citizen-benefiting projects. The Comanche County Electric Cooperative is presently building a new Eastland County Headquarters Building on West Main St. in Eastland.

Eastland experienced a recent home-building period which has virtually provided all the needed housing for the present, with additional new starts being noted regularly.

On a "hold our own" basis, the county has put on a "hop-to-be successful" effort to keep the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in this county in spite of an attempt to steal by Abilene. The court facilities on the 5th floor of the courthouse have been completely remodeled & air conditioned.

The County Sheriff's posse is improving its arena facilities with a view to expanded use.

A brand new drive-in restaurant is a building on East 80 in Eastland.

Continued expansion at Hollywood Vassarette has brought employe-strength up to some 300 and provide payroll for the

entire county and area. Enthusiasm is running high in Ranger — much has happened within the last few months to indicate a bright future for the city.

Southwest Machines has doubled its capacity within the year, adding thousands of dollars in new payroll.

Featherlite Corporation has increased its payroll by \$30,000 per year.

A new housing development is underway with one new home completed, two more started and lots laid out for 39 more with new curbing and paving complete.

Athletic Repair, Hou-Tex Peanut Co. and Lone Star Gas continue to bolster the city's economy.

Six new businesses have opened since the first of the year — Chestnut and Son Automotive, Walnut Street Clinic, Quality Food Mart, Bray's Department Store, Western Auto Store and Fishers Used Cars. Numerous merchants have remodeled their buildings and put up new signs. All this has caused Main St., Ranger to present a fresh look.

Ranger Junior College's enrollment continues to increase requiring the need for more instructors and enlarged facilities. The college has recently purchased the Joseph Building in downtown Ranger, which will be remodeled and made into a boys dorm — also a new student center building is planned for the campus and will be completed by 1968.

Ranger Public School enrollment continues to hold up with 620 students today compared with 596 the same time last year.

More building downtown is anticipated as the Commercial State Bank plans a new building at the corner of Main and Front streets.

In Cisco the most promising indication of progress is the fact that six-weeks fund drive netted a desired goal of some \$89,000 to begin construction for a new 30-bed hospital.

Remainder of the funds needed, which has been estimated as a one million dollar project, will be obtained through a grant from the federal government under the Hill-Burton act and the sale of federal revenue bonds. Cisco and other area residents responded readily to the drive and contributed liberally in order to see the project go forward.

New buildings have just been opened at Cisco Junior College and others are under construction.

David Cunningham, associated with K-C Fuel Company of Cisco, has announced plans to construct a large truck stop station and cafe in Rising Star. According to a report, the entire project will cost around \$100,000.

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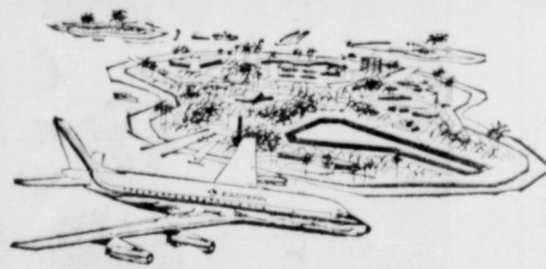
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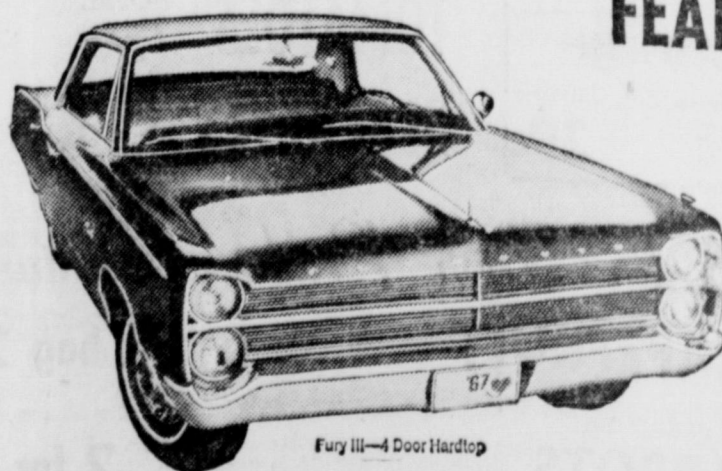

Scholarship Fund Announced District By Church Men

Announcement of a scholarship fund for the benefit of young men of the Cisco District was announced by the Cisco District Church Men at the dinner Friday night at the Victor Hotel in Cisco. Some 200 persons attended. L. C. Young of Graham, speaking for Chairman Louis Pitcock, Sr., told the meeting that the Foundation director-

ate recently created the scholarship program. He said that "we have money to invest in things that will benefit this fund, and we would like for laymen throughout the district to help us make these investments."

Mr. Young announced that a district-wide offering would be taken on Mother's Day for the benefit of the state Methodist home in Georgetown.

Dr. S. W. Reynolds of Cisco, the district superintendent, reported that the district now has 50 men in the lay speaking program. He said the per capita giving has increased some 30 per cent, that prospects are good for a gain of 600 additions this conference year, and that the district is in the best spiritual and financial condition that it has been during his five years as the leader.

Bishop Wm. C. Martin of Dallas was the speaker, and he discussed the responsibility every person has for himself, for others around him, and to God.

"Too many people are walking away from their responsibilities," he said. "They are walking away from their children, from the obligations of citizenship, from the churches." He urged the churches to concentrate on efforts to awaken people to their responsibilities.

Paul Whitten of Fort Worth, former superintendent of the schools at Cross Plains for 14 years, was presented an award for outstanding work as a layman in the Cisco District. The award was given him by Dr. Reynolds.

"I'm on the floor and I need help!"

These were the first words Mrs. Myrtle Allen heard when she answered the call on her switchboard. A telephone operator in Dallas, Mrs. Allen tells what happened next: "He could hardly talk," she recalled, "but it was evident he was stricken, on the floor helpless and had managed to dial 'Operator' for help. I told him to stay on the floor and not to worry because I wouldn't leave him."

With practiced efficiency, Mrs. Allen swung into action. Using another line, she called for an ambulance, alerted the man's next-door neighbor and notified his nearby relatives.

All the while, she kept the man on the phone, cautioning him not to move.

An ambulance arrived and rushed the man to a hospital. After being assured he was taken care of, Mrs. Allen returned to her normal work routine.

Later, the man, who had suffered a heart attack, called

the telephone company and told how he had been helped. "Had it not been for that operator, I would have died," he said. "She was insistent that I keep quiet on the floor. The doctors told me it saved my life."

"It was thanks enough to me that he got help on time," said Mrs. Allen. "Any operator would have done the same thing."

We're proud of Mrs. Myrtle Allen. Her actions in a time of trouble exemplify the highest ideals of the spirit of service of telephone people.
