## Local Rotarians Shown Selves By African Here

Eastland Rotarians and guests got a fresh look at themselves, their country and their customs, Monday when Rotary Fellow Jacques Van Onselen, native of South Africa, who has been in the United States for months, spoke at a luncheon at the White Elephant Restaurant.

Van Onselen is attending Abilene Christian College.

Van Onselen, who has taught English in England and his own land, began by saying, "I'm sorry I cannot address you in your own language." He listed several "Texas drawl words" he finds difficult.

He stated that language is but one of the things on his list of the new and different. The list, which now contains sixty items and is "growing rapidly", includes the utter absorption with football common here in the fall; a high school pep rally; toothpicks; public water fountains, tennis shoes, "bobby sox", and the country's dependence upon the car, including the drive-in banks, cafes, movies, mail boxes, and, in some states, churches.

The things which receive publicity are strange to him: Breckenridge's famous marriage, for instance; and personal lives of the stage, movie, and political figures. He had seen television while living in England.

Van Onselen who recently toured the western states, said that Americans are loyal to their president, regardless of party lines or conflicting interests.

## PO PATRONS THANKED AND BEING REWARDED FOR ZIP COOPERATION

Patrons of the Eastland Post Office are cooperating almost without exception in the use of Zip Coding. Postmaster Marene Johnson reports — "and getting better mail service as their reward."

Postal officials began Jan. 15 figuring all parcel post rates on a Zip Code chart, making it necessary for Zip Codes to be listed on all parcels in order that they could be rated. The local post office asked at the time for customers to have their parcels zipped before coming to the window so that clerks do not have to take time in looking up the numbers.

In fact, the local post office asked that the office be called by telephone to secure numbers, and "You can be sure, our telephone has been busy," Mrs. Johnson said, "but it really helps because people don't have to wait at the window, and it does speed up mailings."

How much, for example on an individual letter?

"Well, figures show that a letter has to pass through at least 19 handlings, without Zip Code, and goes through at least half that many when the letter bears a Zip Code," she said. And on parcels less handling means less damage and fewer claims, Mrs. Johnson said.

She particularly complimented the bulk mailers who are cooperating in zipping and sorting.

Quoting the Jan. 19, Postal Bulletin, she said, "All social security checks, beginning with the Feb. 3, issuance will be pre-sorted and dispatched by Zip Code."

Of his own country, he stated that South Africa has never asked the United States for foreign aid. He said, "My country has only 6 percent of Africa's population and over 20 percent of Africa's income. We have gold, diamonds, platinum, and chrome. Our industry is growing daily."  
With a population of about fifteen million, South Africa has fourteen universities. Van Onselen received his B.A. degree from the University of Stellenbosch, South Africa.  
Van Onselen said, "The whole purpose of a Rotary Fellow is to show one country to another. It is my hope that I may be an undistorted mirror to the Rotary Club of Port Elizabeth, showing your country exactly as it is. It has been said that a country which can laugh at itself, and accept itself, is spiritually healthy. I will not reflect only the 'movie life'; I will reflect the people of your country."



## Tuberculosis Control Services To Be Studied At County Meet

Plans for providing Eastland County people with local tuberculosis control services will be discussed by several of this county's civic leaders at a 2 p. m., Thursday, Jan. 24 meeting at the Commissioners Court Room in Eastland. Judge Scott Bailey has announced. The meeting is open to any interested persons.

The judge has called the meeting. He has announced that Mrs. Marie Peik and Miss Fran McDonald of Austin, field consultants with the Texas Tuberculosis Association, will be on hand for discussion and to answer questions. "With one in every six Texans infected with the TB germ," Mrs. Peik wrote, "each county in the

state should have a chance to fortify its defences against tuberculosis." Eastland County is one of 27 counties which will band together to form an area tuberculosis association. Citizen groups in each county will act as its TB control council, and representatives of each county council will form a board to direct the area association. A name, headquarters site and staff will be selected by this board.

Counties included are: Callahan, Cooke, Haskell, Hill, Jack, Johnson, Palo Pinto, Tarrant, Wichita, Wil-

berger, Archer, Baylor, Clay Eastland, Erath, Foard, Har deman, Hood, Knox, Montague, Parker, Shackelford, Somervell, Stephens, Throckmorton, Wise and Young.

Since the turn of the century, Texas has been served by a volunteer tuberculosis association, whose state headquarters are in Austin. About 100 scattered counties have had local tuberculosis associations. In this move toward area tuberculosis associations, it is hoped that local TB services can be brought to each town and city in the state. The Texas State Department of Health, the tax-supported agency charged with finding, treating, and following up on TB patients, is also reorganizing into regional groups of counties. The two organizations — the voluntary association, which is supported by Christmas Seal and which involves use of volunteers and the tax-supported Health Department work with local doctors in each community to form a three-way attack on TB.

**Depot Hearing  
Is Held Tuesday  
At Court House**

A hearing on a joint application was held at the courthouse in Eastland Tuesday. The hearing was being conducted by C. F. Boulden, examiner for the Texas Railroad Commission.

The hearing opened at 9 a. m. and was concluded at 1:15 p. m. Records of the hearing will be submitted to the Railroad Commission in Austin for a ruling within a few weeks.

The railroads were requesting the closing of the depot as an economy move. The T&P, which proposes to dismantle both the union station and their freight depot, said they would serve Cisco from the Eastland station.

W. C. Dowdy of Dallas, attorney for T & P, questioned

D. W. Swartz of Big Spring, division superintendent for T&P regarding the service now offered and proposed in Cisco. This brought out that T&P motor freight trucks make two trips to Cisco daily to deliver and pick up local shipments. That, it was said, will continue. Present passenger trains will continue.

Questioned by W. B. Wright, president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and City attorney, Mr. Dowdy said T&P has closed depots at a number of towns, including Santa, Merkel, Trent, Coahoma on their main line.

J. H. Elliott of St. Louis, supervisor of statistics for both T&P and M-K-T railroads, testified to give figures on freight shipments in and out of Cisco. He said the company was operating at a loss in Cisco.

Both Mr. Wright and J. O. Dodd of Fort Worth, representing the employees union, requesting the railroad commission to delay a ruling in the hearing until the facts presented could be studied.





## A Look at the County Government

... from the Auditor's Point of View

County Auditor C. H. (Harri) O'Brien has recently given programs in the county on "County Government in Texas."

The building of the present courthouse, list of county officials and how they are elected or appointed, and the financial condition of the county have been discussed by Mr. O'Brien.

On May 16, 1927, the Commissioner's Court voted to submit to counties that they vote \$300,000 in bonds to build

a new courthouse. At that time, E. S. Pritchard was county judge and commissioners were V. V. Cooper, Precinct 1, who made the motion; W. M. Burns, Precinct 2, who seconded the motion; J. T. Poe, Precinct 3; and Burt Brittain, Precinct 4.

The election was held on July 9, 1927 and carried by 60 votes. Some 2380 votes were cast in 29 election places. Eight boxes were for, 20 against and one box showed a

tie. Final vote was 1220 for; 1160 against. The final cost of the courthouse was \$313,268.28.

O'Brien stated that today the county expenses are about one half million dollars and the county tax levied 80 cents per hundred is the state constitutional maximum, saying that counties which charge more levy special taxes. Eastland County ranks as one of approximately 20 counties in the state having the lowest tax rate.

According to O'Brien, the county's indebtedness at the end of 1966 was \$73,783, which included the courthouse warrants for repairs to the Court of Civil Appeals.

This is itemized: Courthouse warrants, notes), \$42,659; Precinct 1, \$9,000; Precinct 2, \$10,874; Precinct 3, \$1,250; and Precinct 4, \$10,000.

Payments on it in 1967 will amount to \$20,346, with \$2659 paid on Courthouse warrants. Others: Precinct 1, \$5,000; Precinct 2, \$5,437; Precinct 3, \$1,250; and Precinct 4, \$6,000. Also, the interest on this, \$2,928 will be paid in '67.

O'Brien said that the balance on deposit, end of 1966, was \$225,000.

Each precinct elects a Commissioner, constable, and justice of the peace.

Officials elected by the entire county are: district clerk, school superintendent, sheriff, tax assessor - collector, clerk, attorney, surveyor, treasurer and judge.

The county auditor is selected by the District Judge and the Home Demonstration Agent and County Farm Agent are appointed by A&M Extension Service, subject to approval of the county court.

The Court also appoints a health officer and has authority to deal with contracting agencies whenever the need arises.

Federal and state offices in the courthouse are not connected with county government. They serve the people of the county, however, and the central location of offices is of benefit to all.

O'Brien said, "A county government is one of the finest examples of 'government by separation of powers'. No county official is under the supervision of any other county official. Each is responsible only to the voters of the county. No county office is more important than another office. Each office does a specific job to keep the whole county government functioning smoothly."

### Seven Counties Had Big Deer Harvest

AUSTIN — Seven Texas counties each reported a fall deer harvest in excess of 10,000 head, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department that set the estimated 1966 take at 271,599. They were Llana, Mason, Medina, Gillespie, San Saba, Kimble and Sutton.

This is approximately 60,000 more than in 1965. The survey by game wardens shows that 208 of the state's 254 counties yielded one deer or more and that the kill exceeded 4,000 deer in 18 counties.






