Youth Corps Summer Jobs Slated For 160

An announcement by Tip Archer of Eastland, Area Coordinator, says that 160 jobs will be available for youth corps members during the summer. The jobs will include clerical aides in the schools and tax offices; library aides; and custodial and maintenance aides. Clerical aides will also be employed in the Home Demonstration offices, Soil Conservation offices, and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices.

County Youth Corps Summer Jobs Slated For 160

To be eligible, a student need only be enrolled in one of the high schools, between the ages of 16 and 21, and meet family income requirements. Students should apply through their high schools.

Each student will be paid \$1.25 per hour for up to 27 hours a week for 12 weeks. In addition, each student will spend one hour a week in education and job counseling with selected school personnel.

All wages will be paid with the federal grant of \$74,270.60 available for this area. Archer stated that \$63,000.00 was spent on the "in-school" phase of the NYC this school year. The summer program will begin May 29.

All student employees will be supervised by the participating schools.

Tourist Development Study Is Planned At Area Meet May 22

Upper Leon SCS Wins \$300 For Work Plans

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District received a check last week of \$300 as award winner in Zone V by Fort Worth Press.

Supervisor Clint McCain, E. E. McAlister, work unit conservationist, and John Simpson with the SCS were in Temple Saturday evening, May 13. They attended Zone V Soils Awards Program sponsored by the Fort Worth Press. Mr. McCain, chairman of the local board, received the award for the local district for being the outstanding district in 1966.

There has been a large number of new district cooperators who have developed conservation plans during the year. The small watershed program has also expanded almost throughout the entire district, which includes: Green's Creek, North-east Tributaries of the Leon and Rush Creek, with plans completed.

Sabanno River watershed has completed and submitted an application for planning. Other winners from this district were in the boys and girls essay division. Linda Lane of Gustine received a medal for 5th place essay and Kay Darnell, Rising Star, received a medal for 10th place.

One full table was reserved for the Upper Leon SCD. The delegation was from Eastland, Comanche, Dublin, and Gustine. Walter Humphrey, editor of the Fort Worth Press presented the awards.

Marker to Honor Pioneer Doctor, Early Settler

The Texas Historical Survey Committee will dedicate the marker, Pioneer Physician, at the grave of the late Dr. J. D. Windham in the Tecumseh Cemetery, 20 miles south of Clyde, on Sunday, May 28, at 3 p. m., according to an announcement here.

Dr. Windham was born on Feb. 13, 1816, and died January 11, 1901. He was the first practicing physician in Brown County in 1855. He moved west to Callahan County in 1874 and established a truly needed outpost at Tecumseh. He owned a general store and the only post office for miles around.

A school house was soon built and school teachers were carefully investigated and it was said, "the wilds began learning reading, writing and arithmetic." Children came for miles and miles, some on horseback and some walked.

The name, Tecumseh, it was said, was because the place was the burial location of the once famous Indian chief, Tecumseh. Eula Windham Preslar, a granddaughter of the late Dr. Windham, said that many friends and relatives had asked her to make this announcement as many Eastland County people would want to attend the dedication.

Three Oil Test Are Announced For County

D. T. Luton of Dallas has announced location for a wildcat oil test some four and a half miles southwest of Eastland in Eastland County. The test is Luton's No. 1 B. J. Harrison et al. Plans call for a 3,600 foot hole to test the Ranger sand formation.

Location was given as 2,750 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 7, Block 3, H&TC Survey. Site is 660 feet southeast of a plugged and abandoned gas well.

Elsewhere, Otto Bendorf of Breckenridge has staked his No. 1 Abbott-Reynolds as a regular field project five miles northeast of Cisco. Location was given as 2,040 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 50, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Plans called for a 3,500 foot hole to test the Lake Sand. Bendorf has a 108 acre lease there, it was reported. Two and a half miles west of Ranger, Bilhartz Operating Co., Inc., of Dallas has spotted their No. 2 T. J. Nash as a 3,800 foot test. Location was 1,290 feet from the north and 422 feet from the east lines of the W. H. Ahrenbeck Survey.

Non-Federal contribution last year included \$2.6 million to speed up watershed work, \$5 million to help layout and install conservation measures, \$1 million for informational, educational, and other local activities, and \$33,000 for making soil surveys for urban uses.

"SCS resources are much more effective when financial and other help are given conservation districts by State and local sources," Smith said. "We, therefore, encourage conservation districts to use all resources available to help conserve and develop natural resources."

Smith said the fact that every State in the Nation appropriated money last year for soil and water conservation districts reflects the wide spread support they are getting from the public.

He stated Texas was second only to California in the amount of non-Federal conservation assistance.

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said vacation interest in state park screened shelters and cabins has reached such a fast pace that patrons-to-be should follow routine making reservations.

Inquiries are advised to write directly to the park, enclosing a personal check or money order made payable to the park to cover the fee for the desired space.

The writer also should clearly state name, address, date, time of arrival and date of departure.

Reservations will be confirmed by return mail, if space is available.

The Department said refunds cannot be honored without 24-hour notice of cancellation.

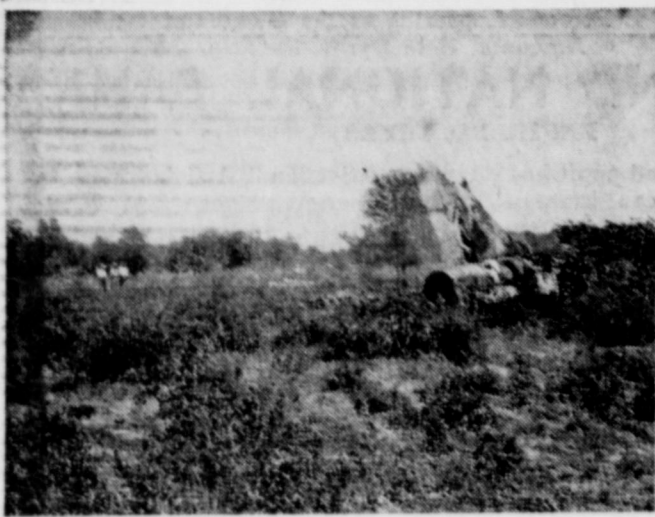

Pilot Escapes As Navy Jet Crashes In County

A U. S. Navy F-8 Crusader crashed and burned on the old Harris place six miles north of Rising Star at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday. Lt. Jim Mc-

Laughlin the pilot parachuted to safety and was uninjured. He was from Naval Air Station, Dallas. The pilot told investigators that his engine failed (flamed out) at 46,000 feet. He was unable to re-start the big jet engine and when the plane reached 3,000 feet, he ejected and parachuted to safety. The pilot landed in a pasture some two miles from the wreckage. The airplane glided down in an upright position, plowing a path through oak trees for some 200 yards before hitting the ground. It caught fire and burned on the ground. Two small fires were started by the plane but they were extinguished without apparent damage. Lt. Paul B. Porter and a

five-team rescue team went to the crash scene from Dyess Air Force Base, and a huge four-engine rescue plane, also from Dyess AF Base showed up and circled at about 200 feet until the pilot was located and picked up and the fire fighters arrived at the crash site. The big plane apparently directed early operations from the air. The Foy Warlick home was narrowly missed by the falling airplane, which came to a stop about 500 feet away. Highway Patrolmen B. C. Rivers of Eastland and I. A. Chambers of Coleman handled the traffic in the area. Numerous cars brought people to the scene, including officers, ambulances and others seeking to determine whether they could help. The airplane was a total loss. The F-8 Crusader is a Navy fighter plane and some of the older models are used for training purposes. They cost more than a million dollars.

Five Negro Women Are Held In Jail After Arrest on Shoplifting Charges

Five Negro women from Fort Worth were being held in Eastland County Jail today on charges of shoplifting, according to Sheriff Lefty Sublett.

The five were arrested in Weatherford about 9:15 p. m. Tuesday night after a Ranger business man suspected them and sounded the alarm. They were arrested by Highway Patrolman Bill Pruitt and two Weatherford city policemen, Sheriff Sublett said.

In the car were 115 cartons of cigarettes, one clock radio, two new men's suits, three boxes of spark plugs, and three bottles of scotch.

Sheriff Sublett said 53 cartons of cigarettes were stamped A & P, Eastland, and 62 cartons stamped Safeway but no town's name. Two of the women claimed that all they had in the car was picked up

in Eastland except the scotch which was taken at Hoot's Liquor Store in Ranger. The clock radio and spark plugs were taken from Western Auto, and the suits from Bray's Department Store, the report said.

Sheriff Sublett explained that when someone is picked up in another county on a pick-up order they must be taken before a magistrate there before being brought back. The women were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Pickard in Weatherford and advised of their rights, then brought to Ranger by Sheriff Sublett and Deputy Loy Williams.
