## SPRING CLEAN-UP IS UNDERWAY IN TOWN

Annual Spring Clean-up sponsored by Civic and Garden Club, will begin today with citizens aiming for a Clean Eastland.

James Horton, chairman of the Clean-Up Committee, said "We are happy everyone seems to be participating in this important drive. The Junior High School students are going to prepare the publicity posters, and the Boy Scouts have agreed to help with the campaign. Mrs. Don Pierson is in charge of poster distribution and Mrs. Frank Lovett is going to be responsible for speeches at the Elementary School. We have people checking into the possibility of distributing litter bags and helping keep the town clean after the end of the campaign.

Lewis Tiner, city manager, has asked that residents have garbage and tree limbs or shrubbery ready for pickup by March 15. Estimates are that the city will need at least two weeks to complete the pick-up.

Mrs. Horton said that races which will hold two or three garbage cans are available, painted and delivered for \$10, from a local business. Lids for the oil drums are also available. Anyone interested in one of these items may secure more information by calling Mrs. Horton, MA 9-1257. Individuals may be hired to haul off trash for \$2 an hour, which include truck charge. These names may be obtained from Mrs. Horton.

## 2 Youth From County Named For Europe Tour

Rhett Smith, Eastland High School junior, and Dorothy Ann Oliver, Ranger High School senior, have been selected to represent this county on the Texas Youth Conference's "Europe '67 Tours." The announcement was made Friday by Mike Collins, county chairman for Texas Youth Conference.

Twenty young Texans will leave June 3 for a 30-day tour of England, France, Switzerland, Germany, the Netherlands, and Italy.

Seventeen year old Smith is the son of Mrs. Ruth Smith. He has been extremely active in Texas Youth Conference work, having attended the state conference two years — first as a delegate and as a junior counselor last summer. He was instrumental in working with the Eastland Jaycees in securing the panel of convicts who spoke in Eastland last year. Assisting with the Extension Services Teen Scene program last year, he was master of ceremonies and introduced R. T. (Somy) Davis, director of the Texas Youth Conference on Crime, as featured speaker. Mr. and Mrs. Davis will accompany the group to Europe.

Rhett is president of his Eastland High School Junior class; vice-president of the Maverick Band, of which he is a member; a member of the Beta Club; vice president of the Area Youth Conference Council; and president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship at First Methodist Church where he attends church.

Dorothy Ann Oliver is the 18 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Oliver, 901 Foch St., Ranger. A Ranger High School Senior, she is feature editor of the annual staff, plays baritone saxophone in both Bulldog and Stage Bands and is also head majorette for the band.

She is reigning queen of Ranger Jaycee Rodeo and Sweetheart of Ranger Lions Club. She is a member of First Baptist Church, Order of the Rainbow for girls and Sub Deb Club where she serves as treasurer and a future Beta Sigma Phi member. She was an Eastland County delegate to the 4th Annual Texas Youth Conference held in Austin Aug. 18-21, 1966, on the University of Texas campus.

The evangelistic team will work in the Buff Bay area on the north side of the island until March 6. They will hold daily services in the mission points of the Buff Bay Baptist Church. Dr. A. L. McKenzie is pastor of the church.

## The Music Goes Round 'n Round And Comes Out Popular at EHS

Editors note: Edison patented the phonograph on Feb. 19, 1878. Tania Faircloth conducted a survey about record players and records, among high school students.

The phonograph is one of the most popular things in the world today. Do high school students feel a record player is a necessity or a luxury? A necessity! Donna Haynes, Ida Young, and Karen Gallagher admitted they might be luxuries, but the majority opinion is that "every teen-ager should have at least one phonograph."

Most homes have one, and many have two: a console and a portable. Stereo is extremely popular and Andrea Rhodes says, "A portable stereo is the best thing by far!" The average Eastland High School student buys from ten to 20 single records a year and limits album purchases to five or six annual.

The other top songs in Eastland are "For What It's Worth" by Buffalo Springfield; "Mares Eat Oats" by the Innocents; "My Cup Runneth Over, by Ed Ames; and "It's Now Winters Day" by Tommy Roe.

Favorite male singers are Dean Martin and Gene Pitney, with The Righteous Brothers, the Beach Boys, and the Monkees the most popular groups. The Monkees are really great with everyone; all the kids like their television programs, albums and single records.

Top female vocalists are Leslie Gore and Dusty Springfield and favorite female group is the Supremes.

Many teen-agers pointed out that record players are not only for enjoyment, but are used for teaching purposes. Almost every classroom has a phonograph which is used for various programs.

It would be a sad world without music and without a record player it's just not possible to have a whatever song you choose whenever you choose.

Thank you, Mr. Edison! is the reaction of Eastland High School students.

## International President To Be Featured Speaker At Lions 45th Anniversary

Edward M. Lindsey, President of the service club's top executive, it will mark the first in recent history, if not the first time, that an international president will be speaker in the county.

Other dignitaries expected included Dave Evans of Texas, third vice president, Lions International, who will assume the presidency at the international convention in Dallas in 1968, and District Governor Bill Longley of Stamford.

Glyn Gilliam of RRanger is in charge of invitations to district officers and Joe Weaver of Cisco is handling invitation, to area Lions. Tom Stark of Cisco is in charge of ticket sales and C. W. Hoffmann Jr. of Eastland is making arrangements for the decorations and printing of the program.

Mr. Stark is president of the Cisco Club; Bill Marsler is president of the Ranger Club; and Ed Etheridge, president of the Eastland Club.

Edward M. Lindsey of Lawrenceburg, Tenn., was elected President of Lions International July 9, 1966 at Madison Square Garden in New York City.

Lion Lindsey joined the Lawrenceburg Lions Club in 1946 and has had a perfect attendance record since that time. During his 20 years of Lionism, he has served in many capacities, most recently as First Vice-President. He has also been a Director for the organization, District Governor, Deputy District Governor and Zone Chairman, as well as President of the Lawrenceburg Lions Club. During his term as District Governor, seven new clubs were formed in his district.

Ed Lindsey is a former Mayor of Lawrenceburg. In 1955 he was named the State's outstanding Mayor.

He served as a pilot in World War II and continued his military service with the Tennessee National Guard. He was retired after 20 years of service on Nov. 30, 1962.

Lion Lindsey has long been interested in history. He was awarded a life membership in the Lawrence County Historical Society for his outstanding contributions to that organization during his years as its president.

Lion Lindsey is active in civic, social and religious work in Lawrenceburg. He was chairman of the Lawrence County National Foundation for fifteen years.

Lindsey is a furniture manufacturer, specializing in church and other institutional furniture.

He and his wife, Virginia have a daughter, Anne. Ed is active in the Methodist Church, working on the church's Board of Stewards for some years, and as a lay speaker.

The Dallas man was a practicing physician at Timberlawn Hospital in Dallas at the time of his death. He was also a part - owner of the hospital.  
Franklin H. Perry of Dallas, Mrs. Riedel's attorney, said the requested \$770,000 settlement was less than the amount Dr. Riedel would have earned during his probable remaining lifetime. Perry estimated that his income would have been near \$1 million dollars had he lived an additional 34 years.

## THE GORDON SPOT

I would like to call your attention to several activities planned for this week.

There has been a growing interest in greenhouse tomato production here in Eastland County. Several have told me they plan to build greenhouses this year. 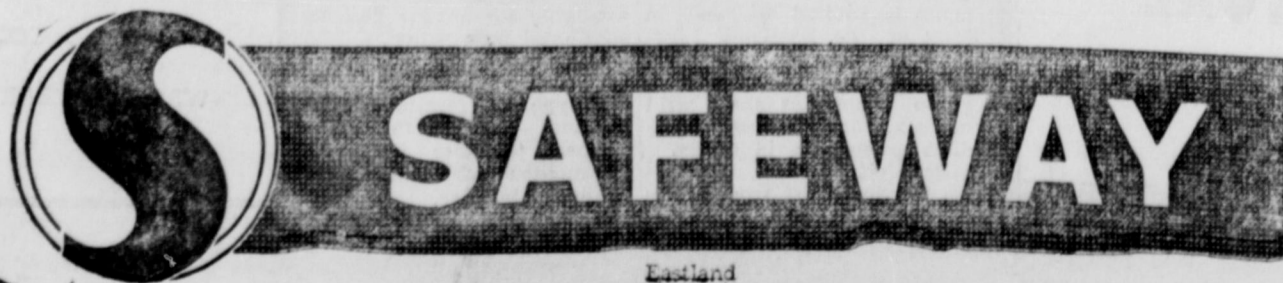
