

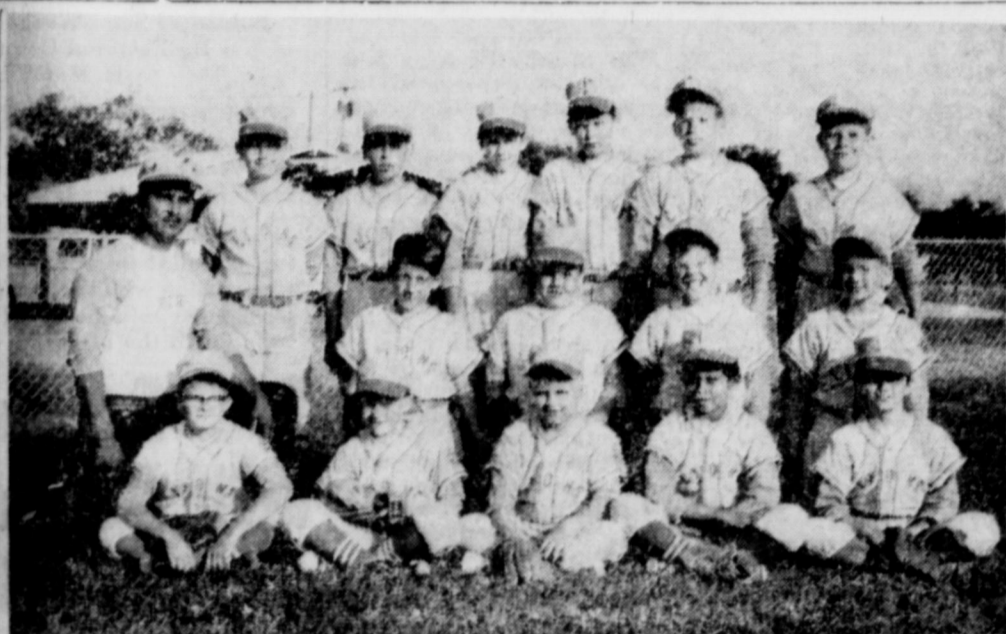

Two Businesses Robbed Friday

Hillcrest Food Market and the Cactus Grill were broken into Friday night. The store and cafe are about four blocks apart on Highway 80 West.

Ed Sargeant, owner of Hillcrest, reported the robbery there at 7:40 a. m. Saturday and the Cactus Grill robbery was reported at 8:40 a. m. Saturday.

Sheriff Lefty Sublett was investigating the events.

Mr. Sargeant stated that some pennies, dimes and quarters were left in his cash register. He estimated the loss — mostly in cigarettes, cigarette lighters, and postage stamps — at \$200.

Ken Moore, owner of the Cactus Grill, stated that about 20 pounds of barbecued beef was stolen. Knives were left beside the cigarette machine and Mr. Moore speculated that the break-in was interrupted before anything else could be stolen.

Two Crime, One Civil Cases Set For Trial This Week

Three cases have been scheduled for trial Monday at the 91st District Court in Eastland. The docket included two criminal cases and one civil suit.

Bryant W. Boles, 45, of Cisco, will go on trial on charges of kidnapping, sodomy, indecent exposure to a child, and enticing a minor for immoral purposes. The charges grew out of a case in Cisco several weeks ago.

In the other criminal case, Larry O. Clark, 21, of Dallas will be tried on charges of burglary and assault with intent to rape. This case was the result of an incident at Ranger several weeks ago.

County Attorney Perry T. Brown will be assisted by Bill Thomas, Abilene attorney and former Taylor County attorney, in the prosecution of both cases. Mr. Brown has announced.
