## Mavericks vs. Clyde Here Friday After Comanche Win

The Eastland Mavericks raised the curtain on the 1967 District 7-AA basketball race Tuesday night with a big win over powerful Comanche by a 74-to-57 score. James Whitehead had himself a big, big night with a total of 37 points to lead the local scoring. The Mavericks were less successful in their meeting with the Comanche girls, losing by a 56-to-44 count. Clyde beat Cisco, 55-43, on Tuesday night, and they and Comanche had been picked as the top teams in the district. Eastland hosts the Clyde team here Friday night in what is expected to be a classic duel. The local gym probably will be packed for the key game. Granbury won over Hamilton, 50-49, in other action in the district, and Dublin beat Baird, by one point, to spoil Baird's opening round in their District 10-A.

## Rehabilitation Center Director To Speak at Eastland P-TA Meet

Shelly V. Smith, executive director of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene, will speak on "Learning Disabilities" at P-TA, 7:30 p. m., Tuesday at the Elementary School. The fourth grade will present a program, Mrs. Robert E. Bishop, program chairman, announced. Smith was reared in Georgetown and received his elementary and high school education in the public schools there. He received the B. S. degree in education from Southwestern University in 1951, and then enrolled in the Hermann Hospital School of Physical Therapy in Houston. He became executive director of the Children Treatment Center in San Angelo in August, 1952, and a year later accepted his present position in Abilene. He is a member of Abilene Rotary Club, a former officer of the Abilene Council for Retarded Children, executive director of the Children's Development Center, director of the Taylor County Chapter of the National Foundation, and has served on the board for the Abilene Council on Alcoholism. Smith is also on the executive board of the Abilene Zoological Society, and on the Governor's committee of Task Force for the Mentally Retarded. He is chairman of the Southwestern University Ex-student Association of West Texas. He received the Abilene Taylor County Mental Health Award in 1961. He is a member of the American Physical Therapy Association and the American Registry of Physical Therapists. He was co-chairman of the Building Committee for the Westgate Church of Christ.

## ... banquet speaker

Breckenridge High School, University of Oklahoma and profession Dallas Cowboy Star Jerry Tubbs will be featured speaker for the Eastland Quarterback Club's Annual Football Banquet at the Eastland Elementary Cafetorium Jan. 21. Tubbs came out of retirement 2 1/2 weeks before Cowboys' NFL opener to shore up line-backing corps. Until this year, he had been regular Cowboy middle backer for 6 years, and is one of 36 original Cowboys, coming from San Francisco where he was a regular middle man. He was with the Chicago Cardinals before that, and the Cards drafted him No. 1, but traded him to the 49ers in 1958. Known for speed and savy, he's an aggressive player and will be a player-coach for the Cowboys. He was All-Pro in 1962 and sparked the 1963 Pro Bowl. At OU, he was a three-year regular and received the Walter Camp Award as nation's top player after his 1956 senior season. As a sophomore in 1954, coaches so valued his defensive ability they started him at fullback in some games just to get him into game under rigid substitution rules of that day. He was All-State Schoolboy at Breckenridge. He now lives in Richardson and is an officer at Dallas Federal Savings and Loan Association.

## Many Are Now Asking Here: 'Can't We Afford To Sweep?'

Spoken aloud, with a n y speed at all, the phrase "Does the city need a street sweeper?" is a tongue-twister. Spoken any way, it's a problem that a lot of people in Eastland are taking more and more interest in. Extremely vocal are some who contend that the streets of the city are the most unkept in Eastland's history. What are the facts? Well, the city has a sweeper. But it's old, tired and according to city officials just "plain worn out." It would most more to repair it than it's worth, they say, and city employes have fought a losing battle in trying to use it with patchwork, bailing and repair. "So, why don't we buy a new one?" the clean-at-any-price group asks. The machines are expensive and the city commission is working diligently to get the city completely out of debt. "But this is something we need right now." "It's among quite a few things we need," the officials answer. Going on to reply that revamping of the sewer disposal plant is badly needed. And so it goes — and it's likely to be a central topic at regular monthly meeting, Monday, Jan. 16, beginning at 7 p. m. at the City Hall. One of the loudest proponents for let's get a sweeper and clean up our streets now, is Mrs. James Horton, chairman of the Civic League and Garden Club's Annual Clean-Up Committee. She has said: "Spring clean up time is soon upon us, and I, as chairman for the Civic League and Garden Club, am looking critically over our city. We have the reputation of being a clean little city, and we want to keep it so. "As I drive about town, I am amazed at our dirty streets. Grass has grown over the curbs. Dirt, sand and even weeds have taken over what should be pavement. Look at West Commerce, Plummer, East Sadosa, all of Connelley, Mulberry from Olive South and many others. We need a city sweeper. Surely something can be done that our city commissioners can purchase either a second-hand one, or better yet, a new one. Nearly all have agreed that the immediate downtown area is "clean enough."

## Convicted Swindler Back In County Jail

John J. Ashford, convicted swindler, was taken to the county jail after being held in the Eastland County Jail for a hearing set in Austin on Jan. 25, the sheriff's office said this week.

A small, dark man reportedly suffering from a heart condition and during his trial in district court he has been on his appeal though he was held in the Huntsville jail.

As a hand-printed appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals that Ashford used to get freedom from the state and the chance for a new trial on his conviction.

On Feb. 21, 1966, he was found guilty of theft over \$50 and sentenced to eight years. At that time he was represented by Attorney Brantly Brantley of Fort Worth, but apparently has been unrepresented since the time of an appeal immediately after the trial before District Judge J. Frank Sparks was granted at the time by a Fort Worth man's taking the amendment and refusing to testify. Assisted by Cisco County W. B. Wright, County Attorney Perry T. Brown produced evidence showing that J. W. Slaughter of Cisco County had been bilked out of some

\$6,500 in furniture and merchandise as the result of dealing with Ashford.

Judge Sparks overruled the motion for a new trial and Ashford was taken to Huntsville. There he made his appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals, and just this past week, DA Brown received a copy of the Court's ruling, in which they held that the evidence must show that the swindled party (J. W. Slaughter) must rely solely on the representation made by the defendant, and that the facts in the case didn't show that.

Brown contends, and so said in a forceful answer to the appeal court, that the law does not require that the injured party must rely on the word of the defendant.

In the event that neither Brown nor Wright appear before the hearing in Austin, a state's attorney will argue the case and the court will either decide to affirm their first finding or reverse it.

Ashford also faces an indictment here for theft "by false pretense," as the result of business dealings with H. T. Gray, formerly of Ranger.

Presently, Ashford is subject to bond, presumably to be set by Judge Sparks.

The file in the case is extensive and shows much use in and through the various channels of appeal.

The women and their wives numbered approximately 200 and Saturday's convention was held at the Ranger Public Schools.

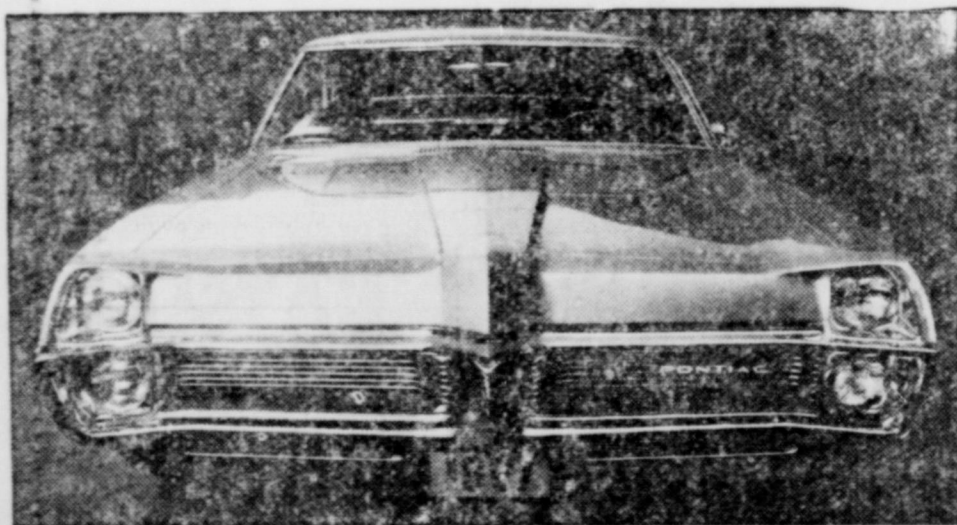

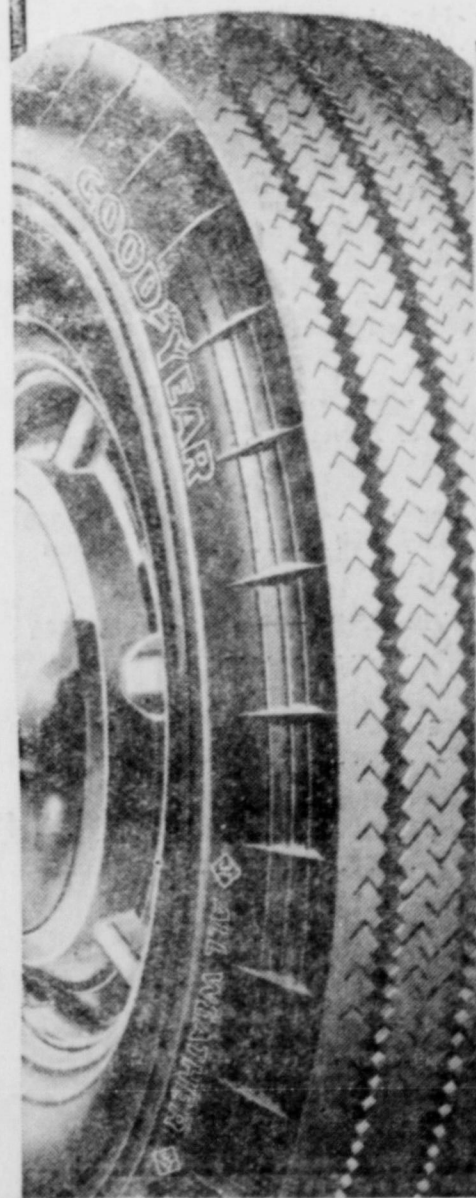

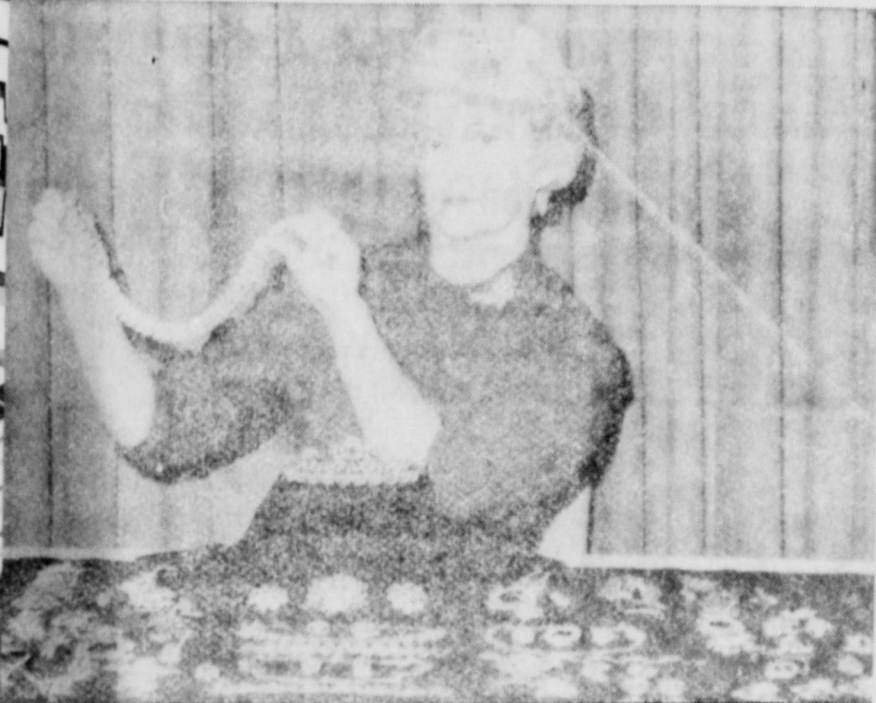

Brockmann, chairman from Morton Valley; Mrs. Ray Judin, vice-chairman from Cisco; Mrs. Jack Lusk, secretary of Eastland; and Mrs. W. V. Fenter, treasurer from Rising Star.

The Home Demonstration Council is composed of representatives from each home demonstration club in the county. The council meets once each month in Eastland. The Home Demonstration Council has the main purpose to develop leadership and extend home demonstration work among both women and girls in all parts of Eastland County.

## Motor Vehicle Inspection Due By April 15th

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded Texas motorists today that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection sticker.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison. "This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have vehicle inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out that official inspection stations are easily identified by the standard sign displayed

at or near the service entrance of the garage. He advised that inspection stations are being urged to request permission to inspect any vehicle brought into the garage for repairs or regular service.

"In this way," Garrison pointed out, "time will be saved for the motorist as well as for the inspection station."

"And if you have not had your vehicle inspected, take it to one of the 5,500 authorized inspection stations for a 'check-up' and start the new year off right with a safe vehicle."

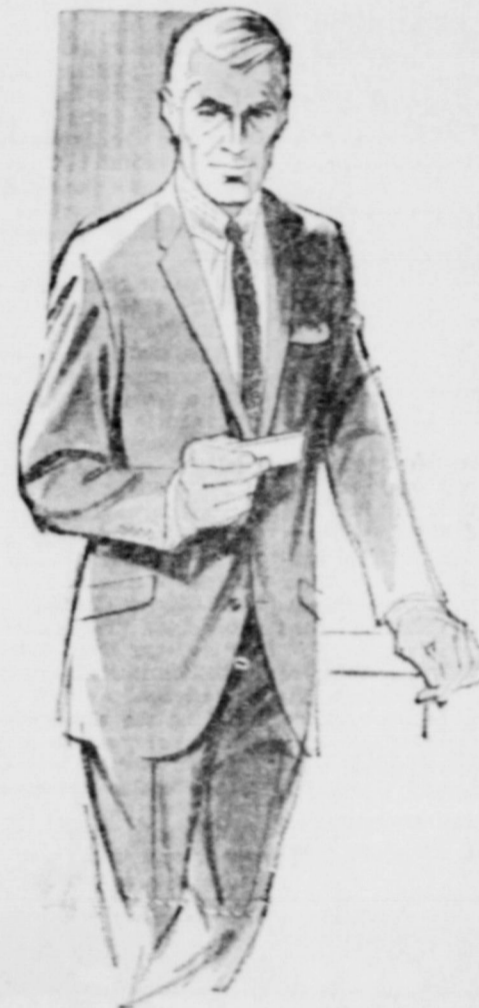

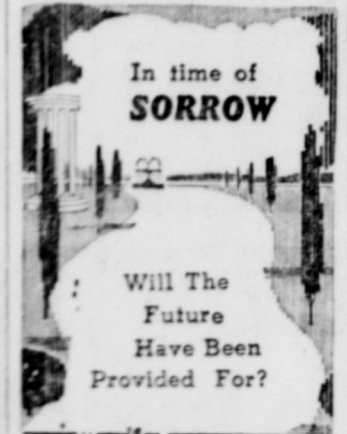

A 32-year old county native was charged in county court with felony theft and was free on \$3,000 bond set by Eastland Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton.

County Sheriff L. E. Sublett and First Deputy Loy Williams have been busy trying to determine the rightful owners of the assortment of agricultural equipment, including fertilizers (large West Texas and Panhandle variety) and a liquid fertilizer distributor made from empty butane bottles.

The man's parents live between Cisco and Breckenridge. First charged last Friday, the man was brought in Tuesday morning by Deputy Williams to face charges on another fertilizer. Complaints and warrants so far are from the Whittace and Olton areas, the sheriff said.

A second felony theft charge was filed Tuesday morning and the man made a second

\$3,000 bond and was released. The State Comptroller's office was advised of the lack of serial numbers on the large butane bottles and officials indicated to the Sheriff's Department that their investigators would be in the county soon to check on the operation.

The man reportedly told the sheriff that he was buying the equipment from a supplier "up near Abilene." He was advised that it would be well to be able to produce receipts and cancelled checks when grand juries up in the Pan-

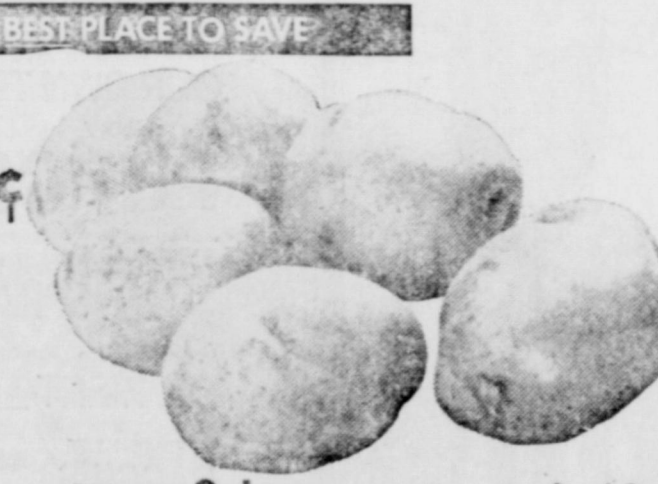
