Texas Highway Deaths for 1967 Due To Be High

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that the total of traffic accidents in 1967 will be \$567,414,000.

This amount of money would give each family in Eastland County a \$20,000 home; a \$400 refrigerator; a \$350 range; a \$350 TV set; a \$300 dishwasher; a \$3,000 automobile; \$1,400 worth of air conditioning; and a bank account of \$29,941.

The statistical service of the department also stated that 1,130,393 Americans died in all the U.S. wars through the Korean War. (Casualties for Viet Nam were not available.)

At the end of 1966, 1,612,450 Americans had died in United States highway accidents.

Bendorf Plans To Drill for Oil On Hart Estate

Another extension effort for the Bankline oil field northeast of Cisco will begin this week by Bendorf Oil Company of Breckenridge, according to information here today. The new test will be Bendorf's No. 1 Hart Estate.

The new test is located 990 feet south of Bendorf's No. 1 G. W. Taylor that was completed some 60 days ago as a Lake Sand producer. This was a western extension of the Bankline pool.

Location was being cleared off for drilling equipment to move in, the report said. The location is near Highway 183 some six miles northeast of Cisco.

Elsewhere, H. L. Neeb's No. 1 Eberhart, Ellenberger lime test 15 miles south of Cisco near Union Center Grocery Store on Highway 183, has been plugged and abandoned as a dry hole, according to reports. Neeb, an Abilene operator, took the test to 3,400 feet.

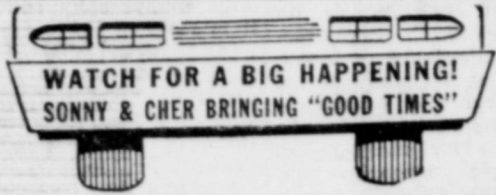

THE GORDON SPOT

Eastland County has several good swine producers. I visited with one last Monday, Fat Moseley of Olden. Pat has a good place for raising hogs with plenty of pasture available. Swine production is a family job at the Moseleys. Three of the children, Patsy, Dollie and Jim are 4-H members at Olden and have swine of their own.



own. Patsy owns a registered Large sow which she won through the 4-H swine program. Her sow has just weaned a good litter of eight pigs. She plans to keep most of the gilts and go into pig production in a big way. One of the pigs will be given to her brother for helping to take care of her pigs. Patsy had surgery about the time the pigs were borne and has not been able to take care of them herself.

I would like to remind pecan producers that Di-Syston, a systemic insecticide, has been cleared by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for aphid control.

A systemic insecticide is a chemical which can be absorbed into a plant's sap system. When the aphid feeds on the plant, it gets a dose of the poison. Di-Syston has proven effective against the black pecan aphid and the yellow or honey dew aphid.

under Eastland County conditions. The granular chemical should be applied in 6-foot bands to the soil on both sides of the trees under the main drip areas. Next work the insecticides into the upper 2 to 3 inches of the soil.

Adequate soil moisture is the key to getting top benefits from the Di-Syston. Other wise, tree roots cannot absorb the material.

The usual recommended application period is May 1-15. Only one application is permitted per season, and this must be made at least 80 days before harvest. Season-long control is most often the rule when proper application and moisture condition prevails.

Survey Shows Most Countians Are For Daylight Savings Time

On April 30th, Eastland County and Texas will join most of the other states of the union in turning their clocks ahead one hour to begin a six months stay on Daylight Savings Time. Daylight Savings Time will be in effect until the last Sunday in October, and this plan will be used each year henceforth.
