



## MAVS SEEK QUARTERFINAL WIN

### Moore... Eastland

Here are a few pass alongs we are throwing your way concerning football.

Bill Morgan, sports writer from the Dallas Morning News, wrote this in his column Wednesday about the Linden-Wilmer-Hutchins game of last week:

"Their first venture into the state playoffs in six years a thing of the past, the Wilmer-Hutchins Eagles this week turned their attention to basketball and to whether their top lineman can get his leg in shape in the next nine months.

"The Eagles lost Billy Dillard in the second period Saturday night at Commerce as they were in the process of losing Class A regional battle to Linden, 25-0.

"Dillard's left leg was broken, and he spent some anguishing minutes in pain before an ambulance arrived to take him to a Commerce hospital. He might have had a longer wait, but Linden's Hiram Strutton was knocked out a few plays earlier and the ambulance was already on the way to the stadium when Dillard was hurt.

"Luke Thornton, the Eagles' coach, said Dillard's leg wasn't set until Monday. The big junior was 'knocked out' at the hospital for the return trip to a Dallas hospital.

"He was blocking a boy head-on when he got hurt," Thornton said. "I saw him make the block and saw him fall, but I just don't know how he broke that leg—so bad."

"Dillard was injured on the second-period kickoff following Linden's first touchdown. Strutton's injury came just nine plays before that. By the time the ambulance arrived, still another Linden grinder was tagged as a passenger for the trip to the hospital.

"That indicates it was a pretty rough game and the Eagles agreed.

"Our kids said they've never seen a team hit so hard," Thornton said. I think we both got some boys banged up in that one. White (Fullback Red White) told me that Parma (Wilson Parma) had hurt his shoulder and at the half Wilson told me 'My shoulder feels kind of funny.' The kid got a shoulder separation in the first half."

"Probably the biggest injury to either side came three days before the game when Eagle Quarterback Marion Turner underwent an emergency appendectomy.

"The loss of Turner, and Linden's rocky defense, held the Eagles to 99 yards rushing and let them get as far as the Linden 15 only once. Turner was able to make it to the game as a spectator, but returned to the hospital Sunday.

"Four Eagles took a hand at quarterbacking — two halfbacks, and one quarterback and a man who had seen little action previously.

"It was apparent to those who saw the Eagles before—like Rockwell team — that their ground game suffered badly without the lanky junior there to call the shots.

"Rockwell's team and Coaches G. A. Glenn and Carlton McCormack were there. The Eagles beat Rockwell last week in bi-district, 34-12. The Rockwell boys stopped by the Wilmer-Hutchins dressing room before the game to wish the Eagles luck.

"After the game, Rockwell's little halfback, Jerry Anderson, said, 'It's too bad that had to happen to Marion ... but since it did happen, I wish it would have been a week sooner.'

And the Denton Record-Chronicle tabs the game as a battle of offense vs. defense. They say Linden is "slightly tighter on defense and not as powerful offensively" as the Mavericks. By the way, the Eagle Club, the Chamber of Commerce and the

## Eastland Eleven To Play Linden Friday

The 1956 version of the Eastland Mavericks will attempt to set an all-time record for an Eastland High School football team Friday night when they journey to Denton to take on the Linden Tigers in a crucial quarterfinal Class A game.

It's "win or hang up your uniform time" for Coach Carrol Shelton's rugged eleven. The 1956 Mavericks already have tied the record set by the 1947 Mavs, but now they must win to boost Eastland's gridiron stock any higher. Kick-off time at Fouts Field on the North Texas State College campus is set for 8 p.m.

It will be a battle of two T-model teams which have the looks and speed of the latest model supermobile. Both run from tight standard T formations and both have aggressive lines and fast backs. Both have also been surprise teams by getting to the quarterfinals. If the dopesters had had their say, both elevens would have fallen in defeat two weeks ago in bi-district play.

The Tigers — with a not so impressive 8-4 record for the year — get a lot more respect after a closer look at their record. Linden has lost only to Class AA elevens, and two of them — Dekalb and Gilmer — had 10-0 records during regular season play.

The Tigers opened against Gilmer, losing 0-6. Then they scared tough Dekalb before going down in defeat 20-25. An 18-0 win over Hooks got them into the win column, but New Boston snapped them right back out with a 13-15 defeat. Jefferson was the last team to beat the Bengals. They did it to the tune of 14-9. Then came five wins in a row to give Linden the right to go into the state playoffs. They beat the following teams in order: Bogota, 40-7; Hughes Springs, 37-7; Paul Hewitt, 52-0; Talco, 20-0; and James Bowie, 28-6.

In bi-district play the Tigers knocked off highly rated White Oak, a perfect record team, and then smashed a crippled Wilmer-Hutchins team 25-0 in regional play.

The Tigers are a threat both by land and air, led by Quarterback Donald Burns, a lad who is being mentioned by many as a likely all-state product. He has a top receiver in End Kenneth Hays, a 190 pounder who's also a defensive standout. Halfback Alvie Hitchcock, a 155 speed demon, is the lad Coach Shelton says he expects the most trouble from, however.

"Linden uses a lot of flankers and they like to trap and cross block," Shelton said. Shelton revealed that the Tigers use very little spacing in their line. "They like to run their T tight."

The Mav head mentor described Burns as a "real fine quarterback" and pointed out that Linden had two touchdowns called back in their game against Wilmer-Hutchins last week. Shelton did admit that Wilmer-Hutchins was "demoralized" by the loss of their star tackle, who suffered a broken leg, in the last half, however. Linden led the Eagles by a slim 6-0 margin at halftime, despite the fact that Wilmer-Hutchins' star quarterback didn't even suit up because of illness.

"The game has all the markings of a thriller. Both teams have a scoring punch and both are fairly rugged on defense. Eastland has scored 388 points to their 12 opponents' 137 this season, while Linden has 288 points to their credit to only 93 for their opponents.

Linden will have a slight weight advantage. Three big men in 15-A District champions' line boost its average to 174 pounds a man. That compares to a 167 pound average for Eastland's line. In the backfield the Mavs have a slight edge, 158½ pounds a man to 156. Overall Eastland has a 156½ to 164 pounds a man, or 165 to 164 pounds a man.

Coaches Shelton and Jon Tate report their teams in good physical condition and excellent mental shape. Only a couple of colds hamper the Mavs' healthwise.

The Mavericks had a record of nine wins and three losses this season, with all of the losses coming in early season play.

The Fort Worth weatherman has predicted that the cold front which has been pushing down on this area for the last few days won't reach Denton in time to hamper the Mavs' healthwise.

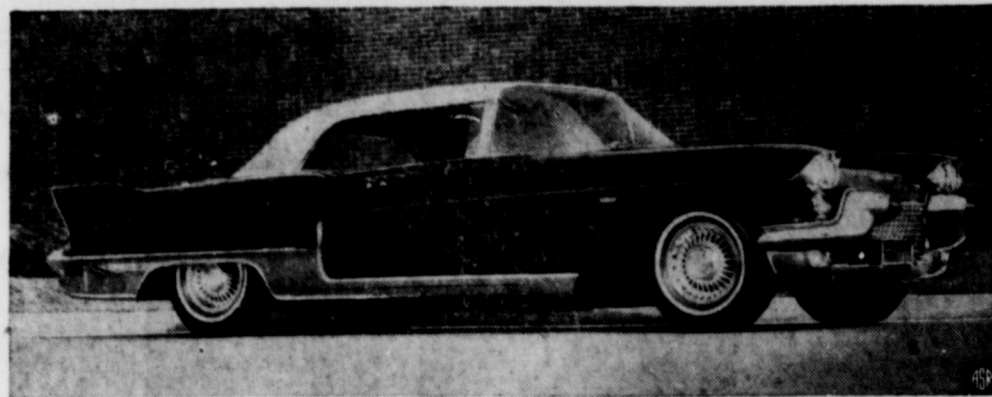

### Income Tax Forms To Be Mailed Soon

Federal income tax forms for the preparation of 1956 returns were made available about Dec. 3 in reasonable quantities to accountants, attorneys and other professional personnel. A. E. Fogle, Jr., District Director (Administrative Officer) of the Abilene office of the Internal Revenue

Service, said today. The Internal Revenue Service has provided order blanks to the 3500 North Texas tax practitioners who have, in most cases, already submitted orders. These orders are being packaged and shipped starting Dec. 3. Individual taxpayers on record will receive their forms and instruction booklets through the mails on the same schedule as last year, during late December or early January, Mr. Fogle said. There are very few changes in the form other than minor revisions for clarity and simplification. The instruction booklet which accompanies it has been changed, however, to provide a line-by-line series of explanations, keyed to the arrangement of the form and its sequence of entries.

### Garden Club Hint—Plant Roses Now

Anyone can grow roses, according to A. F. DeWorth, head, Department of Floriculture at Texas A&M College. They may be planted in the fall or spring. In Texas, fall planting is generally preferred.

Aim for quality and you may also get quantity. Many gardeners try to grow too many varieties or too many plants. Given careful attention, Mr. DeWorth says that 10 well chosen varieties will produce as many flowers and give far more pleasure than 50 poorly-tended plants.

Essentials for success with roses are: proper planting, a sunny location and well-drained soil. Start with No. 1 grade plants, and have the ground ready when the plants arrive. Make sure roots are never exposed to sunlight or drying winds.

Water plants thoroughly. Don't apply fertilizer to newly-planted bushes until the root system is well established, then feed at least twice a season. Never fertilize in late fall. Keep plants free of insects and disease with a regular spraying or dusting schedule.

McFadden was discussing the pedestrian phase of the holiday hazards program which the Texas Safety Association is now conducting.

"Many walkers show a complete disregard for their own safety," McFadden said. "They seem to have a childish belief that, no matter what they do, drivers will watch out for them."

He said that walkers become more careless than ever during the holiday season. They get caught up in the excitement of holiday planning, shopping and partying and become so preoccupied that they

McFadden listed two of the most dangerous pedestrian practices as dashing out into the street without looking, and crossing against the lights at intersections.

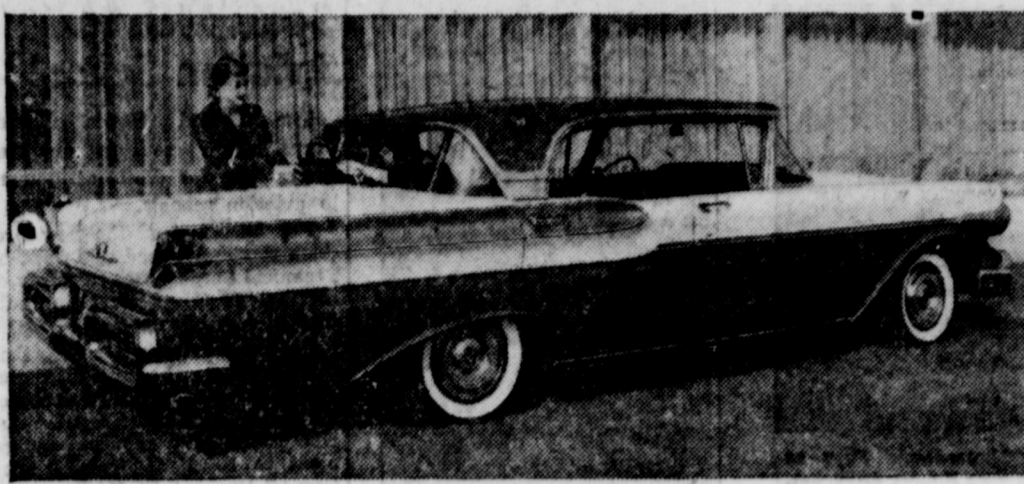
"And at this time of year pedestrians often hide behind umbrellas or stacks of packages," McFadden said. "They can't see where they're going and they become a menace to motorists and other pedestrians."

McFadden warned pedestrians to be especially cautious in bad weather.

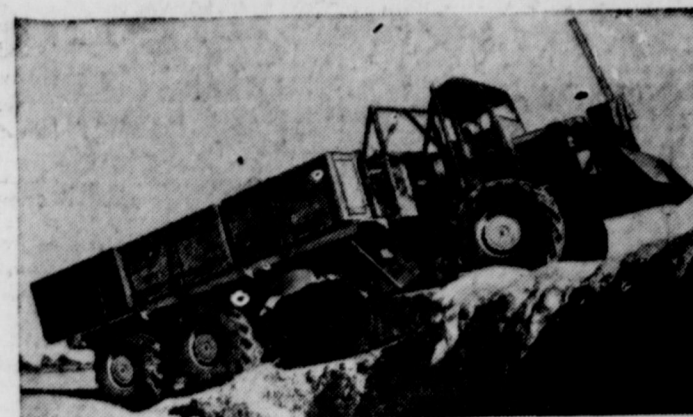
"Snow and rain reduce visibility, making it difficult for you to see vehicles and making it more difficult for drivers to see you," he said. "These conditions also make roadways and sidewalks slippery. Cars are likely to skid, and pedestrians are unsure of their footing."

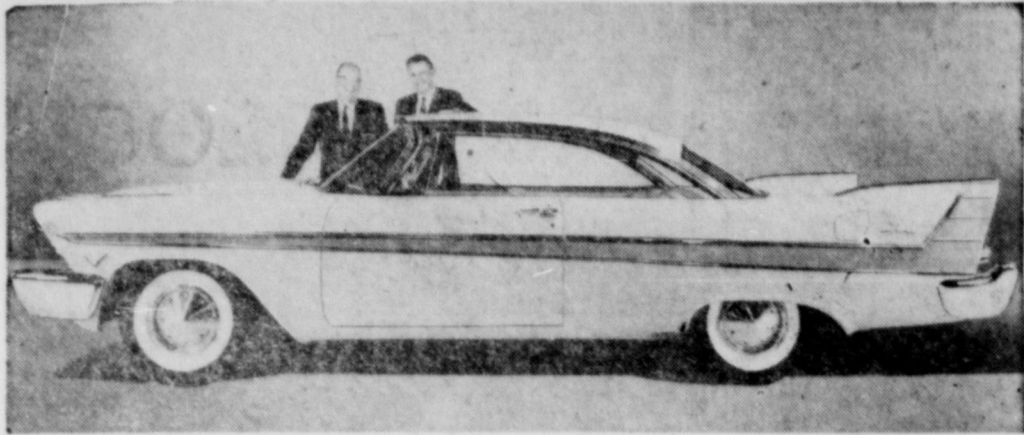

### Marine Corps Seeks Men for Aviation School

The United States Marine Corps is now seeking qualified young men for direct assignment to aviation schools.

The initiation of the new program was announced this week by Technical Sergeant L. R. Posey of the Marine Corps recruiting substation, in Abilene.

Sergeant Posey said that, "Young men who are interested in aviation and who are qualified for enlistment in the regular Marine Corps may request assignment to aviation. The Marine Corps," he went on, "will guarantee assignment to an aviation school of the man's choice in so far as school quotas permit."

Under the new program, men requesting this type of duty will be assigned to an aviation school of their choice upon completion of recruit and individual training.

Young men selected for or who chose aviation will have over 20 schools to which they may request assignment. They range from Aviation Fundamentals and Jet Aircraft and Helicopter Mechanics through Radar, Radio and Training Devices, Electronics and Electricians schools, Photo Technician and Air Launched Guided Missiles.

Sergeant Posey stressed that men who are interested should contact the Abilene recruiting station located in the old postoffice building at 900 N. 3rd Street, immediately to take advantage of this program.

### Walters Greet Group To Start Copter Training

CAMP WALTERS, Texas—The first class of men to enter helicopter pilot training at Camp Walters arrived recently.

The first class includes 78 enlisted men, all volunteer trainees, who will be taught by civilian instructors provided by Southern Airways Corporation.

The men will start four weeks of pre-flight training, then will undergo 18 weeks of flight training. They will then be transferred to Fort Rucker, Ala. for final training.

A new class will start training each month.

### 16-Million Lbs. Aspirin Taken Annually In U.S.

Monsanto Chemical Company produced at St. Louis on November 28, 1956, its 100 millionth pound of aspirin. The company is the world's largest producer of the compound and was its first independent producer in the United States, beginning in April, 1917. (Bayer's U. S. patent on aspirin expired February 27, 1917, but the German company had established captive production of aspirin in the

U. S. prior to that date.) Aspirin (acetylsalicylic acid) is the most widely used drug in the world and, at approximately one-half cent per tablet, is also the cheapest.

The United States consumed an estimated four million pounds of aspirin in 1955. Its current annual consumption of aspirin is at the rate of 16 million pounds. This is equivalent to almost 60 million 5-grain tablets daily.

Retail sales of aspirin and aspirin compounds as internal analgesics (not including cold remedies) in 1955 added up to \$197,110,000. This was approximately 20 per cent above 1954's total of \$163,890,000. The wet, severe winter of 1955-56 is partly attributable for this marked increase.

Over recent years, consumption of aspirin in the United States has been increasing at an average rate of approximately 10 per cent each year. This is almost twice as rapid as the nation's rate of population growth.

The 100 million pounds of aspirin produced by Monsanto to date is equivalent to 115 billion aspirin

tablets, sufficient to cure headaches for every person in the United States every day for more than one year.

Figuring a cup of water to each two tablets, all of the water that flows over Niagara Falls in 35 hours would be needed to wash down that many aspirin tablets.

Laid out in single file, the tablets from 100 million pounds of aspirin would reach a distance equal to one and one-half round trips to the moon.

In granular form, that much aspirin could blanket in white the entire state of Rhode Island.

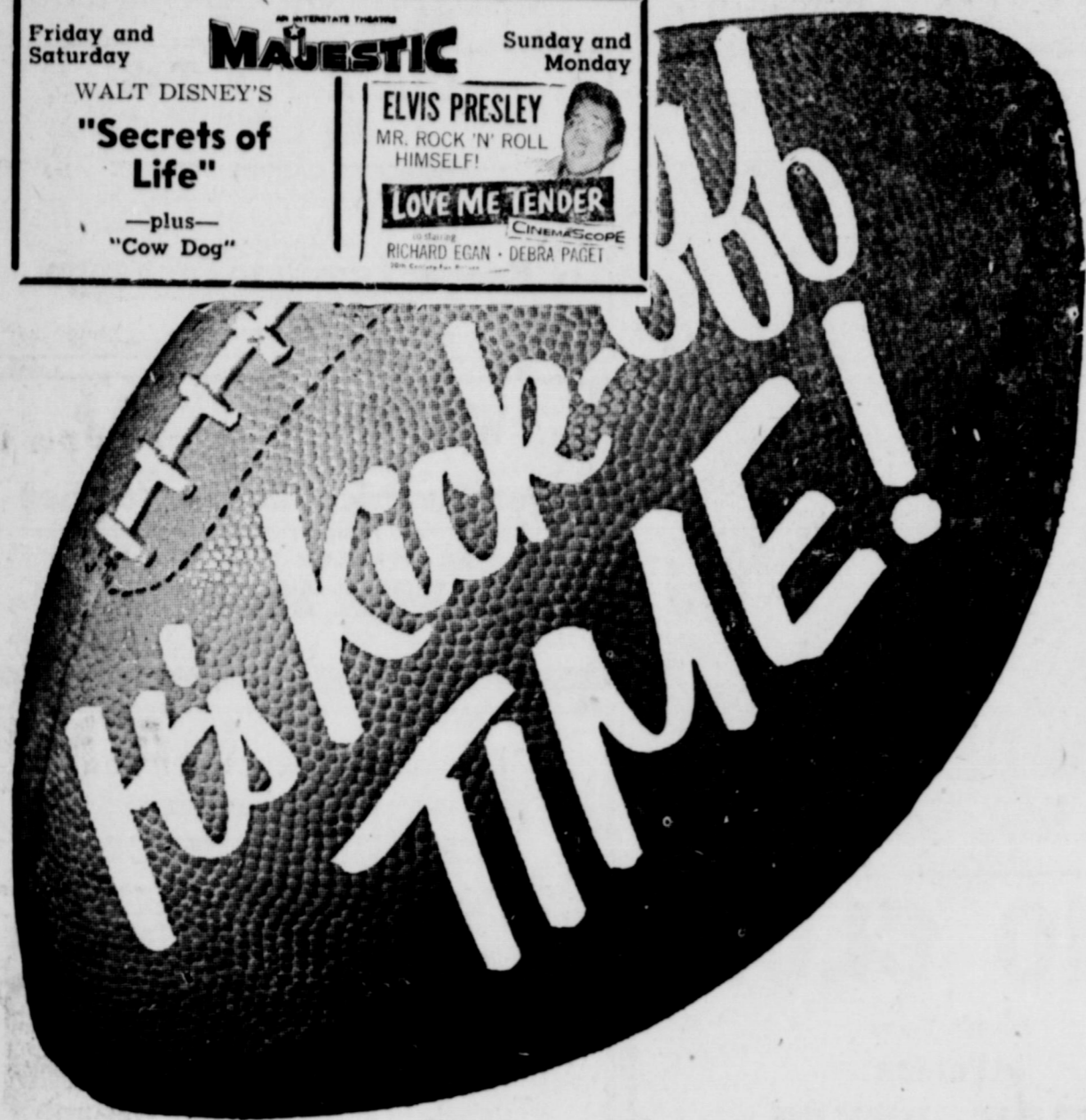

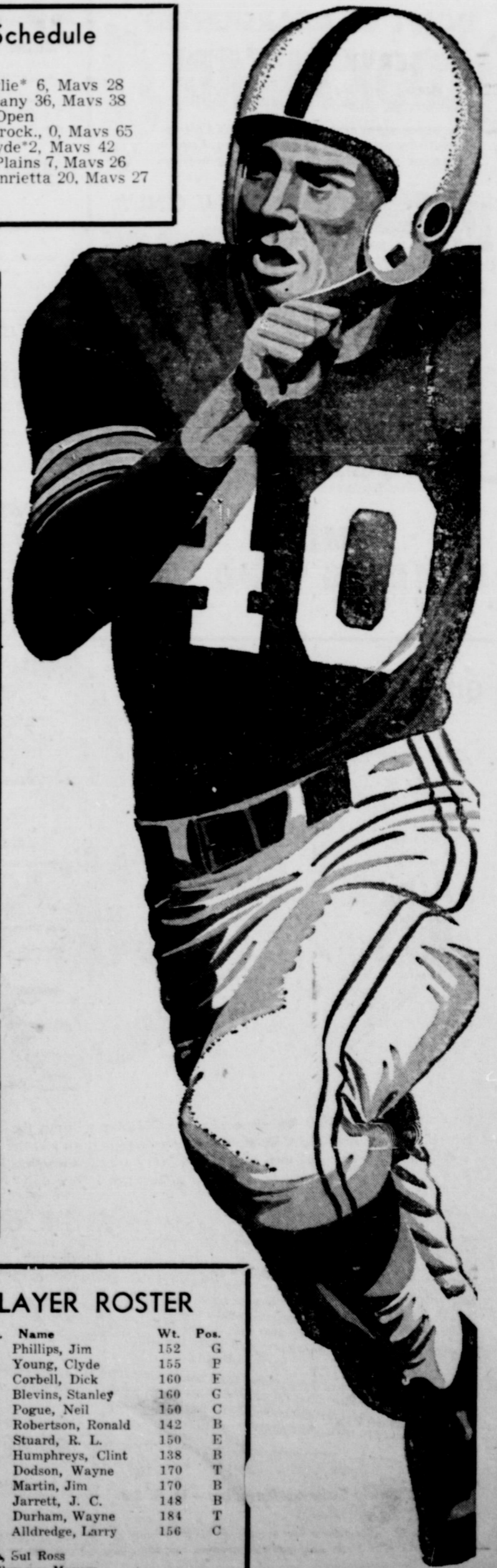

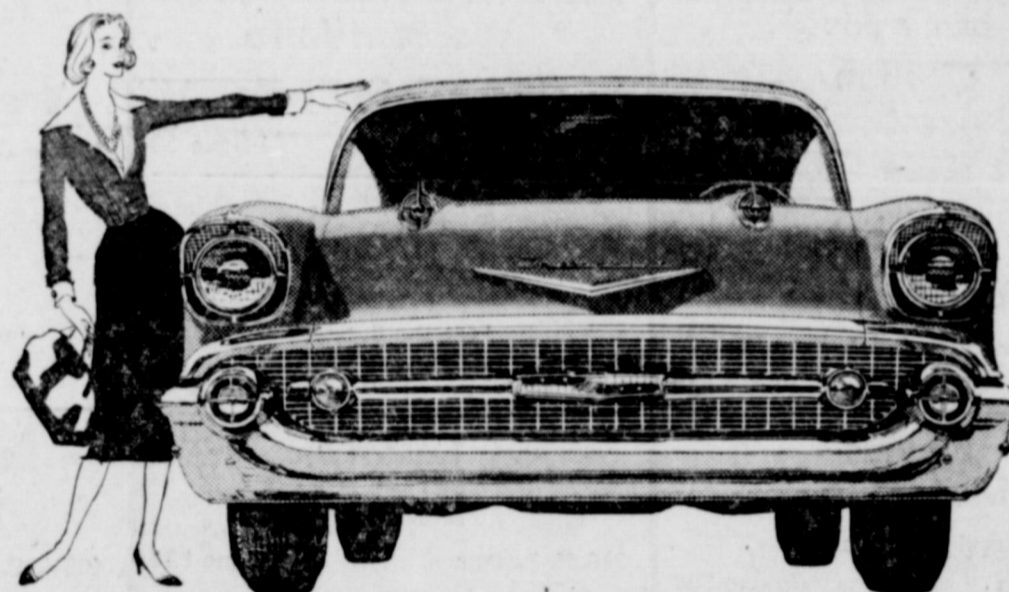
