Hymn Festival Revival Begins Tuesday at Church

The First Methodist Church of Eastland will hold a Hymn Festival Revival March 5, 6, and 7, with Bill Mann of Dallas leading. Everyone is invited to attend these services at 7:30 p. m. each night.

Mann is director of Evangelistic Music of First Methodist Church of Dallas. A native of Bessemer, Alabama, he has studied music since the age of 16. He organized and supervised a youth choir at the second largest Methodist Church in the world, First Methodist Church of Houston.

Mann joined the other recording artists of Word Records, Inc. in October of 1957. His records have met with great success due to the depth and sincere feelings of the singer himself. He is internationally known having sung in Europe on four different occasions. He appeared in West Berlin, London, Glasgow, Edinburgh, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Oslo and various points in the British Isles.

In analyzing the songs he presents, Mann thinks of them as songs that fill the need of every phase of Christian living—songs of praise, prayer, faith, and inspiration. His favorite hymn is "Blessed Assurance" and he considers it his "theme song." The lines, "This is my story, this is my song, Praising my Savior all the day long," depict Bill Mann's way of life—a life dedicated to singing for Christ.

Local's Father Buried in Gorman

Rodolphus Cleveland Boswell of Gorman, father of Mrs. Jamie Smith of Eastland, died at 6 a. m. Thursday at Lawndale Home for Senior Citizens in Gorman following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Friday in the First Methodist Church of Gorman, with the Rev. Robert Haynes, pastor of First Methodist Church of Comanche, officiating. Assisting were the Rev. Joe S. Davis of Gorman and Elder Andy Hudson of DeLeon. Burial was in DeLeon Cemetery.

Born July 31, 1888, in Salinas, Calif., he had lived in Texas 63 years. He married the former Miss Mary Caroline St. Clair in DeLeon in 1911. He taught school for 25 years in the DeLeon area and was also a carpenter. He moved to Gorman in 1951 where he was employed by Southwestern Peanut Growers Association until his retirement.

He was a member of the Gorman Methodist Church and constructed the copper steeple and baptismal font on the new church built in 1958.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Dwight and Bob Boswell, both of Fort Worth; four daughters, Mrs. Mackie Kearney of Columbus, Mrs. Mary Kirk of Gorman, Mrs. Ruth Elaine Pogue of Moriarty, New Mexico, and Mrs. Jamie Smith of Eastland; and 17 grandchildren.

Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Kirk's Eligibility Is Questioned; Hearing Set In 91st, March 7

A hearing has been called for Thursday, March 7, in 91st District Court to determine if Truman Kirk is eligible by virtue of residence, to have his name placed on the Democratic Primary Ballot in the May 4th election as a candidate for judgeship of the same court.

Frank Sparks, the retiring judge, called the hearing for 10 a. m. on March 7th in action Friday afternoon.

Kirk's opponent in the race, Earl Conner, Jr., of Eastland, filed a petition shortly after 4 p. m. Friday, asking a temporary restraining order to keep Kirk's name off the ballot.

In the petition, Conner holds that Kirk is not a qualified candidate, stating that he (Kirk) has not lived in the county two years prior to the election. Among reasons in the petition filed by Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry,

Jr., for Conner, are the holdings that Kirk voted in Taylor County (Abilene) and that he was appointed a notary public in that county last year.

Kirk's family lives in Abilene where his wife is a public school teacher, but he maintains that he is a resident of Eastland County. He is an instructor at Cisco Junior College and practices law in this county with an office in Cisco.

Mr. Conner's petition cited County Democratic Chairman A. E. Crawley and election judges as follows: Jeanette Harris, C. J. Langlitz, Calvin Brown, L. E. Clark, Odie Brightwell, A. E. Guy, G. A. Dunn, Jr., J. V. Heyser and Truman P. Kirk, defendants.

The county Democratic Executive Committee will meet on Monday, March 18, to draw for places on the ballot.

61 Get 'Pink Slips' At Cornelius Plant

"Pink slips," business's traditional bearer of the bad tidings of employee dismissal, brought surprising good news to the 61 employees of the theatrical advertising and menu printing plant of Victor Cornelius, Inc.

Each found a dreaded "pink slip" tucked in with their time card as they punched out Thursday.

However, in small print at the bottom of the card these words were printed: "All employees who receive pink cards will please advance their pay by ten cents per hour, effective this pay check, VC."

The raise with its corresponding effect on overtime pay will cost Cornelius an estimated \$17,000 per year.

A similar raise was given only six months ago on Aug. 4. At that time Cornelius's voice came over the loud speaker: "Attention, please. STOP THE PRESSES. If you don't mind, would you please add ten cents per hour to your pay."

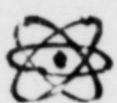
Reid Is Running For Re-Election

Lone Cedar Chef Cooked for Gen. Westmoreland But Mrs. McCary Does the Honors at Home

What would you do if you were the wife of a licensed master chef, who is a member of both the American Institute of Chefs and the American Culinary Society; who was formerly a cook for the Forrest Park Motor Hotels in the Fort Worth-Dallas area; who spent his three years of military service cooking for army generals and their guests (such as Martha Raye, Hank Snow, Senator John Tower, and the Secretary of the Army); and who is now chef of a country club?

The same thing you would do if you were the wife of a man who is totally helpless in a kitchen. You would plan, prepare, and serve his meals. Edd McCary, chef of Lone Cedar Country Club, says, "I taught my wife to cook and, just like most husbands, I never cook at home unless I just have to."

A native of May, McCary is a graduate of Rising Star High School and attended Arlington State College. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H.R. McCary of May. He received his master chef's license through the Commissary Service Company of Kansas City, Kan., and attends educational meetings twice a year in Dallas.

He and his wife, the former Laura Jean Tweed, have two sons, Martin, three and a half years old; and Clovis, twenty months old. They have bought 326 acres in the Morton Valley area and plan to move to a home there in the spring. They are now living on their farm in May.

Specialist 6 McCary was assigned to nine different generals in three years. He went to Viet Nam with Major General George Eckhardt of the Ninth Division. For a year prior to his November 1967 discharge, Edd cooked for General William Westmoreland.

The General was quite universal in his food preferences and was easily pleased, according to McCary. General Westmoreland liked Chinese food very much. Edd says, but his favorite was medium rare steak.

Edd continues, "Both the general and his wife were very interested in the members of his staff and very nice to everyone. Whenever Mrs. Westmoreland arrived in Viet Nam, she came straight to the kitchen to talk with us."

When planning menus for visiting dignitaries, McCary tried to determine the food preferred by the ranking dignitary and plan around that. He says, "Sometimes we already knew what a guest liked. For instance, I had fixed Mexican food for the Secretary of the Army while still in Washington and knew that he

liked it. Sometimes we contacted the staff of the guest. And without specific information, we often fell back on the standard broiled steak... I've never met a man who didn't like that."

The general rarely ate dessert, McCary remembers. Edd personally prefers to fix Cherry Jubilee anytime it will fit a menu. "It is probably the prettiest dessert possible," he says.

An avid fisherman, Edd has a continual fishing lease on the Lampasas River and he and his family go there whenever they can. He also likes to read and says, "It's a habit, I read nearly anything printed, from the labels on the caesup bottles to long novels. And these meals eaten at home... is Mrs. McCary a good cook? Edd laughed and didn't answer. Just like most husbands.

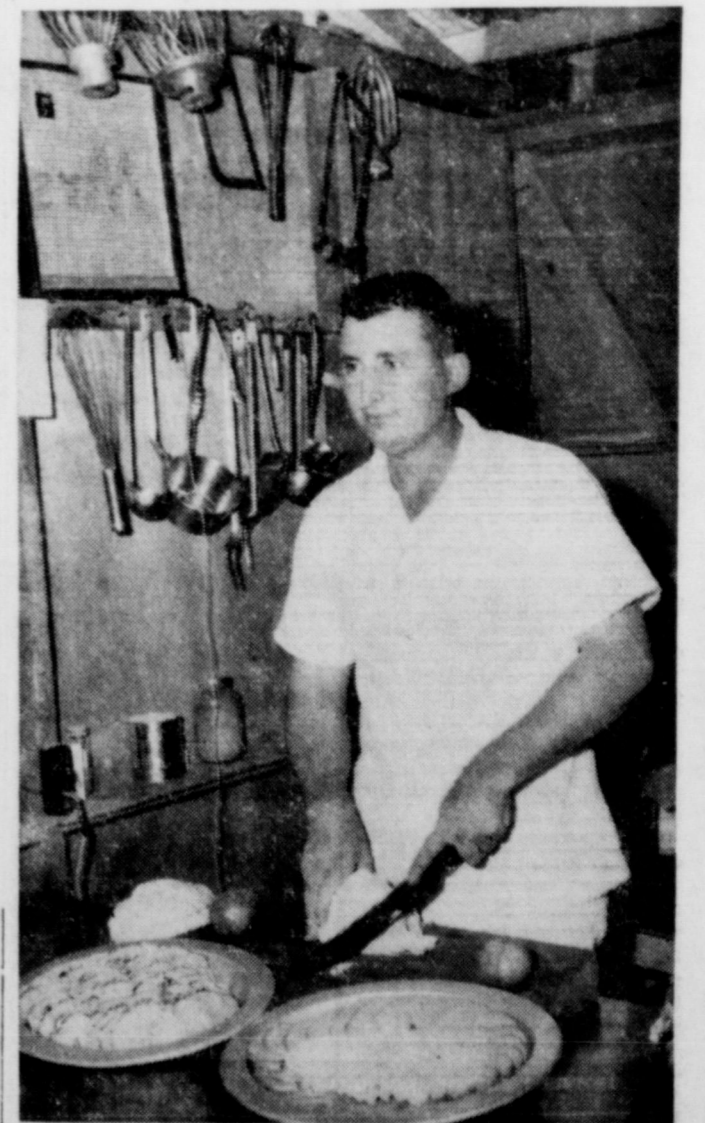

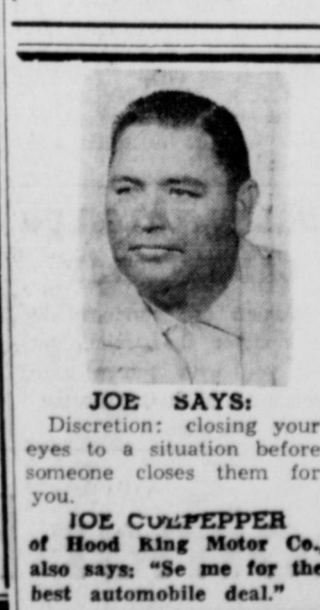

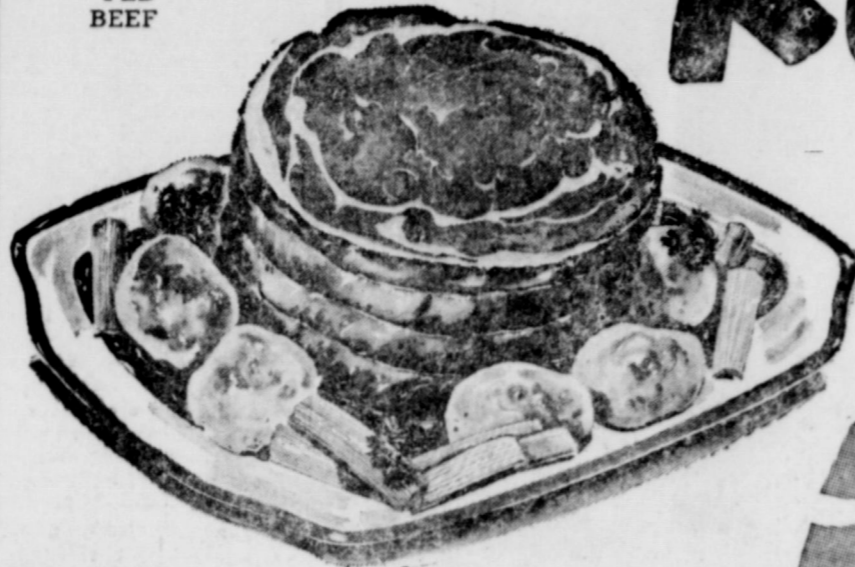
The directors and officers of the Livestock Raisers Association are giving a lot of their time and labor to improve the facilities at the show barn. These men were very discouraged last week when they discovered that some of the material which they had worked to install had been torn down and stolen.

Big plans are also being made for the Cisco Livestock Show March 8 and 9. The people of Cisco are justly proud of their livestock show.

Demand for fertilizer is high and because of wet fields have caused delays in getting plant food distributed, a real rush is expected when fields are dry enough for working. The best way to be sure that you have the right type and amount of fertilizer when you need it is to get it on order now or even perhaps better in the barn. And if you need spreader or applicator equipment, better get an order in early for its use. Once fields are dry enough to permit use of the equipment, it may be hard to come by.

If fertilizer is purchased in bags, here are a couple of storage tips. Be sure to give it room by leaving an air space between each stack of bags. Always store fertilizer in a dry place. Don't place bags on a dirt or concrete floor because they'll pick up moisture and get lumpy and caked up. It isn't a good idea to stack fertilizer more than eight bags high.

Keep fertilizer away from animals since it is food for plants and not for animals.

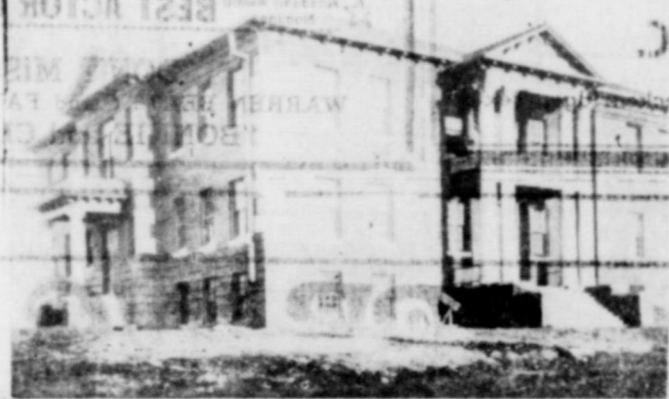

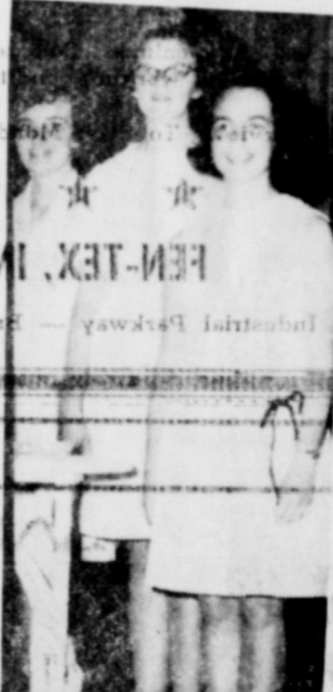

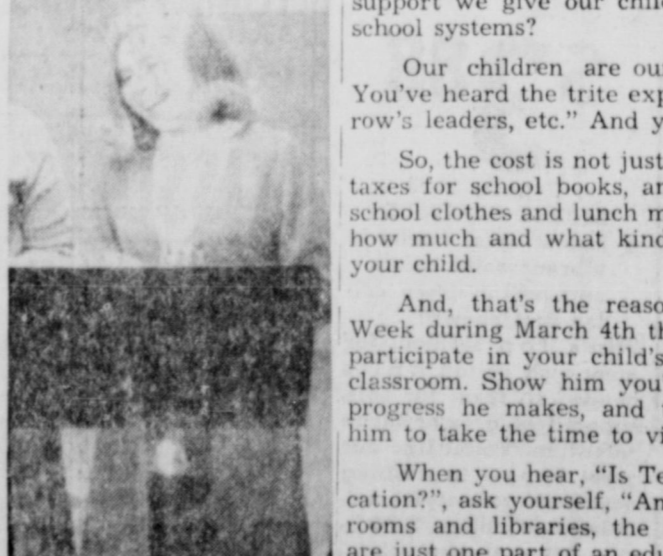

County To Send Group To Field Day at McGregor

Several Eastland County farmers and ranchers have indicated they would take part March 7 in the annual Beef Cattle Field Day at the Livestock and Forage Research Center near McGregor.

The Eastland County group will be especially interested in the following progress reports which will be made at the early weaning of calves when depleted grazing forces the cattlemen to feed. County Agricultural Agent De Gordon says scientists at the center explain that when grazing is poor the feed should be put, not into the cow for making milk, but into the calf for making beef.

The use of low-cost proteins for wintering cows with calves on native pasture. Research at McGregor shows that, at the present time, urea feed mix is more economical than feather meal and cottonseed meal. Although the animals relish the feather meal, at \$100 per ton it is too expensive.

The value of hybrid vigor which has been proved in the massive cross-breeding program at the center. Scores of different crossbreeds will be paraded in the show ring for the visitors.

Gordon says the cross-breeding research has also proved the rancher's need of purebred sires.

The morning session of the field day will begin at 9:30, with guided tours of the many cattle pens in which research is being conducted. The world's largest herd of mother cows used exclusively for research is at the center.

Master of ceremonies will be Charles E. Ball of Dallas, field editor of Farm Journal magazine. Lunch will be dutch treat, and will be catered by the Walter Jetton Corporation of Fort Worth.

The center, which is a unit in the College of Agriculture at Texas A&M University, is 3 miles south of McGregor via Highway 317 and 2 miles west via farm to market road 2671.

During 1967, the Texas Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services to 17,422 children and adults who were in need of rehabilitation services. These services are available to any disabled person who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, Mr. Wilson added.

The Easter Seal Campaign will run through Easter Sunday, April 14.

Museum Institute Is Planned By State History Committee

AUSTIN—"Because of the growing interest across Texas in the establishment and the maintenance of museums, both large and small, the Texas State Historical Survey Committee will hold their second official Texas Small Museum Institute in Fort Worth on Mar. 15 and 16."

The announcement was made by Charles R. Woodburn, of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. The Committee is the state agency that has spearheaded the development of historical museums at the local level.

The Smithsonian Institute of Washington, D. C. will again be participating in the Institute to be held at the Fort Worth Childrens Museum.

In September 1966 (at the time of the first Small Museum Institute), Texas could count 243 museums open

while another 74 were in various stages of planning. Today, this figure has increased to 275 with another 166 museums reported developing. Many of these are small museums seeking to preserve local and regional heritage.

Small museums are hampered in establishment and operation because they have no organized source of professional guidance and few publications to refer to for information.

This is the reason the Survey Committee is sponsoring this second institute which will deal with small museum needs.

All phases of museum operation will be discussed and workshop sessions using the Childrens Museum facilities (nationally recognized for its trend-setting programs and exhibits) will be held. Topics for the workshop sessions include educational programs, exhibits, natural science, astronomy accession, budgeting-financing and gift shops.

An announcement has been sent to county historical survey committees, all museums, chambers of commerce and various state agencies.

The Institute is open to all interested in museums and their workings. The registration fee is \$12.50. Those interested in attending should contact the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, P. O. Box 12276, Austin 78711, for further details.

Large Quota Is Seen For Draft

Texas draft boards next month will furnish the largest monthly quota of young men for military service in nearly two years.

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said the local boards have been called on to provide 1,948 men — most since the 2,012-man quota of November, 1966. Low point in the interim was 674 men last February.

This year's monthly quotas have been 1,165 men in February and 1,659 in January.

National call for March induction is 39,000 men. All are for the Army.

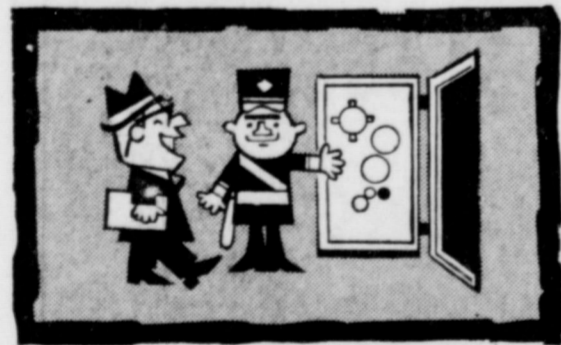
