## County Enjoys 'Near Perfect' 4th Record

Eastland County finished the 102 hour Fourth of July Holiday weekend without a violent death or serious injuries. According to reports of local and county law enforcement officers.

Texas led the nation for the four-day period with a total of 109 violent deaths — 71 in traffic, 11 homicides, one in fire and four others.

On a nation-wide scale, 722 persons died on the highways for an all-time record for traffic carnage.

In Eastland County, citizens enjoyed the comparatively safe pastimes of picnics, fishing, golfing or simply the luxury of having the day off. Thankfulness for the day and all that it symbolizes was in evidence by the large number of flags waving proudly over places of business and homes throughout the area.

## Area Recreation Potential Evaluated In New Report

### 'No Ski Lifts Foreseen'

An appraisal of the outdoor recreational development potential for Eastland County has just been completed and released by the Technical Action Panel (TAP), a group made up of representatives from the various Department of Agricultural agencies, according to an announcement Friday.

The appraisal, issued in the form of a 29-page booklet, was regarded as well-timed, coming in mid-vacation time. It was being distributed to key people and personnel.

Just about every avenue of outdoor recreation is covered and the report evaluates the existing facilities and comments on the potential for development.

## FB Barbecue, Contest Aug. 4th at City Park

The Eastland County Farm Bureau annual barbecue and queen contest will be held in Eastland, Aug. 4th, at the City Park.

The Farm Bureau Board of Directors met July 3rd and named Henry Fry and Sam Kimmel as chairmen of the barbecue. Tickets will be 1.25 for adults and 60 cents for the children.

Entry deadline for the queen contest is July 30th.

To enter a girl must be a daughter or sister of a Farm

Bureau member who is actively engaged in agricultural production. She must be single and between the ages of 16 and 22 by Sept. 1.

Each contestant will be required to speak approximately one minute on "Why I am Glad My Family Belongs to Farm Bureau."

Girls will be judged on grace, poise, charm, vivaciousness, and all other qualities that go to make up a winsome Texas Future Home-maker. There are three main points on which they will be judged; namely: (1) appearance, (2) poise, (3) personality.

The 1967 Queen will be crowned by the reigning queen, Miss Susie Morgan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Morgan of Cisco, and will represent Eastland County at the District Queen's Contest which will be held in Madison Junior High School Auditorium in Abilene on Aug. 18th.

WWI MEETING  
The annual convention of Veterans Department of Texas will convene at Brownwood July 13-16, inclusive. The local Barracks No. 2441 which meets Monday evening at 7:30 p. m. in Eastland County Court Room will send delegates to the state convention.

And the potential is good. With an Interstate Highway now being built through the county, quite a number of people in all the towns are wondering about the future. Development of the available recreational facilities is a big factor in most thinking.

Key Elements  
Ten key elements with several subdivisions were used to evaluate potentials for outdoor recreation in the county. Discussed are: climate, scenery and scenic areas, natural areas, historic areas, soils, water, fish and wildlife, populations of people, proximity and access; and rural ownership and land use patterns.

Each of these key elements are given valuation in the extensive study and 12 potential recreation development areas are evaluated against these standards.

Cabins and Cottages  
The recreational potential of vacation cabins, cottages and homesites for Eastland County is medium with a score of 93 out of a possible 150. That is, the evaluation of this potential using the key elements shows it to be medium, but worthy of future developments.

Camping Grounds  
The three types of camping grounds (vacation sites, pack trips and transient) each receive a medium score. Vacation site camping received a 70 on the evaluators scale; pack trips, 51; and transient, 43. "Even though camping grounds for Eastland County presently shows medium potential, the completion of IH 20 will show an increase in vacation sites camping and will probably move to a high potential for transient camping," the report said.

Picnic, Field Sports  
"The potential for game, play and target areas is low with a score of 25. Bicycling low, with a score of 25, and picnicking, low, with a score of 38. Nevertheless, the opportunities for all three developments are good, especially around our major lakes. These areas will demand greater development for the future, thus helping to raise the potential for picnic and field sports areas."

Fishing Waters  
"The fishing waters for Eastland County received a medium potential score of 52. Even though the county does not abound with lakes and streams, the ones that are present offer some very fine fishing. As other lakes and impoundments are developed, the county's fishing potential will show a considerable increase."

Golf Courses  
"The potential for standard and par-3 golfing in Eastland County is low with a score of 40 (of a possible 120). That for driving ranges and miniature golf is low with a score of 34. The added potential in the future will depend almost wholly on the increase in the vacationing non-resident population."

Hunting Areas  
"Eastland County furnishes a fairly substantial opportunity for all three types of hunting (small game, big game and water fowl). Small game hunting has the best potential with a medium score of 85 (of 140). Small game hunting centers around the cottontail and jack-rabbit with some limited squirrel hunting and the important birds are quail and dove.

"Big game hunting in the county is limited to white tail deer. The potential is medium with a score of 80 (of 120), based on rather poor habitat in some areas. However, deer hunting is likely to improve as land use changes occur.

"Water fowl has the least potential with a medium score of 65 (of 130)."

Natural, Scenic and Historical Areas  
"The existing undeveloped potential of natural areas of the county is low with a score of 40 (of 120)."

**Letters TO THE EDITOR**

In the article I wrote that was printed in Thursday, July 6, I did not intend to leave the impression that the Immigrants Home (large hotel) was built in Eastland.

I cite the following information from the Director of Public Relations of the T&P Railroad:

"Early in 1880, T&P began building westward from Fort Worth. As work progressed into the rich, but sparsely settled lands of West Texas, the builders encountered difficulties that tested the resourcefulness of the most hardy. Construction materials, supplies of all kinds and much of the food for the hardworking crews had to be transported to the track-laying sites from the distant, more populated sections of East Texas. In addition, there still was the possibility of Indian raids.

"Colonization of West Texas, the Plains, and the Panhandle received great impetus with the extension of the T&P from Fort Worth westward. The railroad advertised the advantages of the West, put on extremely low homeseeker and prospector fares. It was at Baird, in December, 1880, that the railroad built Immigrants Home, a large 2-story frame hotel, in which immigrants could stay while searching for the land they intended to settle."

## MARIANNE ENJOYING FIRST LOOK AT TEXAS

Miss Marianne Landgraf of Tranas, Sweden, arrived in Eastland Thursday night. The Lions Club Foreign Exchange Student will visit with the Wendell Sieberts the Earnest Moores, and the C. W. Hoffmanns. She will return to New York August 2 and fly to Sweden the following day.

The attractive eighteen-year old will enter college in the fall. In two years, she plans to be a qualified gymnastics teacher. She lives with her parents in a town house in Tranas. The family also maintains a lake home outside Tranas and travels extensively. Marianne has spent summers in England and France in separate student exchange programs. A sister married in June and lives about fifty miles from Tranas. She is a secretary and her husband, an Austrian, is a construction engineer.

Some 150 students from Norway, Sweden, and Denmark left Copenhagen in a chartered plane. Marianne had never met any of the others before. There was a seven-hour delay in Iceland for repairs to the plane. Marianne says, "No I was not frightened. They explained that this was necessary and we took a sightseeing trip while we waited." The group arrived in New York City June 27 and stayed at the Dixie Hotel while waiting to leave for various parts of the United States. They took a Circle Line sightseeing cruise around Manhattan, attended a performance at Radio City Music Hall, toured Greenwich Village by bus and took a walking tour through Chinatown. Ten of the students came to Texas and two are in Beckenridge.

Marianne flew to Loye Field, where she was met by the Earnest Moores. Her first impression of Texas was the temperature, since the average July temperature in her country is between 60 and 72. Marianne's first love is swimming, which she has enjoyed since early childhood. She likes to ride horses, and spends an hour a week in riding school. She also plays the guitar and prefers folk songs and jazz although she enjoys all types of music. A city of some 15,000 people, Tranas is about 200 miles from Copenhagen. Its industries utilize natural products and Tranas is noted for furs and furniture, particularly furniture used in schools. The making of safety matches is also a large industry there.

Television reception is excellent, but the programs are not, according to Marianne. She says, "We have no commercials on the television and the lack of competition stops the desire to improve. Our system compares to BBC in England, but there they also have commercial television and we only have non-commercial."

Marianne studied English, German, and French in high school, which she attended for three years. The Swedish elementary school is for nine years. "One thing she plans to buy here is a pair of Bermuda shorts. These are not available in Sweden or near Sweden", she says, "And anyone wearing them is surely a tourist or one returned from the States".

Swedish girls wear regular-length shorts or slacks. The straight shift and above-the-knee hemlines are popular there. Both boys and girls wear Swedish-made wooden shoes with white leather tops for school and casualwear. It is also available in black leather, but the white is much more popular.

Marianne accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Siebert to Georgetown Saturday where she picked up daughter Shelley who had been attending the Senior Assembly of Central Texas Conference of the Methodist on the campus of Southwestern University.

They went to Austin to visit the University of Texas and the Capitol. Monday night, the Sieberts took Marianne to Stamford for a performance of the Cowboy Reunion Rodeo.

Through the countries we were full of educational and historical sights and places and the scenery was fantastic, the best part of the tour was the 14 Texans and the two Europeans (our guide and our driver) that I journeyed with for 30 days.

The chaperones for nine girls and two boys were Mr. Robert T. (Sonny) Davis and his wife, Linda, and Denman and Mickey Moody from Austin, Texas.

Alex, our French-speaking Belgian driver, proved to be a most interesting person as he told us of his experience in concentration camps in both Germany and Russia during World War II.

**Capt. David Carothers In Major Viet Air Action**

(E.D. NOTE: The following news article is from the Army at Viet Nam and describes major helicopter action in which former Eastlander David Carothers participated. A graduate of EHS and Texas A&M University, David is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Carothers, formerly of Eastland and now of Dallas, and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Onie White. David's wife and 15-month-old daughter, Susan, are living in New Rivers, New Jersey.)

A three-ship Firefly team from the Army's 71st Assault Helicopter Co. (14th Combat Aviation Battalion) sent 148 enemy rivercraft to the bottom of the Trung Cang River last week during illumination sorties in northern Quang Tin Province. The gunships also destroyed 13 enemy bunkers, storage huts,

and fortifications, and killed 12 enemy troops, while providing night illumination for Task Force "Oregon" Army elements.

Army chopper pilots smashing the enemy with rocket, machine gun and minigun fire included Major William Arink of Springfield, Missouri; Major William Williams; Major Edward Johnson, of Miami Springs, Florida; Captain Joe David Carothers, Eastland, Texas; and Warrant Officers Ager Davis of Gainsville, Florida; Jerry Shirley, Carmie, Illinois, and Conrad Hower of New Albany, Ohio.

A two-ship "Gunslighter" fire team from the 128th Assault Helicopter Company (11th Combat Aviation Battalion) flew "mop-up" missions for CIDG (Civilian Irregular Defense Group) troops in the Duc Hoa area yester-

day — killing four enemy, and destroying Viet Cong ammunition storage facilities, fortifications and troop billets.

"We were called out the first time at 10 o'clock in the morning," reported the fireteam leader, Major Donald L. Becker of Beaver City, Nebraska, "and headed to an area about 10 miles southwest of Duc Hoa." The army gunships were called in by a USAF forward air controller to give close fire support to CIDG troops chasing an unknown size enemy force.

"The FAC directed us to Charlie-targets, and we let go with our miniguns and rockets," said Warrant Officer David Gardner of Kress, Texas, pilot of the first ship. "We blasted a few bunkers and VC storage huts — when one of our rockets set off a secondary explosion that was a real dilly. We'd hit an ammo cache that will put a crimp in Charlie's shooting for awhile." Group troops reported that the ammo cache was still burning two hours later.

The fireteam received moderate ground fire throughout the mop-up mission, but took

no hits. Other members of the leadership in the fireteam were Private First Class Paul A. Brewer of Arlington, Texas, crew chief, and the ship's doorgunner Specialist Four Stephen Cibak, Jr., of Gary, Indiana.

On the second gunship were aircraft commander Warrant Officer Larry Palley of Parkersburg, Indiana; pilot Warrant Officer James Mason of Albuquerque, New Mexico; Private First Class Daniel Ortega, Amarillo, Texas, crew chief, and Specialist Four Mike S. Rose of Fort Worth, Texas, door gunner.

The two gunships later learned that CIDG ground troops reported four enemy killed by the aircraft during their day-long support sorties.

At 6 p. m. the next day, the 128th "Gunslighters" were again called out, this time to fly gun cover for elements of the 2d Brigade, 1st Infantry Division, operating about four miles southwest of Duc Hoa. Troop transport choppers from the company were also called upon to fly tactical troop lifts for the infantrymen.

The Army helicopters returned to their base camp at Phu Loi an hour later — and were immediately scrambled to an area 11 miles west of Duc Hoa, to provide suppressive fire for CIDG elements fighting an estimated 40 enemy. The gunships peppered the area until reinforcements could link up with the CIDG troops.

Choppers from the 10th Combat Aviation Battalion continued helicopter support to Free World Forces operating in the II Corps Tactical Zone yesterday.

"Slick" (transport Hueys) choppers from the 48th Assault Support Helicopter Company lifted a reaction force to secure an area in which a "Bird Dog" spotter plane had made an emergency landing yesterday 30 miles north of Nha Trang. The force encountered no enemy action and the spotter craft was later extracted.
