Progress Being Made by Jaycees On City Airport Development

Progress is being made on the development of the city airport, James Wright, chairman of the sponsoring Jaycee's committee.

Brush has been pushed and a center-line for the run-way extension has been laid off, Wright said. The 3,200-foot runway will be expanded to 4,000 by 50 feet and lighted, he said.

To meet Federal Aviation Agency specifications, the runway has been "re-located" to clear approaches of towers, he said. The south end of the present strip has been swung generally to the west, with the north end moved toward the east — putting the entire strip closer to the east boundary of the city's airport property, he said.

Arrangement for base material is being considered, he said, and will be announced soon.

Members of the committee are Tom Magness and Dick Johnson, consulting engineers, F. L. Bond, Dale Bakker and Ronnie Reese.

The club recently undertook the improvement of the airport to assist the city in securing new industry.

Wright, owner-manager of Modern Dry Cleaners, is the nephew of Wilbur Orville Wright of Fort Worth.

Mrs. Lobaugh Is Buried In Rites Conducted Here

Mrs. Emma C. Lobaugh, 94, died in Longview April 7. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in Tyler, with Dr. W. M. Shamburger officiating. Graveside services were held at 11 a. m. Monday in the Eastland Cemetery, with the Rev. J. C. Johnson, Presbyterian minister of Graham, officiating.

Mrs. Lobaugh was born in Sigtel, Pennsylvania, on December 10, 1872 and moved with her family to Eastland during the early oil boom here. Her husband, M. H. Lobaugh, preceded her in death in February, 1938.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. E. M. Agrelius of Longview, Mrs. C. L. Ray Kelm of Houston; three sons, W. H. Graham, Melvin L. of Longview, and R. J. of Taft; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Plans Complete For Annual County Pecan Budding, Grafting School

Plans are complete for the 14th annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School that will be held Friday, April 14, at the Cisco Junior College cafeteria. The event will open at 9 a. m. A record crowd has been

forecast by County Agent DeMarquis Gordon on the basis of response to announcements sent out in Eastland and surrounding counties.

The program will begin with a welcome address by Anton White, chairman of

the agriculture committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. Manager Jim Smothers of the CofC will be on hand to help with the program. Lunch will be served at the college cafeteria. The morning program will

be devoted entirely to lectures and demonstrations on how, when and where to bud and graft pecan trees. J. M. Cooper, former county agent who retired last year, is president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and is the originator of the school. He will head the staff of instructors, which includes local pecan growers.

Mr. Cooper reported that pecan budwood of some of the better new varieties such as Choctaw, Apache, Sioux, Comanche and Barton along with budding tape and knives will be available for use of those attending the school.

After lunch, the school will move from the classroom to the orchard of B. T. Graham, located one mile west of Cisco on the old Abilene Highway, to give everyone interested an opportunity to practice budding. Plans call for those wishing to do so to re-convene at the orchard in about a month to observe results.

Mr. Gordon reported that his office has completed writing and memographing a paper of some 10 pages on "Guidelines for Pecan Production in Eastland County. This represents a continuing effort by the extension service to be sure that all pecan producers have the kind of up-to-date information that will enable them to continue to improve their level of efficiency of production, Mr. Gordon said.

The pecan growers association had an active part in developing the guidelines, Mr. Gordon said. Copies will be available to those attending the school, it was understood. C. E. Smith of Rising Star and A. D. Ellington of Cisco, and Oscar Schaefer of Cook, former presidents of the growers association, will assist with instructing in the school.

Arraignment Due Friday 91st Court On Kidnapping

Arraignment and possibly more indictments are expected Friday for Bryan W. Bowles, 45, presently under indictment for kidnaping in a Cisco morals case, officials reported today. Bowles was still in the county jail at Eastland Wednesday in lieu of \$25,000 bond.

District Judge J. Frank Sparks reported that the grand jury will be back in session Friday, and District Attorney Perry Brown said that additional indictments may be sought naming Bowles. The man was originally charged with fondling and sodomy.

The grand jury last week indicted the man for kidnaping and he probably will be arraigned Friday on that count, Judge Sparks said. His plea will be taken at the Friday hearing and an attorney named by the court in the event Bowles is not represented by counsel. Word was that the man expected to engage an Eastland attorney.

Mr. Brown indicated that additional indictments to be sought may not be of the sex violation involved in the previous charges. One could be indicting a minor for immoral purposes, apparently. Mr. Brown would not admit that Abilene Attorney and former Taylor County District Attorney Bill Thomas had been asked to assist with the prosecution in the Bowles case.

A kidnaping conviction could result in up to 25 years in prison, Judge Sparks said. The grand jury will also consider some other cases Friday, and also several other people who were indicted last week will be arraigned, Judge Sparks said. If indicted on other charges, Bowles would not be arraigned before Monday, the judge added, because a two-day waiting period is required by law.

R. C. Hendricks, Former Resident, Buried Tuesday

Rufus Clarence Hendricks of Austin and formerly of Eastland, died Sunday at the Veteran's Hospital at Temple.

Funeral was held at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel Tuesday morning with the Rev. Cleo Clements of the Long Branch Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Long Branch Cemetery.

Born December 5, 1892 in South Carolina, he married Jewel Walker April 1, 1923 in Carbon. He was a retired rock mason and a member of the Baptist Church. He served in the Army during World War II.

Survivors include the wife of the home; two sons, David of Oklahoma City and Dwight of Austin; one grandchild, one brother, Lee of Magnolia, Arkansas.

Palbearers were Vernon Walker, Bob Shults, H. D. Martin Joe Criswell, Freddie Cooper, and Vernon Roy Walker.

Transfers May Qualify For U. S. Army Programs

COLLEGE STATION — Transfer students from junior and four-year colleges who miss the first two years of the ROTC program may qualify for a U. S. Army commission through a new two-year program at Texas A&M University and other institutions. Students from four-year col-

leges without ROTC and the undergraduate who elects not to enter training during the freshman year are also eligible, announced Col. D. L. Baker, A&M commandant.

Such students who wish to serve following graduation should contact Maj. Donald Fenton in A&M's Military Science Department for information on scholastic requirements, aptitude tests, physical exam, officers board interview and summer camp requirements.

"The student is deferred as soon as he passes required

tests," Major Fenton noted. "We will arrange tests here, even if he does not plan to attend A&M."

Applications must be made and processed in time for six-weeks summer camp at Fort Benning, beginning June 11. The camp provides equivalent training for the first two years of the ROTC program. It includes military history, courtesy, drill and marksmanship.

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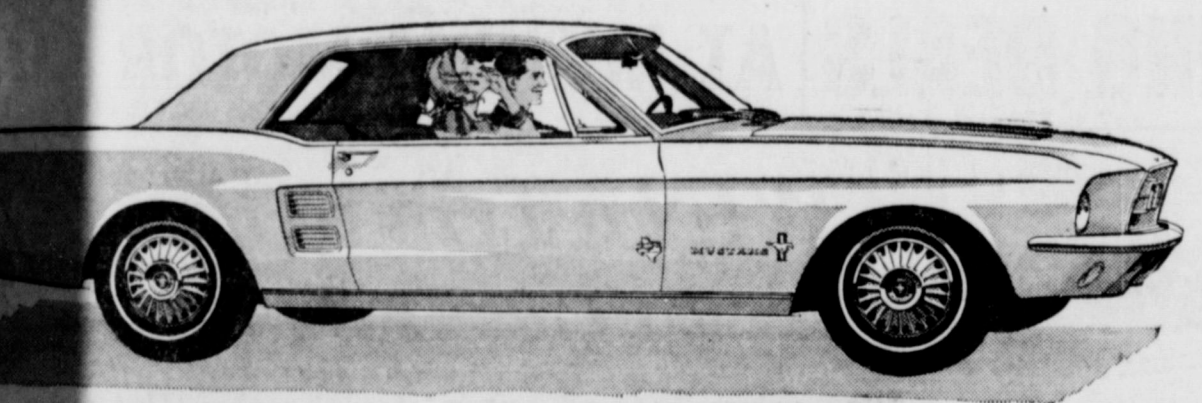
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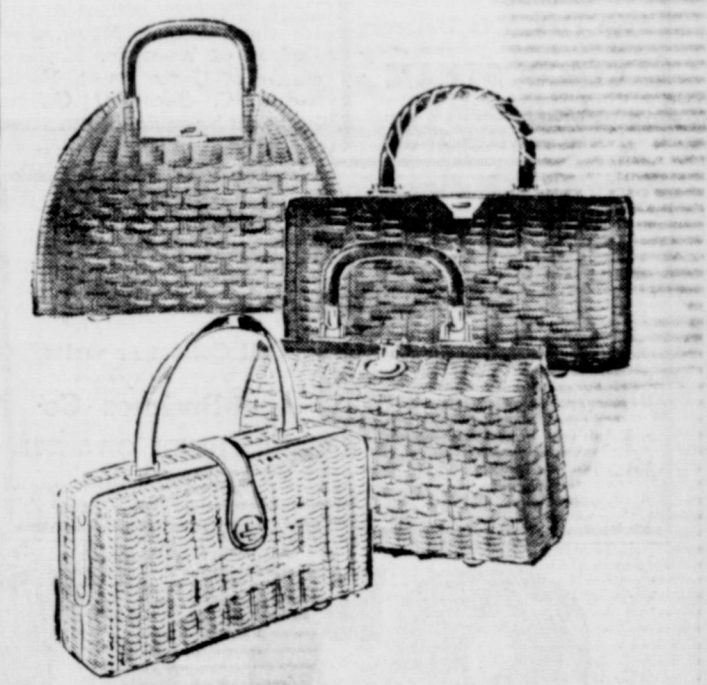


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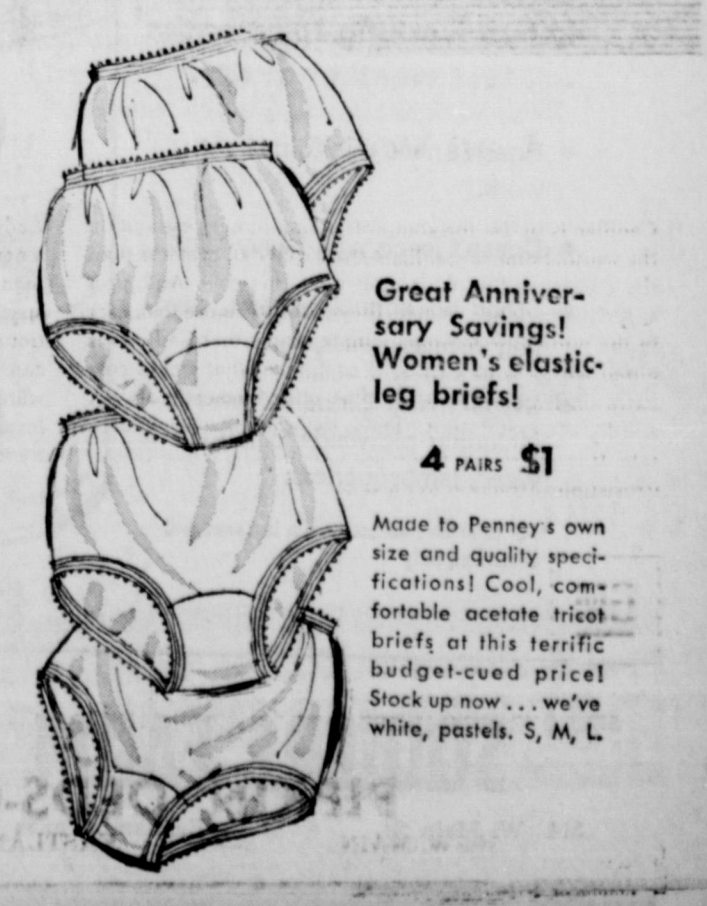
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Rip Galloway Buried In Tuesday Services

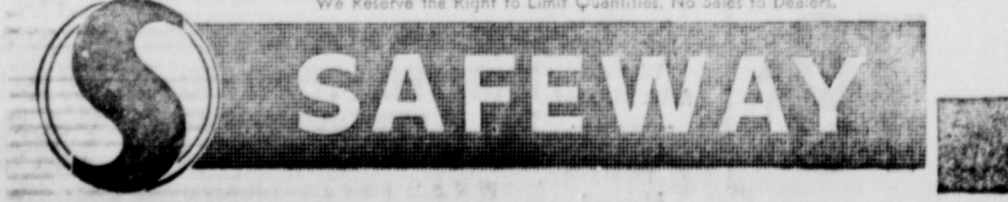
