Back in 1947, when Eastland won regional, that was far as a team could go. Now the Class A race goes all the way to the wire.

PACIFIC FLEET (PHTC) — With Destroyer Division 112, William J. Blackmon, machinist's mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Blackmon of 310 S. 2nd St., Eastland, visited Wellington, New Zealand in early November.

During a four-day visit to Wellington, members of the division were entertained by the American Ambassador to New Zealand, the Honorable R. C. Hendrickson.

The four ships of the division made the 12,000-mile trip from their home port of San Diego, Calif., in just under 13 days.

Top Forger Captured After Passing Check On Eastland County Merchant

One of the nation's most wanted forgers was trapped in Breckenridge last week through the alertness of a Cisco, merchant who suspected a passed check as being worthless.

Arrested and booked for passing and forgery was David Lavon Cason, 28 years of age, an escaped convict and a native of Florida. The arrest was made by Breckenridge city officers and sheriff's deputies, with the assistance of Texas Ranger James E. Riddle.

Riddle told Justice of the Peace J. R. Boggs of Eastland, in whose court formal charges were prepared, "This man is a master forger, and a check with the FBI reveals he is one of their most wanted men."

In a statement to officers and Boggs, Cason gave this story: He left his mother's home in Florida last week in her 1956 automobile, telling her he was going to Ohio. Instead, he went to Louisiana and entered Texas at Port Arthur. On the way, however, he printed up his supply of fake construction company checks, drawn on the "Williams Construction Company," of Shreveport, La. Cason admitted there was no such company. And, while sitting on a dirt road near Mobile, Alabama, he typed out several checks made payable to "J. B. Brown" on a typewriter he had bought with one of the forged checks in Atlanta, Ga. All checks were in amounts ranging from \$47 to \$80.

Boggs stated, "Cason was clever enough to allow for payroll deductions, withholding taxes, etc., in order to make the check look more authentic."

In order to get the checks cashed, Cason used jewelry and clothing stores. In jewelry stores, his main item of purchase was cuff links, and in clothing stores it was shirts and gloves.

Rainfall Far Below Normal In Eastland

Eastland is still 11.99 inches short of the average rainfall figure toady with less than a month left in 1956.

Total rainfall in November was 1.44 inches, pushing the total for the year to 14.15 inches.

It has been dry most of the month with the only moisture coming during the first four days of the month. Thirteen hundredths fell the first, 1.31 inches the fourth and 14 hundredths the fifth.

If December should be a rainless month, this would be the second driest year in the history of Eastland, at least during the past 45 years when records have been kept. The driest year on record was 1948 when only 14.10 inches fell.

Coldest day was Nov. 29, when the mercury dropped to 24 de-

grees. Nov. 9 was second in line with a 25 degree reading. Warmest day was Nov. 15 when an 80 degree reading was recorded.

Here is a breakdown of rainfall for the year: January, 1.74;

February, 1.94; March, .10; April, 3.30; May, 2.50; June, .33; July, .30; August, .20; September, .44; October, 2.05; and November, 1.58.

Quarterfinal Game Set For Friday At Denton

Two teams which the experts said would never survive bi-district play will clash Friday night in Denton in a Class A quarterfinal game. It will be the Eastland Mavericks vs. the Linden Tigers. Both teams have polished off perfect-record elevens in their climb towards the top.

Eastland earned the right to meet the Tigers by defeating previously unbeaten Henrietta last Friday in a major upset. Linden moved past a crippled Wilmer-Hutchins team to earn the right,

and the previous week they raised many an eyebrow when they upset highly touted White Oak—the highest scoring team in Texas schoolboy football at the time.

Linden and Eastland are divided by some 300-plus Texas miles and officials of the two schools decided on a neutral site rather than make one team do all the traveling. Denton's North Texas State College stadium, which is practically new and seats about 25,000, was selected. Denton is 127 miles from Eastland and

about 200 from Linden. Slow Starters

Both teams got off to a slow start this year, but both have come alive now. Linden dropped four of their first five games and Eastland was loser of three of their first five tilts. All four of Linden's losses were to Class AA teams, however, and two of Eastland's setbacks came at the hands of AA elevens. The third Eastland loss, to Cross Plains, was avenged in bi-district play.

Linden's losses can't be sneezed at. Two of the teams which defeated them, Gilmer and DeKalb, turned in perfect records over the regular season, and a third, Seagrville, won their AA district title. Another fact that makes Linden look strong is that Quarterback Donald Burns had to sit out four early season games because of injuries. He is back at full strength now.

Eastland officials met Linden's coaches and superintendent after the Wilmer - Hutchins game Saturday night at Commerce and worked out plans for the quarterfinal tilt. Representing Eastland were Coaches Carrol Shelton and Jon Tate, Supt. Wendell Sieber and Principal Charles Marshall.

Permission to play at the NTSC stadium was secured Sunday and Fort Worth officials were signed to work the game.

The Class County eleven represent District 15-A and Eastland is champion of District 10-A. The game will begin at 8 p.m.

The Class A state playoffs have now been trimmed down from 32 district champions to eight regional winners. In the upper bracket, Stinnett will take on Merkel this week and Eastland will play Linden. In the lower bracket, Mart will play Humble and Honda will test Hallettsville. Honda, Humble, Linden and Stinnett are rated as favorites in the four games.

The Mavericks apparently got through their rough and tough game with Henrietta without any serious injuries. Fullback Saul Pullman, who was the target for a lot of Henrietta's hard play, is reportedly "ready to go."

TCU Accepting Applications for Cotton Bowl Seats

Applications for the Cotton Bowl game are now being accepted by TCU. Ticket Manager Martin Phillips has announced.

Phillips said orders will be accepted by mail only. Applications must be postmarked before midnight Dec. 6, and all orders must be accompanied by a check and a self-addressed stamp envelope. Tickets are \$5.50 each.

Season ticket holders will have first priority on tickets. Each season ticket is good for one Cotton Bowl ticket. A season ticket holder is also entitled to four additional tickets outside his allotment but these probably will be end zone seats.

Non-season ticket holders are permitted to order as many as four and these will be filled by drawing.

"We think we have plenty of good seats between the goal posts and 50-yard line on both sides to handle all the season ticket holders," said Phillips.

WEARY PIER BECOMING PEERLESS

The biggest waterfront rehabilitation job anywhere in the United States is under way in Boston Harbor, reports Engineering News - Record, McGraw - Hill publication. Safeguarding the underpinning of the 38-year old South Boston Army Base has called for building up over a mile of bulkheading. 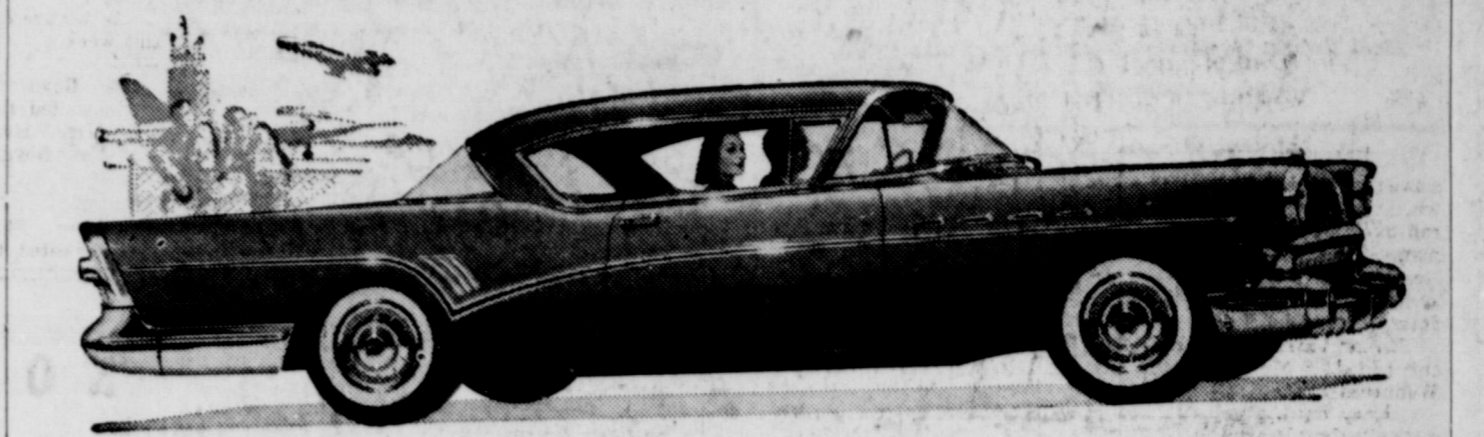

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IT'S THE LAW
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Seller Remains Liable When Buyer Assumes Mortgage

Henry Jones decided to sell his home for \$15,000 and when a buyer was found, the question arose as to how the buyer should finance

the purchase. Henry had a mortgage on his house, with a balance of \$10,000, and the buyer suggested that Henry permit him to take over the mortgage payments, paying Henry the difference of \$5000 in cash. This, argued the buyer, would save him the trouble and expense of getting a new loan himself and so Henry agreed.

Several years after the deal was closed, Henry received a letter from his bank advising that the payments on the mortgage were far in arrears and that he would have to pay or a lawsuit would be filed. Henry was surprised to learn that he was still liable on the original obligation, and that if the

property could not be sold at foreclosure to bring enough money to pay the mortgage balance and the costs, he would have to pay the difference.

Of course, Henry might have sued his buyer for his loss, but the chances would be that the buyer is insolvent and "judgment-proof," so that Henry could not collect a judgment against him. When a mortgage is assumed by a purchaser of real estate, the financial institution still holds the original note which was signed by the seller. If Henry had contacted his bank and obtained a release of liability, Henry would, of course, have been cleared of all further responsibility of the obligation.

Henry's bank, however, would have no reason to release Henry and might be reluctant to do so unless the bank's investigation disclosed that the buyer was at least as credit-worthy as Henry. The bank may also have had additional problems concerning releasing Henry from the obligation if the loan was of the FHA or GI type.

The danger of permitting an assumption of your mortgage loan may, therefore, be considerable, especially in view of the fact that real estate markets may fall after a period of years so that the real estate itself may not be of sufficient value to pay the mortgage note in the event of a default by the buyer.

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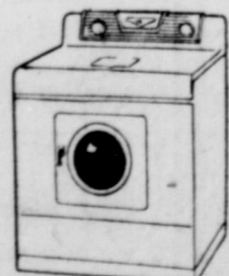

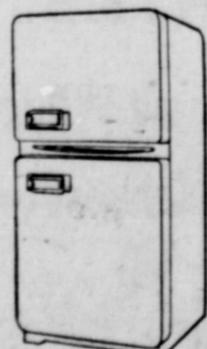
