THROUGH APPLAUDES COUNTY HISTORY AT BIG JULY 4TH PAGEANT

Spectators by the thousands were on hand Tuesday night to see the history of Eastland County come to life on stages at the Kendrick Amphitheater in a Fourth of July Historical Pageant.

The 24-scene pageant began with a scene of the American Indians living in this part of the State. Then a scene with a wagon train which camped for the night, enjoying folk songs, square dancing, and camp activities.

Other scenes depicting the early days, were Indian camp, dances, and attack of a wagon train and a rescue by a Calvary patrol. Members of the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse. It was stated only five persons were killed by Indians in what now is Eastland County.

Other scenes in the pageant were scenes of the early day cattle roundup, early day church services, stagecoach travel, the coming of government and private surveyors, the organization of the County, the early buildings, the placing of the famous horned toad, Old Rip, in the corner stone of the Eastland County Court House, and his removal years later, still alive.

Oil boom days in Ranger were also shown, beginning in 1917, the Santa Claus robbery in Cisco and up through present day Eastland County.

The pageant was produced by the J. H. Kendrick family. The theater is located midway between Cisco and Eastland on Highway 80.

A patriotic 4th of July fireworks presentation concluded the crowd-pleasing show. A music program was prelude to the pageant.

Approximately 3,000 autos were parked and estimates are that attendance was from 6,000 to 7,000 people.

Eastland County area residents interested in helping the people of developing nations to help themselves are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p. m. on Saturday, July 15 at Abilene's Post Office.

The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a foreign language, not

education or achievement. It is given to determine where an applicant will be happiest and best utilized overseas. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail. The test takes about one hour and a half.

The application form, available from local post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they

have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test.

Over 15,000 Peace Corps Volunteers are now at work in 53 developing nations. They come from every conceivable background, but are united in their efforts to improve the food production, health education and life of the millions whose governments have asked the Peace Corps to help.

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Dick Lauderdale Is Buried Tuesday In Last Rites; Dies Unexpectedly

John Dillon (Dick) Lauderdale, 67, who died of an apparent heart attack late Sunday, was buried in Oakwood Cemetery following funeral services at 2 p. m. Tuesday at the First Christian Church in Cisco. He was a lifelong resident of the Cisco area.

Services were directed by the Rev. Almon Martin of Llano, former minister of the local church, with Rust Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

Mr. Lauderdale, who was senior vice president of the First National Bank where he had been an employee since 1934, collapsed in the yard of his home on Park Drive while preparing to mow grass. He was dead on arrival at the local hospital.

Born July 26, 1899, in Stephens County, Mr. Lauderdale was married on April 4, 1920, in Seymour to the former Miss Jessie Bullock. He started his banking year some 50 years ago at Moran, and was employed by the old Cisco Banking Company for 11 years and the old Cisco State Bank for four years. Before going into banking, Mr. Lauderdale worked briefly for the Texas Company and for a trucking concern. He and Nick Miller were partners for a few years in The Man's Store during the early depression years. He sold his interests to enter banking again.

An elder of the First Christian Church, Mr. Lauderdale was active in various community affairs. He was a Rotarian, a director of the Chamber of Commerce, and was active in other organizations.

"J. D. Lauderdale was probably the most trusted and best liked man in Cisco," said James P. McCracken, president of the First National Bank and a long-time associate. "He had the confidence of all who knew him. This confidence was reflected in the fact that he was frequently named administrator or trustee of estates, committees or organizations. Dick Lauderdale's word was his bond. We have lost a valued employee and officer, and our community has lost an outstanding citizen."

Surviving Mr. Lauderdale are his wife of Cisco; one son, Jack D. Lauderdale, Norman, Okla.; and four grandsons.

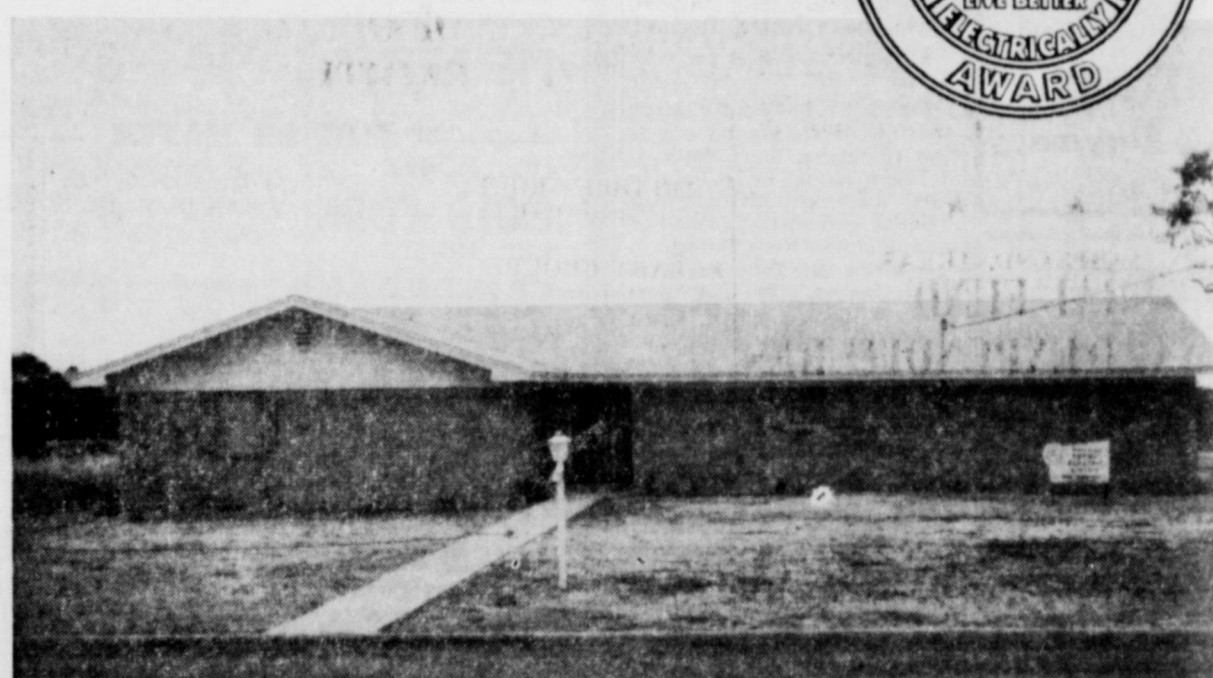

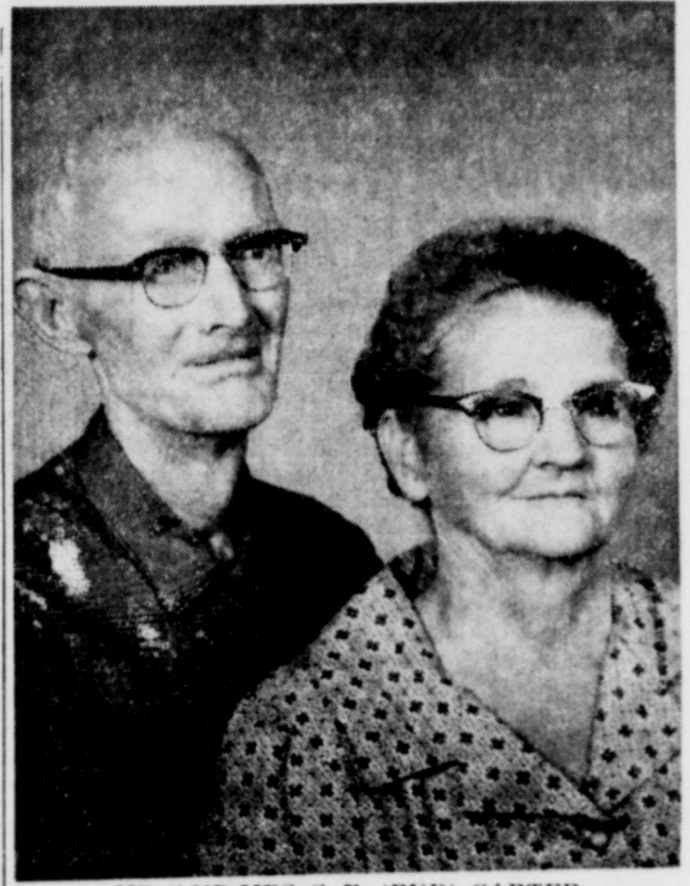

THE GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis (Dee) Gordon
Eastland County Extension Agent



For three weeks, June 5 through June 23, I have been attending school at Texas A&M. I took a course in Horticulture, "Factor Influencing Fruit Production." This training will help me in working with pecan and fruit production problems in Eastland County. It was pointed out several times by the instructor that Eastland County has excellent climate and soil for nut and fruit production.

When I returned to the office last Monday, I began getting calls concerning problems of diseases on ornamentals. We are usually glad to get rain during the summer. Unfortunately, this is also ideal conditions for certain viruses, bacteria, and fungal plant diseases.

bam, Zineb, Maneb, or Dichlorone. Begin spray applications 2 or 3 weeks before the disease usually appears and continue at 2 to 4 week intervals as needed.

Plant disease foliage chemicals are most effective when applied as preventive sprays. This means to begin the applications before the disease symptoms appear. But then the questions come up "How do you know when the disease is going to be a problem?" During periods of above-average rainfall or high humidity it would be advisable to start spraying with a general-purpose fungicide which contains several chemicals.

Various types of scale insects are also causing damage to ornamentals. These are very small insects that are stuck to the leaves or stems. Diazinon or Malathion will sometimes control the scale. It usually takes several applications made at 2-week intervals. The only effective way to control scale on fruit trees is to apply a dormant oil spray during the winter.

We have guides for controlling diseases on ornamentals as well as guides for controlling insects. If you would like more information on these problems let me know and I will send you these publications.

the Indians "work shop" was at the southeast corner of the Flat Top Mountain. It was probably secluded from the road by trees. The mountain is easily climbed and from it one can see in every direction for miles and miles around, deal for the purpose of the Indians.

Since this part of the country had no forts and was off the beaten path to one, the natives had to band together and fight their own battles with the Indian without regard to county line. They were all one neighborhood and fought in the Battle of the Gap. If the Gunsight Pass could tell it's own story of fights in battles, of tragedy, of murders, massacre, robberies, and skeletons it would make some of the other county tragedies look pale in comparison.

We've all heard of the digging in Gunsight Pass searching for buried treasure, gold or anything that robbers and thieves might leave behind.

When the railroad came through Eastland terminal for about two and a half months, long enough for the company to build an immigrant's house (a large hotel) to take care of prospectors that were sure to come, to settle somewhere in West Texas.

During the terminal, C. H. Connelley was to busy making history to write it. But after he got older he dictated much history of Eastland and Eastland County to his wife who is now Mrs. Samuel Butler. Mrs. Butler was kind enough to lend me some papers. In one he writes to his friend Mr. M. S. Sellers, the editor of the Rising Star paper. Among other things he said, "During the terminal I helped to survey a route up the Leon River over into Coleman County, and the old Star Route was abandoned and the new one went from Eastland to Coleman and thence on the old route to Fort Concho now San Angelo and on to Fort Stockton.
