



Although the disability provisions of the social security law were changed in July 1965, Tuley said, his office has seen evidence that some disabled workers have been passing up bentfits because they had not heard of the 1965 changes. One important change, he said, removed the requirement that a disability be long continued or permanent without expectation of recovery. Another eases the work requireme for persons whose disability is blindness.

Under present law, a person who becomes blind for benfits with only 112 years of work in the 3 years before becoming blind.
