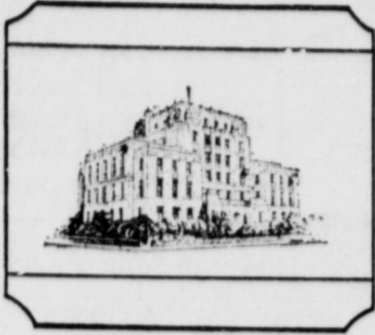

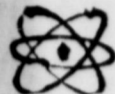

# Program Complete For Teacher Appreciation Banquet May 12th

Dr. John C. Stevens, assistant president of Abilene Christian College, will speak at the Lions Club's second annual Teacher Appreciation Banquet at 7 p.m. Friday, May 12, at the Elementary School Cafeteria.

Dr. Stevens, a native of Richland in Navarro County, received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from ACC and his Master of Art and PHD from Arkansas University. He served as a chaplain during the WWII and participated in the European campaigns of Normandy, Northern France, the Rhineland, the Ardennes and Central Europe with an infantry regiment.

Joining the faculty of ACC in 1948 as Assistant Professor of History, he became the Dean of Men in 1950, the Dean of Students in 1952, and Assistant President of the College in 1956.

He is a member of the American Historical Association and Academy of Political Science and is active in many civic affairs including work for the Chamber of Commerce, the United Fund, and the Kiwanis. He is a director of the Citizens National Bank.

Mrs. Stevens is the former Ruth Rambo. They have two children, Clark, 17 and Joyce, 15.

The banquet will honor all Eastland teachers and one teacher will receive the Top Teacher of the Year Award. Miss Verna Johnson, high school English teacher, received the award last year.

## Former Eastland Man Charged In Theft Case

A former Eastland man was arrested Friday morning at his home in Hurst, near Fort Worth, and charged with receiving and concealing stolen property and the Eastland County Sheriff's Dept. is receiving credit for helping solve the burglary of a clothing store in Marlin, in Wood County.

A message received by County Sheriff L. E. Sublett and his department Friday sums up part of the story:

"Sheriff Brady Pamplin and myself extend thanks and congratulations for fine effort in breaking the R. E. Cox burglary case. Your call (regarding) the suit from R. E. Cox Co of Marlin that you obtained in the course of your investigation broke the case for us." Signed, J. W. Ballard, Manager R. E. Cox Co., Marlin.

The developments in the unwinding of the case from the sheriff department's blotter: "April 28, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Worked on burglary job with officers from Euless and Hurst.

"April 29, 9 a.m.: picked up a man's suit which came from burglary in Marlin.

"May 2, 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.: Worked with officers from Marlin on clothing burglary. Picked up 71 men's suits.

The 71 suits have been returned to Marlin and Sublett reports that some of these were taken in burglaries at Kaufman and at other points. Valued at several thousand dollars, the suits were identified as those taken in a burglary in Marlin last fall.

Sublett said the suits were apparently connected with a "ring" of similar burglaries. A total of 80 men's suits were taken in January from the same Eastland store in which the Marlin suits were located this week.

The suspect, the sheriff said, stated that the suits had been bought from an unidentified man in Grand Prairie.

## Final Rites For J. J. Hammett Held Saturday

James Jackson Hammett, 100, died Thursday morning in Eastland Memorial Hospital, following an extended illness.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 Saturday morning in the Olden Baptist Church with the Rev. Bob Farrell, pastor of the church, officiating. Burial was at 3 p.m. Saturday in the Buffalo Gap Cemetery, under the direction of Arrington-Hammer Funeral Home.

Mr. Hammett, formerly of Lamesa, had been a resident of Olden for 23 years. He was a member of the Woody Baptist Church near Lamesa.

Born February 14, 1867 in Ruda, he married Maude Elliott in Austin in 1894. She died in 1901. He married Ellen Stewart in Austin in 1906.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Carl Butler of Olden; five grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

If, on the other hand, you want to learn about a warm, friendly community, you will be interested in what I have to say.

It seemed rather ironic to me that at the same time I learned that I had to leave Eastland because of the lack of a certain industry, that I would also learn that I was required to write a theme on why I like Eastland and why I thought industry should come here. If nothing else, the shock of my having to move has helped me realize my true feelings about my

home town. I may not be able to put into words how I really feel about Eastland without making it sound like some kind of utopia, but perhaps finding a place where we will be happy is the closest thing we will find to a utopia on this earth. If we are able to find this happiness in Eastland, then I should think we would be safe in calling Eastland our utopia.

Along with other students, I have heard some of our citizens say that they have never been able to find a town of the same size that can compete with Eastland. I feel that there is something else that causes Eastland to stand out from other towns. Perhaps it is an air of independence. By this independence Eastland does not want to be one else. I mean that the people of Eastland realize that they are individuals in a democracy, and that they have the right to stand up for themselves and try to progress, and they are trying to take advantage of this right. Perhaps I am being prejudiced in my view of Eastland, of this town, I feel that I can be justified in my opinion.

The question has been raised before us whether or not we would accept industry and the people involved in that industry if it were to come to Eastland. I feel that I can say for all the youth in our town that we are for anything that will help Eastland to progress. Although I am soon to leave Eastland, I hope someday to return, and when I do, I do not want to find it growing old and slowly dying, rather progressing and preparing itself as a better place in which to be able to live. Just because our physical bodies must grow old and die and turn to dust, is no reason for the town of Eastland to do the same. Eastland should go on living and growing until there are no longer any bodies left to turn to dust. I only wish I could start a chain reaction of the ambition and loyalty that I have for Eastland so that there would be no possible way that it could be stopped.

I looked for a long time for something that would poetically describe my true feeling toward Eastland. 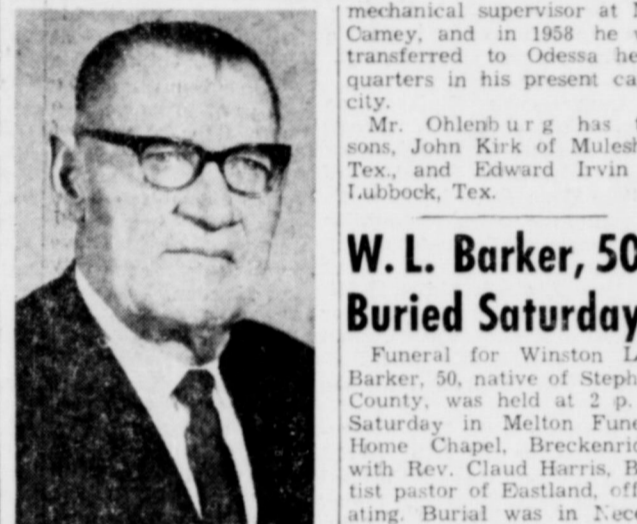

## THE GORDON SPOT

If you are a pecan grower you better get your spraying equipment ready and buy the needed chemicals or make arrangements with a commercial applicator so spraying can be done on schedule.  
The pecan nut casebearer is the little worm that goes into the small pecans and completely destroys the nuts they attack. They seem to be developing ahead of schedule this spring.

Arthur Ellington of Cisco, vice president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association is closely observing the development of the casebearers. As a service to pecan growers in the county he placed about 200 corrugated paper bands on pecan trees in order to trap some of the casebearers. The bands were put on trees in four orchards in the county. He has about thirty casebearers which were in the pupa stage when they were collected. They are now emerging from the pupa cases into moths or the adult stage.

Ellington said the first moth emerged on April 28. In 1966 and in 1965 the first moth emerged on May 15. This is in line with reports from over the state. The specialists say the moth emergence and egg laying will be about 10 days earlier than normal.

At the time this column is being written it is too early to set a date for the spraying, but we expect it to be from May 15 to May 20. In addition to Mr. Ellington's observation we are keeping in close contact with the Pecan Field Station in Brownwood and the Experiment Station in Stephenville as well as obser-

ving trees for casebearer eggs. Timing is very important in controlling this insect.

There are several insecticides that can be used to control the casebearer. Some of the most commonly used chemicals are Carbaryl (Sevin), Malathion, Toxaphene, or DDT. If it is necessary to spray twice, I suggest you use different insecticides each time. Sevin is used more than the others because it is effective and one of the safest chemicals on the list.

You should also add zinc sulfate at the rate of two pounds per 100 gallons of water. Zinc is a plant food which most pecan trees need each year.

If you have trouble with leaf diseases you can also add a fungicide to the spray. Some of the recommended fungicides are Du-Ter, Cyprax, Zineb, Polyram, and

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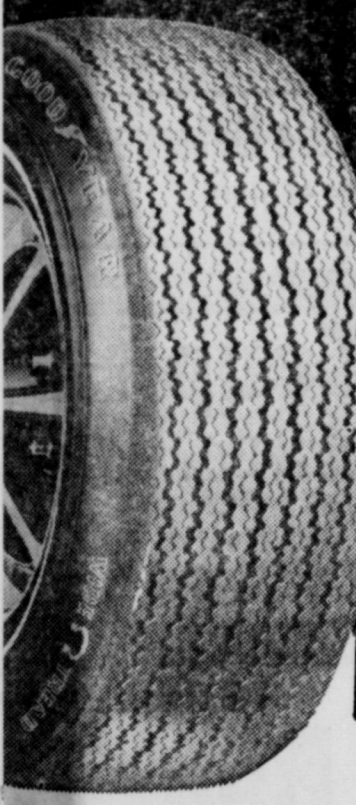
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**Annual Spring Field Day

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## Miniature Oil Derricks Are Made By Area Housewife

For many years Ranger was known as the town with an oil derrick on Main St., and will be remembered as such by residents and tourists for years to come.

The memory served to inspire Mrs. Joyce Hoover, Olden housewife, to make 100 miniature derricks in preparation for a banquet held during the recent Oil Belt Association of Royal Neighbors of America's annual convention held in Kanger.

An oil field of 100 derricks does not spring up overnight, nor was this artistic and appropriate setting achieved without many hours of patient and high skilled work. Equipped with a pocket knife, a pair of tweezers, plenty of glue and thousands of match

sticks, Mrs. Hoover devoted all would be spare time for many months in cutting, fitting and gluing stems into two-inch replicas of derricks that once dripped flowing gold. Soon, thanks to the assistance of Mrs. Edna Huffman, the tiny derricks were dripping paint and ready to be fastened to a square of plywood upon which was outlined the map of Texas, name of the town and date of the banquet in the dining hall of First Christian Church.

To complete the motif, Mrs. Hoover made three derricks, one 18 inches and two 14 inches in height, attached to large outlines of Texas. These were used on the speaker's table. Thus the local artist depicted the Oil Belt in general and Ranger in particular as guests carried these favors home with them.

Oil derricks are only one of Mrs. Hoover's decorative specialties. Holidays offer her an opportunity to come up with something delightfully different. Creative handwork, which includes crochet, tatting, sewing and embroidery is but one of her hobbies. Her name appears among high scorers in bowling where she currently serves as vice-president of Eastland County Bowling Association and secretary of two leagues.

Reared in Breckenridge, Mrs. Hoover and her husband moved to Ranger in 1939. In 1959 they moved to Olden where they now reside. She is a member of Ranger's Royal Neighbor Camp and Breakfast Club.

## International Postal Rates Are Increased

An increase in international surface and airmail rates went into effect Monday, May 1, the Post Office has announced.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and airmail — averaging 13 per cent — were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office.

This was the first general increase in international rates since July, 1961.

The increases are:

1. Airmail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 13 cents a half ounce to 15 cents.

2. Airmail to the rest of the Western Hemisphere remains 15 cents a half ounce, except for Canada and Mexico.

3. Airmail to Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15 cents a half ounce to 20 cents.

4. Airmail letters rates to the rest of the world remain unchanged at 25 cents a half ounce.

5. Aerogrammes and air post cards increased 2 cents each from 11 cents to 13 cents.

6. Items sent by air, other than letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10 cents per piece to all countries except Canada.

7. Most letters going by surface transportation to all nations (excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11 cents to 13 cents. Post cards raised from 7 cents to 8 cents.

8. Most printed matter, including publications, increased one cent a piece. For 2nd class publications to Canada only, the one cent increase will be deferred for six months to become effective November 1, 1967. Also, the present bundling rate which permits postage to be computed on the bulk weight of packages of publications addressed to Canadian post offices will remain in effect until November 1, 1968, at which time it will be discontinued.

9. Surface parcel post rates to all nations increased 20 cents a parcel, an average of 7 per cent.

Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters and surface 3rd class type printed matter to Canada and Mexico correspond to U. S. domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and are not being changed at this time," postal officials said.

## Story Of Civil War Diary Told At Lions Meeting

H. V. O'Brien and J. C. Poe of Eastland told about publication of the Civil War Diary of the late J. T. Poe in a program at the weekly meeting of the Cisco Lions Club at noon Wednesday at the Victor Hotel. W. J. Foxworth was the program chairman.

The late Mr. Poe entered the Civil War as executive officer of a Confederate Army Company from Union County, Arkansas. The company of some 1,500 men was captured and held as prisoners of war for more than a year, and Mr. Poe, who was a major, kept a detailed diary.

The major served in the Arkansas Legislature for 10 years following his release after the war ended. He then moved to Texas and settled in the Pleasant Hill Community, southeast of Cisco. He was buried there in 1913 and an imposing tombstone marks his grave.

A son of the pioneer soldier, Lee Poe, served as president of the First National Bank in Cisco for a time. O'Brien said the Longhorn Press, which issued the book as its initial hard-bound effort, plans other books. Plans have been completed, he added, to publish a book entitled "Beyond the Cimmaron," a historical work about an early Indian campaign in Texas and Oklahoma by Dr. T. R. Havins, well known Brownwood educator and historian.
