





In the first year President George Washington served as presi-dent he issued a proclomation recommending that November 26, 1779 be kept as a National Day of Thanksgiving for a form of government that stood for safety and happiness.

For years the festival was confided almost exclusively as a New England institution. Services were held in all churches, often times the sermons were political addresses and families met in their old

In 1864 president, Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation that the last Thursday in November be set aside as a National Day of thanksgiving.

In December 1941 Congress passed a resolution making the fourth Thursday a legal holiday. The day is now cele-brated in all of the United States and it's possessions.




