WINFORD PARR RESIGNS AS VOCATIONAL A G TEACHER

Winford Parr, Vocational Agriculture Teacher in Eastland High School, has announced his resignation with the local school system in order to accept a position as Sales Supervisor for Smith-Douglas Fertilizer Company, a division of The Borden Chemical Company.

Parr, a Texas Tech graduate, taught two years at Lingleville and Huckabay before coming to Eastland in 1965. He has served as a director of the Jaycees, being co-chairman of the Peanut Bowl, chairman of the first installation banquet, and was responsible for starting the "Jaycee of the Quarter" Award. He also served as an Advisor of the Eastland County Young Farmer Organization, and director of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association. His F.F.A. Leadership and Judging teams have won a total of 17 awards in Chapter Conducting, Farm Skills, Radio Broadcasting, FFA Quiz, Dairy Judging, Livestock Judging, and Land Judging. The highest award won by the local chapter was 4th place in the state chapter conducting contest in 1963, and this year his teams won the Cross Timbers District Sweepstakes. "My decision to leave the teaching field came after several months of consideration. I have thoroughly enjoyed my teaching years and have reaped much self satisfaction from my many experiences. I feel that Eastland is indeed fortunate to have such an excellent administration and board of education, and I have sincerely enjoyed my association with these individuals, all of whom I hold in very high esteem."

Funeral was held at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday in the Desdemona Church of Christ with Payne Hattax, minister of the DeLeon Church of Christ officiating. Burial was in the DeLeon Cemetery with Nabors Funeral Home of DeLeon in charge.

Born August 12, 1886, in Purvis, Texas, she had lived around DeLeon and Desdemona all of her life. Her husband died March 13, 1956. She was a member of the Desdemona Church of Christ.

We particularly call attention to the damages caused by water to the 91st District Court quarters."

The second letter:

"Inasmuch as we, the grand jury, have been in session on three occasions during this term of our service and have done a very minimum of work, we urge and recommend that all witnesses be subpoenaed and present and that the docket be planned prior to the meetings of this or the next grand jury called to session so that we may more efficiently function."

Both letters were signed by W. C. Smith, foreman. The letters were filed by Judge Sparks in the District Court's office.

Women Arrested In Theft Cases

Sheriff L. E. Sublett went to Weatherford early Wednesday to claim custody of six colored women who were being held on charges of shoplifting in several Eastland County retail stores.

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THE GORDON SPOT

Friday, May 16, is the date for the annual Eastland Pecan Growers field day. If you have any interest in pecan production we are making plans to present a program which will start at the Paramount Hotel in Milledgeville. Two outstanding pecan growers, Tom Denman of Milledgeville and George Brown of Brownwood will be the featured speakers. After the group will move to the Pecan Community Center in Milledgeville for a luncheon. This is the time to start your pecan trees to cone-bearing. Studies made by Denman, Madden and others in Eastland County have set the spraying for May 15th through 20th. These are the dates that you should have your trees sprayed. We have more information to verify these dates in Brown County. The spraying last week, May 15th, was the development of cases here and in Stephens County. You want to time the spraying exactly check for and nut penetrations. May 15. If the nut is green, the nut is not ready. The eggs are usually on the dark brown of the young pecans. The eggs which are just to the naked eye, are white when they are sprayed but assume a red appearance in a few days. When the pecans have penetrated you will be able to see some dark material at the base of the nut.

If as many as three pecans in one hundred have been penetrated you should start spraying with a mixture that contains Malathion and one other insecticide such as Sevin, D.D.T. or Toxaphene. Malathion has a quick kill power, but a short residual. The other insecticides have a longer residual. Due to the delayed development of some of the casebearers it may take two applications to do an effective job. If you spray twice I would suggest spraying early in the week and spraying again between May 25th and May 30th.

A new service is available to pecan growers. This service is a zinc analysis of pecan leaves to determine if zinc is needed or if that analysis is adequate. The leaf samples should be collected

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Form ASCS 406 Has Been Mailed To All County Wheat Producers

Form ASCS 406 has been mailed to all wheat producers who did not sign up to participate in the 1967 wheat program, according to Jesse G. Meredith, office manager of Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The ASCS office needs to know the wheat acreage on farms for the purpose of establishing future wheat allotments, Mr. Meredith said. Failing to furnish this information will result in a reduction in future wheat allotments, he added. Producers who have signed to divert acreage under the feed grain or cotton program are reminded that no crop can be harvested and no grazing is permitted between April 30 and Nov. 1, according to the ASCS office.

Failure to divert intended acreage or stay within permitted acreage will cause a drastic reduction in payments.

In order to be eligible for price support payments on cotton and feed grain on permitted acreage the crop must be planted and worked in a workmanlike manner, Mr. Meredith said. He added that since planting time for peanuts is almost here, every farmer should check carefully the 1967 allotment notice to prevent over-planting. In many cases it will be smaller than for 1966 due to the limited acreage under the release and reappointment provision. June 23 is the final date set for aerial spray mesquite, Mr. Meredith stated. Funds are currently available for cost-share on this practice, he added. The 1967 support price for wool is 66 cents per pound and the support price for mohair is 76.4 cents per pound, according to the ASCS office. Original sales documents should promptly be furnished the ASCS office upon completion of sale of wool, shorn lambs, and mohair.

ATTEND ALL CLASSES SURGED BY OFFICIALS

Four children's attendance at Eastland Schools during the remaining days of the school year is tremendously important to next year's operation, school officials reported this week.

A check of attendance through Friday, May 12, indicates that the school district is dangerously close to losing two teachers for the 1967-68 school year unless attendance for the remaining days is near perfect. It was required to earn two teacher average daily attendance for white students was 713.02 students per days since the beginning of school in September. An average daily attendance of 712.75 is required to maintain the present number of faculty members. Any amount below this figure would mean a loss of one teacher for 1967-68.

By law, the Negro attendance is calculated separately and a total of 26 students in

average daily attendance is required to earn two teacher units. At the present time the average daily attendance for the year for Negro students is 26.3 which is also dangerously close to the breaking point.

A loss of faculty personnel for the 1967-68 school year would mean increasing the size of classes or eliminating certain courses. Cooperation of parents and students alike will be necessary in order to attain the high percentage of attendance that is needed, the officials said.

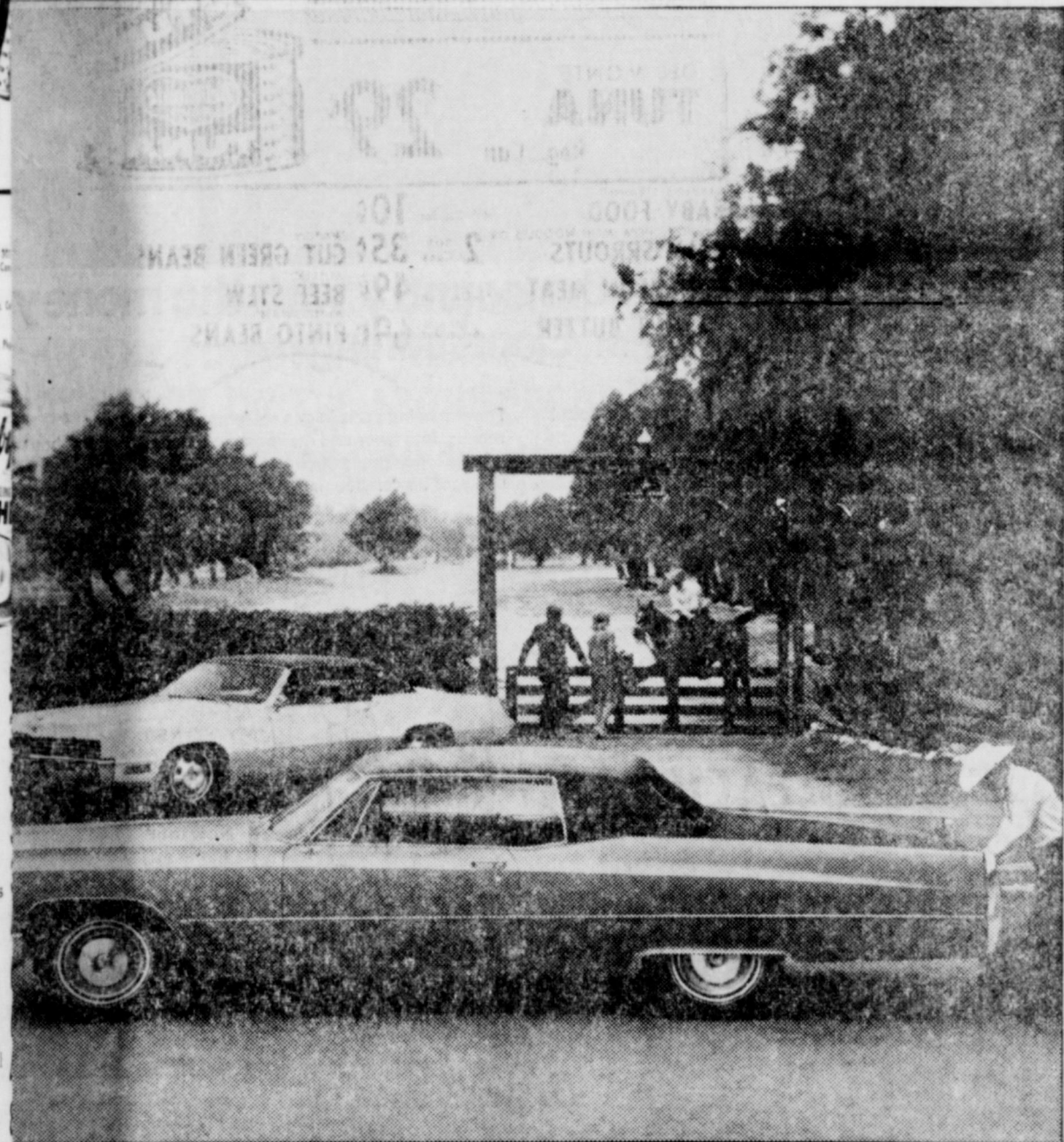

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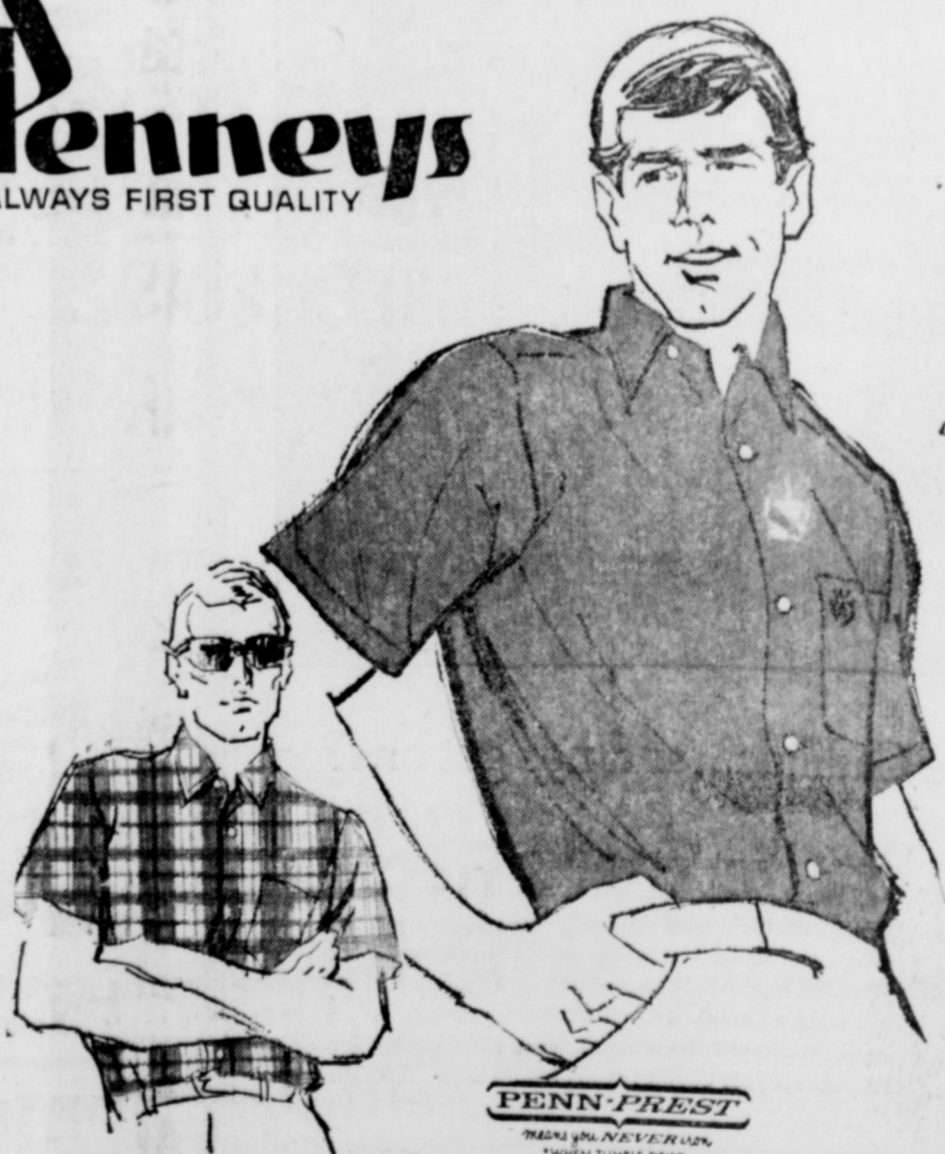

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Warning Is Issued On Per Fish Cooking

Eating fish caught in Eastland County ponds and lakes could be extremely dangerous, health officials warn. They see that the meat is cooked long enough to insure killing of larvae, Dr. R. C. County Health Director Dr. Ferguson said.

Dr. Ferguson explained that the acid-fast bacilli test was a tuberculosis strain, and as shown was found to be negative.

Mr. Timmons reports that from 50 to 60 percent of the channel cat that he has caught this year, he believed to have been infected with the tapeworms. However, no signs have been observed by him in the yellow cat, crappie or bass, he said.

It isn't known for sure whether fish caught in other lakes and ponds have the tapeworms or not, Dr. Ferguson said.

He suggested that persons should expose cooking fish to high temperatures for at least 20 minutes and perhaps longer, depending on the thickness of the meat, in order to kill the tapeworm larvae.

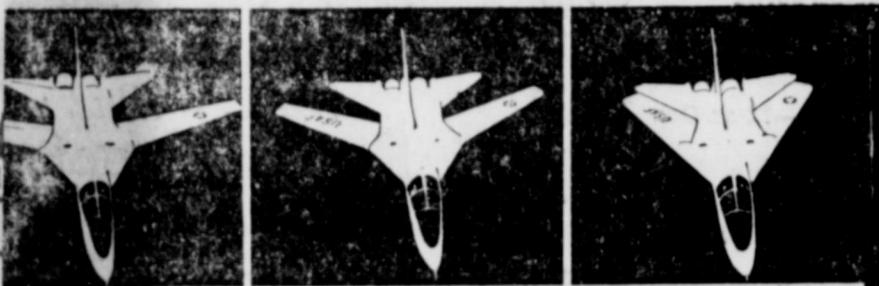
