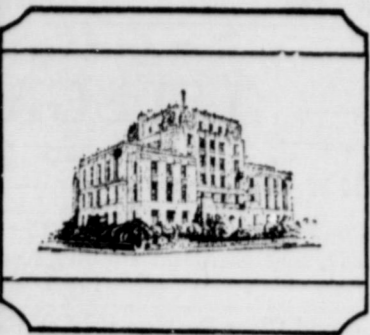

45TH DATE OBSERVED BY LIONS

Eastland County Lions previously had known him mainly only through the pages of their national publication, but Tuesday night they met him, heard him and joined him in celebrating the 45th Anniversary of the clubs in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger. Top Lion of all Lions, International President and Mrs. Edward Lindsey of Lawrenceburg, Tenn., arrived in Eastland Tuesday afternoon accompanied by District Gov. Bill Longley of Stamford, for a 5 p. m. press conference at the Chamber of Commerce office. Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Hoffmann Jr. hosted a reception in their home from 6 to 7. Approximately 225 Lions, their wives and guests gathered at the Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria at 7 for the 45th birthday celebration.

City To Up Gift To Library Here

The Eastland City Commission voted to up the city's contribution to the Public Library, passed on second reading a Lone Star Gas Co. rate increase and agreed to ask for bids on a new police car at the regular monthly meeting at City Hall Monday night. Mayor Frank Deaton, Commissioners Billy B. Hart, James Reid and Curtis Koen were present for the relatively short meeting. The city has contributed \$400 annually toward the maintenance of the library for many years, and the commission voted to increase the annual contribution by \$100. City Manager Lewis Tiner will begin immediately to received bids for a new police squad car. There apparently has been no opposition registered to the proposed gas rate increase. Commissioner and Attorney Bill B. Hart reported that he will begin proceedings this week to attempt to receive for the city the some \$12,000 held in escrow as the result of the long-ago federal court order. This amount of money, if received from the holding bank, will just about clear the city of debt.

Five Men Will Be Inducted

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service director, has announced that Texas will be called upon to furnish 885 men for the armed forces in May. This compares with quotas of 675 for April, 761 for March, 674 for February, and 1,110 for January. Mrs. Jewell Reeves of the County elective Service office, stated that the county has not received a quota for May. April quota is five men for induction. (Continued on Page 5)

Plans Complete For Third Annual Kendrick Family Easter Pageant

Arrangements are complete to handle an anticipated 50,000 people for the third annual Kendrick Easter Pageant at the family farm midway between Cisco and Eastland on Highway 80 on Sunday morning, March 26. The pageant will begin at 3:30 a. m. and end at sunrise. This year's pageant, which will depict the Life of Christ from birth to Resurrection, has 50 scenes — 10 more than last year — with a cast of some 135 people from cities throughout this area. The Kendrick Amphitheater has a complex of some eight stages, special lighting effects, sound system, a facsimile of the River Jordan, and other features to add realism to the production. The Easter program is an annual presentation of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Kendrick and their family, which includes their three sons, Phil, Pierre and Bill, the wives of two sons, and three children. There is no admission charge. The pageant was written by Phil Kendrick and he serves as the director, assisted by Mrs. W. S. Mitcham of Cisco. In addition, Phil and his mother will provide musical accompaniment on an organ and piano, respectively. Ten new scenes have been added to this year's pageant to portray the birth of Moses and his life through the Ten Commandments. Several of the pageant scenes will have real livestock in them, including a camel borrowed from the Fort Worth Zoo, a flock of sheep, and donkeys. Bill Kendrick plays the part of Jesus. Robinson presents an enthusiasm and energy to the film that helps put it head and shoulders above the ordinary. As Sammy, Fergus McClelland gives a performance that will be well remembered. Cisco Man Found Safe After Day-Long Search

A widespread search for Elbert Ezzell, 86-year-old Ciscoan, ended at Decatur early Wednesday when police found him at a motel where he had spent the night. He had been missing since 1 p.m. Monday.

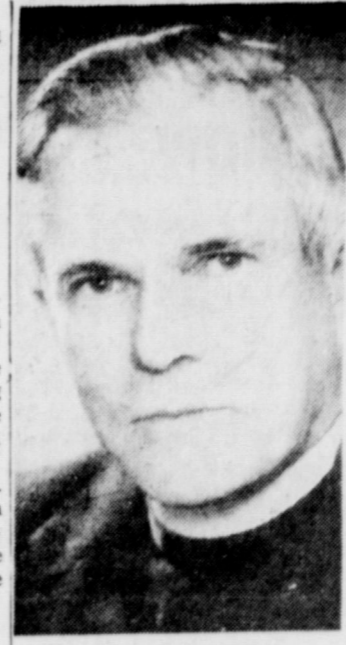
Mr. Ezzell, a resident of the Cisco area for some 75 years, was picked up in Decatur later in the day by his son, Bart, and he appeared none the worse for his two days away from home. Search in that area began after a highway patrolman reported seeing Mr. Ezzell at Saginaw Tuesday afternoon — out of gas.

Relatives had feared for Mr. Ezzell's safety & called Clyde Brymer, Cisco police chief, after he failed to return home from a visit to the family farm seven miles south of Cisco Monday night. It was his custom to go there daily. He left around 1 p.m.

Tuesday, Chief Brymer of Cisco, Chief Ray Laney of Eastland and Sheriff Lefty Sublett of Eastland County, assisted by officers and highway patrolmen, combed this region for Mr. Ezzell. Helicopters from Fort Wolters and the Cisco Flying Service airplanes aided the search with an aerial survey.

Mr. Ezzell apparently drove through Cisco and kept going as he did not recognize the scenery. He was in a 1951 green Chevrolet.

Born at Goldthwaite, Mr. Ezzell grew up at Scranton and has lived in the Cisco area virtually all of his life. He is an active member of the Church of Christ.

I read with interest the inscription on the Historical Plaque that will be placed on the First National Bank about the "Santa Claus" Bank Robbery. The last sentence reads as follows: "Later a mob lynched 'Santa' when he broke out of jail. This is a very BIG error. He had 'played insane for some time and never seemed to notice anything happening around him so 'Uncle Tom' Jones, who was jailor at the time, made the mistake of going upstairs one evening without his guns on, to give the prisoners their supper, so Ratliff (Santa) seeing he had no guns jumped him, severely beating him and took the keys to the jail but was caught downstairs before he could get out. 'Uncle Tom' was taken to the hospital but died the next day or perhaps the next day, but the night of the day he died a mob of "hoodlums" took the law in their own hands, and went into the jail and took 'Santa' out and strung him up, near the jail. I was not at the scene but heard two people tell about being there. Ratliff never said one word. The young man, at that time, who did the most of the pulling of the rope that strung up 'Santa' was shot down in "cold-blood", a few months later on the streets of Eastland. I won't call his name but you can check the records at Eastland County Courthouse and see that all this is very true. I was living there at the time and the time of the lynching was a day in November, 1929. So, for future generations that will read this plaque why not have nothing but the truth. Thank you. 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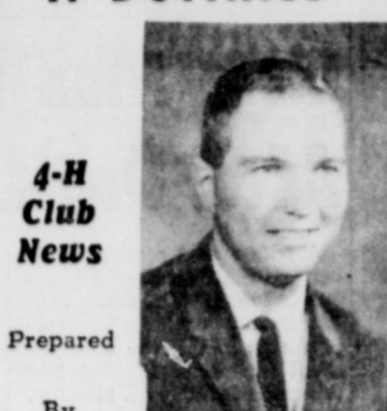

The President humorously described a "typical day" in one of his recent tours, which took him 415 miles, six speeches, many dedications and ceremonies through Africa, from 5:30 a. m. to 1 a. m.

Reporting on India, he called it the most interesting and with its 477 million people, the country most in need. "Thank God, Lionism is in India," he said. And through the help of the CARE organization, Lions are doing good work there, he said.

In spite of his high station in the Lion Hierarchy, his appearances, his address and his warmth were all marked by humbleness. He and his wife were presented a silver dish and a hand-mace gavel, made from the root of a mesquite stump by Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Merket of Cisco.

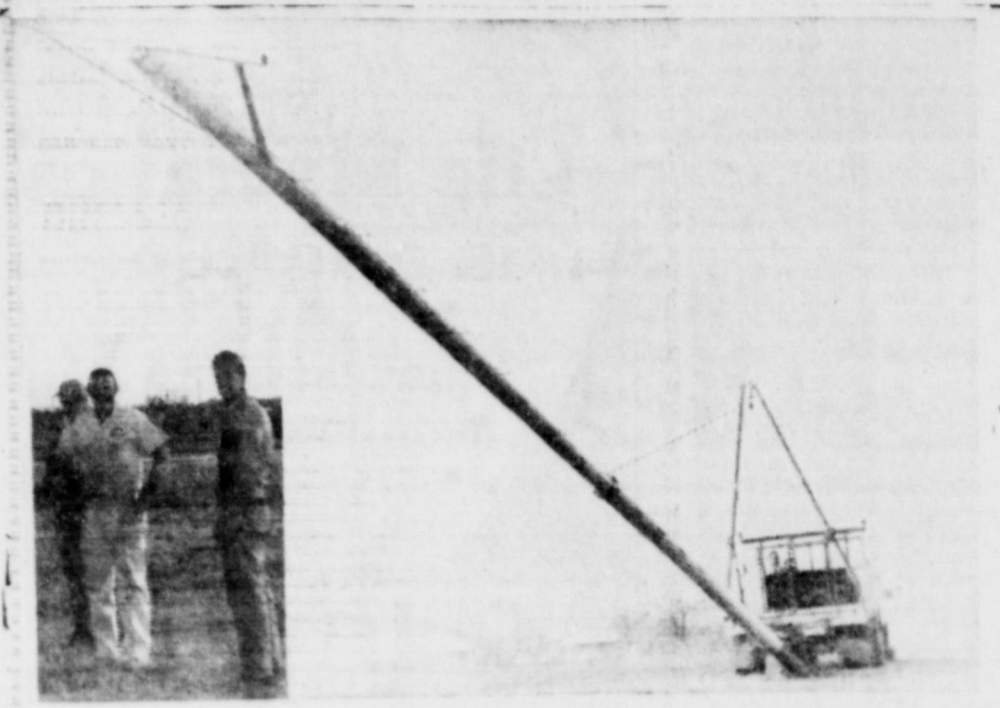

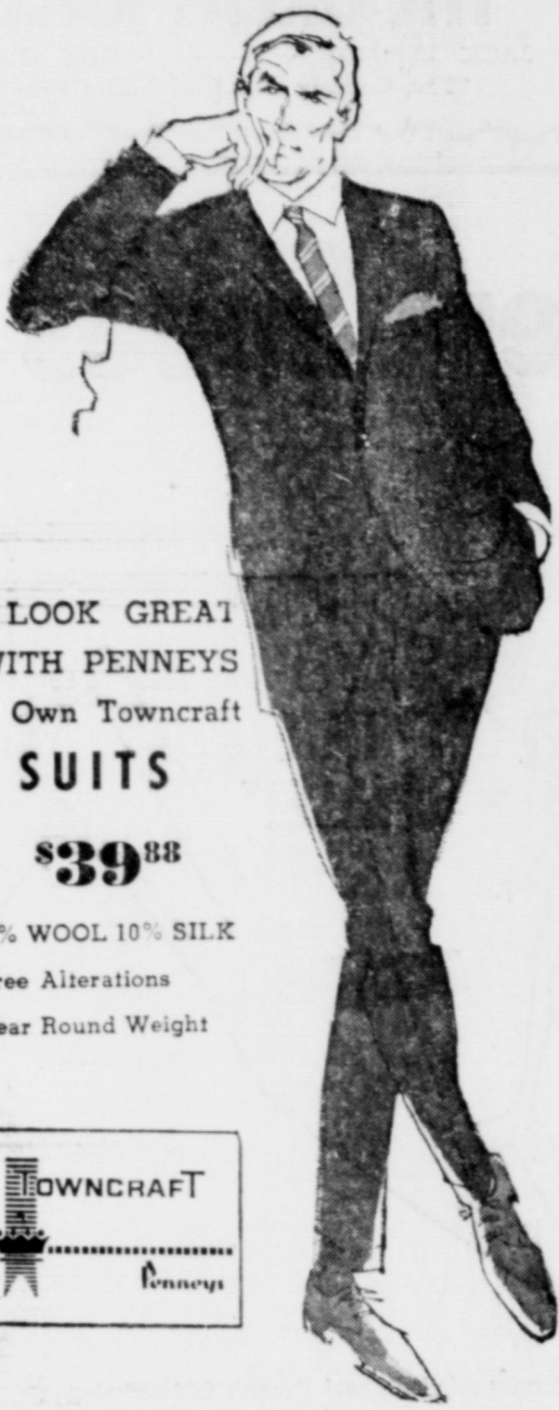

Report On Russia Trip Given At Rotary Meet

in a talk Monday night at the four-city Rotary Club dinner at Lone Cedar Country Club.

Plaque Is Fixed To Bank's Front

A bronze plaque designating the First National Bank of Cisco as a point of historical interest was unveiled and dedicated in ceremonies at 3 p. m. Monday as the highlight of a 50th anniversary celebration at the bank.

The marker has been fixed to the stone front of the building beneath the official seal of the Texas Historical Association. Large crowds attended the bank's open house all day Monday and took part in the ceremonies.

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson of Abilene, prominent educator and historian, was the program speaker, and he recalled that he resided in Cisco the year before the bank was founded on March 20, 1917.

Noting that the marker was commemorating the infamous Santa Claus bank robbery of Dec. 23, 1927, Dr. Richardson pointed out that "This bank is better known among home people because it has been a keystone in a good town for five decades."

Like the church and the school, a bank must contribute to community stability, Dr. Richardson said. "I am sure that the First National Bank has done its part and more over the years." Credit, he added, is essential to community growth and survival.

Dr. Richardson told the story of the bank's founding, its days of oil boom growth, the panic of 1920 when oil prices collapsed, the depression of 1929, the war years, and steady progress since that time. He told the story of the Santa Claus bank robbery, which the marker commemorates.

The marker was unveiled at the conclusion of his talk by Mrs. Alex Spears, well known Ciscoan, whose father was among the founders and an early president.

James P. McCracken, present president of the bank, spoke to express appreciation to Dr. Richardson, the historical survey committee, and to the public for the support given the bank over the years.

In part, Mr. McCracken said: "Even though the dedication of this marker has been one of the highlights of today's program, let us not forget that today is the 50th anniversary of this bank. On March 20, 1917, several Cisco civic leaders opened the bank for business. This group was headed by C. H. Fee, Alex Spears, John H. Gatner, R. L. Poe, R. F. Davis, J. P. Leveridge, A. J. Olson, George D. Fee and others.

"We would like to pay tribute today to the founders of this bank for their vision, courage and integrity in charting a safe, sound course which has enabled us to weather every storm of the past half century and which has made it possible to provide a strong and complete banking service to thousands of customers over the years."

Mr. McCracken paid tribute to Mrs. Spears for her association with the bank and its leaders since it was organized. He expressed pleasure that members of the founding families — the Fees, Spears, Davis, Poe and Leveridge — could be present.

Mike Collins of Eastland, chairman of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee, presided for the program. A prayer of invocation was given by the Rev. Frank Alverson, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, and County Judge Scott Bailey introduced the speaker.

Hundreds of visitors signed the guest register during the day. Visitors included many old-timers of this area and representatives of many banks throughout this region.

"Monday was a very memorable day for us," Mr. McCracken said today.
