City Calls Bonds, Endorses 1 UF Drive, Opens 3 Bids

The City of Eastland exercised its option to call the last of the old refunding bonds during a busy City Commission meeting Monday night at City Hall, that also saw quite a bit of other important business handled.

The Commissioners opened bids and heard presentations from three companies which seek to equip the city's new fire truck as a fire-fighter. No action was taken, but another meeting was set for 2 p. m. Wednesday, to be held at the bank conference room, for the purpose of deciding the winning bid.

The bids were surprisingly close in amount, and generally higher than had been anticipated, it was felt. The Boardman Co. of Oklahoma City, bid \$14,875, fob, Oklahoma City, which would raise the bid by about \$245 for rail shipment to Eastland. The American La France Co. bid of New York was \$15,397, delivered; and the Fire Appliance Co. of Chicago, bid \$15,973.

BOND CALLING RESOLUTION

A resolution adopted by the City Commission, calling the old refunding bonds, reads as follows:

300 ACRES BURNED

Erratic weather, which has brought a little bit of everything except general rain, was being blamed for a series of property destroying incidents at mid-week.

Some 300 acres of grass land was destroyed by the fire, local firemen reported. Assisting were departments from Cisco, Gorman and Eastland.

All agreed that the matter should be explored and that an iron-clad "release" would need to be drawn between the man, who lives in Rising Star and the city to relieve the city of any possible liability. The subject will be explored.

Discussion was held on the matter of improving of a 200-foot section of Oak St., between W. Commerce and W. Main St. No action was taken.

Commissioner James Reid reported that he had been asked by several citizens to have the police force enforce the anti-littering ordinance. All agreed that this needed to be done to help keep the city cleaner.

City Manager Lewis Tiner announced that John Morren, a retired Army Master Sergeant had been employed as a policeman, replacing Patrolman Bill Partin, who was recently released because of ill health.

Commissioner Jay Staggs recommended that the group reconsider the possibility of relieving City Manager Tiner of the responsibility of performing as city judge, stating that it does work satisfactorily with his duties as manager. This subject was considered once before, at which time, the possibility of turning the city judgeship responsibilities over to Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton were discussed. No action was taken then, and it was agreed Monday night that the matter will be re-opened and considered.

W. Morren, retired Master Sergeant from United States Air Force and Air Force Base, named the Eastland Police Department, Chief Ray has announced.

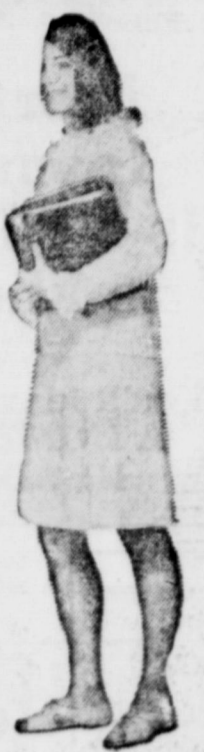

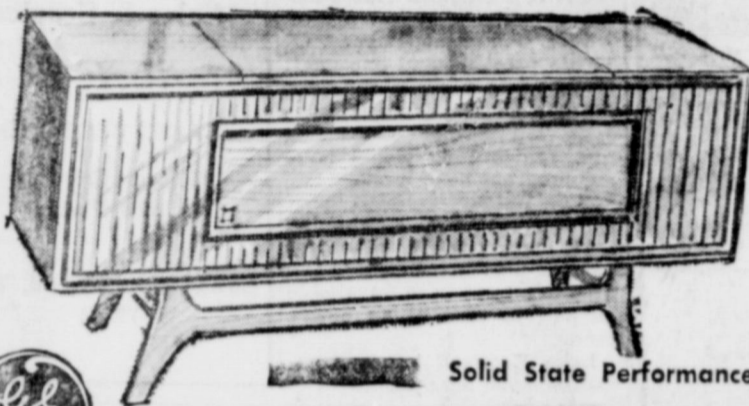

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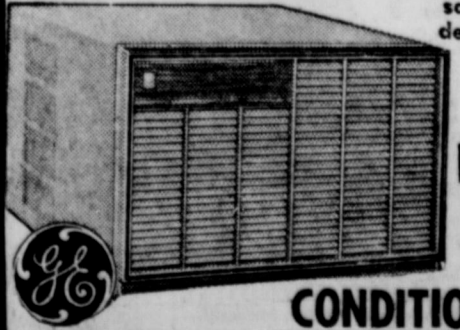

Drivers' Law Amendments Benefit Texas Motorists

The Department of Transportation has reminded motorists that August 28 marks the effective date of several amendments to the Texas Motor Vehicle Code designed to increase the penalties for driving without a license and violations calling for automatic suspension.

It also sets penalties for counterfeiting or forging a license, or for possessing such a license.

The age limits were raised to a minimum of 16 years for operating a five-brake horsepower motor scooter was raised to 15 years. A special examination will be required after January 1 for applicants desiring a license to operate a motorcycle which includes an "off-street phase" and an "on-street phase." The applicant must provide the motorcycle and a passenger vehicle and licensed driver to convey the License Examiner during the road test.

Licenses issued to persons under 21 years of age will be stamped "Provisional" and may be suspended if the operator is convicted of two traffic law violations in a twelve month period. This becomes effective January 1.

Upon conviction of driving without a license, a motorist is subject to a fine of up to \$200 for the first offense and increasingly stiffer penalties for each successive conviction. Persons convicted of driving while intoxicated (or a similar offense) are subject to a first suspension of twelve months. Any subsequent on the basis of this type of conviction will be for a period of 18 months. In addition, any driver whose license has been suspended or revoked may be required to attend a program of rehabilitation for problem drivers.

Any person applying for an original license must furnish the department with certified copy of the applicants birth certificate or other documentary evidence deemed satisfactory by the Department for proof of age. The Department is also authorized to require any other information necessary to determine the applicant's identity, competency eligibility for licensing. Thumb prints will be required on all original applications after August 28.

Among other provisions designed to ban unsafe drivers from the highways is the requirement that the Department of Public Welfare furnish the DPS with a list of the persons who apply for or receive assistance to the needy blind. The license of such persons must be revoked to comply with the law.

Also, any person who is convicted of driving while his license is suspended or revoked shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500, and shall be imprisoned not less than 72 hours nor more than six months.

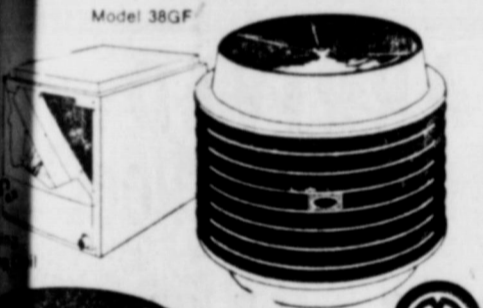

SAN ANGELO — Bobwhite quail counts throughout the Texas Panhandle and the Lower Plains are higher than last year except in the vicinity of Childress where rainfall has not occurred regular-

ly according to District Chief Weldon Fromm of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Fromm reported exceptionally good hunting in the Panhandle during 1966 and said "the 1967 quail crop will be even better." High quail numbers are a sign of a season which kept vegetation lush and food abundant for nesting bobwhites.

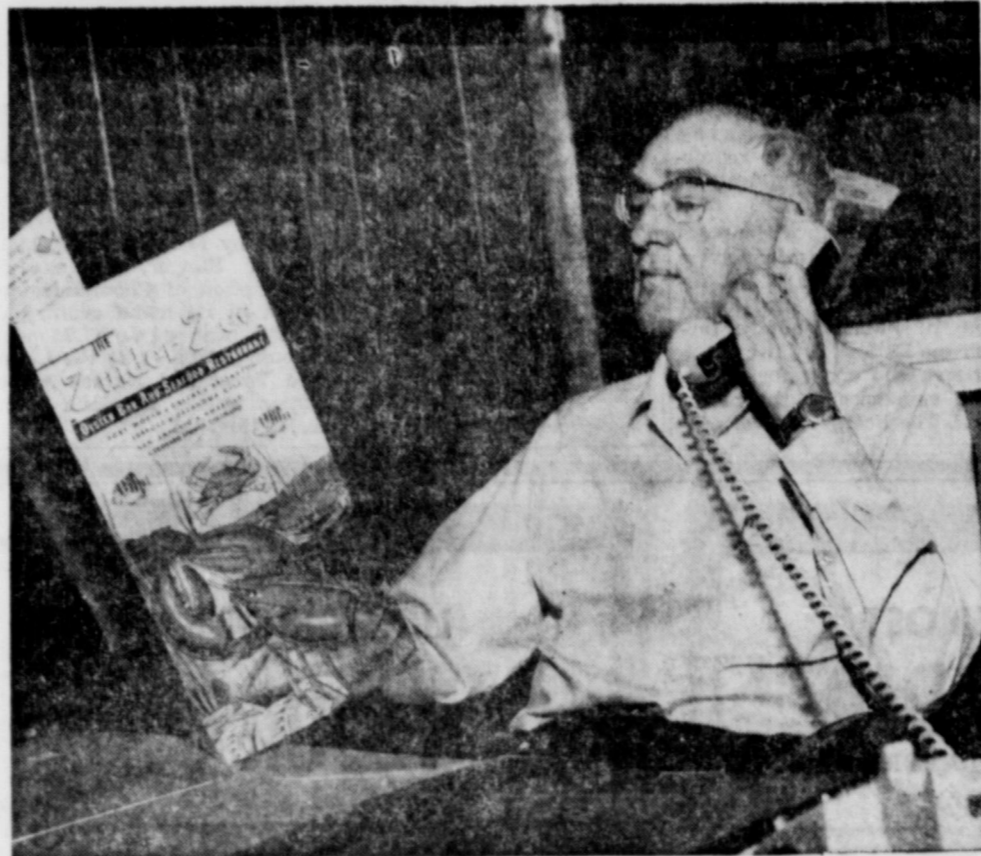

VICTOR CORNELIUS
... the man who makes VC menus
CORNELIUS LIKES THINKING, BIKING

He Invents His Jobs

(Editor's Note: The Abilene Reporter-News carried the following story about Victor Cornelius of Eastland in their August 20 edition):

Victor Cornelius rides an English bicycle late in the afternoon. Perhaps, it's a desert on top of a dessert. He likes his work, too.

On work days, he's among his 60 employees in downtown Eastland at his city block-long plant across from the Post Office.

His million-dollar-a-year business is the printing of restaurant menus and theatrical advertisements. Menu printing and related work make up about two-thirds of the plant's production. Payroll is more than \$300,000 annually.

"We have an unusual business," Cornelius, 63, said matter-of-factly. In 1936, with a \$150 platen press, the VC enterprise started "in our garage" in Eastland but he hesitated to reminisce.

His job printing then was devoted to "motion picture" advertisements which were attached to restaurant napkin holders.

But that was discontinued long ago, and Cornelius' wood paneled office is void of remnants of that now obsolete innovation.

Inventive Cornelius, now approaching the traditional U. S. retirement age, is still in-

venting and experimenting. His latest is the "Rediclips," a plastic clip-on-holder that sticks on menus, advertises, and holds an extra meal or dish selection or special announcement the restaurateur may want to include for a spell on his regular menu.

He received a patent on the "Rediclips" earlier this summer — two years after he had applied for the patent and three years after the utility's invention.

Millions of "Rediclips" have been sold. Currently being processed is a Bacardi Imports Wine order for 193,000 of the white plastic Rediclips, which are about half again as large as the standard paper clip. "Rediclips" are international.

Cornelius uses the silk screen process to place the usually red advertisements on the Rediclips. Bacardi will have its trade name placed on the Rediclip, as do other customers — such as dairy, soft drink and beer distributors and manufacturers. The advertising "Rediclips" then go to restaurants and cafes.

Rediclips, functioning similarly to a bobby pin, provide an advertising space for point of purchase sales.

Plastic for the "Rediclips" comes in 15-20 mile reels, and Cornelius has designed two devices to process the continuous plastic strands into the salable item. He, however, hasn't bothered to seek patents for the cutter and heat stamper.

A patent, however, is pending on a contraption called a Heat-Seal, which can place four-color decals, illustrating meals, at once onto a menu.

"Thousands of restaurants throughout the nation are using VC custom menus," reads a mailer to potential customers.

Cornelius attracts most of his customers through the mails. He does have some field representatives. Also, he said some 500 salesmen for John Sexton Co., a restaurant supplier, are part-time VC salesmen.

Included among the thousands of restaurateurs Cornelius serves are approximately 500 who have a menu for each month of the year.

VC artists design menu covers for eating establishments ranging from ultra exclusive to the almost ubiquitous chat-and-chew cafe. But most of his menus are fancy and conspicuously over-size.

Three basic techniques are used by Cornelius to print his menus: gold-stamp, offset and silk screen.

Cornelius prints advertisements for thousands of theaters nation-wide. The ads may be window posters or hand-outs illustrating a month of motion picture attractions.

Victor Cornelius Menus was Victor Cornelius Theatrical Advertising when in 1958 he purchased Osment Menus in Waco and merged his theatrical job printing with the menu venture. He prints with offset and letterpress for motion picture work. "We do our own photo-engraving," he said.

"Four color work is not any big feature with us," Cornelius volunteered. "But we do it."

Cornelius has lived in Eastland since 1918. He was born in July of 1904 in Kickapoo, Limestone County, and grew

up at Rockwood in Coleman County.

For the past six years, he and his wife, the former Inez Petit of Mississippi, have lived on the western edge of Eastland, overlooking this county seat of 3,300 people.

Just moved in next door is the Jack Germany family. Mrs. Germany is the former Catherine Cornelius, one of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius' two daughters. The other is Mrs. Charles (LaVerne) Meeks of New Orleans, La. Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius have five grandchildren.

"He's really an unusual man," Mrs. Germany said of her father. "Just always been able to think creatively, keynote of his success." To Cornelius, a problem is a challenge, she added.

Eastland County is drained by the Leon River.

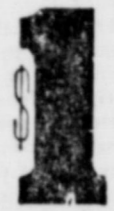

Congressman Poage Speaks For Electric Co-Op Meet

Dedication of Texas' 79 rural electric systems to "Helping Texas Grow!" was reaffirmed in Houston this week as rural electric leaders from throughout the state convened for the 27th Annual Meeting of Texas Electric Coopera-

tives, Inc., the rural electric state-wide association. Congressman W. R. "Bob" Poage, the concluding speaker of the two and one-half day conclave, noted that while rural electrification has already helped Texas and the nation grow, too few people know this. This was evident, he pointed out, in failure to obtain legislation from the Congress this year to establish a Rural Electric Credit System to assure the spiral-

ing need for financing the future holds. Urban people do not understand, he said, that food and fiber in abundance has permitted cities to grow and flourish. They don't know that rural electrification has enabled fewer and fewer farmers and ranches to produce more and more to meet the needs of all Americans. Unless adequate financing is available to finance facilities to meet the spiraling demands for

electricity in rural areas, Poage said the continuing productivity of rural areas which makes possible expansion in the cities will be hampered. Earlier, the state director of the Farmers Home Administration outlined his agency's programs for cooperating with individuals, groups, and communities in financing development of another key resource — water. L. J. Capleman of Temple reported

that as of July 1, FHA had assisted in financing the construction of 13,000 miles of main line water facilities in rural areas of Texas. Through the medium of county Technical Action Panels, of which FHA supervisors are chairmen automatically, many federal agencies counseling and assistance services are made available to rural businesses, individuals, and communities. He stressed the emphasis

being given through his agency to helping the young farmer. In the annual elections of the state-wide group, four were elected to two-year terms on the TEC board of directors, and three new officers were elected. New president is Myrl D. Head of Decatur. George Henry of Wellington was elected vice-president, and Joe Lytle of Greenville was elected secretary-treasurer. Earlier, Lytle was

elected to the TEC board with H. M. King and Chester King. These with Clifton Stephenville and W. G. Newton are the directors of the TEC. Re-elected to the TEC board is a former president and has been director since 1958.
