Salary for Assistant DA Expected to Be Questioned

Indications are that there may be some opposition to the paying of an assistant county attorney a salary of \$500 a month, according to reports in the Eastland County Court house Friday. County Attorney Perry T. Brown has appointed Emory C. Walton, an Abilene assistant city attorney, assistant Eastland County attorney, and the County Commissioner's Court Monday approved the appointment and set Mr. Walton's salary at \$500 a month. The young man is expected to report Feb. 26, Mr. Brown said Friday.

However reports in the courthouse indicate that there are some who believe the amount of the salary is too high, while they do not object to the hiring of the assistant to assist with the work load of the county attorney's office. Mr. Brown and others did extensive research, primarily through the state attorney general's office, to determine the statutes on payment for assistant attorneys. In a report to the commissioners court, Mr. Brown cited the various laws which apply, and held that the \$500-a-month salary is legal.

No Sales Tax Vote For Eastland Now

No sales tax for the city of Eastland — at least not at this time. That's the official word from the City Commission which will not call a sales tax election because need doesn't justify the added revenue at this time, it is reported. Mayor Deaton reports that he was authorized by the City Commission to appoint a fact-finding committee to study Eastland's needs as to a 1 percent sales tax. At that time he appointed Robert G. Perkins, H. T. Wilson, J. Don Stoner and Clint Bray, with H. T. Wilson to serve as chairman.

This Committee made a careful study of Eastland's needs for the future, even to having a Certified Public Accountant project the City expenditures five years into the future, and allowing for normal rises in prices, wages, etc. It was the Committee's opinion that "the projected budget would indicate a surplus sufficient for the normal purchase of fixed assets without creating a deficit, and indicates that the additional revenues from a sales tax are not presently needed."

The Mayor said "We (the Commission) hope that Eastland never will need to vote in a sales tax, but if it should, they would not hesitate to reconsider the matter". The Mayor said he and the Commission want to take this opportunity to express their appreciation to the members of this Committee for their work and for the way their report was presented, and, to the citizens of Eastland for their fine patient cooperation in years past that lead to a debt free city.

Both the City of Cisco and the City of Ranger have recently voted for the one-cent sales tax in those towns.

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years. The coating of ice at that time became so great that the extra weight caused severe damage to trees, power lines, and utility poles. However, the beneficial effects of normal snowfall, acting as a cover for young crops, and sleet and ice greatly outweigh the usual damage. Fresh water from streams fed by melting snow and ice in watershed areas finds its way to such places as Lake Leon, Eastland Lake, Ringling Lake and numerous stock tanks throughout the area.

Some of the "old timers" will tell you that winters are... "not what they used to be." Winters are getting colder and these chilly mornings you might think so. History shows that in the days of the Roman Empire, the Tiber River froze solid. And "Frost Fairs" were held each year on the River Thames, adjacent to London, England. On Feb. 3, 1814, a whole sheep was roasted on the ice of the Thames, without melting through the ice. Today, one couldn't roast as much as a squab on any of the major rivers of the Western Hemisphere. Reference books will show that in pre-historic time the weather on earth was so cold that great ice areas not only covered all of Canada, but extended as far south as St. Louis, and some of this ice was one half mile thick.

So, perhaps we should be thankful for our type of winter, and as February draws to a close in the coming weeks, you can expect to see more windy days, with the wind prevailing from the southwest.

Normal yearly rainfall for our part of Texas varies from 21 to 27 inches, and the month of January produced a good percentage of this, ten and eight-tenths inches.

This was truly unusual, however, and was caused by a cold front that passed through Eastland County on the night of Wednesday, Jan. 17, setting off thunderstorms that lasted until about 5:30 a. m. on the 18th. The front stalled across Central Texas and the warm, moist air from the Gulf of Mexico overrode it, causing drizzle and intermittent heavy rains that lasted until Tuesday, Jan. 23rd. This spell alone dropped eight and three tenths.

Perhaps nature will be kind to us, though, and not permit the flowers and fruit trees to blossom prematurely, for there is still a chance of freezing weather for some time to come.

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More Money Asked for Airport Development

The City of Ranger's Airport could benefit from a proposed \$1 million state aid program to build and develop airports in towns under 50,000 population, it has been announced.

Ranger is one of 64 towns in Texas which has formal applications pending before the Texas Aeronautics Commission. The proposal for the \$1 million was made by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, who called the legislative budgeted \$500,000 "insignificant."

There are at least 64 towns in Texas that are eager and ready to build airports or make their facilities adequate and only the lack of money was held back for the projects," Smith said.

Brownwood and Brady are other area towns which have applications pending. The Lieutenant Governor said an accelerated program of \$1,000,000 for the year 1968-69 would not cost the taxpayers "one thin dime."

"The funds used for the development of aviation and aviation facilities come from unclaimed refunds on aviation fuel."

"The amount of these unclaimed refunds varies from month to month, but will

average out to around \$50,000 a month."

"Right now, there is a surplus of \$450,000 in the unclaimed refunds funds, and between now and Sept. 1, 1968, the start of the new fiscal year, another \$400,000 surplus, it is anticipated will be in the fund and by the end of Sept. 1969, the full \$1,000,000 will be available for appropriation to the proposed program."

Smith said another half a million dollar million appropriation would be "entirely inadequate" and that he would personally urge and campaign for doubling this amount.

"We are at the cross-roads of building an air transportation system in this state and unless we speed up now we will never get an adequate system because applications for funds will increase not decrease as more and more towns become aware of the importance of an airport in attracting and keeping industry and tourists."

"The air age is here to stay. We must meet the challenge headon."

Smith said State aid to build airports was not by any imag-

ination a "give away program."

"In the first place it is the people who fly who buy aviation fuel" he pointed out.

"In the second place the airport aid program is a mutual assistance program. The State gives a helping hand to towns that do not have the resources to raise sufficient money locally to obtain a grant from the Federal Aviation Administration which requires half the cost of a project be paid for with local and State funds. Without State help many towns will never be in a financial position to build an airport."

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OPEN LETTER TO MY OPPONENTS AND THE VOTERS OF EASTLAND COUNTY

Dear Friends,

It has come to my attention that my residence eligibility as a candidate for District Judge, 91st District Court, is being questioned. I sincerely feel that I am a legally qualified candidate for the 91st District Court of Eastland County. However, because of questions being raised by my opponents I have (about one month ago) contacted my opponent in the race and suggested to him that if he felt he had any reason to contest my qualifications, that I would be willing (at that time, middle of January 1968) to work out an agreed statement of facts and submit the questions directly to the Supreme Court of Texas. In this way it would be possible for us to get a final decision from the Supreme Court of Texas prior to either of us spending any money in the race.

To date, I know of no efforts by my opponent to contact me in trying to find a fair answer to any questions he may have. And since the time of my suggestions I have made several expenditures in behalf of my candidacy and I have a bill for \$12.33 from our County Democratic Executive Committee for Election. Filing fees which is due and payable by Feb. 24, 1968.

Today, I received word from what I consider reliable sources that my opponents have stated that they plan to wait and let me get my feet wet" by paying my filing fees etc. before they plan to contest me, and

Second, that they plan to file their charges in Judge Sparks Court, where they feel they can be more assured of a favorable decision.

It is my opinion that any contest in this matter will have to be finally decided by the Supreme Court and that it is not necessary that there be a fact issue since all the necessary facts can be easily determined.

I therefore challenge my opponent to put his candidacy on the line to rise or fall on this issue:

First, if the Supreme Court determines that I am not qualified, then, of course, I will be out of the race; but second, if the Supreme Court agrees that I am qualified, then I would expect Mr. Earl Conner to withdraw from the race.

If my opponent feels that he is so sure of his ground and that he really has a case against me, then I challenge him to accept this proposition. And I can assure him that I (and my lawyers who I have already retained to work with me) will make every effort to get an early answer from the
