'Clean Eastland Before Easter' Is Slogan for Civic League Drive

"Let's Clean Eastland Before Easter" seems to be the campaign slogan for the Spring Clean-up Committee of Civic League and Garden Club. Fifteen League members met Monday afternoon in the home of Mrs. James Horton, chairman of the committee. City Manager Lewis Tiner was present to explain the city's participation in the drive.

Tiner stated that a "weed ordinance similar to that used in Fort Worth and other large cities is not practical, due to the amount of paper work and time involved. This ordinance calls for the city to clean property and bill the owner. Eastland has a citation ordinance, but nothing else along this line. Tiner said, "Those towns which have this weed ordinance aren't satisfied with the ordinance."

Mrs. Horton reported that J. W. Bailey, principal of Eastland Junior High School, would ask students to prepare publicity posters for the clean-up campaign, which is scheduled to end March 15, with the city trucks picking up garbage between then and Easter. Tiner said that during the 1966 campaign, the city worked about two weeks gathering and hauling.

Asked about the possibility of more frequent trash pick-up, the year around, Tiner said, "The city isn't even breaking even on the garbage situation now."

Mrs. Horton appointed committees as follows: litter bags, Mrs. J. M. Perkins and Mrs. Floyd Robertson; Boy Scouts, Mrs. Harold Ray and Mrs. Mike Collins; poster distribution, Mrs. Don Pierson; and Jaycee bulletin board, Mr. S. Jim Query.

Other possibilities discussed were a garbage display on the square, similar to one Winters, Texas used in its clean-up drive; the involving of school students and club members in the drive; and mail notification of dirty

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Easter Seal Appeal Begin Feb. 20

1967 Easter Seal Appeal will open in Eastland on Monday, Feb. 20, to H. T. Wilson, representative for the county to contact to request rehabilitation services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing program and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

Special emphasis is being given in 1967 by the Easter Seal Society in Texas to locating disabled children and adults who may need rehabilitation services and do not know where they are available. Wheelchairs, walkers and related services are provided to those who cannot provide for themselves.

Mr. Wilson said the Easter Seal Society depends on the annual Easter Seal Appeal to finance this program of rehabilitation in Texas. He urged Eastland County citizens to increase their support of the Easter Seal Society, and its program to help crippled children and adults.

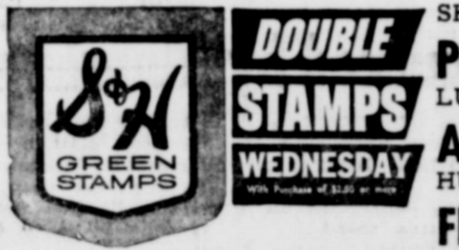

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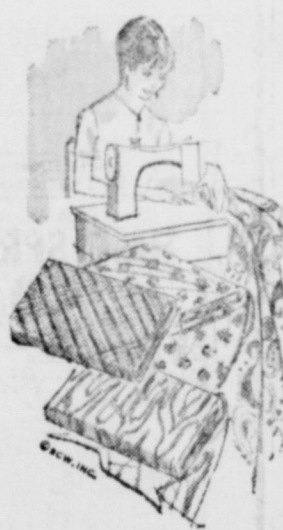

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Jury Expected To Get Suit Wednesday at 5

The \$770,000 civil damage suit went into its third and expected, last day in 91st District Court Wednesday.

Presiding Judge J. Frank Sparks was expected to rule on a bill of exceptions by defense attorneys in the admission of testimony by Highway Department Engineer Tommy

charge was being drawn by attorneys.

The charge was expected to be given to the jury at 1 p.m.

Lengthy testimony involving the shooting death of Dr. Albert Riedel on Nov. 7, 1965, continued Tuesday in the civil case of Mrs. Patsy Riedel vs. Ivan J. Allen.

Testifying Tuesday were Mrs. Riedel, widow; Dr. W.T. Watkins of Ranger, attending physician at Ranger General Hospital at the time of Dr. Riedel's death; and several doctors, including Dr. Robert T. Long of Dallas, a psychoanalyst who had treated Mrs. Riedel.

Eastland County Sheriff L. E. Sublett testified that it was altogether possible that overhanging limbs in the area of the shooting could have deflected a bullet. Dr. Watkins testified as to Dr. Riedel's condition and the wound location, saying that the bullet entered the body under the chest area and angled down at about 20 degrees. Later in the day Magness testified that the elevation at which Dr. Riedel stood at the time of the shooting was some 10 inches higher than the ground on which Allen was standing when the gun fired.

Mrs. Riedel is suing for \$770,000 in civil damages. Allen, indicted for the rifle shooting death of Dr. Riedel, was acquitted of the charge in the same court in January, 1966. Monday, he testified that the death of his nephew was an accident, that the gun Allen was holding went off accidentally and that he did not pull the trigger or aim the gun at anyone. The suit is attempting to prove negligence in handling the gun.

Mrs. Riedel testified that both she and Dr. Riedel were under psychoanalysts care at the time of his death. She said that Dr. Riedel's and her relationships with the Allens had always been good.

She also said that at the time of her husband's death, Allen had said the shooting was an accident. She said, in response to an attorney's question, that Allen was "like a father" to her husband, Mr. Riedel said that all the community property had been left in her husband's will to herself as co-executor.

She testified that her husband drank, but not to excess and that she felt he had no drinking problem. Attorney Virgil Seaberry Jr., attorney with Bill B. Hart, for Allen, read depositions from Mrs. Riedel in 1965 in which she admitted family quarrels and accusations by both herself and the doctor as to alleged infidelity.

Allen returned to the stand to testify that on the day Dr. Riedel was shot that he had told Allen that he was "going to divorce Patsy."

Pretty, blonde Mrs. Patsy Riedel testified Tuesday morning that her marriage to the late Dr. Albert Riedel was a "happy marriage."

Mrs. Riedel, who took the stand about 11:30 a. m., outlined her late husband's school and medical training, beginning with their marriage in 1948, and explained they had been childhood sweethearts since kindergarten. Following a tour of duty in the service, the late Dr. Riedel attended the University of Texas, at which time they were assisted financially by Ivan J. Allen, Riedel's uncle.

According to the testimony, Riedel and his wife were employed in Austin until the birth of their first son in 1950, during which time Riedel drew GI assistance. When their second son was born, he was named Allen for "Uncle Ivan," Mrs. Riedel said. Upon receiving his bachelor's and master's degrees from the UoT, the Riedels moved back to Dallas where he attended Southwestern Medical School for four years.

The family lived in El Paso while Dr. Riedel served his internship, and Mrs. Riedel testified they had no assistance from Mr. Allen at that time. His later training included three years residency in psychiatry at Timberlawn Hospital in Dallas and a year of study in adolescent psychology.

The question of the Riedel's marital problems had come up during Monday's testimony but was not allowed to be presented to the jury after the plaintiff's attorney objected and was sustained by Judge Sparks. Jack Frost of Eastland is assisting the plaintiff's attorney.

After Judge Sparks agreed Tuesday to let the testimony concerning the Riedel's marriage be presented, a doctor and close friend of Riedel of Dallas was questioned by deposition about knowledge of the matter. The testimony said that Riedel had indicated to him that he was concerned about his marriage and about his children. The doctor, upon being questioned as to whether Riedel had a drinking problem, said that he did not know if it was a problem but that it was one of his habits.

Spectators in the courtroom showed visible emotion as the four Riedel children — Scott, 16, Allen, 14, Becky, 10, and Alice, 6, entered the room and were seated in a prominent place. They left during a court recess to return to their school classes in Dallas.

The trial against Allen opened Monday with the defendant, taking the stand.

Bob Cousins, attorney for Mrs. Riedel of Dallas, told prospective jurors "this is not a criminal case, but a civil case to prove only negligence in handling the gun."

The plaintiff's attorney said "Allen failed to handle the gun as a prudent, responsible man should have." In asking for the damages, the widow is asking for the amount approximated which her husband would have earned in his probable lifetime of some 30 more years.

Dr. Riedel was shot with a

small telescopic rifle on the ranch property of Allen when he accompanied him on Allen's alleged intent to make some trespassers, who were picking up pecans leave his land. Taking the stand Monday, Allen did not deny that it was his gun which killed his nephew but contended vigorously that it was an accident—that the gun went off accidentally, and he did not pull the trigger.

Mancill Henson, a Brownfield farmer, testified that he and his party of six adults and five children were on the Allen property to pick up pecans and that Allen raised

the rifle and aimed carefully just before the gun was fired.

Close questioning by Allen's attorney, Virgil Seaberry Jr. of Eastland, brought out that each of the three families who were on the shooting property on the day the shooting were being paid \$100 per day per family to come to Eastland and testify in the case.

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Mrs. Riedel testified that it was altogether possible that overhanging limbs in the area of the shooting could have deflected a bullet. Dr. Watkins testified as to Dr. Riedel's condition and the wound location, saying that the bullet entered the body under the chest area and angled down at about 20 degrees. Later in the day Magness testified that the elevation at which Dr. Riedel stood at the time of the shooting was some 10 inches higher than the ground on which Allen was standing when the gun fired.

Mrs. Riedel is suing for \$770,000 in civil damages. Allen, indicted for the rifle shooting death of Dr. Riedel, was acquitted of the charge in the same court in January, 1966. Monday, he testified that the death of his nephew was an accident, that the gun Allen was holding went off accidentally and that he did not pull the trigger or aim the gun at anyone. The suit is attempting to prove negligence in handling the gun.

Mrs. Riedel testified that both she and Dr. Riedel were under psychoanalysts care at the time of his death. She said that Dr. Riedel's and her relationships with the Allens had always been good.

She also said that at the time of her husband's death, Allen had said the shooting was an accident. She said, in response to an attorney's question, that Allen was "like a father" to her husband, Mr. Riedel said that all the community property had been left in her husband's will to herself as co-executor.

She testified that her husband drank, but not to excess and that she felt he had no drinking problem. Attorney Virgil Seaberry Jr., attorney with Bill B. Hart, for Allen, read depositions from Mrs. Riedel in 1965 in which she admitted family quarrels and accusations by both herself and the doctor as to alleged infidelity.

Allen returned to the stand to testify that on the day Dr. Riedel was shot that he had told Allen that he was "going to divorce Patsy."

Pretty, blonde Mrs. Patsy Riedel testified Tuesday morning that her marriage to the late Dr. Albert Riedel was a "happy marriage."

Mrs. Riedel, who took the stand about 11:30 a. m., outlined her late husband's school and medical training, beginning with their marriage in 1948, and explained they had been childhood sweethearts since kindergarten. Following a tour of duty in the service, the late Dr. Riedel attended the University of Texas, at which time they were assisted financially by Ivan J. Allen, Riedel's uncle.

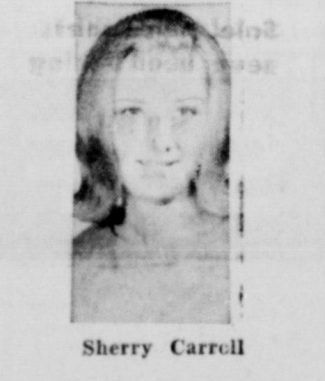
