"Which path to take?" was the question Eastland Chamber of Commerce directors asked themselves at a meeting Thursday, as they reviewed the tabulated results of the extensive community survey reports.

A route of deliberate and thoughtful approach was taken with a special committee named to study the report in detail for future work. Chamber President J. T. Gregory named the following persons to the committee: Frank Sayre, Lewis Tiner, Wendell Siebert, M. H. Perry, R. P. Haun and Clint Bray. This group will evaluate the material and report back to the chamber's board of directors in about a week. The board will then consider the route to be taken in applying the material garnered from the survey.

Meeting for a sandwich lunch and working session at the chamber office at noon Thursday, the board also handled other business during the monthly meeting.

Retail Trades Committee Chairman Clint Bray reported on the recent Easter promotion and announced that his group will meet monthly to plan retail promotions for the city. He urged all-out participation and encouraged support for the local promotions.

Gregory announced that the Texas Forts Trails signs are up near Lake Leon. The Chamber contributed to the purchase of the signs.

A committee composed of Frank Deaton and Bray was named to work with local jewelers to consider the advisability of making "Old Rip" tie pins available in Eastland as a promotion item for the town. A wholesaler for these gold and silver items has been in contact with Mayor Deaton.

The board voted to contribute one-third (\$63.33) toward the purchase of an advertisement in the recent West Texas Chamber of Commerce publication, in cooperation with Cisco and Ranger. Over 500 persons responded.

County Pioneer Buried In Last Services Friday

Mrs. Wannie Stafford Hart, 70, died April 25 in Eastland Memorial Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Funeral was held at 2 p. m. Friday at Arrington Hamner Funeral Chapel in Eastland, with the Rev. Bill Goff, pastor of Bethel Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

Born Dec. 28, 1897 in Eastland she married H. M. Hart in November of 1923 in Ranger. She had lived at 601 South Bassett, Eastland, most of her life. She was a long-time Eastland school teacher, retiring several years ago. She joined First Baptist Church when she was 14 years old.

(Continued from Page 1) from the U.S. Civil Service Commission who wants to make sure that such retirees know exactly what to do in case of war: "In the event of an attack on the U.S. and until further notice: A Section 331.07 of Subpart A, and Subsections 831.502 (B) (1) and (2) and (C) (1) and (2) of Subpart E are suspended and B Part M-831 is added to the commission's regulations." To the uninitiated, this probably means you have permission to take cover.

EASTLANDERS SHOULD plan to attend and take part in the activities down at Gorman on Thursday, May 2, when the State Soil and Water Conservation Board comes in to determine priority for the proposed Sabanna Watershed Project, a program that is estimated to cost some two million dollars. The importance of this Watershed cannot be overemphasized for Eastland and Comanche Counties. A total of 13 major and 20 small structures are mapped, and it's essential that the Board give the project a high priority so that work can begin as soon as possible. The folks down there are having a 6:30 p. m. barbecue and the public hearing will be held at 8 p. m. at the Gorman High School. It certainly would be impressive if about 300 people from Eastland showed up at the hearing. We've all talked about the need for this Watershed for flood control and irrigation, now it's time for us to go about letting the right people know. See you there at 8?

(Continued from Page 1.) was suggested that had every individual in Eastland filled out a questionnaire, the "goods" and the "averages" would have been much higher, while the "below averages," would have been about the same. This could well be. While the chamber searches for its most expedient approach for leadership in correcting the faults of our town, perhaps all of us as individuals need to take the next logical step and survey ourselves to see if we, in our own niches, can be doing more, contributing more, and making better, in the areas where we alone have reign. Take "Pride in Homes" for example. Do we need any kind of leadership to lead us to have that kind of pride? Probably not. Or if we don't have "interest in local politics" perhaps the concern we should have is for ourselves and not our community.

These are areas in which only the individual can make progress. An interesting thing is that a lot of improvements have already been made even before the survey results are dry on paper. The clutter of some streets is disappearing, alleys are cleaner and improvements are underway in a hundred different places. The paint cans are open, and the tidying up is underway. It might have been done without a survey. It might not have been. I was an honest appraisal and the people who filled out the questionnaires, sometimes with tongue in cheek, might like to know that the results were tabulated in a combined manner, with the same frame of mind. One of the tabulators learned that his daughter thought the town needed some fresh leadership. Another was surprised to learn that one of his employees doesn't especially consider Eastland a good place to work. These are of course, isolated cases, and the general attitude throughout has been:

"Let's find out what's right about our community, and fix that which isn't."

Mail Pamphlet Spanish Edition Planned by P. O.

The Post Office Department is publishing this week a Spanish edition of its new military mail pamphlet for helping families pick the best possible service for sending letters, packages and other mail to the servicemen and women stationed overseas, Representative Omar Burleson announced today.

Correo Militar, Guia Postal Para Acelerar El Servicio will soon be available in Texas post offices with a significant number of Spanish-speaking patrons. Copies of the pamphlet are also available through the office of Representative Burleson.

The Congressman said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad. We hope this guide will also help our Spanish-speaking citizens be fully familiar with these services and use them."

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates the three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford, the speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines, to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personal messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Viet Nam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address military mail.

One of the newest military mail services is PAL. Packages up to 30 pounds in weight and 60 inches in combined length and girth now receive airlift service from a U. S. city through the overseas base in a space available basis. The family sending a 10-lb. parcel from Anson to Viet Nam, for example, will pay only \$2.75 for a package marked "PAL", while the air parcel post rate for the same package is \$6.58.

Measles Due To Become Rare In State of Texas

AUSTIN—Within the next five months measles may be a thing of the past in Texas. Authorities of two key health agencies have gone on state-wide television and radio to urge parents to have their children vaccinated against the dangerous disease which can cripple and even kill.

Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Commissioner of Health, and Dr. Sam Nixon Jr., chairman of the Texas Medical Association's Committee on Public Health, are telling Texans via TV spots that an effective vaccine is available to all children who have reached their first birthday.

June had been set earlier by Governor John Connally as the target date for measles eradication in the state.

In one of two statements made by the Health Commissioner—which will be viewed and aired on Texas stations from now through June—Dr. Peavy points out that the goal can be achieved only if parents cooperate with their private physician, local health department and the State Health Department. He says juries, health departments and further that local medical societies must continue to get involved "if this measles eradication effort is to succeed."

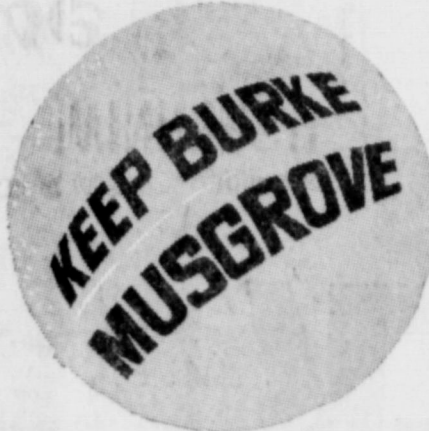
