IN THE recent Texas Farmers Union news paper there's a picture of Oral Davis and E. B. "Slim" Harding of this county, making plans for upcoming FB events. In the same issue, there's a good evaluation of the new tax situation showing that the added sales tax averages out to some \$9.50 per family per year; beer and liquor tax will cost the average drinker some \$5.20 a year; and the cigarette tax will take an additional \$10.30 to sustain the annual habit.

THE NEW, up-dated Eastland community profile published by Texas Electric Service Co. is, as always, a storehouse of useful information. It's got the low-down on our town from every angle.

An interesting note on housing:

"It is estimated that Eastland has more than five housing units for rent or sale. Ten are under construction and during the year 1968, 20 new homes were built. The residential building contractors of Eastland estimates that approximately ten new home will be built within the next 12 months."

Scouts hereabouts indicate that interest is developing for some sort of low-rent housing for the town, with the surmise that lack of additional available housing might be a hindrance in further industrialization.

For instance, we had at least two other letters about bells on students' shoes; a nice subscription re-newal letter from Robert (Bob) Harrison of Memasha, Wisc., and a copy of his Oshkosh Daily Northwestern; and the following note from Gordon Clark, which we are holding here because of its timeliness in view of present voter registration:

EDITOR

"Last fall we heard a lot of talk about loosing your vote. Since it is now time to begin registering for voting in 70 we might ask "Who lost their vote?"

"Some may say the Wallace voters lost their vote because George came far short of winning.

"Humphrey lost the race, so some would say the Democrats lost their votes. Nixon failed to carry the state so the Republicans can claim no credit for helping him win the office, so maybe they then also wasted their vote.

"The truth as I see it, is that very few votes were really lost or wasted unless they were those who put off registering through carelessness or because they had lost faith in the American system of government.

Forgot Clock? You've Gained A Whole Hour

Daylight Saving Time ended this year at 2 a.m. Sunday, when clocks should have been turned back one hour.

The summer time system was in effect since 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in April, when clocks were moved ahead an hour.

Under the Uniform Time Act, which became effective in 1967, all states, the District of Columbia and U.S. possessions must observe Daylight Saving Time beginning 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in April and ending at 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in October.

If you didn't remember to set your clock back an hour last night, you're early.

score twice in the second period. A Maverick drive was halted on the Pirate 30 when Gaeta's fourth down carry was inches short of the first. On the first down play Pirate halfback Johnny Perkins broke through the middle and was finally hauled down on the Maverick 10 yd. line. Perkins scored two plays later from the 11.

Danny Reed's extra point kick was blocked by Craig Lund.

Late in the second quarter Pirate End Danny Reed took the ball on a reverse and threw 30 yds to Perkins in the end zone for another score and a 12-6 lead. Craig Lund again blocked Reed's extra point attempt.

The Mavericks wasted no time in getting their second half comeback started. The Pirates fumbled on their first play from scrimmage and the Mavericks had a first down on the Granbury 18. Gaeta picked up 2 on first, but Lund lost 5 on second. On third, Lund passed to Gaeta who was stopped on the 14, setting up fourth and 6. On down, Rexroat took a pitchout around right end for his second score. James Eidson's extra point kick gave the Mavericks a 13-12 advantage.

Granbury was still in the game until the center for a fourth down kick sailed over the punter's head and was recovered on the 12 giving the Mavericks a first. Rexroat used his sweep around right end successfully again on the first down play to give the Mavericks another score. Eidson tacked on the extra point to give Eastland a 20-12 lead.

Early in the fourth quarter Granbury punted and the Mavericks marched in for another score. The Mavericks took the ball from their own 33 to the goal line in 11 plays with Rexroat gaining the final 10 yds for the touchdown. Eidson's kick was good again making the score 27-12.

The Pirates fumbled on the first play following the kickoff and Phillip Smith recovered for the Mavericks setting up a first down on the Granbury 38 yd line. On second down Lund passed 34 yds to split end Bob Mace for a touchdown. Eidson kicked the point.

With just over two minutes left in the game, the Pirates went to the air in hopes of at least scoring once more. Rexroat discouraged them by intercepting the first pass they threw and returning it 76 yds for a touchdown. Two point conversion by Lund failed.

With only 13 seconds showing on the clock the tough Maverick defense forced the Pirates to punt and the ball landed once again in the arms of Randy Rexroat who raced 68 yds to the end zone for the final score. Eidson tacked on his last extra point and the score read Eastland 47, Granbury 12.



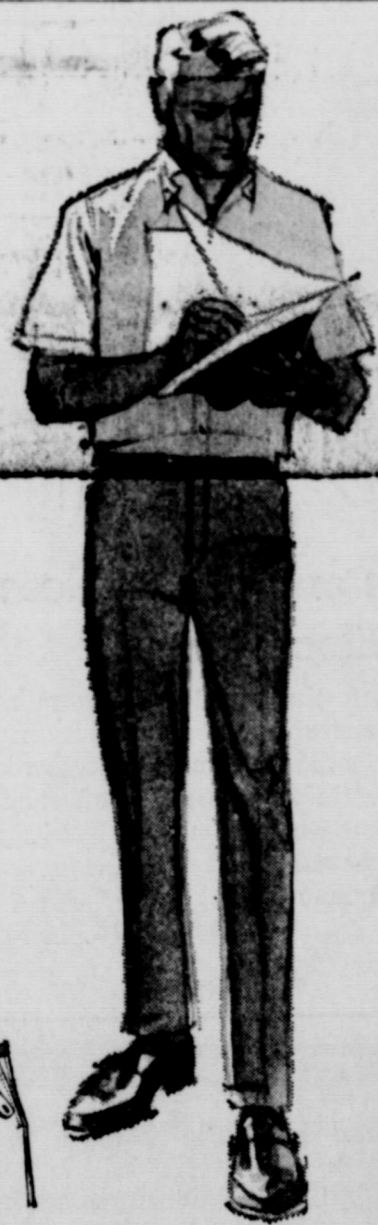

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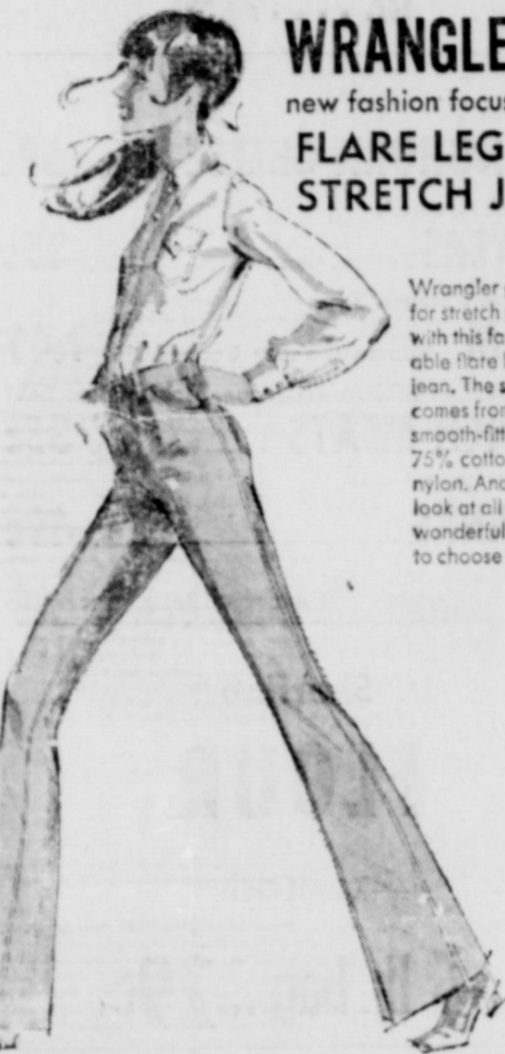

Farm Bureau Closing Membership At 832

The Eastland County Farm Bureau will end its previous membership year Oct. 31 with 832 members and 124 new members.

At the County convention held recently, President Jack Cozart of Cisco was re-elected. Other officers are first vice-president Sam Kimmell of Cisco; second vice president, Henry Fry of Cisco; and secretary-treasurer, Ray Norris of Eastland. Directors elected include Herman Schaefer, Minford Fry and Jack Cozart, Cisco; Luke Palmer and Glenn Jordan, Gorman; Cowan Hutton, Rising Star; K. F. Kirk, Ranger; B. M. Campbell, Carbon; Clyde Johnson, DeStemona; and Ray Norris of Eastland.

Delegates named to attend the State FB Convention Nov. 16-19 in San Antonio were Don Adams, Ranger; James Chesshir, Mr. and Mrs. Cowan Hutton, Rising Star; K. F. Kirk, Ranger; and Henry Fry and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cozart, Cisco. Alternates are Mrs. James Chesshir, Mrs. K. F. Kirk and Mrs. Henry Fry, Cisco.

Guest speaker for the convention was Billy Joe Gist of Abilene, state director of District 7. His topic was the "Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1965." He stated that Farm Bureau's farm program for 1969 is to phase out all of the acreage allotment marketing quotas and price supports programs as they apply to cotton, wheat, feed grains and soybeans during the 1971-75 period. The plan is to substitute a price support program through Commodity Credit Corporation at a level of 85 per cent of the previous three-year market price received by producers. Farm Bureau's farm program would return a part of the economy to the market place. The program for rice, tobacco and peanuts are to remain as they are. Title I authorizing class one base plans for dairy marketing order controlled areas and Title II extending the wool Act of 1954, of the Act of

1965, are to terminate Dec. 31, 1970.

Also, if agriculture is to return to the market place now is the time, stated Mr. Gist. Many think that unless the planned economy is reversed in the next year or two it will never be reversed. If agriculture comes under the federal bureaucracy citizens will be told how much they can produce, who can produce, and what the awards are to be. Durward Tucker, Area Fieldman of the Texas Farm Bureau, showed slides of the farm program as Mr. Gist gave his talk.

Kathy Person and Patsy Moseley, both of Olden, gave a talk on their trip to the Citizenship Seminar held recently at Baylor University. Miss Sandy Ingram of Cisco, 1970 Farm Bureau Queen, was introduced at the convention.

Dyess Low Level Flying Considers Area Disruptions

The world wide commitments of the 516th Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW), Dyess AFB require continuous low level flying training. The highest possible degree of proficiency must be maintained and the 516th TAW aircrews must be current in all modes of aerial delivery. As a result, C-130 and C-7A aircraft are flown at low level altitudes over the "big country" on a daily basis.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a. m. and midnight, Monday thru Friday, and less frequently on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle, man made or geographic, within three miles of the prescribed track of the aircraft. Airspeeds will vary from 115 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by the Tactical Air Command, only after coordinating with the Federal Aviation Administration and local airport managers. Minimum disturbance of farms, ranches and communities is the primary consideration in selecting low level routes. Town, local airports, resorts, hatcher-

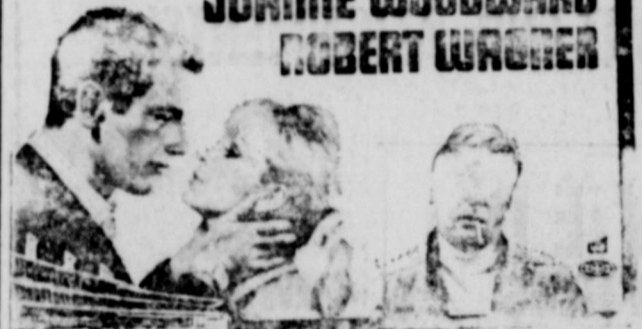

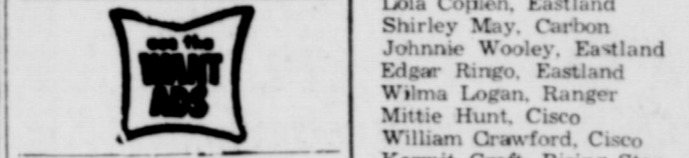
