PERRY STORE HERE DUE FOR BIG EXPANSION, RENOVATION

The Perry Brothers Store, 107 South Lamar, will be enlarged and completely remodeled in the next few weeks. Work on the old theater building, which joins the store on the north, will begin Monday. The building will add 1600 square feet of space to the store.

James Johnston, manager, said a third store entrance will be located where the theater entrance and another check-out counter will be installed to handle the flow of customers. The store will add many new items to its stock, and will also expand its present lines. Johnston said bicycles and other wheel toys will be added to the toy department.

New flooring and lowered ceilings with new lighting system will be installed throughout the store, which will be 75 by 80 feet.

Work is scheduled for completion before Easter. Johnston estimated that two or three new employees will be needed. Currently, the store employs ten people.

Asst. County Attorney Due On Job February 26

Emory C. Walton, Goldthwaite native and assistant city attorney at Abilene for the past three years, has been appointed Assistant Eastland County Attorney by County Attorney Perry T. Brown and approved by the County Commissioners Court this week.

Mr. Walton's appointment will become effective Feb. 26. He is a graduate of Baylor University.

Mr. Brown said in his appointment notice to the court:

"Under the authority of Article 331 of Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, I hereby appoint Emory C. Walton as my assistant for the remainder of my term of office, which expires Dec. 31, 1968, and request this Honorable Commissioners Court to approve said appointment and fix the salary of said assistant at \$500.00 per month. Said appointment to become effective as of Feb. 26th, 1968.

"Respectfully submitted, Perry T. Brown."

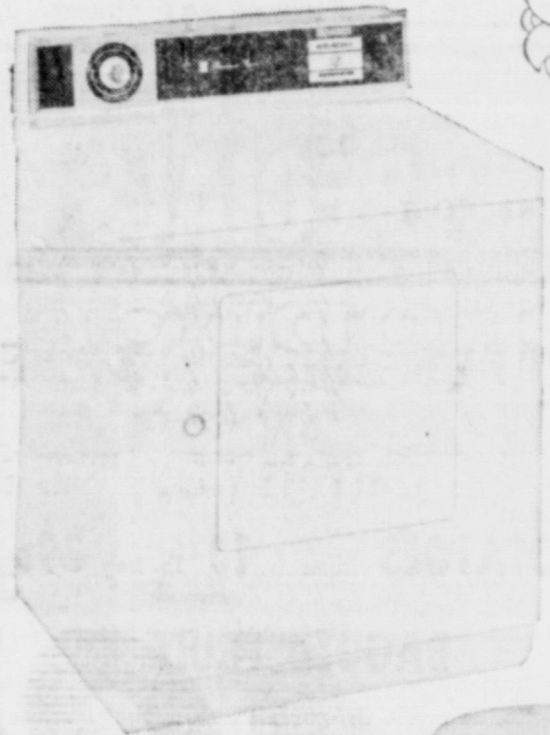
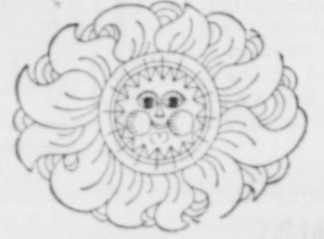

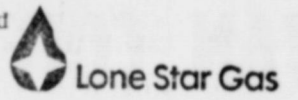

SALARY QUESTION IS SOLVED' -- BROWN

Salary question arose when the 91st District and Jury, the County Court and the Attorney discussed the question of an assistant county attorney's salary.

Question apparently resolved with legislation, and the appointment of an Abilene man to the position. Originally, local attorneys held that a salary more than \$1,800 a year was in order.

Findings show differences pointed out by District Attorney Perry T. Brown in a letter to the Commissioners Court, as well as the fact that the grand jury of the County on the 29th of January, 1968, for the purpose of an assistant to the County-District Attorney, did the Commission of Eastland County the authority to compensation by the District Attorney of an assistant to pay said \$500 per month salary.

After a search of the law, the Attorney's office for an opinion on the matter was given to a Mr. Davis of the County Attorney's office. After consulting with him, the County Attorney had the authority to pay such salary.

He replied, "Certainly, no problem. No question at all." He cited the following Articles from Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes: Art. 3902-Sec. 9; Art. 3912g-Sec. 1, 2, 3, & 5; Art. 3883 h-Sec. 1; Art. 3883i-Sec. 1. Article 3912g provides as follows:

"County attorneys, by consent of the commissioners court, shall have power to appoint in writing one or more assistants, not to exceed three for their respective counties who shall have the same powers, authority and qualifications as their principals, at whose will they shall hold office. Before entering on the duties of their offices, they shall each take the official oath which shall be indorsed upon their appointment, which oaths and appointments shall be recorded and deposited in the county clerk's office."

Article 3902-Sec. 9, provides that the Commissioners Court is hereby authorized, when in their judgment the financial condition of the county and the needs of the deputies, assistants and clerks of any district, county or precinct officer justify the increase, to enter an order increasing the compensation of such deputy, assistant or clerk, etc.

Decision note No. 9 under article 3902, "Payment of maximum salaries under appointment—Application by county clerk for authority to appoint deputies to be paid maximum salaries allowed by law and order of county commissioners' court ratifying appointments at such salaries, provided fees of office were sufficient to pay them, held sufficiently definite to impose absolute duty upon county clerk to pay maximum salaries of office were sufficient. Maryland Casualty Co. vs. State, Civ. App. 81 S.W. 2d 165, affirmed 130 T. 206, 107 S.W. 2d 865."

Article 3912e-Sec. 15 provides that "the Commissioners Court in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand according to the last Federal Census, at the first regular meeting in January of each calendar year, may pass an order providing for compensation of all county and precinct officers on a salary basis" etc.

Paragraphs (a) and (b) of Sec. 15 provides that the compensation of County Attorney who performs the duties of District Attorneys, together with the compensation of his assistants, shall be paid out of the County Officers' Salary Fund, etc.; and (b) provides that the commissioners court may increase such compensation when the needs of the county and the needs of the officers justify the increases, etc.

Article 3902j-Sec. 1 provides "The Commissioners Court in each county of this State is hereby authorized, when in their judgment the financial condition of the county and the needs of the deputies, assistants and clerks of any district, county or precinct officer justify the increase, to enter an order increasing the compensation of such deputy, assistant or clerk in an additional amount not to exceed 35 percent of the maximum sum allowed in the law at the present time."

Article 3912e-12, provides that in all counties in this State having a population of less than 20,000 according to the last Federal Census, and in which counties the commissioners court have determined the county officials shall be compensated on a salary basis, such commissioners court are authorized to fix the salaries of such county officials, their deputies, clerks and assistants, etc., provided, further that no salary shall be set at a figure lower than that paid for the Calendar Year 1946.

Article 3912g-Secs. 1 and 2 provide for increases in salary or compensation whether paid on fee basis or salary basis for both county officials and their deputies and assistants.

In my opinion, gentlemen, you have the authority to approve the appointment of an assistant to my office, and you have the authority to fix the salary of such assistant and to increase it as the needs justify. Article 331; Art. 3902j-Sec. 1; 3912e-Sec. 12 and 3912g-Secs. 1 and 2, give you, in my opinion, such authority. Respectfully,
