white with a train, and in her qualifying talk, she explained that she will go to a 4-H club seminar at Baylor University later this summer as a guest of the Farm Bureau. Judging was on poise, character and personality with Mrs. Bob Beazley and Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Adcock, all of Anson, serving as judges. Runner-up Kathy Williams, also a brunette, wore a red gown. Other contestants were Belinda Hickman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ike Hickman of Rising Star, who wore a turquoise gown; Liz Leveridge, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Leveridge of Cisco, who wore yellow; Ivy Ferguson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Ferguson of Cisco, and the only blonde in the contest, who wore a white gown with a green bodice.

FB General Agent Gayle Baucum was master of ceremonies and introduced the girls, interviewing each and asking "Why are you glad your family belongs to the Farm Bureau." FB President Jack Cozart made the welcome and introduced.

Grass Fires Claim Drive In, Acreage

Thursday at 3:15 p. m. fire trucks were summoned to Bill Hoffmann's property, located four miles south of town. Eastland, Cisco, Olden and Carbon fire departments were at the scene and helped control and put out the fire. About 100 acres of grassland damage and a trailer of hay burned, according to reports from Guy Robinson.

The screen and part of the fence of the Joy Drive-In Theater, located two miles east of Cisco on Highway 80, were destroyed by fire of undetermined origin Wednesday afternoon.

The blaze originated as a grass fire southeast of the theater and spread to the wooden fence and screen. Some 20 acres of grass land burned off before fireman from Cisco, Eastland and Olden brought the fire under control.

Wesley Walker, owner of the drive-in, estimated the loss at \$6,000. It was not covered by insurance, he said. He expressed doubt that the screen would be rebuilt. The concession stand and the projection booth were not damaged.

The grass fire broke out about 2 p. m. and it was dark before the fire was out. Two other grass fires started near Highway 80 between the drive-in and Eastland but they were put out without damage. Origin of the grass fires was not determined, fireman said.

Mr. Walker had owned the drive-in for 11 years. He also owns the Place Theater in Cisco. The drive-in was built on land leased from the Haslow family.

The drive-in was built by Joy Huck of New Orleans in the summer of 1948. It was one of the first if not the first drive-ins ever built near a small town in Texas, and the original equipment included a large central loudspeaker.

Mr. Walker expressed appreciation to fireman and others for their help in bringing the fire under control.

Eddie Simms To Teach Math In EHS System

Eddie Simms will teach math at Firstland High School this fall, it has been announced here. A definite schedule hasn't been worked out, Supt. Wendell Siebert said, but Mr. Simms probably will teach the high school units and possibly a Junior High unit.

In Eastland, he probably will teach Junior High Science, it is reported. Other teaching positions, including that of librarian, are to be announced Supt. Siebert said.

Greenbacks Advance To Tourney Champion Round

Eastland County's entry in the District 7 Junior League Tournament at Coleman put together three wins this week to advance to the championship finals Saturday. The Eastland Greenbacks downed a big powerful Snyder team Friday night, 5 to 2, as their biggest hurdle toward the crown. They were to play the winner of the Comanche and Snyder game which was being played at Press time Saturday morning. Eastland will advance to state tournament in Brownwood next week if they claim the district crown in Coleman.

They beat Stamford 5 to 1 Wednesday, and Baird 6 to 3 Thursday. The Snyder team was the hands down "picked team" going into the tournament. Eastland played an "all-around" good ball game Friday night, and started off by making four runs in the first inning. The runs were made by Joe Herrera, Bobby Guy Emfinger, Grady Gregory, and Randy Boles. Joe Herrera scored again for Eastland in the fourth inning. Snyder scored once in the second inning and once in the fifth inning. Snyder played an extra inning but failed to

WEDNESDAY'S ACTION

Eastland County's entry, the Greenbacks of Eastland, opened the Jr. League District Tournament in Coleman Wednesday by defeating a team from Stamford, 5-1. It was a hitting - pitcher's night as Larry Don Williamson of Ranger, pitcher for the Greenbacks, put on a hitting demonstration that advanced the local team.

Joe Herrera scored in the third inning for the first Greenback score and Williamson drove in Randy Boles for another, later in the same frame. Stamford made their first and only score in the sixth, on an Eastland error.

Williamson drove two runs in during the fifth, bringing home Herrera and Bobby Guy Emfinger. In the sixth he brought Boles in for the sixth run. On the mound, Williamson struck out 15 and gave up only two hits. In other games Wednesday: Snyder bested Coleman 6-1; Baird downed Comanche 8-2; and Colorado City defeated Sweetwater 6-1.

Labor Dept. Okays N.Y.C. Project Here

Word has been received that the Department of Labor has approved a Neighborhood Youth Corps project, sponsored by Eastland County school. Sen. Ralph Yarborough announced in a telegram that the project will provide work experience opportunities for 120 in - school enrollees and 150 summer, 1968, enrollees and will cost a total of \$155,900 of which the federal government will provide \$128,210. This is down some from last year's program which provided for 150 in - school and 160 summer enrollees, Tip Arthur of the County School Superintendent's office and director of the program, announced. However, the new program which covers this coming school term and next summer, will include some vocational courses to be offered at Cisco Junior College, beginning with the spring term. Offered will be IBM machines and automotive repair training, probably. The participating schools' contributions to the program is made up in professional counseling and administrative services rendered, it is reported.

Former Resident Is In Top U. S. Defense Post

Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Lucas received a letter this week and a clipping from, and about some former Eastlanders.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Greathouse, former residents, are now living in Ferriday, La. While in Eastland Mr. Greathouse ran the swimming pool for two years, and he also worked for Mr. Lucas and Texas Electric Service Co.

After Danny was born, he and his mother moved to Ferriday to live during World War II while Mr. Greathouse was away as an aide to Adm. Naminez. After the war, the family remained in Ferriday.

Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Lucas received the following letter from the Greathouses:

"We thought you would like to see what happened to the little red mite of humanity you gave his first bath. We often think of you folks and get a bit homesick for all the good Eastland people we used to know."

The Greathouses also sent a newspaper clipping that gave the following information about their son:

Danny is now a captain in the Air Force. He is a sub-systems manager for development of propulsion equipment in the engineering of new aircraft, and his office is at Washington, D. C.

Essentially, he is in charge of development and manufacture of the engine and connected parts for new aircraft, and he is responsible for solving any problem in construction or production.

Greathouse, who is a part of the System Program Offices, goes along with the SPO director to brief Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara on the progress of various systems at least once a month.

Capt. and Mrs. Greathouse and their three children are in Dayton, Ohio, where he is working with engineers and contractors at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base on an A7D fighter aircraft. After a stay at the base, Greathouse and his family will return to Washington.

Greathouse graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Petroleum Engineering from the University of Southwestern Louisiana in 1957. He was also graduated from the ROTC program that year, receiving his commission in the Air Force. He went into flight school in 1958.

He was in the Strategic Air Command until May, 1964, when he was selected as one of 24 navigators to go to Air Force Systems Command, which named his present position.

Mumps ...

Swollen Jaws? Be Careful

Mumps is a virus infection of the parotid gland, one of the salivary glands, immediately below the ear lobe and behind the angle of the jaw, says Today's Health magazine of the American Medical Association.

The best sign of mumps is a tender, smooth firm swelling that covers the corner of the jawbone where it turns upward toward the ear, the magazine reports.

Mumps in a child is usually only mildly incapacitating and moderately uncomfortable. Early cases of mumps are so mild as to go unnoticed by parents. A mild medication for fever and the discomfort of mild headache and muscle aches may be used as needed.

Normally the child recovers in five to seven days. In the teenager or adult, mumps is more serious. The virus is more likely to involve other areas such as the pancreas, and to result in nausea, abdominal pains and severe food or fluid intolerances.

The tendency for mumps with its attendant pain to settle in the ovary or testicle is well known. The chance of sterility is highly and emotionally overrated, however. Physicians usually prescribe complete bed rest for adults with mumps. Greater physical activity brings greater chance of complications.

Mumps is not excessively contagious and almost direct contact with the afflicted—such as drinking from the same cup or being sneezed at—is required to contract the disease.

One can get mumps twice, but it is a rare occurrence. Most cases of "mumps the second time" were the result of previous misdiagnosis of swollen neck glands from an infected throat. Odds are about one in 400 of having bona fide mumps as a repeat illness.

Mumps cannot be prevented at present, but recent research promises a vaccine soon.

Eastland: The City With Prospects

Bennie Simpson, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Simpson of Eastland, will be a junior in 1967-68. He has been an active 4-H member for six years. During this time he competed in a Soil and Water Demonstration in 1964, Entomology in 1965, State Dairy Judging in 1966, and he also showed in the livestock show all prize winning tomatoes. He is a member of the H. S. band, and has entered in band contests as well as the Interscholastic League in 1967. Bennie is a member of the First Methodist Church where he is active in the choir and M. Y. F.

Eastland is a community with a population of 3,500 and is the county seat. This town has four factories or industries which include clothing, clay products, casinghead pipe, and a regional refinery plant. These four industries are not enough for Eastland, which has a lot to offer.

This community is not only a county seat, but it is a good place to live. It has many things to offer new people and new industry. There are good shopping places, and many churches in Eastland. The school system is in the AA. In this school system there is a band and an athletic department. The school also has a variety of courses which a student can take. There are four chain grocery stores; and four privately owned grocery stores; and there is a good meat processing and packing plant.

Eastland has a plentiful water supply for growth and industry, yet the recreational phase around our lake needs to be improved for picnicking and camping. Since the city dweller tends to desire an outdoor environment, this type of recreation could bring in many dollars in the form of returns for swimming, boating, fishing and horse back riding.

Besides Eastland having an adequate water supply, it has an excellent highway system on which supplies could be shipped in and out. There is also a railroad system that provides transportation. Heavily traveled highways bring people, and without people there cannot be industry. For industry you must have agriculture, and this is one thing Eastland has. There is everything from ranching to raising crops. For every dollar in agriculture it creates seven dollars in business, most of which is local. There are almost 600,000 acres of

agricultural land in the county, an increase of only one dollar per acre could increase business by four million dollars. This increase can come by better land use and soil and water conservation.

Since we are more or less an agricultural community it would be more practical to manufacture things that the farmer needs, such as machinery, fertilizer, herbicides, insecticides, and motor fuels. Industry could also be built around processing agricultural products such as meats, peanuts, fruits and vegetables.

For the families, there is recreation at the bowling alley; and during the summer the whole family may enjoy themselves at the swimming pool, or on the gym equipment at the park. For entertainment there are two drive-in theaters and a theater downtown. Opportunities such as being in plays at the civic theater, and joining the bowling teams for competition, are also offered in Eastland.

Information about what is taking place in the area is provided by the radio station and the semi-weekly newspaper. Communication is aided by the Bell Telephone system and the Western Union.

Let us remember that industry begets other industry. So a start in the right direction means a continued growth.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election, and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board may be used by said Board as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds heretofore issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

tirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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Poison Ivy Days Are Here; Hints Given on Control

COLLEGE STATION—Summer days are here and so is poison ivy. This plant is found throughout Texas, especially along streams and in shady places, says G. O. Hoffman, Extension range brush and weed control specialist at Texas A&M University.

Hoffman points out that the greatest danger from poisoning is in the spring and summer, though it can occur in the fall and winter.

Poison ivy is a perennial, native plant which grows during the warm season and belongs to the sumac family. Three varieties of the plant grow in Texas. It can exist as a vine shrub or small tree and always has its leaves divided into three leaflets.

The leaflets are usually glossy and have one of three types of margins—smooth toothed or lobed. The lobed or toothed leaf margin resembles oak leaves, thus the name "poison oak."

Clusters of white flowers arise from the axis of the three leaves. When fruits develop, the berries are white and waxy with distinct lines marking the outer surface which resemble segments in a peeled orange.

All parts of the poison ivy plant are toxic, particularly the sap. It can be carried by pets, gardening tools or from the soot of burning plants.

Hoffman says poisonings can be prevented if contact with the toxin is avoided. If contacted clothing should be washed thoroughly and separately before wearing. The contaminated part of the body should be washed with soap and water and a doctor called if the irritation becomes serious.

Poison ivy plants can be controlled by hand chopping but a herbicide applied as a spray solution is more effective. Herbicides that produce

the most effective control are ammonium sulfamate (am-mate) and amino trizole. Ammate can be purchased at most feed seed and garden supply stores. Used with care it will control all growth forms of poison ivy without endangering other plants or the soil. It is nontoxic to animals and humans and can be used throughout the growing season.

Local county agents can supply additional information on the subject, Hoffman said.


