Suddenly I know yet another word: "hope." The hope of reunion. I smile. Let those around me think whatever they will. For I see not the coffin, not the grave, not even those around. I see a wife, crying as she runs to catch her husbands outstretched hands.—By Marie Boney

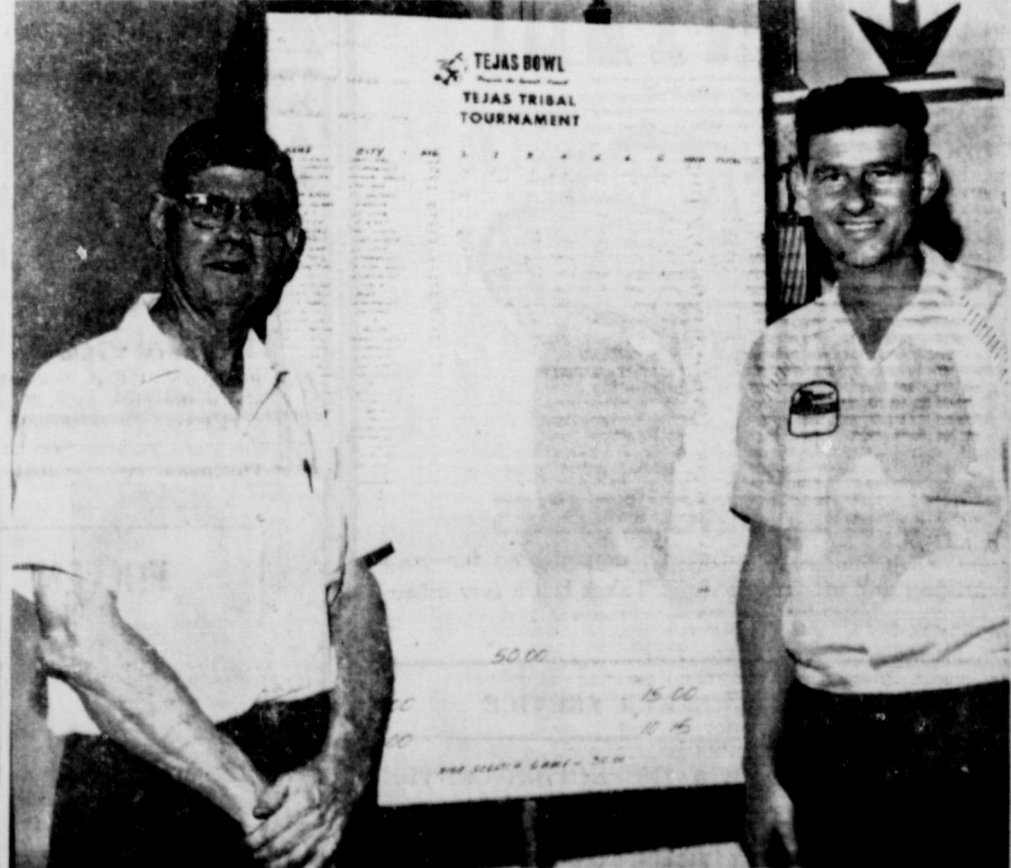

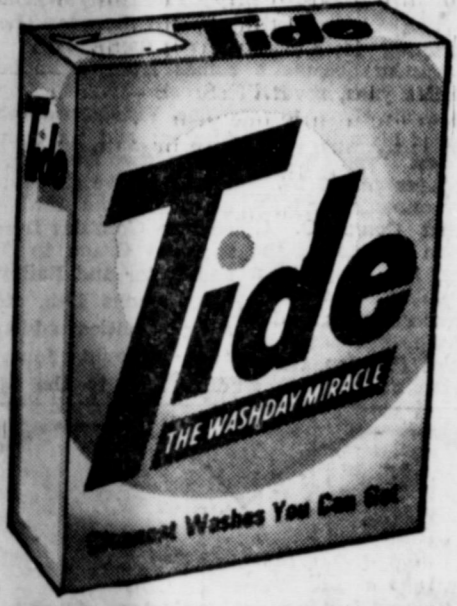

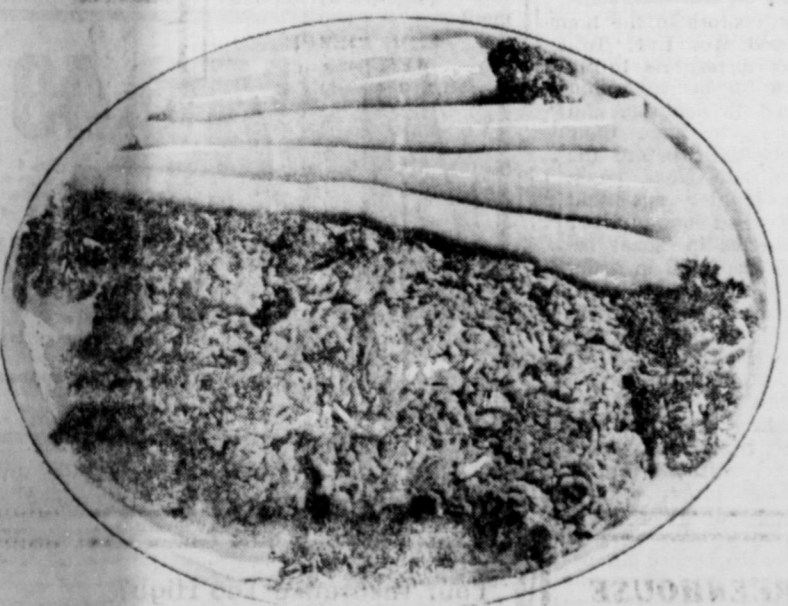

Deadline Near To Have Motor Vehicle Check

AUSTIN—The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that only six weeks remain before enforcement begins on the 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, said that the law allows for no extension of the April 15 deadline and urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected before the last minute lines begin.

Garrison pointed out that some two and one-quarter million vehicles in Texas remain to be inspected in order to comply with state law. This amounts to approximately 14 vehicles per working day for each of the 5,500 official inspection stations.

"Undoubtedly," Garrison stated, "many motorists will wait until the last day, and it may be very difficult to find an inspection station that is not swamped with late-comers."

In order to secure an orderly flow of the remaining uninspected vehicles through the inspection stations we would urge each motorist to have the inspection attended to as soon as possible. This can easily be taken care of during a routine visit to an authorized neighborhood inspection station.

THE GORDON SPOT

Now that the fruit trees are in bloom several people have called wanting to know when to spray the trees. If you have only a few peach or plum trees, there is a simplified spray schedule suggested. Use methoxychlor or malathion insecticide. The trees should be sprayed according to the following schedule: (1) When 75 percent of the blossom petals have fallen. (2) Ten days after the first spraying. (3) Ten to fourteen days after the second spraying. Fourteen to twenty-one days after the third spraying.

If infestations of fruit-damaging insects occur following the completion of the above schedule, Sevin can be used effectively up to within one day of harvest.

Those who have commercial orchards will use a slightly different spray program. The Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts, will be very helpful to fruit growers.

FORT WORTH — Dr. R. C. Ferguson, Eastland, and Miss Mildred Blair of Cisco were named as directors of the area-wide tuberculosis association which will officially begin operation April 1st.

The North Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association moved further toward "setting up for business" in a meeting this weekend. Its steering committee of 40 representatives from the 27 counties forming the new association elected a board of directors and officers. A central headquarters will be established in Fort Worth.

Wyndall R. Johnson of Fort Worth, who presided at the steering committee meeting, was named president of the area association. Dr. John Wiggins, also of Fort Worth, was named president elect.

"Tuberculosis recognizes no county lines," Mr. Johnson said, in accepting his new office as area president. "and I'm hoping with this organizational plan, we can better our efforts against the disease. Medical men now know how to prevent or control TB but community acceptance has to be gained to put into practice that knowledge. In these 27 counties, we'll try very hard to rid our people of tuberculosis."

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Annual Pecan Budding School Planned In Cisco April 14th

The 14th annual Eastland County Pecan Budding School will be held in Cisco, April 14, according to an announcement by DeMarquis Gordon, county agricultural agent.

The school will be sponsored by the agent, the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The morning session will be held in the cafeteria at the Cisco Junior College. It will begin at 9 a. m. and will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations on budding and grafting.

After lunch the afternoon practice session will be at the B. T. Graham orchard, one mile west of town on the Old Abilene highway.

J. M. Cooper, former county agent, who originated the school several years ago, will be the instructor. Mr. Cooper is the president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. In the past years more than 1,000 people from over central and west Texas have leaned the basic fundamentals of pecan propagation at one of these schools.

A supply of dormant budwood of some of the new pecan varieties including the Choctaw, Apache, Wichita, and Comanche as well as others will be available. Also a supply of the two bud-budding knives and pasting tape will be available.

Out of the county residents including both men and women are welcome to attend the school. There is no charge as the school is free, according to County Agent Gordon.

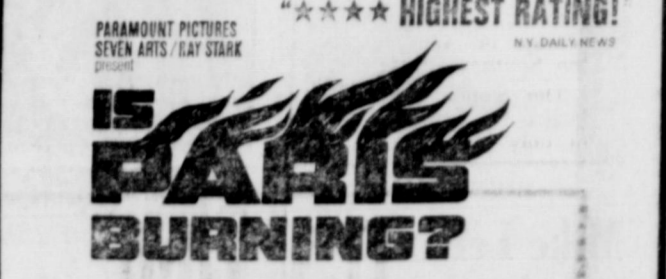

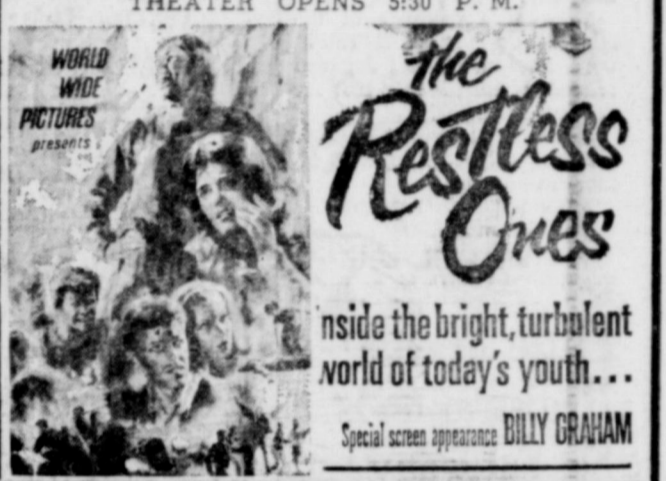
