Twenty-One Oil Tanks Collapse During the Tornado.

DEL RIO, Texas, March 22 .-Del Rio business men today surveyed the wreckage caused by a tornado and torrential rain which struck here last night and estimated the damage would amount

to upward of \$800,000. The Illinois Pipe Line company reported 21 of the 25 tanks on its tank farm near Del Rio collapsed during the blow when the wind reached a velocity of 56 miles an hour.

The tanks had a capacity of 80, first 000 barrels each of oil. Stocks in stores here were dam-
