The annual Eastland Father-Son Banquet, sponsored by the Nine Forty-five Men's Bible Class of the First Methodist Church, will be held Friday night. The program which is expected to fill the Methodist Fellowship Hall to capacity, will begin at 7 p.m.

One of the main attractions is Dr. Thomas H. Taylor, president of Howard Payne College, who will be the principal speaker of the evening.

Fred Hale, class president, will serve as master of ceremonies.

The program will begin with the singing of "America," led by Homer Smith. Rev. Jackson Oglesby will lead the invocation.

The meal will be served, and following a quartet, led by George Bledsoe, will sing.

Dr. Taylor became president of Howard Payne in 1929 with the motto, "More and More on Less and Less." Under his administration the college has paid \$185,000 debt, increased endowment to one and one-half million, doubled faculty and student body, built four buildings, been admitted to the Southern Association of Colleges, Southern Baptist Education Association and the American Council on Education.

Dr. Taylor is interested in religious and community affairs. A deacon in Coggin Avenue Baptist Church, he is past district brotherhood leader; and twice vice-president of Baptist General Convention of Texas. He is past director of the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce; past district director of the Interscholastic League; a member of the Southern Baptist Education Commission; county chairman, Democratic Executive Committee, vice president, Texas Association of Democratic County Chairmen; past congressional district Democratic chairman; past president Brownwood Rotary Club; past district governor of Rotary International; past director of Texas Good Roads Association; past District member of Texas Centennial Campaign Committee; listed in "Who's Who in America and Why," and a former member of the State Board of Public Welfare.

Dr. Taylor holds BA, MA, and LLD degrees from Baylor University and LLD degree from Howard Payne.

He has a sweetheart waiting for him. Heretofore, the men in the family have married only within their clan, but this girl is from the north and is quite fair. ## Circus Performance In Eastland Sunday

The circus is coming.

The second largest wild animal circus in the world, Al G. Kelly and Miller Bros. Circus, will have a one performance stand Sunday in Eastland. The matinee show will be held at the old driving range, west of Eastland.

Kelly-Miller moves on 65 new all-steel semi-trailer trucks, employ 450 people, has a block-long menagerie, consisting of 36 cages of wild animals, six herds of elephants, 16 camels, 11 zebras, 107 head of beautiful ring horses and several dens of tropical reptiles. The actual operating expense daily exceeds \$2,300.

Six big tents cover more than seven and a fourth acres; the main tent having a seating capacity of almost 5,000.

A large amplifying system is employed in the "main" tent to broadcast the announcements of the various feature attractions during the circus program. Sixteen huge electric fans, keep the big tent at a cool temperature, assuring the circus patrons relief and comfort even on the hottest days.

Four monster electric generators set the entire circus grounds ablaze with illumination. Several modern mechanical devices are employed, operated by both steam and electric power, used in erecting and tearing down the "canvas city."

When you visit the showground early on circus day you see the Diesel powered "canvas spool" a time and labor saver and its operation is very interesting. The elephants too do their share in raising the canvas city, as well as their strength being utilized in pulling deeply driven stakes at night.

Gigantic means are employed to feed this city of Kelly-Miller. More than two thousand meals are served daily to its people alone in the vast canvas hotel said to be one of the largest ever traveled. The giant ranges upon which the fried and broiled foods are prepared are mounted on big wagons weighing upwards of ten tons. It is not unusual to hear the head chef place an order for 5,000 griddle cakes and a proportionate amount of eggs and bacon for a single breakfast. Practically all purchases are made daily in the particular city in which the circus is to exhibit. The average daily expense of running the commissary department is over eight hundred and sixty dollars.

According to reports regarding the size of Kelly-Miller, it is undoubtedly the largest circus that has ever visited Eastland.

Mr. Penn, father of Ranger City Commissioner Frank Penn, was born in Indiana and had been a resident of Eastland County for 63 years. A retired farmer and rancher, Mr. Penn came to Eastland County in 1891 when he was 14 years of age.

He died at 11 p.m. Tuesday at the home of his son in Ranger, where he had made his home since his wife passed away last November. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

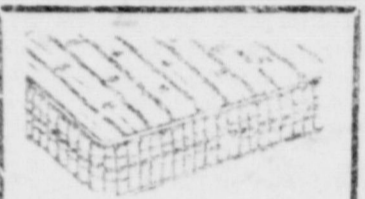

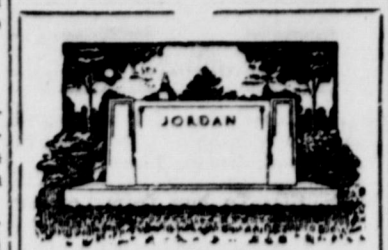

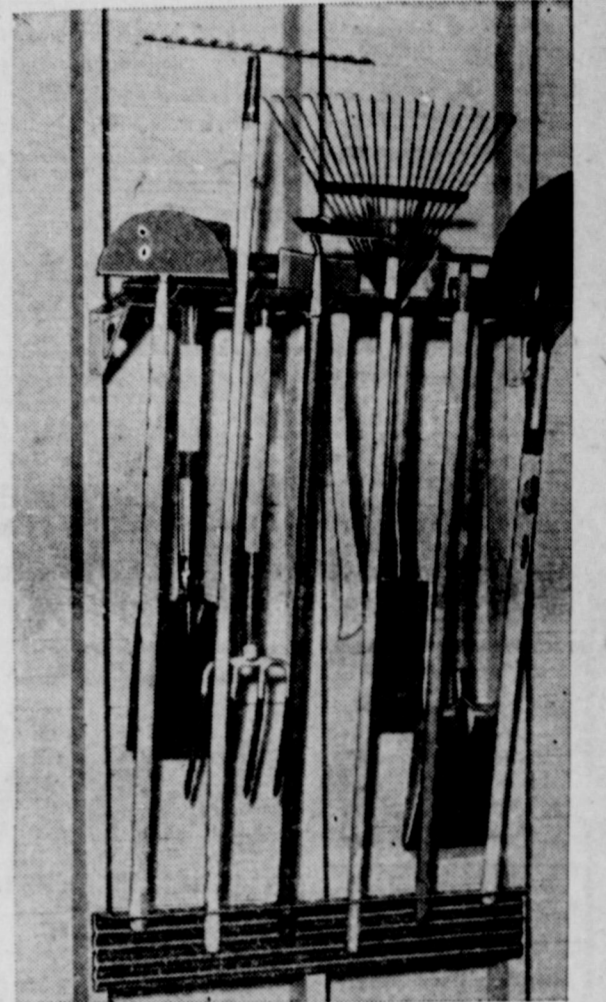

### SCOTT'S SECRET

Here is a delicious recipe to serve any time, but it is especially good to serve at picnics: Sherbert: juice of 3 oranges, juice of 3 lemons; pulp of 3 bananas, 3 cups sugar, 3 cups water, 3 egg whites or 1c cream whipped; add the cream or eggs after it is frozen to a mush. Use the hand cream freezer or the electric cream freezer.

Here is a recipe Mrs. Leo Stambaugh gave me that several have asked for: Fruit Cake Cookies: 1 1/2 c. flour; 1/2 c. brown sugar; 1/4 c. butter; 2 eggs, well beaten; 1/2 c. orange juice; 1 1/2 t. soda dissolved in 1 T. sweetbark; 1/4 t. each of nutmeg, mace, allspice, cloves, salt, cinnamon; 1 lb. dates chopped fine; 1 lb. pecans broken; 1 lb. candied cherries; 1/2 lb. candied pineapple. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs. Sift flour, spices, and salt; add with orange juice and soda mixture, alternately, to creamed butter and sugar. Add fruit and nuts. Drop from spoon on cookie sheet. Bake very slowly (about 275 degrees) for 20 to 25 minutes. Do not over-bake. Recipe makes about 60 large or 100 small cookies.

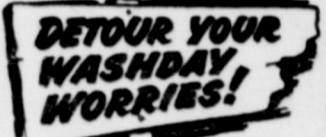
