The soil in good tilth feels alive and breaks into soil aggregates with a crumbly spongy feel. The soil in poor tilth is compacted and feels harsh and gritty.

Poor physical condition in local soils is undoubtedly more damaging than low fertility in limiting cron yields. Soils in poor condition of tilth are able to absorb and store our limited rainfall, so essentially necessary for profitable yields.

Knowledge of the land is stressed in the display for determining and management. Knowledge of the land is needed in regards to texture, rate of water intake, soil lepth, slope, amount of erosion and range grasses since soil condition determines the level of pro duction. The farmer must know his land before determining land treatment for increasing moisture storage capacity, increasing water applying needed fertilizer, and leveloping his best cropping sys-

(Continued from Page 1) help attract teachers from other states, thus reversing the present flow of qualified teachers out of Texas to neighboring states with more to offer.

The present law would be clarified, streamlined, and brought up to date. Administration would be improved.

No new state tax bill would be needed, Perry made clear. Local school district taxes would not be involved. Teachers would increase their deposits 4 1/2 million dollars per year and the state would match these deposits.

"This is the closest approach to a painless method of easing the teacher shortage," Perry stated.

The local school board president advised that the Texas Association of School Boards, composed of community leaders and substantial taxpayers from all over the state, gave unanimous endorsement to Amendment No. 4 in their convention in mid-October.



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

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
