

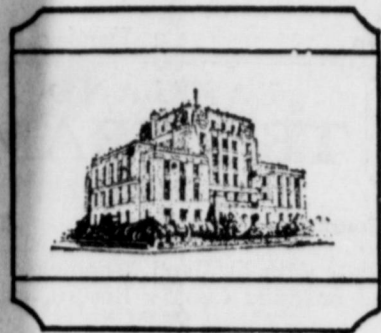

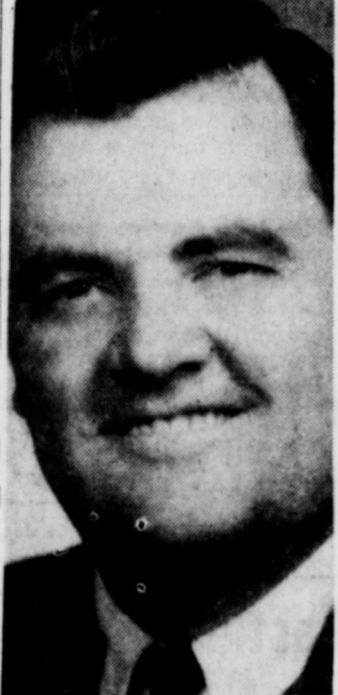

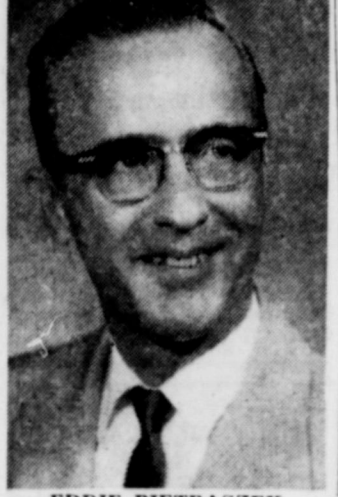

The Readers Write

It appears that there are matters within the City of Eastland that should be brought to the attention of the public in a manner that is bound by its character. I have two particular incidents in mind that are too lengthy to outline in detail in this letter.

Another item concerns Article 13, Sec. 6, of the Charter of the City of Eastland. Now, for those of you not "fortunate" (?) enough to have a copy of the Charter, I shall quote it to you verbatim: (Sec. 13) "No person shall be eligible to appointment to any salaried position in the City who is related to any member of the Board of Commissioners, or to the City Manager, or to the Director of any department in which he may be appointed, either in direct line or collaterally nearer than the fourth degree." This section is entitled "Nepotism."

The violation of the Nepotism clause has cured itself, simply because the person who had been hired by the City to maintain their two-way radio equipment has moved away. This person was, and is, a brother to one of the City Commissioners. When this matter was brought to the City's attention some months ago, it was "explained away" by their stating that the individual in question did not receive a salary, as stipulated in the City Charter,

but that he was paid on a "fee" basis for his work done. The point is very fundamental, regardless of what you call the money he received for his work... fee, salary, or what-have-you... it was still money, and he was the brother of one of the commissioners.

Another situation that sorely needs correcting exists in the Fire Department. I have in my possession a letter from the Assistant State Fire Marshal, Mr. Charles Meadows, of Austin, Texas. At the time I heard that the local fire marshal had been placed in charge of the "men and equipment" in the City Fire Department, I felt that this was not within state regulations, so I proceeded to inquire of the State Fire Marshal's office as to the correct procedure. This is a quote from the letter I received: "The Fire Marshal is not required to belong to a pair or volunteer fire department. He (fire marshal) may at the pleasure of the Mayor, City Council, or City Manager serve as Chief of the Fire Department only if the Chief is not elected by the volunteer members."

You will note that the writer says "Only if the Chief is NOT elected by the volunteer members." Mr. Wayne Jackson is the duly elected Chief of the Volunteers, and consequently it would appear to me that the Fire Marshal's position is null and void because the paid men are also members of the volunteer fire department. And, certainly, State regulations and requirements have precedence over city "appointments."

However, there are other duties of the Fire Marshal as outlined in my letter from Mr. Meadows, among them the chore of inspecting downtown buildings for fire hazards on a regular basis. I personally checked withowners of downtown stores and found that there has not been any required inspection in so long that they cannot remember exactly when an inspection was made last.

The Fire Marshal of Eastland used to draw a monthly fee of \$10 for serving in this capacity, but it has recently been raised to \$25 per month — for what?

Some months ago I brought to the attention of the readers that the instructions of the Fire Marshal to the paid firemen, in what to take to the scene of a major house or building fire, had reduced the immediate fire fighting ability to one-half. This was denied subsequently by the City Manager, after his denial I later proved him wrong. This is another situation where fundamentals are involved, 2nd grade arithmetic. If you have two apples and take away one apple, what do you have left? Ans. one apple.

In the point of issue, when you have two pumpers and take away one pumper, what do you have left? The answer is one-half what you formerly had. Also, this rural truck that the Fire Marshal has directed to go to house and building fires, is actually supposed to be on stand-by for protection of the rural populace. The County Commissioners' Court pays to the City of Eastland the sum of \$50 per month (which is too little) for fire protection outside the City Limits. How can people outside the city be protected when their truck is tied up at a fire inside the City, when there is actually other equipment available, and remaining idle at the station? In the fire department, for example the paid men need a chief who is a paid chief and paid fireman, and not someone outside their department. If this cannot be worked out, then the only chief needed is the Volunteer Chief, who should be in charge of all men and equipment. A man cannot serve two masters, and this is the situation now existing locally.

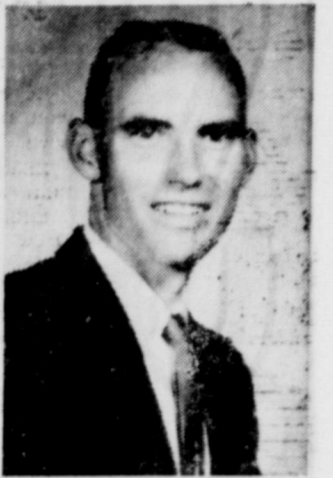
Rod Carter Accepts Position As ASCS Manager Of Hood County

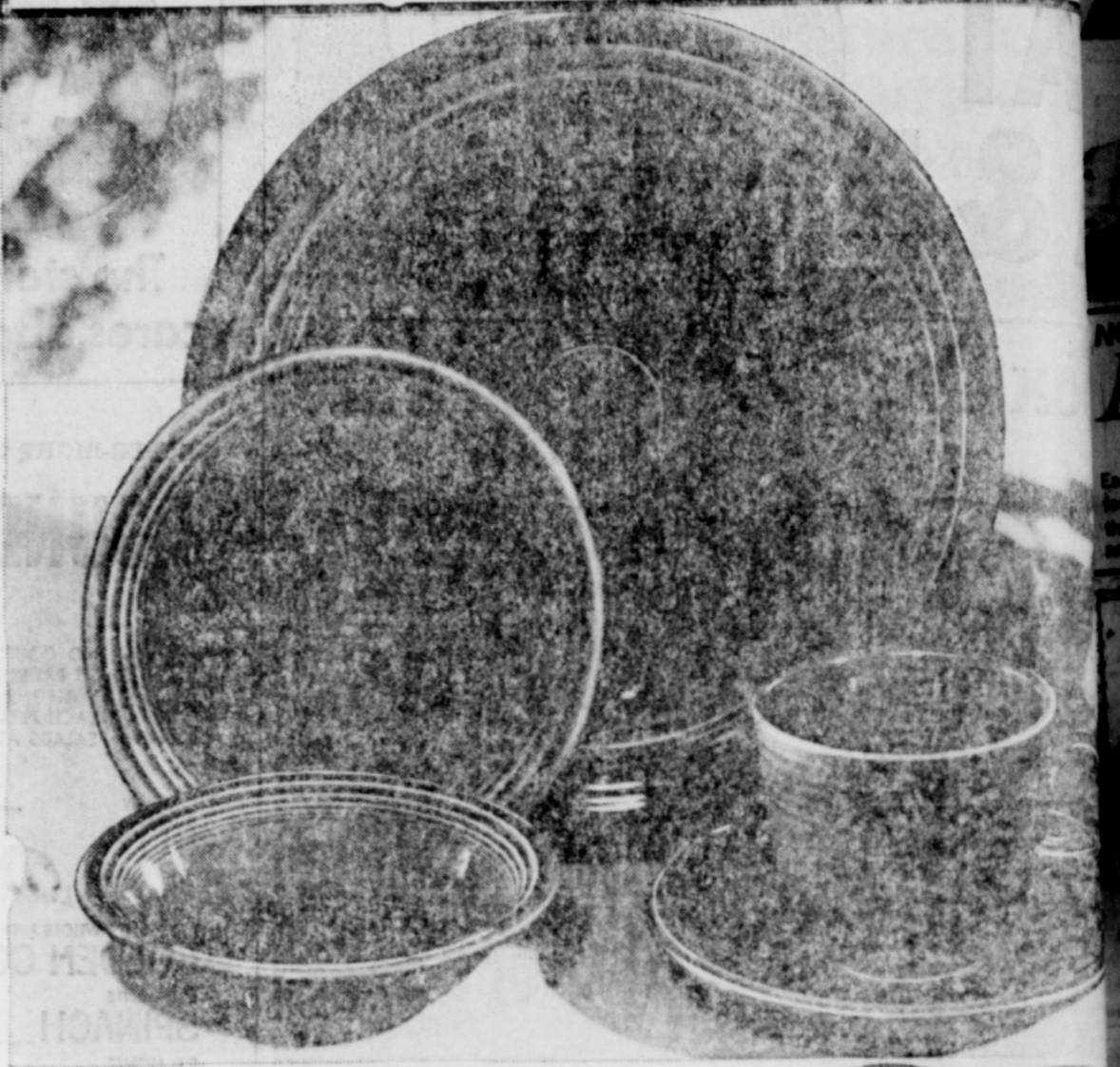

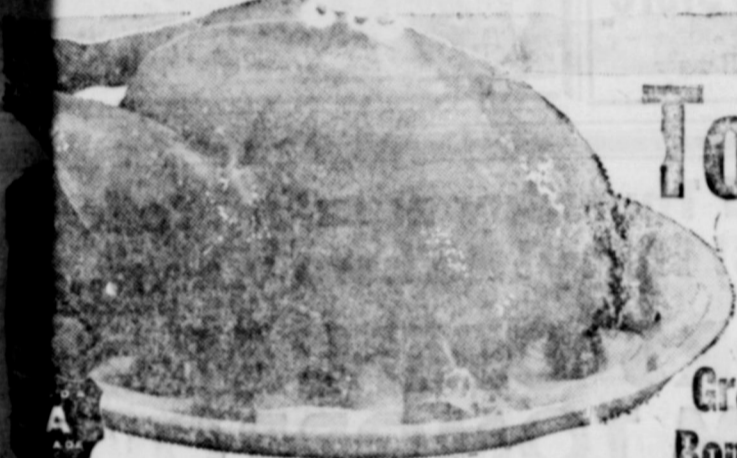

THE GORDON SPOT

Many home gardeners in Eastland County have trouble growing tomatoes because of root knot nematodes and various tomato diseases. Here is some good news for these people. A multiple disease-resistant tomato called Nematex is now on the market which combines nematode resistance with resistance to several other damaging tomato diseases.

Nematex is a fresh market tomato with moderately sized fruit and is adapted to the Eastland County area. Nematex is not recommended where a premium is placed on large fruit, but is recommended for home gardeners.

This new tomato was developed by the Plant Disease Experiment Station at Yokum.

Commercial plant producers and especially those growing plants for home gardeners, should consider providing the transplants of Nematex for 1968 use.

Some of the farmers in the Lake Leon area have told me they can not raise grain sorghum because of the large amount of birds in that area.

Most seed companies now have bird resistant hybrid grain sorghums on the market. The grain is brown in color. This grain has a bitter taste, especially during the milk and soft dough stage which is when the birds normally do most of their feeding and damage. The bitter taste of the grain during this stage is apparently distasteful to birds, but not poisonous. The bitterness tends to disappear or is reduced as the grain matures.

There have not been many yield trials made on the bird resistant hybrids, but the limited trials indicate that yields are about the same as other varieties.

Studies on the feeding value of the brown grain has been inconsistent. Some studies indicate the feeding value is equal to the non-bird resistant varieties. Other studies indicate that brown grain is not as good as non-brown for

feeding. When fed free choice, the brown grain is largely avoided due primarily to the remaining bitterness of the grain.

In general the bird resistant varieties should be planted only where other varieties can not be grown because of the high bird population.

A land measurement short course will be conducted by members of all agricultural agencies at the Olden Community Center on the evenings of Feb. 5 and 6. The Young Farmers Organization is sponsoring the short course.

Students Invited To Enter Soil Essay Contest

E. E. McAllister of the Soil Conservation Service in Eastland has announced that students of Eastland County high schools have been invited to enter the 23rd annual Fort Worth Press "Save the Soil and Save Texas" essay contest. This year's subject is "Conservation: Key to Texas Prosperity".

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District will award prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 for the top three essays in each of the five zones of the District. Entries in this contest must be received by Feb. 10.

Essays will be forwarded to the Fort Worth Press for judging in the state contest, which will offer prizes of \$200 for the top essay and 50 trophies and medals.

Rules concerning both contests have been sent to the principals of Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Gorman, Carbon, Rising Star, Desdemona, and Olden High School.

Farmers Union Makes Plans For Workshop

Robert Cathey of Dublin, district director of District 4 Farmers Union, has announced plans for a District Leadership Conference to be held at the Stephenville Steak House in Stephenville beginning at 10 a. m. on Thursday, Feb. 8.

District 4 Farmers Union comprises eight counties in the central West Texas area, and county leaders from Runnels, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Parker, Palo Pinto and Bosque counties are expected at the Stephenville meeting.

Highlighting the conference will be special reports from several leading commodity producers in the area. Lyndell Coan of DeLeon will report on peanut problems, Harold Parks of Stephenville will discuss the milk producers' situation, and a special report on young farmers problems will be presented by Gaylelsham, Jr., of Comanche who is the Area IV president of the Young Farmers Association.

Other events scheduled on the program are the selection of a commodity committee to advise the district director on commodity problems and a report from Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco on the legislative outlook and farm policy for 1968.

The Constitution of the United States makes no mention of a President's Cabinet.

ASC Farmer Committee System Is 32 Years Old, Meredith Reports

This year, 1968, the elected farmer committee system of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will be 32 years old.

Jesse G. Meredith, ASCS County Office Manager made this announcement at the regular ASC county committee meeting on Jan. 23. Members serving on the ASC county committee this year are Robert E. Lyerla, Chairman, of Eastland, Charles Little of Eastland, and Paul Norris of Gorman.

The committee administers action on farm programs in the county level, including price support and production adjustment, conservation cost-sharing and others. Principal commodity programs administered by the local committee are: 910 peanut allotment farms, 244 wheat allotment farms, 135 cotton allotment farms, and 970 feed grain base farms.

The county office manager said that farmer committees were authorized by the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1933. However, in those early years committees were appointed. Since 1936 ASC county and community committees have been elected Congress currently prescribes the election procedures for ASC committees.

"Farmers like the committee system, as nearly as I can tell," Mr. Meredith said. "It gives them a local voice in setting yields, establishing allotments, setting up rates of cost-sharing on conservation

work and other important policy determinations that protect farmers at the producer level of operation."

Mr. Meredith also pointed out that the elected committee system constitutes a pipeline for ideas and suggestions for improving farm programs. Farmer elected committees act as agents for their neighbors in linking local farmers with the Department of Agriculture in Washington.

The ASC committee invites all farmers, farm groups and others interested in Agriculture to take advantage of this pipeline to help bring new solutions and fresh approaches to ever-changing farm programs, Mr. Meredith said.

Gov. Connally Designates Farm Bureau Week

Governor John Connally has designated the week of Jan. 29-Feb. 4 as "Farm Bureau Membership Week" in Texas.

The period officially kicks off the Texas Farm Bureau's state-wide 1968 drive for new members. The TFB, now fourth largest state Farm Bureau in the nation, with 104,553 member families, has a goal of 112,000 members for 1968.

In his proclamation, the Governor paid tribute to the productivity of today's farmer and rancher, saying that our high standard of living is,

in part, due to agricultural efficiency.

Here are excerpts from his proclamation: "Agriculture is vital to the economic well-being of this State and Nation. About 40 percent of all Texans depend upon agriculture, either directly or indirectly, for their livelihood.

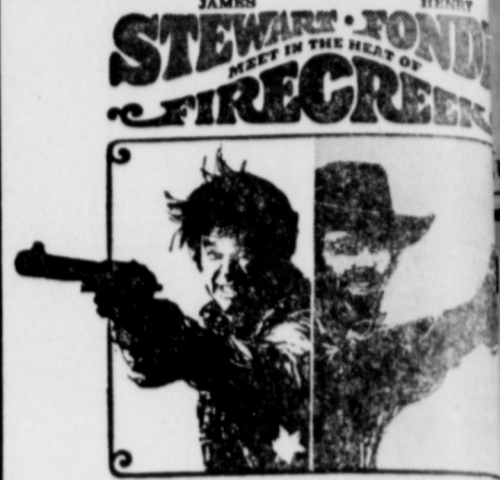
