Eastland

It's Friday, and of course we can't think of much today but tomorrow's football game. However, we have heard so much this year about 1947's team — the last EHS squad to win a district and regional crown — that we decided to do a little research.

We read somewhere this year that the 1947 Maverick team won 12 games in a row while allowing only one touchdown. It seems that the great Mav team of '47 has become even greater as the years go by. For although the team did pile up a fine record, winning the first regional crown in the history of the school, it wasn't quite as strong as some of the oldtimers recall.

Eastland opened the season against Ranger. And for the first time since 1940 the Mavs scored a victory over the Bulldogs. You loyal fans will remember that one. Think back and you will recall how gummy those seats were in the brand new west stands of Maverick Stadium. There were 1732 of you there for the tilt, and you fought crickets all during the game.

Next came a strong Masonic Home eleven. The Mavericks had to fight hard to down the Mighty Mites 13-7. But the next week Coaches Johnny Little and Wendell Siebert's charges got a little rest as they defeated a weak De Leon team 46-0. Next came AA Fort Worth Tech. Winless Tech was no match for Eastland, and they went down 26-7.

The Mavs had 14 returning lettermen in 1947, including a letter-catcher at each starting position. And they were being boomed highly by this time. But then came Ballinger, remember? The Mavs were crushed 26-6 and left the field with a number of injuries. The following week they played Dublin, supposedly the weak sister of District 10-A. But the Mavs had their hands full in winning a 6-0 victory.

Eastland regained much honor the following week, however. The Mavs rose up to crush Comanche 25-0 and the following week downed strong Hamilton 26-0. Cisco came next, and the mythical Eastland County crown was at stake. Cisco won it, blanking the Mavs 14-0 in a minor upset. Gorman came next, and the Mavs were still mad about the loss to the Lobos. They crushed the hapless visitors 44-0 to wrap up the district crown.

That 1947 team reminds you much of Eastland's great 1956 eleven. For despite what the oldtimers remember, that Mav team also went into the playoffs as the underdog.

Eastland had to face the District 9-A victor in bi-district play. That was mighty Coleman, a team that edged Ballinger, 26-6 victor over Eastland in earlier season play. The Mavs were three touchdown underdogs, but when the game was over Maverick Stadium was glowing with tribute. Eastland won 26-7. Next came Stamford, in regional play. This was child's play for the Mavs, as they coasted to a 35-0 win.

That was as far as a Class A team could go in 1947. The next year Class A started playing to the finals.

Remember the boys that played on that 1947 squad? Refresh your memory while looking over the roster.

The Mavs were a well-rounded eleven. Five of the starters were named on the all-district team and three others made second string all-district.

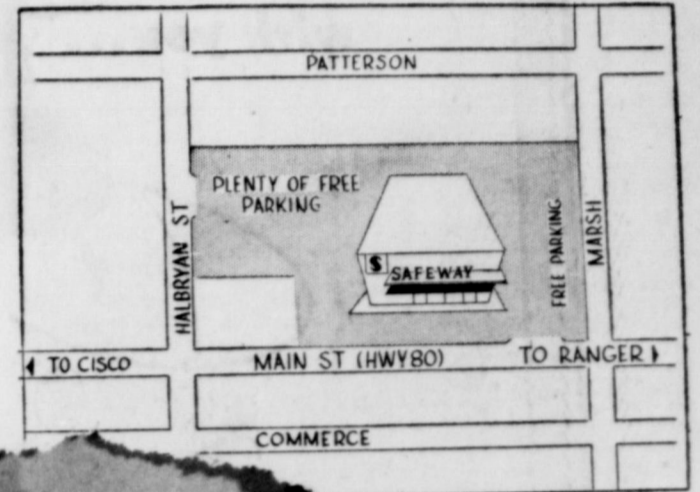
Produce manager is John E. Trimble, who was born in Scranton. Trimble is married and has two children, Karan Kay, 5, and Mike, 3.

# Texas Oil Money Waiting For Yankees In Eastland

Here is news for some 392 citizens of Chicago and New York: Your Texas oil money is waiting for you.

Yes, there are 392 royalty owners who have money in the bank in Eastland that don't know a thing about it. H. P. Pentecost, local real estate dealer, revealed

the information Saturday.

Pentecost was appointed receiver for the 392 owners, who bought their interest from a "Brooklyn bridge salesman" back in 1917, during the Eastland County oilboom.

This tip to the 392 owners, who Pentecost has a list of. Don't

quit your job and come rushing to Eastland. Your boat may have come in, but you better check its load before doing anything drastic.

Money now in the bank here totals about \$200. That means that your share is something like \$5, or less. ## County Draws New Oil Try

J. D. Drilling Co. of Eastland has staked the No. 1 W. F. Davenport as a wildcat try 2280 feet west and 700 feet south of the southwest corner of Section 10, H&TB Survey in the S. J. Robinson Survey, 3 1/2 miles east of Eastland on a 40 acre lease.

Proposed depth is 2600 feet with rotary. The try is one-fourth of a mile west of a 2840 foot fault.

Another try of interest in Eastland County is the Blue Danube Oil Co.'s No. 3 C. K. West. The try is in the Edward Ramersbau Survey, 13 miles north of Cadogan, Stephens County. Proposed depth is 4200 feet with rotary. The try is on a 620 acre lease.

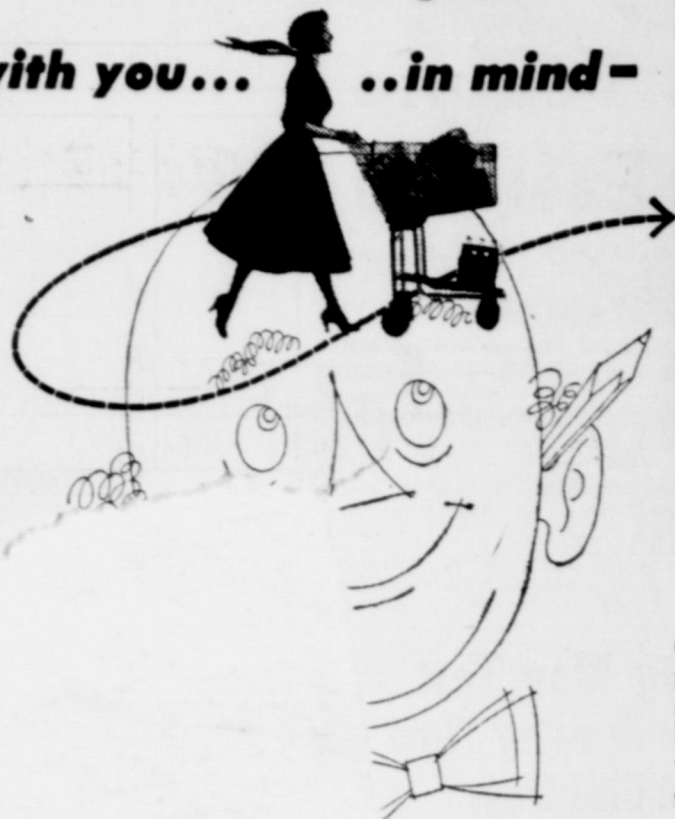

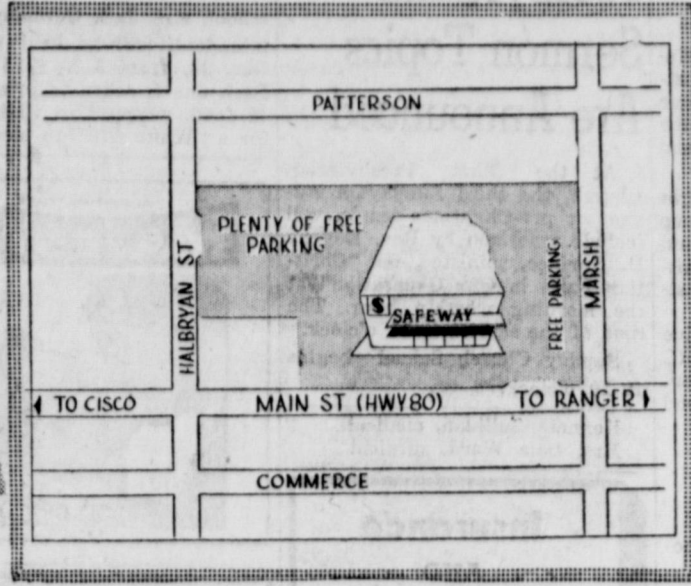

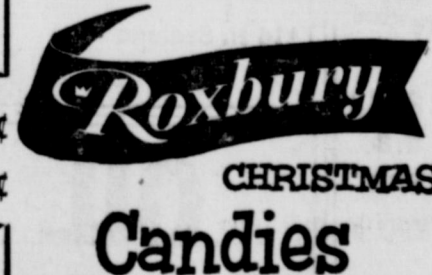
