#### Federal Aid for Texas **Centennial** Celebration

Walter Cline and his lieutenants have been haunting the footsteps of federal solons at the capital of the nation. A joint congressional committee agreed that the federal government should participate in the Texas Centennial celebration in 1936. Senator Tom Connally "knows where to find his hat." He said a bill he introduced calling for an appropriation of \$3,000,000 specified that the money be spent for a federal exhibit, rather than be given to the Texas Centennial commission of the Central Exposition corporation. John Boyle and J. K. Beretva, leading citizens of the Alamo City, are members of the new commission. Major General John A. Hulen is another member. Col. Karl Elobitzelle of Dallas is a fourth member. There are others. Karl Hoblitzelle began his career at 19 when Former Gov. David R. Francis was the president of the St. Louis Exposition. Francis was very fond of his youthful secretary and clothed him with extraordinary power in arranging for the amusement features of the big show of that period. Well, the youthful secretary of Francis has travelled far in the years that have fled. He is widely known in Texas. He is a long time citizen of Dallas. He has a background.

Away back in 1808 the Knapps of Virginia moved westward to the frontier city of St. Louis and Col. George Knapp, then head of the family, established the St. Louis Republican, a democratic daily which had a remarkable run for many many years and ws finally taken over by those who controlled the St. Louis Globe-Democrat. Karl Hoblitzelle is the great-grandson of the Knapp who established this pioneer daily on the banks of the "Father of Waters." His father, Charles Hoblitzelle, was born in Maryland. He was for years a democratic as well as a business leader of St. Louis and identified with its growth in population and wealth and industry.

#### **Texas Highways Builders Plan Mighty Program**

"Highway building extraordinary" is the program outlined by the Texas commission. Harry Hines is the new chairman. Gobb Gilchrist continues highway engineer. A session was held Tuesday. The commission awarded contracts aggregating \$665,000, and made the interesting announcement that it would seek \$100,000,000 in federal funds for emergency construction. Mr. Hines and Engineer Gilchrist will journey to Washington where they will consult or confer with the powers that be. They are going to ask that Texas' portion of the federal government's \$4,-880,000,000 work relief program be increased from a tentative \$46,000.000 to \$100,000,000.

Chairman Hines insists that Texas needs a minimum of \$100,000,000.

There will be a Centennial celebration next year. Highways of Texas, the main arteries of travel and traffic, should appeal to a vast army of tourists who are coming to Texas. There is one point the state legislators of Texas should not overlook. They have been reminded time and again that the principle of non-diversion of special highway user taxes was given masterful recognition by the congress in 1934 in the Haydon-Cartwright act, whereby any state will be denied a third of its federal aid fund for highways if by diversion of user taxes it reduces its contributions to the federal aid system."
