## Bank Deposits Top \$6 Million

Bank deposits at Eastland National Bank has topped \$6 million for the period ending Dec. 30, and set an all-time record high for the local bank.

The bank's statement of condition showed \$6,244,622.16 on deposit as the 1966 year ended. Loans and discounts are recorded at \$2,654,453.11, a low.

Total resources of the local bank are \$5,727,569.73.

Previous year - end deposits have shown \$5,713,983 in 1965; \$5,094,866.86 in 1964; and \$4,853,532.37 in 1963.

At mid - 1966, deposits stood at \$5,997,943.37 with loans at \$2,723,579.78.

The bumper peanut crop harvest is credited with most of the increase in deposits, as well as the general good business climate in Eastland its area, authorities report.

## Few Registered As Deadline Approaches

If you plan to vote in 1967—and there's every indication that there will be some elections in which you'll want to voice your opinion—you will have to be registered before the month of January is gone.

Voting is free, but you must be registered to be qualified, announces County Tax Assessor - Collector Edgar Altom. Those persons who register before Jan. 31, will be qualified to vote from Feb. 1, 1967 to Feb. 29, 1968, he explained.

Applications may be secured from several sub-stations in the county, to be mailed to the tax office in the courthouse for registration. Of

## All Mail Must Be 'Zipped' -- Jan. 15

Zip-coding of all mail becomes a fact of life for residents on Jan. 15.

This announcement comes from the local Postmaster who said that all parcel post packages should be zip-cod-

ed before being brought to the window for mailing.

No packages will be accepted at the postal window which do not carry the zip code of the addressee. Rate charts are now designed for the zip codes.

The post office will assist patrons in securing zip code numbers for those who do not know them, by telephone but postal clerks cannot take time at the window to look up codes for patrons, the Postmaster said.

"In fact, our instructions are not to figure postage on any parcel post that is not zip-coded," said the Post Office.

"Persons who do not have access to zip code lists, are invited to call the post office for information."

Mandatory zip-coding went into effect Jan. 1 for all second and third class bulk mailers, and the Jan. 15 date is going to be mandatory for all mail.

The post office department is instituting the zip-coding program in an effort to speed up service and provide better mail delivery.

Individual letters must also carry the zip code, Jan. 15, the postmaster said.

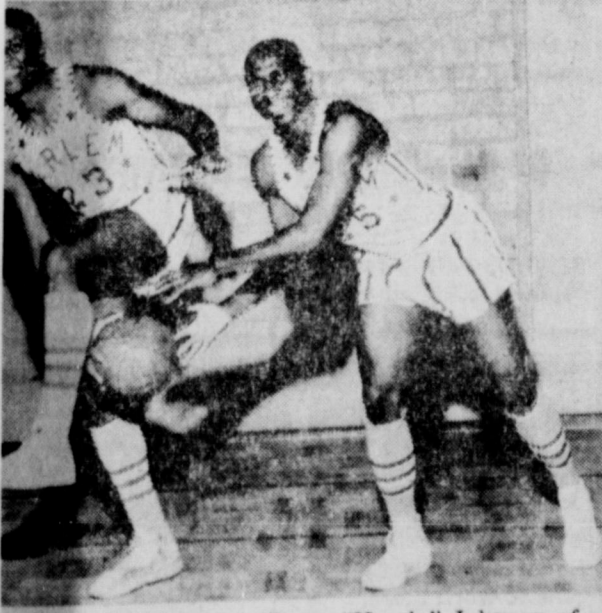

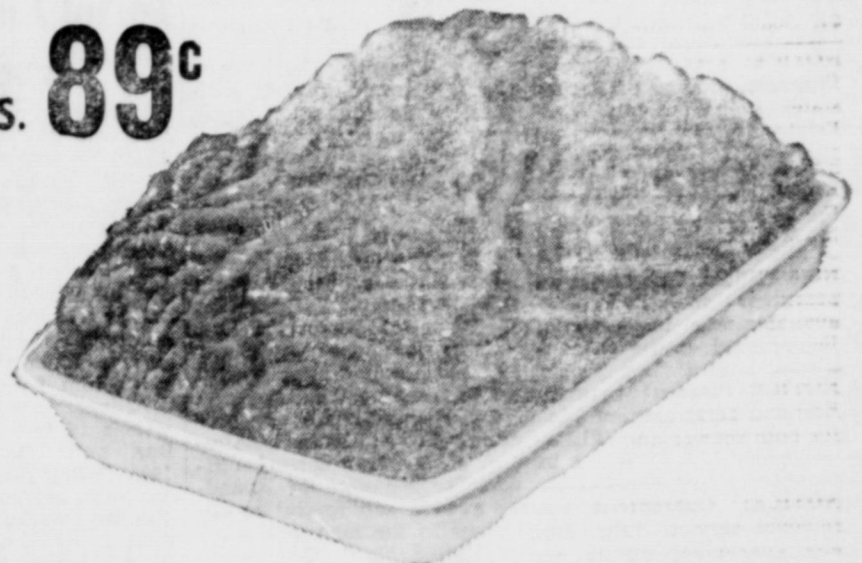

## Conference Tilt On Tap Saturday

RJC Rangers increased their home court winning streak to 27 by defeating Cameron Junior College 81-73 here Thursday night in RJC gym.

Five Ranger cagers scored in double figures with Ulrich Cobb leading the way with 17. Larry Robertson tallied 15, Larry Robertson three in 13 and Sol McMillon had 19.

The Rangers led 41-32 at half-time and at one time held a 17 point lead over the Oklahomans.

Strong team play appeared to be the difference as the Rangers displayed a balanced scoring attack in winning their eighth game in a row to maintain a perfect season record.

Cameron was rated second in post-season national rank-

ings and were considered top contenders for the 1967 National Junior College Championship, so the victory should place the Ranger team near the top in the national rankings, which will be released Tuesday January 10.

The Range Ann freshman team defeated the Grafrod High School girls basketball team 47-44 in a return game in the RJC gym Thursday evening preceding the Rangers' game.

High scorers for the Range Annns were Lynda Brooks with 18 points, Jolene Dean, 15, and Darlene Jock, 15.

The Rangers were to play Cisco Junior College at 7:30 p. m. Saturday in Cisco in RJC's second Texas Junior College Athletic Conference game of the season. They defeated Fort Worth Christian in their first conference game Dec. 5.

The Wranglers have won six, lost seven of their matches; while the RJC cagers

have won eight against no losses.

Probable starters for Coach Butler's Rangers were Ulrich Cobb, Jim McCloud, Larry Robertson, Sol McMillon and Joe Metoyer.

Wrangler starters were expected to be Howard Scott, Billy Robertson, Sam Tipton, David McKaplain and Luster Miles.

The Rangers have scored 769 points while holding their opponents to 620 and are rated number one in their region and conference and will probably be rated high nationally with their victory over national ranked Cameron Junior College 81-73 last Thursday.

## Disability Pay Is Not Limited To 'Permanent'

Disabled persons should take note that social security disability benefits are no longer limited to those with a "permanent" disability.

R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, said today. A worker may now be eligible for benefits if he has a disability which has lasted or is expected to last at least 12 months, and prevents him from working.

Although the disability provisions of the social security law were changed in July 1965, Tuley said, his office has seen evidence that some disabled workers have been passing up benefits because they had not heard of the 1965 changes. One important change, he said, removed the requirement that a disability be long continued or permanent without expectation of recovery. Another eases the work requirements for persons whose disability is blindness.

Under present law, a person who becomes blind before age 24 may be eligible for benefits with only 1 1/2 years of work in the 3 years before becoming blind. Blindness occurring before age 31, with social security credits for half of the time between age 21 and before becoming blind, may qualify the person for disability benefits.

Workers who become blind at age 31 or later, or who have disabilities other than blindness, need to have social security credit for at least 5 years out of the 10 years before their disabilities began.

Social Security payments for a disabled worker range from \$44.00 to \$139.90 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security. Benefits may also be paid to certain of his dependents, Tuley said.

He urged disabled workers to inquire about their eligibility for these benefits at the Abilene social security office located at room 2321 Federal Building or meet a representative of that office when he is in your community. A schedule of visits is posted in all post offices.

# State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — Come Tuesday, Texas legislators will be back in session at the state capitol.

Pressing money matters and certain new taxes head the "worry list" confronting the lawmakers. But a broad montage of other problems on the agenda promises an interesting, high-voltage session. It is sure to be one that will continue through the full 140-day period and may even go into extra innings.

Gov. John Connally in his "state of the state" message to the solons later this month will outline spending recommendations which will require more than 100,000,000 in new taxation. Included will be his own \$911,500,000 budget.

Numerous tax proposals are expected to be offered. These include expansion on the sales tax, a one-cent-per-gallon boost in gasoline taxes, a franchise tax raise and many other proposals.

Growing cities, with financial problems of their own, will occupy much of the Legislature's attention. Mayors will plug for a one-per-cent local option city sales tax.

(Governor Connally prefers a rebate of gasoline tax revenues for street purposes.) While most legislators apparently are prepared to vote for new taxes, few indicate they will support a \$44,000,000 raise in state college tuitions.

Headline topics before lawmakers this year will include: Teacher pay raise — teachers want raises ranging from \$61 to \$100 a month. This would cost the state some \$68,000,000 a year. A majority of lawmakers are committed to some form of increase. Connally is expected to recommend much less.

Constitutional revision — the governor and the State Democratic Party advocate revision by convention. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith favors a more-cautious approach.

Legalized sale of mixed drinks and horse racing. Annual legislative sessions. A long-range plan for water pollution control.

A 20-per cent pay raise for state employees.

Driver safety legislation: increasing the minimum age for drivers to 16 and requiring periodic re-examination of all drivers.

Among other measures to be considered are: a minimum wage bill; an industrial safety act; increased workers' compensation benefits; reconsideration of some provisions of the new code of criminal procedure; daylight saving time (should Texas accept it or pass a special act to retain standard time?) and a \$75,000,000 bond financed 12-year program advocated by the governor to acquire and develop new state parks.

A statewide campaign has been launched for funds to convert the grounds around the Governor's Mansion into a garden area.

ed and surfaced with brick patios and retaining walls.

Mrs. John Connally assisted a Dallas firm in drafting plans for the garden. Project was approved by the Fine Arts Commission and members of the Texas garden clubs have pledged their help with the fund-raising. Contributions may be mailed to Mrs. Connally at the Mansion in Austin.

The Mansion has been the official residence of Texas governors since 1856.

Attorney Gen. Crawford C. Martin and several members of the judicial branch of Texas government had to work Sunday — they took their oaths of office at the Supreme Court Building on the Capitol grounds.

Judges John F. Onion Jr., Wesley Dice and Ernest Belcher took their oaths as judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals. Dice and Belcher had served as commissioners to the court until a Constitutional amendment passed in November made the Court a five-member body. Governor Connally is expected to name one of the five as chief justice this week.

Associate Justice John C. Phillips of the Third Court of Civil Appeals in Austin took the oath of chief justice of that court.

A Texas historical marker will be erected in Junction soon honoring former Gov. Coke R. Stevenson.

Marker is the third in the "modern Texas Statesmen" series being erected by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. Earlier markers commemorated public service of former Govs. William P. Hobby and Allan Shivers.

Stevenson, born March 20, 1888, was the first Texas governor to serve more than two terms (1941-47). He is a lifetime resident of Kimble County.

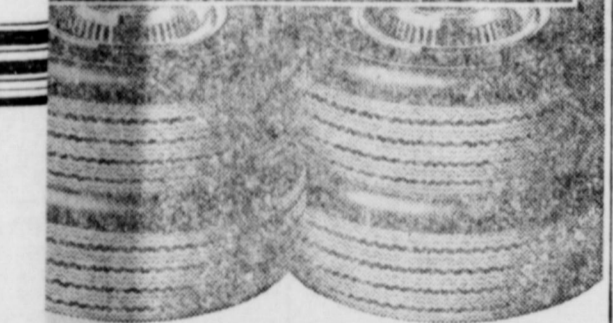

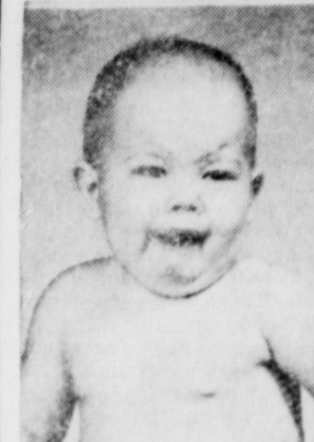

### Throckmorton I On Lone Star's System for Gas

Lone Star Gas Company on December 30 began supplying Throckmorton with temporary propane-air gas service pending completion of a 10-mile natural gas pipeline that will connect the north-west Texas city with the company's vast pipeline network.

Lone Star Gas Company will begin continuous natural gas service to the city early next week.

Temporary gas service to the city began shortly after 11:59 p. m. December 29 following an agreement between Throckmorton civic leaders and gas company officials in Dallas that morning. A portable propane-air mixing machine brought from the gas company's pipeline headquarters in Vernon will supply the city with fuel energy until natural gas service is begun. The stand-by propane-air equipment can produce up to 35,000 cubic feet of the mixture each hour.

Construction workers began work on the 10-mile four inch pipeline December 29. The new pipeline will run northwest from Lone Star's line OS in southeastern Throckmorton County to the IP Coal and Oil Lease where it will join existing pipeline into the city.

Throckmorton will be served by the Lone Star's Stamford District of Distribution

Therefore, it is important to see that soil in which the plants are growing is kept supplied with moisture. It is especially important to soak the soil before freezing weather.

To protect semi-hardy plants and newly planted shrubs, some wind protection may be advisable. A wind screen may be constructed from snow fence, burlap or commercially prepared straw mats.

You may also need to protect from rodent damage this winter. Rabbits and other rodents will frequently damage young trees and shrubs when their normal food supplies are cut off by ice or snow. The tender bark on trees and roses provide rodents with a convenient source of food. It is often good practice to place a wire collar around prized plants or to even construct a rodent proof fence around favorite shrub or flower borders. Such a fence can be temporary, and once the rodent danger has passed, can be easily removed.
