CofC Board Discusses Court Bill, Brochures

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce board of directors in a called meeting Thursday discussed the proposed bill which would move the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, and heard a presentation about a brochure for the city.

George Bergman of Irving proposed that his company enter into an agreement with the city in which a brochure would be printed. Three thousand would be given to the city for its use, and his firm would distribute the remainder in its program of helping small businesses relocate.

A four-man committee comprised of Jack Arrington, Grover Hallmark, Lewis Tiner and Willard Griffin were named by President Jay Staggs to study the matter.

The major portion of the cost of such a brochure would be underwritten by the selling of advertising, to appear on the material, to local business firms.

Directors discussed several aspects of the 11th court bill, and decided to contact the Abilene Chamber of Commerce. Further plans are expected to be announced at that time.


