

There would be signs pointing to the old stage stand, and a sign showing where Eastland stops and Stephens There would be nuge sign showing where the Gunsight Pass begins at this end and another at the other end of the gap.

Long, long before there was a Star Route road, there was well worn road from the Gunsight Mountain and the Gunsight Pass to the Flat Top Mountain. The Indians played back and forth across the county line with no regard to which county they were in People may wonder how know the Indians played back and forth from Gunsight to Flat Top Mountain. I know because I know God did not sprinkle all those arrow heads over and around Flat Top Mountain, and the white man didn't fill the Gunsight Pass with arrowheads. The Gun sight Pass was a gate way from Stephens to Eastlan d County. It was a gate-way between the Gunsight Moun-

tain, just think how much distance this pass cut off. The Flat Top Mountain is a love of a mountain, off to itself about a mile north of the highway and about a half mile west of the Star Route oad, in section 36 with the ip end extending into section where there have been many picnics, and where rock nounds still go and occasionally find a perfect arrow

the Indians "work shop" was at the southeast corner of the Flat Top Mountain. It was probably secluded from the road by trees. The mountain easily climbed and from it one can see in every direction for miles and miles around, deal for the purpose of the Indans.

Since this part of the country had no forts and was off the beaten path to one, the natives had to band together and fight their own battles with the Indian without regard to county line. They were all one neighborhood and fought in the Battle of the Gap. If the Gunsight Pass could tell it's own story of fights in battles, of tragedy, of murders, massacre, rob-beries, and skeletons it would make some of the other county tragedies look pale in comparison.

We've all heard of the digging in Gunsight Pass searching for buried treasure, gold or anything that robbers and thieves might leave behind.

When the railroad came through Eastland terminal for about two and a half months, long enough for the company to build an immigrant's house (a large hotel) to take care of prospectors that were sure come, to settle somewhere in West Texas.

During the terminal, C. U. Connellee was to busy making history to write it. But after he got older he dictated much history of Eastland and Eastland County to his wife who is now Mrs. Samuel But-ler. Mrs. Butler was kin d enough to lend me some papers. In one he writes to his friend Mr. M. S. Sellers, the editor of the Rising Star pap-er. Among other things he said, "During the terminal I helped to survey a route up the Leon River over into Coleman County, and the old Star Route was abandoned and the new one went from Eastland to Coleman and thence on the old route to Fort Concho now San Angelo and on to Fort Stockton.
