21,780 Damage Suit Monday 91st Court

A \$21,780.70 damage suit filed by the law firm of Thompson, Coe, Cousins and Irons, and alleges that Mrs. Reidel's husband, Albert F. Reidel, was shot Nov. 7, 1964. Attorneys Bill B. Hart and Virgil T. Seaberry Jr., both of Eastland, represent Mr. Allen.

The original petition in the suit asked \$771,780.70 but an amended petition raised the amount to \$821,780.70.

Gary Spradling led the Eastland scoring with 12. Herman Mitchell had 11 for Granbury.

Granbury won the girls' game, 48-38, led by Sue Myer with 29. Marsha Treadwell had 30 for Eastland.

The Mavericks close out the regular season play when they go to Hamilton Friday night, and a win over that team could do wonderful things for the team — it would mark the 20th victory for the Eastland team and the local boys want that record mightily bad, they report.

Coach Frazier, commenting on the Granbury game, "We played a little different brand of ball, and it paid off for us. Edward Ivory set a record with 19 rebounds and we had three players in the double-digit scoring column." What about suppositions? It has maintained a Treaty of Friendship and Protection with Great Britain in this century.

Throughout her rule, Queen Salote maintained a democratic monarchy based on the British system.

Dozen Cases Handled In District Court

A dozen cases were disposed in 91st District Court Monday with juries rendering three verdicts.

TIDBITS...

(Continued from page 1) have significance for Eastland: Small Texas communities need to be on the air map, or get on it, to be able to compete for new industry and the prosperity & growth which accompany it.

Fortunately, there is a program in the state which can help these smaller cities build and develop airports intended primarily for interstate traffic. There is little federal money for this purpose and the indication is that less will be available in the future. Apparently, federal efforts and spending will be concentrated on the large metropolitan airports.

The state program for the smaller airports is administered by the Texas Aeronautics Commission. In the current biennium it has made grants totaling \$200,000 to 26 communities. As a minimum, these communities have matched the amount granted by TAC.

After a community airport is constructed with the help of a state grant, it is the responsibility of the local community to maintain and operate the airport. The state does require that Federal Aviation Administration safety standards be adhered to.

Some other states are ahead of Texas in the development of smaller airports and are in a better position to snare the light industries which are migrating from 1 area to another.

It would be in the best interests of the state and the small communities if we move a little faster in this area. The editorial was entitled "Getting on the air map is vital"

'Boom Possible In More Yield' Speaker Says

The potential in peanut production was vividly portrayed for members of the Eastland Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting Tuesday at the White Elephant Restaurant.

Speaking in an amusing fashion, and using a slide presentation, R. G. Burewell of Stephenville, former District County Agent, and presently representative of the Corn Products Co., (maker's of Skippy's Peanut Butter) explained how this area's economy could be increased through the use of the scientific knowhow available now.

Former Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper was program chairman and introduced his former boss.

Citing specifically the control of leaf spot and Southern Blight diseases, Mr. Burewell said that present production could be increased some 20 per cent - resulting in many thousands of dollars of additional revenue in this area. He spoke primarily of the three major peanut growing counties - Eastland, Comanche and Erath.

"If we could double production through irrigation and fertilization and pest/insect control," he said, "we'd have a boom economy."

Conditions Offered To Help Robbery Of Your Home

Many burglars and apartments are taken care of by insurance companies. Southwest office in Dallas lists conditions offered to help robbery of your home:

1. Heavy screening on windows and sturdy double locks on door make forced entries more difficult.
2. Careful attention should be paid to securing basement doors.
3. Large amounts of cash, jewelry and stamp and coin collections should be kept in a safety deposit box or adequate safe.
4. Locks should be changed when moving into a new apartment or when a key has been lost.

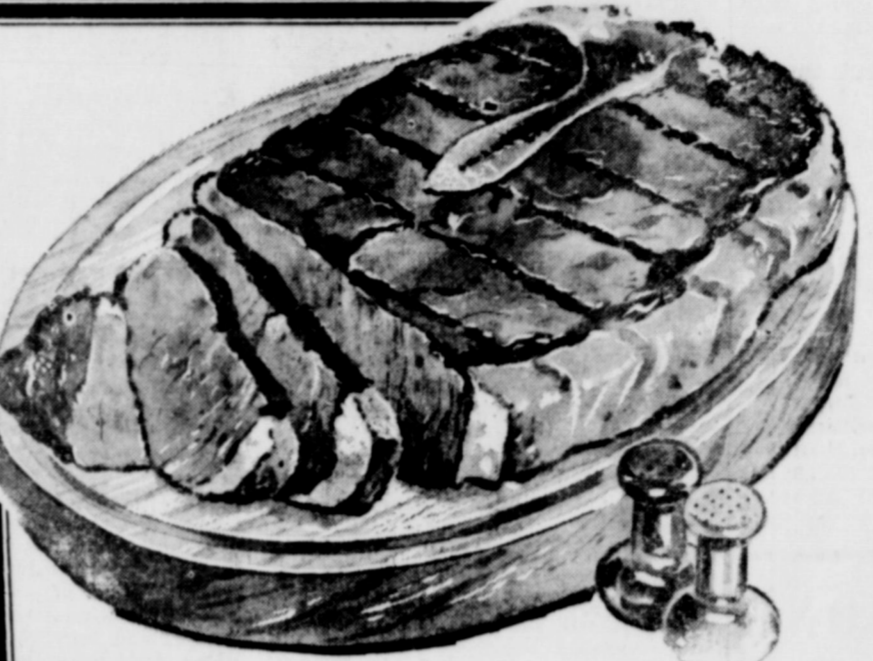

STUDENT DRAFT TESTS TO BE HELD MARCH 11 & 13, APRIL 8

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said students could get information about an upcoming draft test for students, plus application blanks for taking it, are scheduled to be mailed to state draft boards Friday.

Around 60,000 bulletins of the test will be administered March 11 and 31 and April 8. Applications for taking it must be postmarked no later than Friday, Feb. 10.

To be eligible to take the test, the applicant must, on the testing date, (1) be registered with a draft board, (2) intend to request occupational deferment as a student, and (3) not previously have taken the test.

In some college and university towns, arrangements may be made with colleges and universities to have the information bulletins and application blanks on campus.

Taking the test is entirely optional with students. Colonel Schwartz pointed out. He said he had no idea how many would take the test in March and April. He said about 7,000 took the test in November, 1966, and about 30,000 took it in May and June, 1966.

Full details about the tests will be found in the bulletins of information available at the boards. Purpose of the test is to furnish information to the draft boards.

The application blanks to take the test must be mailed to the Selective Service Examining Section, Educational Testing Service, P. O. Box 988, Princeton, New Jersey 08540. A pre-addressed envelope will be furnished with each bulletin of information.

The test is scheduled to be given at 23 colleges and universities in Texas. They are:

Texas Southern, Houston; Hardin Simmons, Abilene; Amarillo College, Amarillo; University of Texas, Austin; Lamar State College, Beaumont; Del Mar College, Corpus Christi; Southern Methodist, Dallas; North Texas State, Denton; Texas Western College, El Paso.

Also Texas Christian, Fort Worth; University of Houston, Houston; Sam Houston State, Huntsville; Texas Tech, Lubbock; Stephen F. Austin State, Nacogdoches; Odessa College, Odessa; Angelo State, San Angelo; St. Mary's University, San Antonio.

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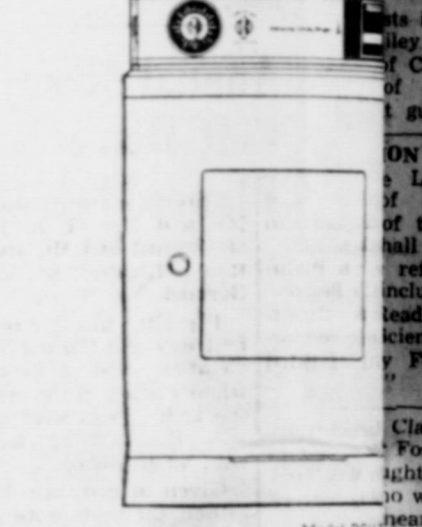

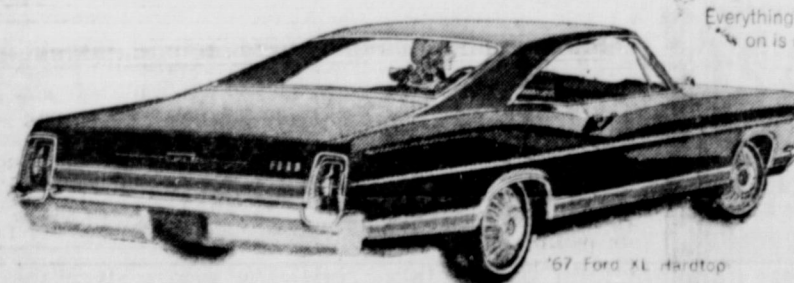
