Eastland County Pecan Growers Draws Good Crowd Friday

Dr. J. W. Worthington, head of the Texas Extension Service Experiment Station at Stephenville, directed a study of budding and grafting pecan trees during the morning session at the college's Harrell Fine Arts Building. He showed a number of picture slides to illustrate methods of improving tree varieties with buds and grafts.

Dr. Worthington discussed two new varieties of improved pecans that are being introduced this year in West Central Texas. They are the Cad-do, a new papershell pecan that was originated in the east, and the Shawnee, which was developed at the U. S. Experiment Station in Brownwood. Both are suitable for orchard development here, he said.

County Agent DeMarquis Gordon of Eastland County also took part in the morning program and led the demonstration and practice session during the afternoon at the Graham Orchard, two miles west of Cisco.

Mrs. Gordon told the pecan men that trees in this region had considerable damage from two ice storms during the winter. These broken limbs could have some affect on the county's total yield, he added.

The unusually wet winter

and spring probably will contribute to an unusually heavy insect infestation, Mr. Gordon said. Pecan men have not been able to cultivate their orchards as they would like due to frequent rains, he added.

Mr. Gordon announced that the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, which joined the Cisco Chamber of Commerce in sponsoring the annual school, has selected May 24 as the date for their annual Spring Pecan Orchard Field Day. It will be held in Cisco with details of an orchard tour to be announced at a later date.

The pecan men enjoyed an informal luncheon at noon at the college's cafeteria at the Victor Hotel.

Following lunch, they went to the Graham Orchard for some three hours of demonstrations and practice in budding trees. Budwood was provided by the county agent's office for use in the class project.

Anton White, president of the growers association and chairman of the Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee, presided at the opening session. Manager Jim Smothers of the Cisco CoC gave a welcome address.

Miss Joan Kelly of Eastland, the 1968 pecan queen, was a guest and helped with registering the visitors.

National Library Week, organized to provide a dramatic focus on library services, begins April 21. The Eastland Public Library has 10,700 volumes. Each year, during National Library Week, the library announces the Outstanding Reader for the year. This year, the honor goes to Audrey England, 13-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. England, who read 147 books.

The Library will offer its Ninth Summer Reading Program during June and July. Emphasis this year will be on the satisfaction and fun of reading good books rather than on prizes and ribbons. The program, which will be titled "Tree Top Reading Club," will allow each child to place his name on a leaf for each book read. A free theatre party is being planned for August for each child who has read 12 or more books during the summer.

The Library is owned and maintained by Thursday Afternoon Club with Mrs. C. C. Collins, chairman, Mrs. Esco Walter, Mrs. T. M. Collie, Mrs. Ben Hamner, and Mrs. Guy Paterson as members of the library committee.

Mrs. A. E. Cushman, librarian, said, "Our library joins with thousands of others across the United States in calling attention to reading activities and in inspiring more people to read. Reading is the very heart of education and freedom with responsibility." The Eastland High School Library has approximately 3,800 volumes, 116 film strips, nine sets of transparencies, 71 disc recordings, and a globe. The Library subscribed to 20 periodicals. The Library has recently purchased many new books which are scheduled for delivery soon.

The policies of the library concerning the circulation of material are liberal and flexible. Much of what the librarian does is aimed at stimulating desire to read. Mrs. Trixie Lester, librarian, said, "When I first entered college I planned to become a kindergarten teacher, but after working only one year in the library at Baylor, I changed my mind. I majored in library science at East Texas State University where I received my degree. I've been a high school librarian for 26 years and have never regretted changing my course. Watching a student read thoughtfully, acquiring both knowledge of a subject and a love of books, is a thrill which is surely unmatched."

planning to build a home? Many in the area are making home improvements. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring a three-night Home Planning Seminar which will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, April 23, 30, and 30.

Thomas, County Extension Agent, is making a special invitation to men and women in the county to make plans to attend one or all of the sessions.

The meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. in the Elmer Reddy Building, Eastland, W. S. Williams, agricultural engineer, is the Extension Service representative in the area. He will have information on remodeling of homes and is a registered professional engineer, and is the author of some 30 publications, including "House Planning".

The 30 meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. in the new Home Planning room, Eastland, Texas. The program will be "Financing of Home Improvements" by a panel of well-known county representatives. The program will be presented by Tim Wilson, Extension Agent, Eastland National Extension Office, and Lester Crossley of First National Bank.

The Seminar is the first of this type to be held in the county, and will offer informal sessions with an opportunity for you to ask questions of personal interest. The public is invited, and the Seminar sessions are free.

State Plans To Hold Research Project In Area

Comanche and Eastland Counties will be the center of a research program aimed at controlling the lesser corn stalk borer, an insect that cost area peanut farmers some million and a half dollars in 1967.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced this week that light traps are scheduled to be set in the two-county area as the first step in the fight against the destructive pest. Texas Department of Agriculture fieldmen will make frequent examinations of the traps to determine if and when a damaging build-up of the insect can be expected.

The corn stalk borer causes most damage to the peanut crop while the pests are in the larva stage. The larva attack the underground parts of the peanut plant, but it is difficult to determine just where the insect begins its work.

"By keeping a close watch on the number of moths caught in the traps, we can anticipate the number of eggs and incubation period into the destructive larva stage," Commissioner White explained. "Our control work in the future will be based on our findings of the moth's breeding and feeding habits."

White noted that a heavy population of the borer is not expected this year as compared to 1967. "We think winter weather conditions have been helpful in keeping down the seasonal carry-over of the pest," he said. "However, we want to keep abreast of the moth population so that we can anticipate and perhaps avoid expensive crop losses."

Peanut farmers can effectively control the borers by applying insecticides at the proper time, White noted. The traps and field examinations are being inaugurated to help determine the best time of pesticide applications.

Light traps will be installed on electricity poles in the two-county area by agreement with the Comanche County Electric Co-Op and the Texas Power and Light Company. Both organizations were praised by White for their interests and help in the project.

Each light trap will be identified by a sign and the public is urged not to molest or damage them. The traps are a part of the research-production and marketing program for Texas peanuts, peaches, and plums, White said.

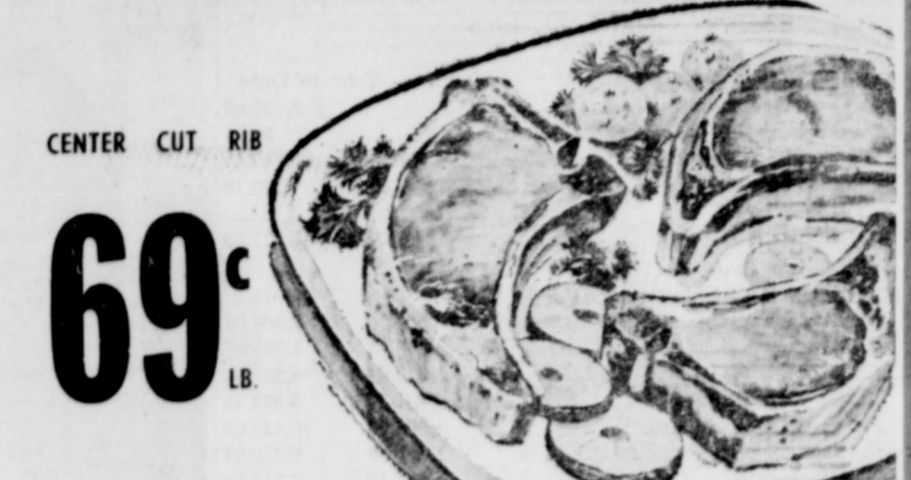

Dear Editor,
 I just thought I'd write you a short letter to keep you informed on what is happening in Viet Nam. Also to describe the unit in which I am serving. Our unit consists of six 105 mm howitzers. We are located on a small mountain in Khe Sahn. The hill is known as Hill 1001. Our job is to support the troops on this hill.

We have killed hundreds after hundreds of Viet Cong and NVA, yet you couldn't tell we killed so many. The population of the NVA and Viet Cong are very dense. It seems as though every time you kill one, he is replaced with six more.

Our sister battery (Chater) was overrun about two weeks ago. They lost one man. The infantry which guards the perimeter lost fifty. The battery also lost two howitzers during the prolonged battle. After 48 hours of fighting, the NVA body count was 205. That's not very many out of a regiment of 900 NVA.

That's about all I have for now. I just thought I'd write you a brief letter.

PATRONS CAN NOW TAKE STEPS TO CURB MAIL THAT OFFENDS

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail, the local Postmaster said today in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."
When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.
To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet — "How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements" — which is now available at the local post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the post office.
The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with the words, "Request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.
The Postmaster said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children."
"Last year the Post Office Department received some 140,000 complaints from those offended by pandering advertisements. While in most cases the ads were not legally obscene and were therefore available, they are often offensive and are usually not the type of material one would want his children to read," the Postmaster said.
He added that "because the law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offensive, and does not deny others the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech."
While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, the Postmaster believes that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because "the great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'smut dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists."
If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from this mailing list, and the patron receives a second mailing 30 days after the firm has re-

feel the people of this district deserve and appreciate this type of representation." "During my recent first campaign, I advocated full-time representation for our district and pledged to be a working representative for all the people. This, I feel, I have done. Not only is this the first time this district has had a full-time representative, but, with the help of many people in this district, the first office of State Representative was established and opened to the needs and various problems of the 70,000 people in this 5-county district. "State government is the biggest business in this state

and more scrutiny and research should be given to governmental matters by all members of the legislature. Between sessions, in the interim periods, a legislator can work on improvements for his district and can serve as a valuable mediator between state government and those individuals in the district who have problems with the many phases of governmental operations. Through my legislative office in Breckenridge, I have worked to resolve the various difficulties that people may have and I certainly feel this type of public service should be continued."

"As the legislative leader against LSD and other dangerous drugs, I organized a statewide youth education program on the dangers of drug abuse to supplement the legislation which he initiated.

"The new dangerous drug law provided Texas with the strictest drug laws in the nation," Musgrove stated, "but laws are only as strong as the public demand that they be enforced. The President of the United States in his recent State of the Union Message to Congress, proposed that laws very similar to Musgrove's Texas legislation be enacted on the nationwide level to control the growing problem with LSD and other dangerous drugs.

"Early in the legislative session a serious legislative effort was begun to move Eastland County's historic 11th Court of Civil Appeals to Abilene. Calling the bill "an act of piracy," I took Eastland County's case direct to the citizens of Abilene during an appearance on a special Abilene television program. And, later in the session, I brought the legislative subcommittee considering the bill to Eastland to personally inspect the court's facilities. The battle raged throughout the session, but the bill was finally killed in the House Rules Committee.

"Without the tremendous support of Eastland County residents for keeping this highly-respected historic court—many of whom traveled to Austin by chartered bus to make known their feelings—our opposition to the move might not have been successful.

"The rapid growth of both Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges automatically creates situations needing legislative help," Musgrove added, "and I have been greatly interested in assisting with the orderly growth and development of these two fine junior colleges. I was instrumental in getting the nearby vacated National

Guard Armory buildings transferred to Ranger Junior College — which saved Ranger taxpayers over \$300,000 that would have been needed to construct similar buildings for the college.

"I have made the development of our area's park and recreational potential — and likewise tourist appeal — one of my main legislative objectives," Musgrove continued.

"During the session I sponsored a special legislative resolution, which was passed and signed by the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker, directing the State Parks and Wildlife Department to assist in the restoration of Shackelford County's Fort Griffin, and appropriations have been budgeted to the proper state agencies for this purpose. The bill that I sponsored authorizing a State Park on Hubbard Lake was passed and laid the groundwork for the inclusion of this proposed state park in the new statewide master plan that was approved as a constitutional amendment by voters last fall.

"Following the legislative session I brought all three members of the State Parks and Wildlife Commission to our district to view, firsthand, Fort Griffin State Park, the proposed Hubbard Lake Park site, Possum Kingdom State Park and a proposal for a new 2,500 acre State Park on the Palo Pinto County side of Possum Kingdom. This new park proposal that I am advancing on Possum Kingdom would be a tourist boost to this area and would preserve scenic Hell's Gate and would maintain Sandy Beach area." During the interim period, I also brought the State Highway Commission Chairman to our district and initiated several needed road improvements.

"Recent efforts to plug abandoned 'lost identity' wells causing salt pollution in Eastland and Stephens Counties had resulted in more wells being plugged by the state in these two counties than in all other counties of the state combined.

Musgrove serves on five standing legislative committees and as a member of the Penitentiaries Committee, he inspected all 13 Texas prisons. Following the tour, Musgrove proposed governmental economies that he said would save taxpayers more than \$2,000,000 annually.

"I was first legislator in West Texas to publicly urge investigation of Liquor Control Board influences, and I also spearheaded a two-month study into sales tax collection problems of retail merchants," he said.

"During my first session, I also successfully sponsored legislation that provided Callahan County with Parks and Wildlife services, that established the Rising Star Hospital District, and a bill which permitted Breckenridge governmental refinancing.

"I was raised in Breckenridge and was selected Most Valuable High School Student by State and National Elks Foundation. I attended The University of Texas and SMU and in 1963 was selected Outstanding Student from the 24,000 member student body at The University of Texas.

"Interested in youth becoming participating citizens, I was the program coordinator of the first statewide Attorney General's Youth Conference

The appearance will be at a banquet sponsored by District 4 Farmers Union and it will be held at the main dining room on the Tarleton College Campus, beginning at 7 p. m. District 4 includes organizations in Bosque, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Parker, Comanche and Runnels counties.

Mr. Brannan, who is a native of Colorado, was appointed Secretary of Agriculture by President Truman in 1948 and served in that capacity until January 1953. He was the author of the then controversial program of direct payments to farmers, called the "Brannan Plan," which has become an integral part of present federal commodity supply management programs.

In his Texas speech, Mr. Brannan will discuss his views on current farm policy and legislation being considered by congress to give farmers and livestock producers legal bargaining authority. He is generally considered the nation's foremost authority on the legal aspects of farmer bargaining.

Deadlines Noted For 1968 Crops

Farmers having peanut allotments or who are participating in the wheat or feed grain programs were reminded this week of the final dates to certify acreage for 1968.

J. G. Meredith, office manager for the Eastland County ASCS, noted that May 1 is the final date to certify wheat acreage, and the deadline for peanuts, feed grains and cotton is Aug. 1. The ASCS has measurement service available for those who desire it.

Mr. Meredith called attention to the fact that the 1968 allotment acreage was not the same as last year and that planters should review their allotment notice before planting.

Diverted acreage cannot be grazed between May 1 and October 1, 1968, the ASCS noted.
