LIONS CLUB IS TOLD FOUR CORNERSTONES OF FREEDOM

The cornerstones of freedom are four in number, and these are being slowly eaten away in America, Mrs. Robert R. Stewart of Cisco told members of the Eastland Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting Tuesday.

Speaking on the Spirit of America, Mrs. Stewart cited Christian morality and individual responsibility as the two ingredients of that spirit. Mrs. Stewart is vice regent of the Charles Crawford Chapter of the Daughters of American Revolution, and her talk in Eastland was arranged by Program Chairman Frank Crowell in connection with American History Month.

President Ed Ethridge presided and O. L. Stamey of Cisco was the only guest. "The danger that our grandchildren may live under communism is not as great as the danger that they may live under a revised Americanism," Mrs. Stewart said.

"We justifiably take pride in our country's material wealth—that ours is the highest standard of living, that our military might is greatest—but we must remember that our greatness came, not from what we hold in our hands, but what we hold in our hearts."

These she listed as the cornerstones of our freedom: A belief in God; a govern-

ment limited by a constitution; Christian ethics; and individual strength of character of our people. Bearing down hard on "federal aid" Mrs. Stewart said that any time that we are given anything that we have not earned, someone has been denied something for which they have worked. "And this is immoral," she said. Mrs. Stewart is scheduled to speak before the Eastland Rotary Club, and arrangements are to be made for her to speak to the Eastland Jaycees, it is reported.

City Buys Old Bonds; Talks Airport, Gas Rate Revision

The Eastland City Commission took steps that will make the city "just about" out of debt, talked with Lone Star Gas Co. officials about local rates, discussed the airport with local Jaycees and called an election during a stimulating meeting at City Hall last Monday night.

The Commission passed an ordinance "fixing and determining the central service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Eastland, and providing for the manner in which such rate may be charged, adjusted and amended."

Also passed was a resolution calling for \$24,100 in refunding bonds, which brings the city within \$8,700 of being free of debt. (City Manager Lewis Tiner explained that there is approximately \$10,000 in bond and interest in an escrow fund, which should easily clear up this remaining city debt).

Lone Star Issues Rates Statement

LONE STAR GAS COMPANY is asking the Eastland City Council to pass an ordinance permitting the company to make an adjustment in the first step of the local general service rate for residential and commercial users.

Lone Star's last general service rate increase in Eastland occurred in 1960 when the City Council passed an ordinance permitting the Company to increase its rates 5.4 cents per thousand cubic feet. This increase was based on a State Railroad Commission order increasing the cost of gas at the City Gate.

The city election was called for April 4, and Milton Underwood was named election judge with Hoover Pittman to serve as substitute judge.

Lone Star District Manager Gene Abbott of Cisco and Local Manager M. L. Forgey were present to discuss the company's proposed rate structure.

The Commission passed the first reading, and two additional readings are required.

Appearing to discuss the proposal that the Eastland Jaycees improve the city airport were James Wright, Grover Hallmark, Tommy Magness and Dick Dixon.

A lively discussion ensued but no action was taken. A meeting was to have been held Wednesday morning at which representatives of the Jaycees, the City Commission and the Eastland Industrial Foundation were to discuss the matter.

Mayor Frank Deaton and Commissioners Curtis Koen, James Reid and Bill B. Hart were present.

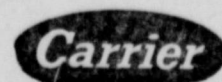

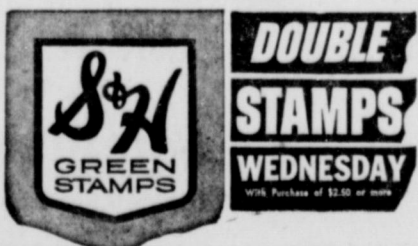

Patent Issued To Former Resident

A. O. Bauchard, formerly of Eastland, has been granted a patent on a paint can-holding device he developed while living here.

Mr. and Mrs. Bauchard came to Eastland from Arizona where he had retired as a groceryman. They moved to Weatherford, Okla., last year because their son, Tom, was entering pharmacy school at Southwestern University there.

"There should be a better way." That single thought has perhaps inspired more of our modern luxuries and marketed gadgets than any other.

Bauchard had that thought while he was painting his house a few years back. He quickly brewed up a simple but effective paint can holder which he thought would be an improvement over clinging to a ladder with one hand while precariously balancing a can of paint on the top and painting with the other.

Apparently the United States patent office believed the idea to be new and better. It issued a patent on his invention last week after nearly three years of research.

Painters who will eventually try and like the gadget will probably say, "why didn't someone think of this before."

If Bauchard had retired earlier he might have. Admittedly not a painter, he found he finally had the time to do his own house painting and worked out his idea for the invention while searching for a "better way."

The uncomplicated gadget is convertible to any type or size ladder and paint container. A sort of "half-bucket" extends from the ladder and a metal rod clamps to the side, runs across the rung and clamps tight for added support. An "extra" has been added to the side of the square shaped paint brush holder to be used when the ladder is moved.

Bauchard said he has

"shown it around quite a bit and the women seem to like it best. It caused considerable excitement during the inventors convention in Odessa, Texas, last year."

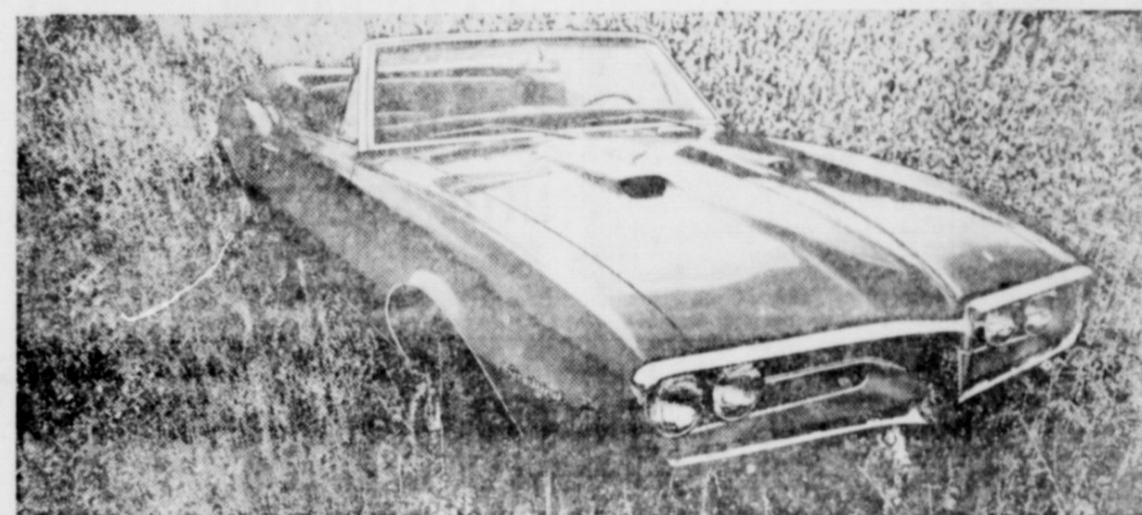
