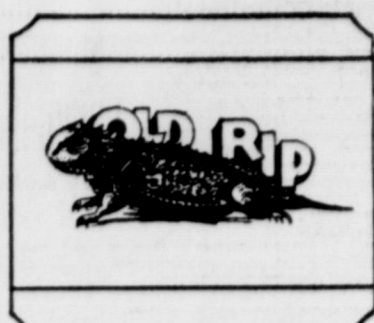

Brann E. Garner, former Ranger resident, was dead on arrival at Stephens Memorial Hospital at 7:45 p.m. Sunday following an apparent heart attack at his place of business, the Belvania Club in Breckenridge.

Funeral was at 10 a.m. Tuesday in St. Andrews Episcopal Church, Breckenridge with the Rev. William F. Ellington, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Mt. Marion Cemetery, under the direction of Satterwhite Funeral Home.

Mr. Garner was associated with Interstate Theaters for 28 years, during which time he owned the Arcadia and Columbia Theaters in Ranger and the National and Palace Theaters in Breckenridge.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Gail Noble, teacher in Ranger High School; one grandson, Brann Noble and one brother, Carl Garner of Eastland.

## Wreck Damage Heavy in County

The Highway Patrol investigated four area accidents during the weekend.

A one-car accident at 9:55 p.m. Friday resulted in \$590 damage to the 1960 Falcon driven by Larry Mace of Eastland. There were no injuries.

A 1959 Ford driven by William Parten of Eastland and a 1967 Ford pick-up driven by Eugene Beaver of Goldsboro a mile east of Eastland resulted in about \$350 damage to the cars. No injuries were reported.

## City Commission Launches New Year With Optimism

The city of Eastland is in a transition period. Its City Commission was reorganized this week, and Mayor Frank Deaton pledged that the governing body would retain its "conservative attitude" in the future.

Looking forward to a busy year ahead, when the city will be debt-free, and face a multitude of projects which need to be done, the mayor said that he would work to "continue to get the most for our money" and do "first things first."

After being sworn in as a commissioner for a third term, Mayor Deaton was immediately re-elected Mayor by the other commissioners, on a motion by James Reid and second by Curtis Koen.

New member Jay Staggs was given the oath of office. Commissioner Bill B. Hart, who was re-elected at the last election, was to have been sworn in, but was absent.

Reid was elected mayor pro tem; Koen, treasurer; and Staggs, assistant treasurer.

## PRaises MANAGER

Mr. Deaton stood to express his appreciation to the board for its cooperation and told the members how he enjoyed working with them.

"I think we have the best city manager any town could," he said of Manager Lewis Tinker.

Speaking of the near future when the city will be out of debt and out from under the old federal court order, Mayor Deaton said, "We're going to have an extra 40 cents of tax money to be used for the improvement of the city. We plan to place it wisely. "We've always been pretty conservative, and our city manager is conservative. We'll all want to continue in that thinking."

Guests present were H. T. Wilson, his daughter, Victoria; Gene Abbott, district manager for Lone Star Gas Co.; Jack Arrington; and Bruce Pipkin.

## OKAYS LONE STAR RATES

First item of business was the third and final reading of the Lone Star rate adjustment ordinance which was adopted and approved on a motion by Reid, seconded by Koen. The new rate will go into effect on May 17.

Bids for a new police car were opened and read. Contract for a new vehicle was awarded to Pipkin Motor Co. on a bid of \$1,186.50. Other bids were Fullen Motor Co., \$1,296.; Muirhead Motor Co., \$1,081.58; and King Motor Co., \$1,264. The Pipkin bid was held to be the lowest in view of equipment included on the auto.

REC PROGRAM SET AGAIN

The commission agreed to enter into a summer recreation program, engaging Coach Shirley Frazier as City Recreation Director for the months of June, July and August, at a cost of \$200 per month; for a total of \$600. "It's the best money we spend," Reid said of the program, which was started last summer.

Visitor Arrington suggested that the city might do well to repair and improve the tennis courts at the City Park. Tinker explained that this is planned as soon as there is a highway construction hot-mix plant in operation near the city.

## Insurance Hike Could Pay For New Fire Truck Quick

Savings in lives, injury or property damage with adequate fire-fighting equipment cannot be estimated, because there is no one who would put a value on a human life, an injury or the loss of irreplaceable objects.

But savings in the cost of a home owner's insurance premiums can be estimated.

If Eastland doesn't buy a new fire truck, insurance is going to cost more, with a predicted three cent penalty in our key rate.

That's the opinion of Floyd H. Williams, Engineer, Property Division of the State Board of Insurance.

What would a three cent penalty mean in dollars and cents?

Premium for a three-year period for fire coverage only on a \$10,000 frame home in the city, figured with the present 28-cent key rate factor, is \$76.

A three-cent penalty in that key rate (up to 31 cents) would make the same coverage for a like three-year period cost \$84 — a difference of \$8.

If that amount were multiplied by some 2,000 homes, it would average some \$16,000 — just about the amount needed to pay for a new fire truck.

Writing to an Eastland insurance man, Mr. Williams says: "At the present time, the city is receiving credit for the 1950 Seagrave truck as a reserve pumper and hose truck and as a ladder truck. After our next reinspection of your city, credit will no longer be allowed for this truck as a reserve pumper and hose truck due to its age and doubtful reliability; however, credit will still be allowed for it as a ladder truck."

## Legal Notices

An ordinance fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Eastland, Eastland County, Texas, and providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted and amended.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bill rendered on or after the 17th day of May, 1967, the general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Eastland by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.67 gross; \$1.50 net. All over 1,000 cu. ft. @ \$.433 gross per MCF; \$.759 net per MCF.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to January 1, 1966, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment, however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment in whole or in part in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

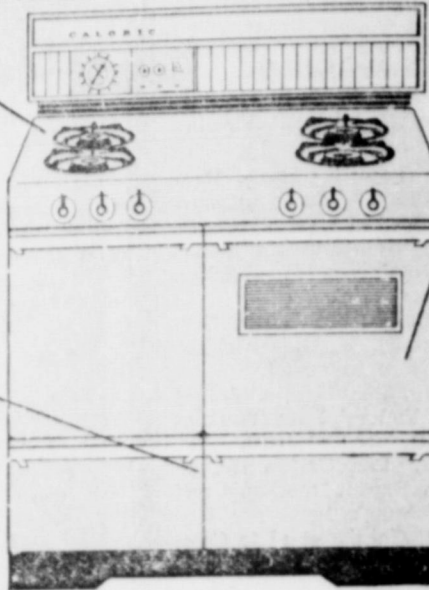

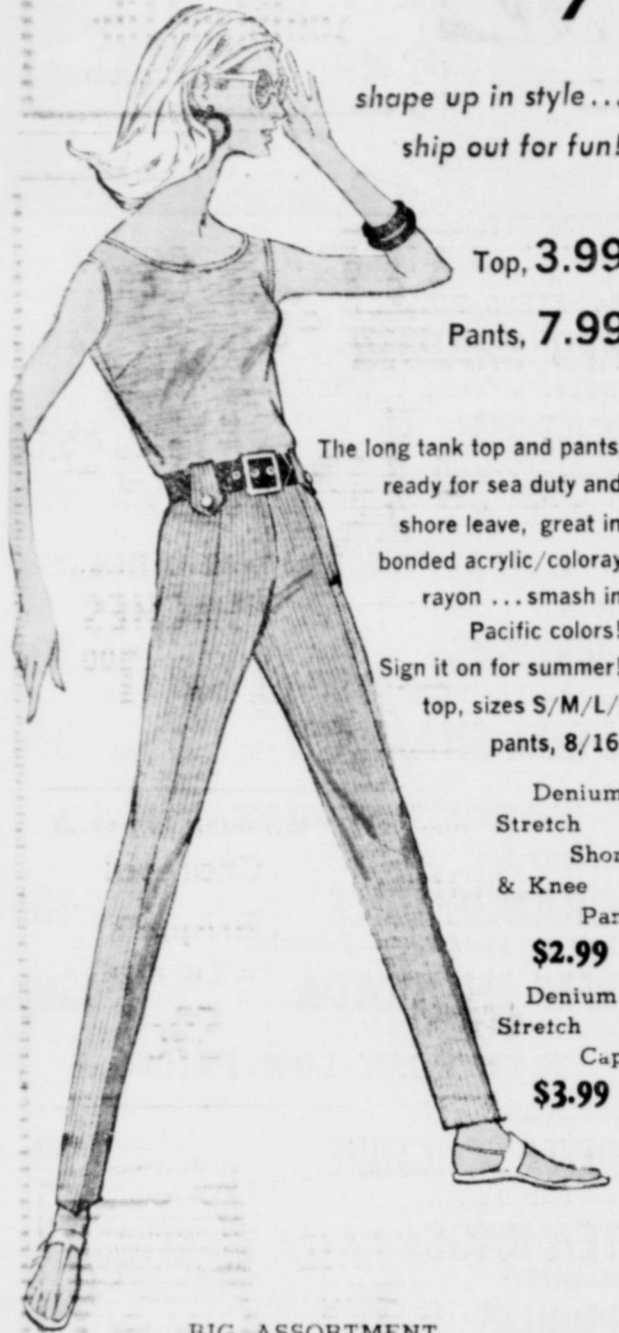

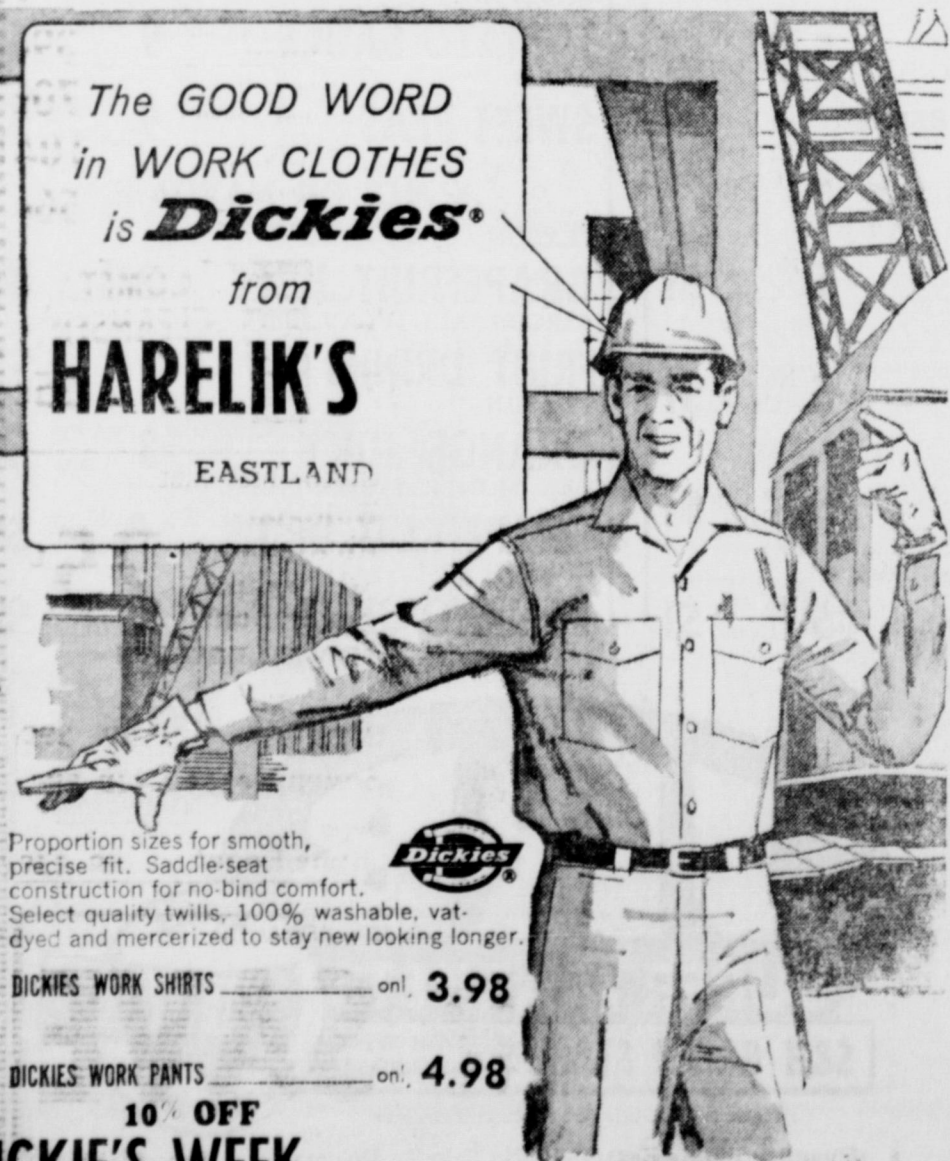

# Old Rip Makes Headlines As Solons Consider Frog Plans

Sen Joe Christie's plea for a law to protect the horned toad from exploitation and eventual extinction got unanimous approval from the Senate when his bill passed that body and went to the House.

The El Paso senator's bill would permit capture and holding of the picturesque creature of Texas dry prairies and hills, but for propagation purposes only.

As might be guessed, Eastland County's famous frog, Old Rip, has come in for a share of headlines in connection with a bill presently before the Texas Senate.

In an elaborate eight-column feature in a recent issue of the Daily Texan at Austin, Old Rip is cited as the example in the horned frog issue. The story headline read 'Legend of Old Rip', the Hapless Horned

Toad, Revived By Restrictive Legislation of Campus Jewelry Fad."

The bill in question was introduced by Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso on March after he observed what is being done to the poor creatures. Christie is quoted in the article on how the baby frogs are used to make jewelry.

"...they put the baby toads in a substance to make a mold with. Then the mold is baked and the toad is burned to ashes. They take out the ashes and pour metal into the mold."

"Burned up" about this abuse, Christie said that after some research, he discovered that hundreds of thousands of the animals are also being

exported from Texas as pets and curiosities.

"Not only are thousands being burned up, but many are sent to other parts of the country, where in strange environments they die." Besides being harmless, Christie added one toad alone eats more than 40,000 bugs a year.

His proposed bill would make it "unlawful for any person to capture, trap, trap for, ensnare, willfully kill or injure, take or have in his possession for the purpose of sale, barter or commercial exploitation, horned toads... except for propagation and scientific purposes."

Maximum penalties for violating the conditions of the bill would be a \$200 fine and or 60 days in jail!

## Old Rip Appears In National Observer

A clipping from the National Observer, Washington, D.C. was sent to J. I. Doc Brinkley by his daughter, Mrs. Ruby Copp of Chickasha, Okla.

The article is titled "Hoping Mad: Of Toads and Tortoises" and deals with the bill, sponsored by Senator Joe Christie of El Paso, to stop commercial exploitation of either horned frogs or the Texas tortoise. The bill calls for a penalty for commercial exploitation of either creature of a maximum of 60 days in jail and 200 fine.

The National Observer article devoted space to Old Rip, Eastland's horned frog.

The Texas Tortoise lives in the southern reaches of the state. State biologists have said the species could become extinct unless protected.

**THE BATTLE OF SAN JACINTO**  
(From the Texas Almanac — The Encyclopedia of Texas)  
The arrival of Gen. Cos with 400 Mexicans on the following day increased Santa Anna's force to about 1,600. Sam Houston had under his command between 700 and 800. The Texans attacked suddenly during the afternoon of April while the "Napoleon of the West," as Santa Anna called himself, took his siesta. The Texans charged to the music of "Won't you come to the Bower?" and with a battle cry, "Remember the Alamo! Remember Goliad." The Mexicans were routed with a loss, according to Houston's report of 10 killed, 280 wounded, and 730 captured. Practically the entire Mexican force was killed, wounded or taken prisoner. The Texans sustained a loss of nine killed and mortally wounded and 30 less seriously wounded. Santa Anna fled from the battle field but was captured the next day. Few military battles in North America have had greater historic effect than that of San Jacinto. It led to the independence of Texas and its later annexation to the United States. The Mexican War which followed resulted in the acquisition by the United States of most of the United States' present Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast area.
