

Change To Be Effective With March Directory

EFFECTIVE with the issuance of a new telephone directory here next March, all Eastland telephone numbers will be changed from two letters and five numerals to seven numerals.

Eastland thus will become one of the first Southwestern Bell exchanges to have this new numbering system, known as All Number Calling, already in use in many other parts of the nation.

The present prefix, "MA 9," will be changed to "629." This will not represent a real change, since "MA 9" and "629" are the same in dialing. The last four digits of each telephone number will remain unchanged.

For example, MA 9-2691 will become 629-2691.

Numbers in New Directory

All the new seven-numeral numbers will be included in the new telephone directory.

Why the change? The reason we're eliminating central office names is simple. On a nationwide basis, we're running out of suitable, easy-to-pronounce-and-understand names. All Number Calling gives us about 50 percent more usable telephone numbers. We need these new numbers to keep up with the demand for service.



Since "MA 9" and "629" are the same on the dial, stationery and other printed material bearing the "MA 9" telephone numbers can still be used after the change. However, customers who use printed material bearing their telephone numbers will want to be sure to remember to use the new number in reordering material.
