LOCAL POLITICAL POT FARTING TO BUBBLE

The political scene in Eastland County is coming into focus with the beginning of the new year already announcements are being made — and speculations are being talked for races and contests.

To date only four persons announced their plans: one will not seek re-election and three have filed.

District Judge Frank Sparks has announced that he will not run again and Attorney Truman Kirk of Cisco has stated that he will seek the 91st Court position.

County Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett reports he will ask re-

election and County Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom has announced for re-election.

Other posts are to have election this year and several men have indicated that they will make announcements at later dates.

Voters will also exercise the ballot in these offices this year: president, congress (17th District), governor, Lt. governor, state representative, district judge, district attorney, county tax assessor-collector, sheriff, county commissioners Precinct One (Eastland and Ranger) and Three (Rising Star), and all constables in the county.

Edgar Altom To Seek Re-Election To Tax Position

Eastland County Tax Assessor-Collector Edgar Altom has authorized this newspaper to announce that he has filed as a candidate for reelection in the May Democratic election.

Mr. Altom is seeking his second term as assessor-collector, having been elected in the election of 1964. He had previously worked in the tax office from 1959 until he ran for the position. He was in charge of making the tax roll for the county from 1957 until 1964.

He had earlier been with the tax office from 1937 until 1945.

Mr. Altom announced that he filed Tuesday with the Eastland County Democratic Party Chairman.

Mr. Altom said that he will issue a formal statement regarding his candidacy at a later date.

Sublett Running For 2nd Term As County Sheriff

L. E. (Lefty) Sublett, Eastland County sheriff, has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election in the 1968 election. He is now serving his first term.

Before his election in 1964, he had served four years as first deputy in the department, and prior to that had served five years on the Cisco city police force as radio telephone dispatcher. Sublett is a member of Bethel Baptist Church. He also has membership in the Southwestern Law Enforcement Assn.

Sublett said he had filed his notice of candidacy with the Eastland County clerk and had presented the papers to the Eastland County Democratic chairman.

In making the announcement, he said, "I appreciate the cooperation of all the people and law enforcement officers of the county during my years spent in the sheriff's department. I would like again to thank the voters for the large majority vote in 1964, by which I was elected sheriff. I pledge myself and my department to carry on the law enforcement work in Eastland County to the very best of our ability."

Resources Top \$8 Million At Eastland National Bank

Records continue to crumble at Eastland National Bank where the current statement of conditions shows all-time high deposits of nearly \$6 million and total resources approaching \$8 million.

The current totals mark vividly the tempere of the year just ended, and make the Eastland bank one of the leaders of banks in the county in deposits and total resources.

On deposit at the close of business on Dec. 29, were \$7,900,825.17, with \$6,431,998.05 listed as resources. Amount shown on loan was \$3,736,410.88.

These figures, compared with those for the same period a year earlier, reflect the continued strength and growth of the Eastland trade-area economy. (The Dec. 30, 1966 statement showed \$6,244,622.16

on deposit; \$2,654,455.11 on loan; and \$6,727,569.73 total resources.)

The year-end total is up handsomely over the first half totals when \$6,596,522.67 was shown on deposit; \$2,934,685.35 on loan; and resources at \$7,116,336.84.

Biggest jump was from the third quarter report to the fourth and final for 1967. The Oct. 4, 1967, report showed \$6,679,118.60 on deposit; \$3,174,493.84 on loan; and resources of \$7,239,561.47.

Officials at the bank could not pinpoint any specific item which would affect the increases, stating only that general economic conditions in the city and area are responsible.

Creighton Is On State Immunity Study Group

AUSTIN — Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith has announced the appointment of Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells to the special committee on Charitable Immunity, which was created by resolution (H.C.R. 54) of the 60th Legislature.

Senator Creighton, an attorney, is chairman of the important Senate Committee on privileges and Elections and vice chairman of the State Affairs Committee. In addition to a number of other standing committees, he is serving on the Legislative Budget Board, the special committee on Emergency Hospital Treatment, the Multistate Tax Advisory Committee, and the Committee on Economy in State Government.

The Committee on Charitable Immunity and its study assignment grew out of a divided Texas Supreme Court decision in the case of Watkins v. Southeast Baptist Church which upheld the Texas common law doctrine of charitable immunity. It thus preserved the exemption of charitable organizations from liability for certain tortious conduct of their employees and agents. Since the decision, however, the courts of 24 jurisdictions have totally abrogated the charitable immunity doctrine and those in six jurisdictions have limited its application.

Other appointees named to membership on the committee by the Lieutenant Governor include Senators Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo and Charles Herring of Austin, both attorneys. Clint C. Small Jr., Austin attorney, and the Reverend J. Carroll Chadwick of Center were appointed by Smith as representatives of the public.

State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

AUSTIN—State crackdown on loan abuses in the home improvements field is steadily widening.

Consumer Credit Commissioner Frank Miskell issued show cause orders against 16 home improvement firms and 16 individuals, alleging they are lending money at illegal interest rates.

Orders applied to firms in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Kingsland and Fort Worth. "These cease and desist orders were but the initial step which will be followed by other legal actions as part of our comprehensive program to protect Texas consumers from abuse in the field of home improvement contracts," Miskell said.

Companies and personnel were directed immediately to stop any activity in violation of Texas' Regulatory Loan Act or new Consumer Credit

Practices complained of include cash advances on home improvement loans (primarily for debt consolidation) as an inducement for contracts at interest rates over 10 per cent. Some interest rates, an aide to Miskell said, range from 18 to 24 per cent.

A Houston finance company has filed suit in district court here, challenging Miskell's authority under the Regulatory Loan Act to regulate its purchases of discounted notes executed by homeowners to improvement contractors.

Texas' 91-year-old Constitution, as a result of Nov. 11 elections, has six more amendments.

Voters approved all six proposed amendments. Also, as a result of the general election, Texas has a new Republican senator, 35-year-old Dallas lawyer Ike Harris. Republicans are in run-off races with Democrats next month in all six districts which have House vacancies. Two of the districts are in Houston, one in Austin, one in the Rio Grande Valley one in Wharton and Matagorda Counties and the other in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties of West Texas. GOP candidates led November voting in all but the Valley district.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held that the Department of

Public Welfare must furnish monthly reports containing names of those seeking aid to bind to the Department of Public Safety so their drivers licenses can be promptly revoked under a new law. Opinion said 1941 law prohibiting disclosure of welfare applicants no longer applies in this particular case but does apply in other situations.

Department of Public Safety, Martin concluded in another opinion, has authority granted by the Legislature this year to purchase land for subdistrict headquarters in El Paso which already has a suitable building to house operations located on it. Legislature appropriated funds to buy property and construct subdistrict headquarters.

Voters in seven local elections on Nov. 14 expressed their opinion on a one-per cent city sales tax. The result: six cities approved it, and one city turned it down.

Approval came from Alpine, Georgetown, Granger, Hughes Springs, Marfa and San Marcos. Tax was turned down in Lufkin.

That brings to 34 the number of cities which have approved the tax. Only three have rejected it. At least 100 more are expected to vote on the question before the end of the year.

Photo Now Needed When Renew Driver's Licenses

Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that a photograph becomes a part of all drivers' licenses issued after Jan. 1. The change makes it necessary for all drivers to have a photograph taken in person at their Department of Public Safety office, and we have been working toward a procedure that will cause excessive delay in the issuance of a license. Garrison explained that the new law was incorporated into law by the last legislature.

"Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Mr. Garrison said. "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new

licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after Jan. 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthday of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term; if the license ends in an odd number, it will be renewed for two years the first time then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year.

The new license will be approximately 2 1/8 inches wide by 3 3/8 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends, Mary Christal and Mrs. J. C. Johnson and sons, among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before now."

Local Governments Have Wide Authority In Clean Air Law

"Probably the most important new feature in the present (clean air) law is the authority vested in local governments to take an active role in air pollution control work."

This statement is one of many emphasized in a recent analysis of the Clean Air Act of Texas, 1967, compiled by officials of the Texas Air Control Board, which is available to anyone interested in the Act.

Charles R. Barden, executive secretary to the Air Board, said the analysis was made to clarify misconceptions stirring in some quarters over the Act, and is meant to give clear picture that the new Act is a much-improved law over the old one of two years past, that it will work toward the benefit of local residents for cleaner air and that its enforcement procedures can and will be carried out.

The analysis report points out that "from the standpoint of local governments, this (authority) enables them (local governments) to establish and prosecute their own air pollution control programs, in addition to enforcing the State program."

"This is very beneficial from the State's standpoint," the report adds, "because it has the effect of directly complementing and supplementing the air pollution control effort on the part of this Board."

The report also stresses that the record of the Air Control Board "reflects that the Board has given primary consideration to the protection of the health and welfare of the people of this State, tempered with recognition of the fact that emission controls on the agricultural, commercial, industrial and other ac-

tion points to the final portion of the analysis which states "it is the opinion of this agency that the Clean Air Act of Texas, 1967, represents a considerable improvement over the former law and provides a very adequate legal basis for carrying out effective air pollution control programs for all areas of the State."

Further, the term "undesirable levels" of pollutants is now defined to bring the Act more in line with the standard definition of air pollution recommended by the Public Health Service of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

"It is our view," stated the report, "that this strengthens the air control program by eliminating certain phrases which were contained in the definition in the 1965 Act."

In answer to critics of the state legislation who claim the law fails to give local officials enough authority to act against firms guilty of air pollution, Barden said:

"It is spelled out in the Act that local governments are authorized to bring civil action within their own air control programs. A local government (an incorporated city or town or a county) may go on public or private property to make inspections and may bring enforcement actions under the Act."

"A city may also adopt its own air pollution control ordinances if they are consistent with the Act and the Board's regulations and orders."

Barden said authority is also given to local governments to enter into cooperative agreements with each other for air pollution inspections and enforcement, technical aid, educational services and transfer of money between agencies for certain air pollution control activities."

Barden also pointed out that the Board is well aware that a certain portion of the law—Section 6 (C)—is restrictive as to air pollution control in some situations, but he fur-

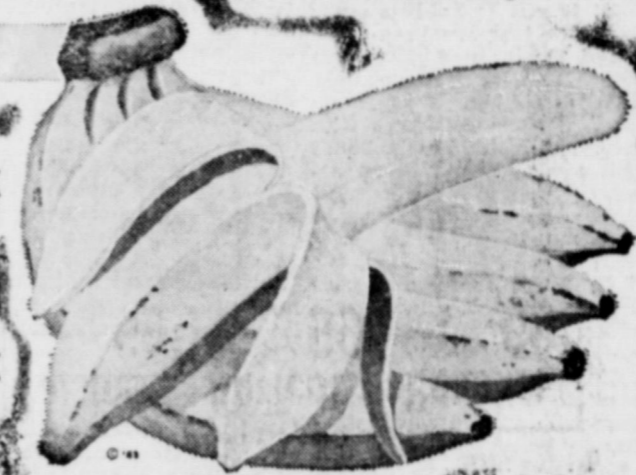
