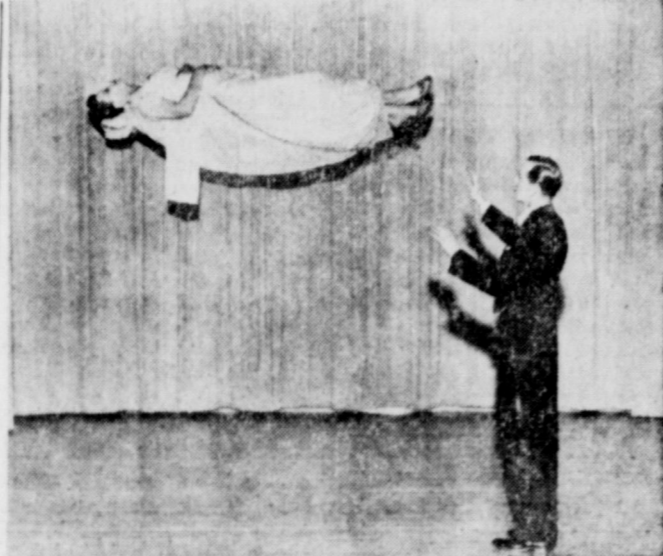
Fire Destroys Chicken House

Liquor Charges Filed Against Cisco Woman

Discovery of a specially-constructed hiding place yielded up a cache of booze and a transportation charge against Miss Gertrude Jones of Cisco Saturday night in Ranger.

Liquor Control Board officers and members of the Eastland County Sheriff's Department made the arrest, and found the hiding place in the form of a special "shelf" built over and in front of the front wheels on the 1957 Ford driven by Miss Jones. Sheet metal had been welded onto the under side of the front fenders, providing a perfect place to keep a large amount of bottled spirits — safe from the prying eyes of the authorities.

Brought out were 14 half-pints of whiskey, four half-pints of vodka and there was a case of beer inside the car. Miss Jones was charged with transportation of liquor in a wet area without a permit, and made \$750 bond, the sheriff said.

The sheriff remembered that the Ford had been seen at the location of several unsuccessful raids in the past, so it is believed that another ruse has been foiled.

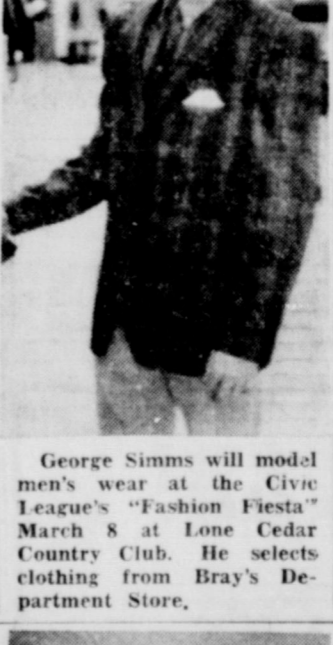
Mayor Deaton and Hart have both filed for re-election but Dr. Treadwell has indicated that he will not seek re-election.

That said election should be held in accordance with the Election Code of this State and only resident qualified voters of said city shall be eligible to vote at said election.

That the City Secretary shall give notice of said election by posting a copy of this order in each of the election precincts of said city, which posting shall be done not less than 30 days prior to date fixed for said election.

That immediately after said election is held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Mayor of this city as required by the Election Code of this state.

A copy of this order shall also serve as a writ of election which shall be delivered to the above appointed Presiding Judges, for said election.

THE GORDON SPOT



By DeMarquis (Dee) Gordon
Eastland County Extension Agent

March came in with unseasonable warm weather. Most people I have talked with believe this is going to be harmful to our fruit trees. Some people have told me their peach trees are beginning to bloom now. We are very likely to have some freeing weather that would ruin a fruit crop if the trees are in bloom.

a good time to put out pecan trees. So if you want to put out more trees this year I would suggest you put them out this month.

On the way to Houston last week I saw several trees that were in bloom. They have had some rain in that part of the state and their weather is warmer.
Some people have been asking if it is too late to put out young trees. Dr. Fred Brison, one of the most respected Horticulturist in the State, recently told me March was

Now is an excellent time to look ahead to the Spring months and the time for buying transplants or nursery stock. Later troubles can be eliminated by purchasing only disease - free, healthy plants.

If possible, root systems should be checked to detect such disease as rots, galls or knots. Avoid buying any plant that does not have a healthy appearing root system.

Stems of plants also merit checking to assure that they are healthy in appearance. Dead areas or cankerous-type lesions often found on stems may later develop and kill the plant. Then too, disease can be carried to healthy plants already growing by planting those with diseases.

Care in the selection of bulbs to make sure they are not discolored and do not have scab - type lesions on the surface is important. Healthy bulbs will have nice, smooth surfaces free from spots and pittings.

Evergreens should be checked for signs of leaf spot and their color should reflect uniformity and a healthy growing condition. It may be well worth the extra money to buy top grade of nursery stock.

Since some ornamentals are extremely susceptible to diseases which occur in a given area, I suggest selecting only those with resistance to these diseases. Cotton root rot, for example, is common over much of Texas and it should be considered when plants are being selected.
A list of plants showing the most tolerance for this disease, (L-390-"Cotton Root Rot"), is available at the county agent's office, along with other publications dealing with plant diseases. Most of these diseases can be prevented and the logical starting point for a disease control program is the planting of disease-free stock.

The service took place in the old tank back of the Corner Drug Store. (The tank supplied water for a flour and corn meal mill located near the spot.)

"Miss Sally" kept house at the corner of Plummer and Mulberry Streets until 1962 when, due to age and health, she was forced to give up her home. She presently resides at the Hickman Rest Home at the corner of Moss and Green Streets.

Miss Sally Day, oldest living member of the First Christian Church in Eastland holds the Communion Tray on which her mother prepared communion for the church for over 23 years. The tray was a gift of Mrs. Marge Brelsford, wife of Senator H. P. Brelsford.

The story of Miss Sally Day is one of faithful Christian service. "Miss Sally" as she is affectionately called, was born on October 13, 1870, at Hartsville, Tenn. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Day, moved to Dallas, where they lived for three years before settling in Eastland. To hear "Miss Sally" recount those early days is both interesting and fascinating. She states that she came to Eastland when she was three and one-half years of age. There was only one building standing in Eastland when the family arrived and that was a blacksmith shop.

Travel into the area was made by covered wagon. While a log cabin was being built the family lived in a tent and did their cooking out of doors. The cabin, in question, was built on a plot of land now occupied by Maverick Stadium. As one might imagine, life was not easy in

those days. Mr. Day supplied the family with wild game such as was available. In addition to farming Mr. Day plied the trade of a carpenter. Supplies had to be brought in from either Palo Pinto, Stephenville or Ft. Worth. Many of the commodities were bought by the barrel. These trips had to be made at night to avoid encounter with the Indians.

Miss Sally attended school in Eastland completing the seventh grade. During her 20's she taught the first grade and later conducted a kindergarten. It has been said that there are very few children, of that time, who don't remember "Miss Sally's" delicious cookies.

"Miss Sally, although past her 96th birthday, has a keen memory. Through all these years she has been an inspiration to countless numbers of people. Her students remember her on occasion with a box of candy which she graciously shares with her friends. On the occasion of her 96th birthday she was presented with a "money tree."

The Day family comprised part of the group listed as charter members of the Christian Church in Eastland. Interesting incidents in her life do not follow any set order in this presentation since they were copied down during conversations in which she related them as they
