





(From the Texas Almanac - The Encyclopedia of Texas)

The arrival of Gen. Cos with 400 Mexicans on the following day increas-Santa Anna's force to about 1,600. Sam Houston had under his comand between 700 and 800.

The Texans attacked suddenly during the afternoon of April while the poleon of the West," as Santa Anna called himself, took his siesta. The 3 5 cans charged to the music of "Won't you come to the Bower?" and with battle cry, "Remember the Alamo; Remember Golidad."

The Mexicans were routed with a loss, according to Houston's report of killed, 280 wounded, and 730 captured. Practically the entire Mexican was killed, wounded or taken prisoner. The Texans sustained a loss nine killed and mortally wounded and 30 less seriously wounded. Santa ina fled from the battle field but was captured the next day.




