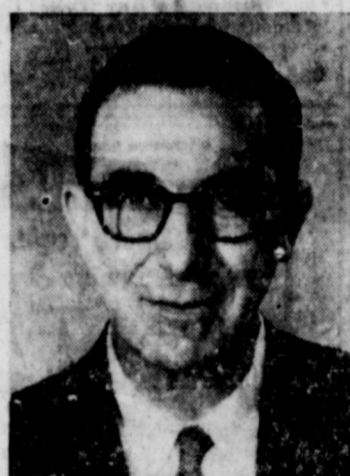

Maverick B Teamers Hang Up Fifth Win

Eastland High School's B team took their fifth win of the season here Thursday night, downing an outclassed Dublin B squad 33-6 before a good crowd at Maverick Stadium.

Dublin held the Mavs scoreless in the fifth quarter, but midway in the second period Bill Norwood took a Dublin punt on his own 35 and weaved his way 65 yards for the first score of the evening. Norwood's extra point try was blocked.

Still in the same period, the visitors punted the Mavs a touchdown. Standing on about his own 20, the Dublin punter booted a high punt that sailed over his head. Swept by a hard wind, the ball rolled into the Dublin endzone. There neither team attempted to recover the ball, and finally the ball was blown dead and Eastland was awarded the score. This time Norwood converted and the Mavs led by a 13-0 count.

Norwood scored again in the third quarter, this time on a 21 yard gallop. The Mav B team speedster again put the ball through the uprights to make it 20-0.

Still in the third quarter, Larry Hollis tucked in the ball and raced 17 yards into paydirt. Norwood's extra point try was no good this time.

Dublin scored early in the fourth quarter. A 22 yard pass and run play netted the visitors their only score of the game.

Eastland came back to draw final blood, with Elton Williams scoring on a 10 yard run.

The annual meeting of the Eastland County Red Cross Chapter will be held Nov. 15, Stanley Webb, county chairman, announced today.

The meeting will be held at 2 p.m. in the 91st District Court room in Eastland. Webb urged all members to make plans to attend.

Amendment No. 4 would increase the security, prestige and attractiveness of teaching as a profession, thus easing the task of teacher recruitment. It would also encourage teachers to stay on the job, despite the better pay and other inducements offered by private employers.

Teachers could contribute six per cent of their pay, compared to a present maximum of five per cent. The state would match the amount contributed by teachers.

Teachers retiring at 60, after 20 years of service, would qualify for a minimum monthly payment of \$100, compared to present amounts ranging much less than half that amount. Compensation for death or disability would be added.

Reciprocal privileges would be added.

Third Republican Victory In History of County Is Possible

Eastland County citizens go to the polls Tuesday, and there is a 50-50 chance they will vote Republican for the third time in the history of the county, political observers in this area believe.

The county, like the state, voted for the Republican presidential candidate, Dwight D. Eisenhower, four years ago, and from all indications the county may again go in to the Republican column this year. It is expected that Ranger will go Democratic.

In 1952 county voters gave Eisenhower a margin of 4518 votes to 3386 for Adlai E. Stevenson, his Democratic opponent. The President's immense personal popularity has lessened little if at all in this county, but some observers say that the county, with a large farm vote, may shift back into the traditional Democratic column because of dissatisfaction with the Republican farm program.

Four years ago Eisenhower carried two of the larger cities in Eastland County, but Stevenson came out on top in Ranger. Eastland went for Eisenhower by a margin of 1073 to 619; Cisco voted 1279 to 728 for the Republican candidate, and Ranger cast their margin for Stevenson, 831 to 678.

What threat of the war that now hangs over the world will have on the election is unforeseeable. The Republicans and "Texas Democrats for Eisenhower" have used "Peace and Prosperity" as their slogan throughout the campaign, and in Eastland county have carried on an active crusade, including newspaper, radio, billboard and direct mail advertising. Democrats, on the other hand, have done little in behalf of their candidate in this county.

One once before 1952 had the county voted Republican. That was when Herbert Hoover was elected president.

Eastland voters who live west of Daugherty vote at City Hall, and those who live east of Daugherty vote at the courthouse. In Ranger, Precinct 3 voters will cast their ballots at City Hall and Precinct 4 is at Young School. Precinct 1 chairman is H. P. Pentecost. Assistants will be Happy Hightower and Hoover Pittman.

Precinct 2 chairman is Herman Hassell. Mrs. B. B. Bralley and J. H. Rusing are assistants.

Precinct 3 chairman is A. G. Koenig. D. C. Arterburn and Jess Carter are assistants.

Precinct 4 voting will be under the direction of R. H. Hodges. Leslie Hagaman and A. H. Powell will assist.

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Two New Eastland County Wells Are Being Drilled; Area Activity Up

Two new wildcat tries have been staked in Eastland County, and oil activities in surrounding counties also has seen new action this week.

In Eastland County, the No. 1 J. T. Watson is being drilled by George W. Keith, et al, of Wichita Falls 990 feet from the south line and 3630 feet from the east line of Section 37, Block 4, H&TC Survey, seven miles northwest of Eastland on a 200-acre lease in the north central part of the county. It is an east outpost to an old marginal producer. Proposed depth is 3800 feet with rotary.

Drill Well Oil Co. and R. B. Morris, et al, also of Wichita Falls, are drilling the No. 1 Sam S. Powers. Location is 330 feet from the north lines of the G. W. Dakan survey, three miles north of Desdemona on a 53-acre lease. The try is three miles north of the old Desdemona field. Elevation is 1460 feet and proposed depth is 3500 feet.

Three new tries have been staked in Stephens County. The first is the No. 1 C. H. Compton, a wildcat being drilled by McElroy Ranch Co. of Midland. The well spots 2310 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the west line of Section 7, Block 7, T&P Survey, three miles south of Eolian of a 405 acre lease, two miles southwest of the Eolian Caddo area, and one-half miles west of a 3709 failure. Proposed depth is 4100 feet to the Caddo said with rotary.

Another Stephens County try is the No. 5 Molly Pratt. Being drilled by Ira-Lee Drilling Co. of Lubbock, the well is located 170 feet from the north line and 830 feet from the west line of Section 1022, TE&L Survey, two miles southeast of Etalville on a 130-acre lease. Elevation is 1120 feet with proposed depth listed at 4500 feet.

Cheyenne Oil Corp. of Wichita Falls is drilling the No. 1 Donnell as a wildcat in Section 62, BBB & C Survey, four miles north of Crystal Falls in Stephens County. Proposed depth is 4700 feet.

In Palo Pinto County, the No. 4 Swenson Estate is being drilled by Palco Oil Co. of Ranger. The try is 300 feet from the north line and 165 feet from the east line of the BBB&C Survey A-78, five miles west of Strawn on a 295 acre lease. Proposed depth is the No. 2-A L. E. Seaman Estate being drilled by Henry L. Seale and James P. Lohan of Breckenridge. The try is located in Section 1, TS&S Survey A-1339, five miles north of Brad. Proposed depth is 5000 feet.

A Callahan County try is being drilled by J. A. McGee et al of Abilene. The well is the No. 1 G. A. Brown and is located in Section 2283, TE&L Survey, three miles east of Putnam. Proposed depth is 1900 feet with casing tools.

In Shackelford County, G. E. Kadane and Sons of Wichita Falls are drilling the No. 1 W. H. Green "L." The try is in Section 29, BAI Survey, nine miles southwest of Albany. Proposed depth is 4500 feet.

R. E. Collie of Breckenridge is drilling the No. 14 W. Y. Davis as a regular field try in Shackelford County. The try is in Section 19, Block 13, T&P Survey, 18 miles west of Albany. Proposed depth is 1700 feet with casing tools.

(Continued from Page 1) help attract teachers from other states, thus reversing the present flow of qualified teachers out of Texas to neighboring states with more to offer.

The present law would be clarified, streamlined, and brought up to date. Administration would be improved.

No new state tax bill would be needed, Perry made clear. Local school district taxes would not be involved. Teachers would increase their deposits 4 1/2 million dollars per year and the state would match these deposits.

"This is the closest approach to a painless method of easing the teacher shortage," Perry stated.


The local school board president advised that the Texas Association of School Boards, composed of community leaders and substantial taxpayers from all over the state, gave unanimous endorsement to Amendment No. 4 in their convention in mid-October.

"It's good business for Eastland to keep the experienced teachers we have for our children especially when the supply is scarce," Perry maintained. "An adequate retirement system will help us do that."

(Continued from Page 1) accruing to the retirement fund.

5. For or against the amendment to Section 49-b or Article III of the Constitution of Texas to charge the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II and to Texas Veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

6. For or against the constitutional amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State.

7. For or against the constitutional amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem.

8. For or against the amendment to the Constitution of the

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State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two previous felonies.

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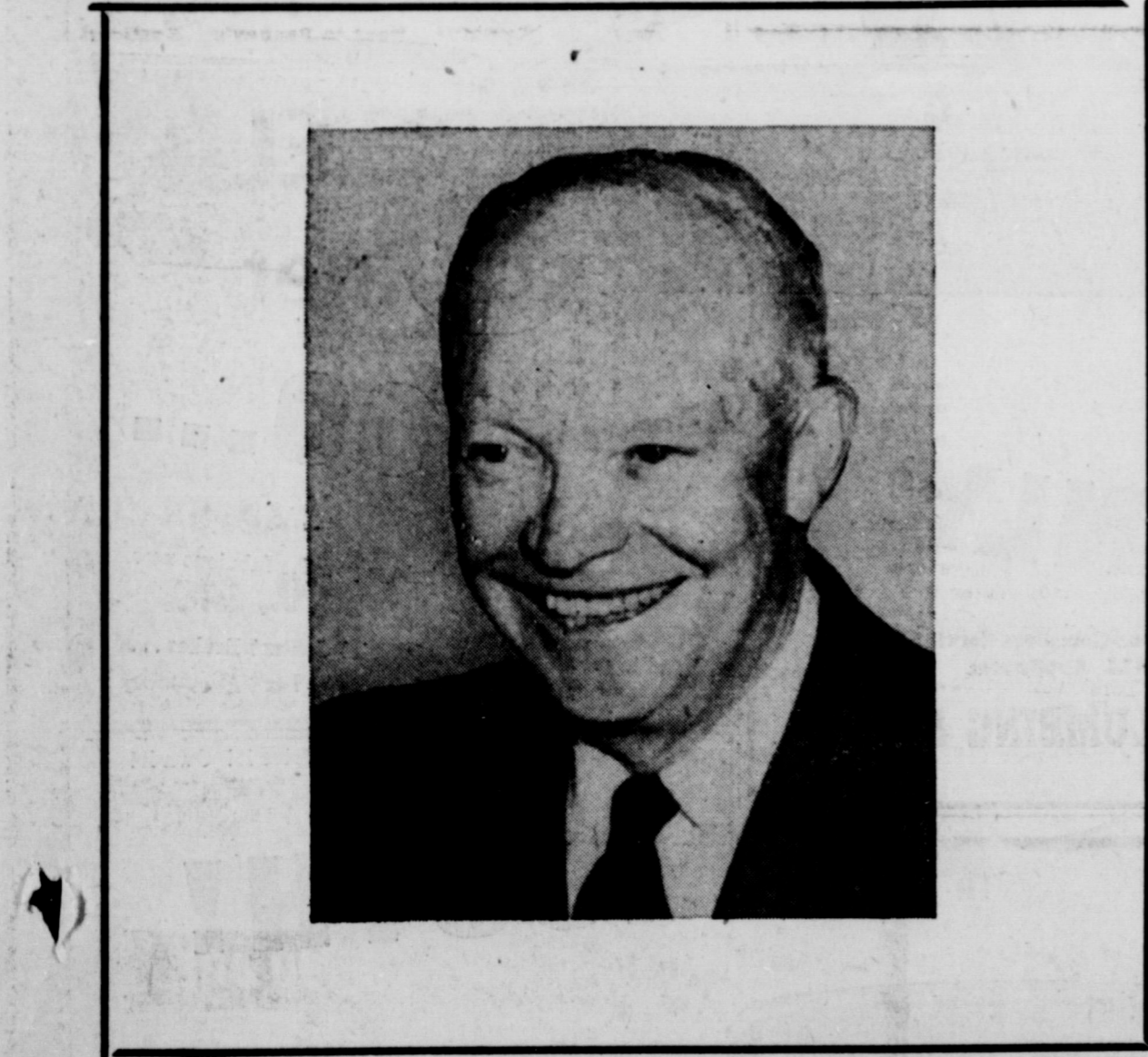

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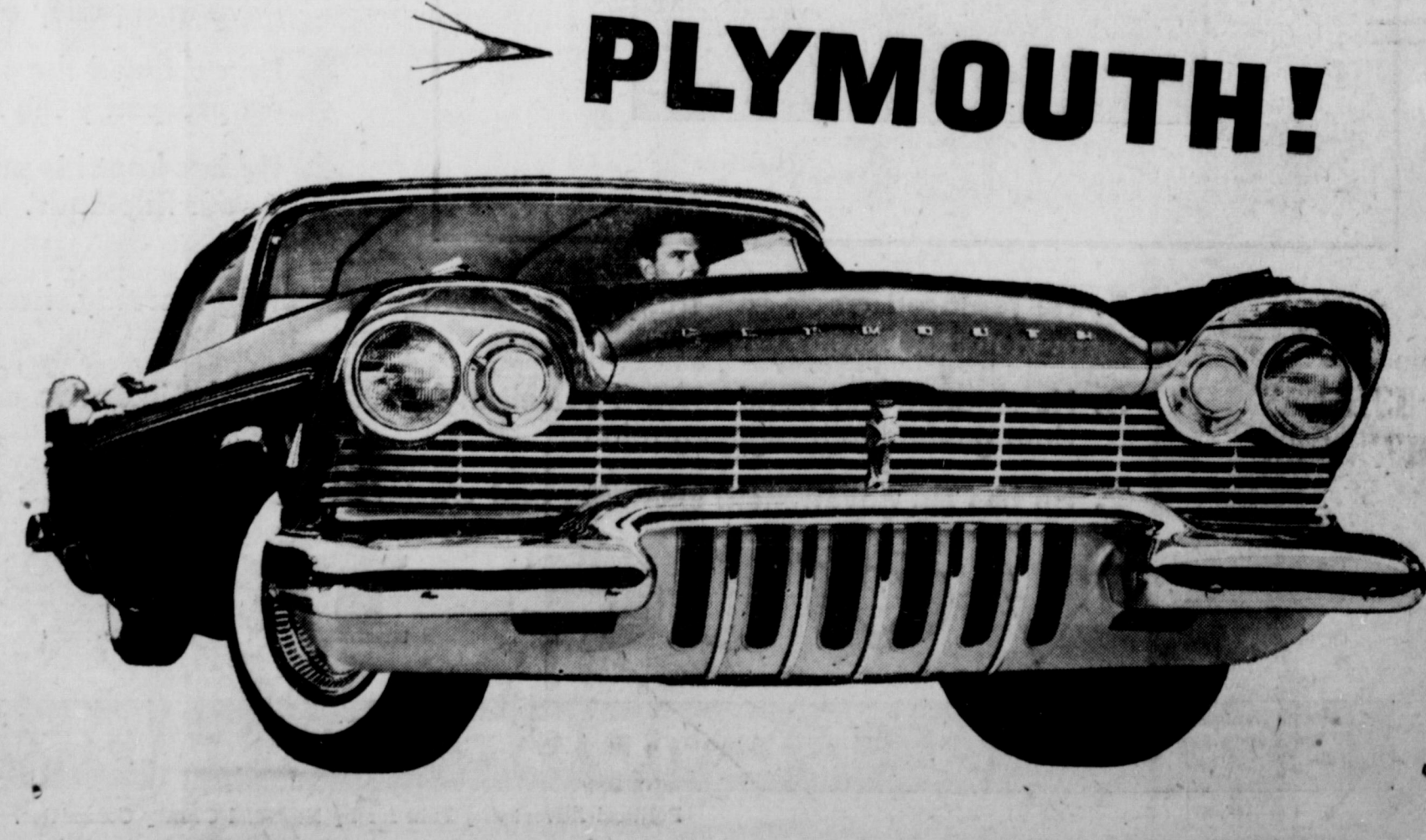
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
