School Tax Rate Is Increased for 1967

The state assessment made against the Eastland District will be increased next year by \$5,656.00, an increase over which the local district has no control. The local assessment against the Eastland District has increased from \$19,012 in 1955 to \$40,379 in 1967, an increase of over \$21,000 in just a little more than ten years.

Of the total tax of \$1.75, the maintenance operating fund will receive \$1.25 and the sinking fund will receive .50. Since the construction of the new elementary school, high school gymnasium and shop, .55 of the total tax fund has been allocated to the sinking fund to service the building bonds, and this rate has been more than sufficient.

Under the 1967 schedule, .05 of the previous debt service rate of .55 is being transferred to the maintenance fund along with the additional .20 increase to make the total maintenance rate tax \$1.25.

Enrollment Is Near '66 Total

Preliminary tabulations indicate that enrollment in Eastland Public Schools will be about the same, or a little below last year level, Supt. Wendell Siebert has announced.

Early registration indicates that the total will be somewhere in the neighborhood of 706 - 14 students less than last year, but with room for changes as school opens Sept. 1.

A total of 245 high school students were pre-registered at the close of last term and this figure will probably change.

Monday a total of 461 students were registered in grades one through eight, and these figures are almost certain to be changed, the superintendent said.

By grades, the registration went like this:

3 KILLED, 2 INJURED IN CRASH

Two women and a man lost their lives and a woman and a man suffered painful injuries Wednesday morning in a three vehicle accident five miles south of Cisco on Highway 183.

The three dead people had not been positively identified at 2 p. m. Wednesday. Their bodies were at the Rust Funeral Home in Cisco. Papers in the man's pocket and in a purse belonging to one of the women indicated that they were from Vera, Texas.

The mishap occurred about 10:15 a. m. Two cars were demolished, and a Chaney Butane Company (of Cisco) truck turned upside down beside the highway. Butane gas spilled out for several hours, making dangerous travel conditions in the area.

Injured were Mrs. Truly Clark, 22, who lives south of Cisco, who was in one of the cars, and R. E. Blalock of 309 West 7th Street, Cisco, who was driving the butane truck. Mrs. Clark was in Graham Hospital, Cisco, and Mr. Blalock was in Eastland Memorial Hospital. Both had cuts and bruises and were undergoing tests.

The three dead people were in a Chevrolet sedan. Wreckers had to be called to free the body of one woman from the car, which was a mass of mangled metal.

Highway Patrolman Sgt. Roger W. Sosebee was in charge of investigating the mishap.

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Plans Are Formulating For Annual Peanut Bowl

The least hint of fall is enough to set Eastland Countians thinking about Peanut Bowl time.

And the recent low temperatures (down to the 60s, and Tuesday morning's light shower) are reason enough to consider the Peanut Festival Upcoming.

And as usual, one finds that the sponsoring Eastland Jaycees are busy as ever, making plans and setting the stage for their annual spectacle.

Date for the celebration that pays homage to the important peanut industry in the county is Sept. 23, according to Special Events Chairman Bill Halden. Highlight of the day will be the traditional grid-iron crash between the Cisco Junior College Wranglers and the Ranger Junior College Rangers. Both teams are "home folks" and the rivalry is fierce.

Dale Bakker is president of the Eastland Jaycees. The game is held in Eastland's Maverick's Stadium and pre-game festivities include a beauty pageant at which a Miss Peanut Bowl will be picked and a gigantic parade through the streets of Eastland.

Already set for appearance as special events are the 328th Army Band from Fort Wolters at Mineral Wells, with a special color guard coming from Dyess AFB at Abilene, and a special appearance of the famous Owens County Sausage display of eight Belgian horses and converted Barnum and Bailey circus wagon which will be on display and in the parade.

The matched team of draft horses' combined weight is just some 400 pounds short of ten tons, Holden reports, with the "smallest" in the team standing 18 hands high and weighing 2,400 pounds each. The big ones stand 22 hands and weight 2,700 pounds each, he said.

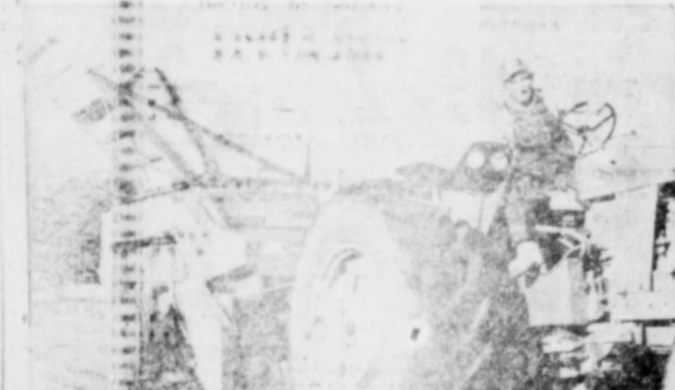
One-Big-Drive-for-All' UF Plan Is Gaining Supporters, Enthusiasm

All the students have passed the 30-hour classroom part that took 20 days, according to Principal James Childress.

Following the classroom portion, they had to complete six hours of time in observing from the back seat and six hours actual driving under the wheel. Instructors for the course were Coach Charlie Smith and Coach Dewitt Jones.

Two automobiles were used for the driving part of the program. Actual driving tests were administered by State Police.

A \$25 tuition fee was charged for those enrolling in the course with most of this going for salary of the teachers. Part went to pay for gasoline used and part for dual controls for one car. At this time, the Driver Account has a balance of \$57 in it but this will be paid out for insurance on the car.

This is the last class to finish under the old law which expires August 28. After that only those above 16 years of age can enroll in the course which nearly eliminates the course in Ranger High School for two years.

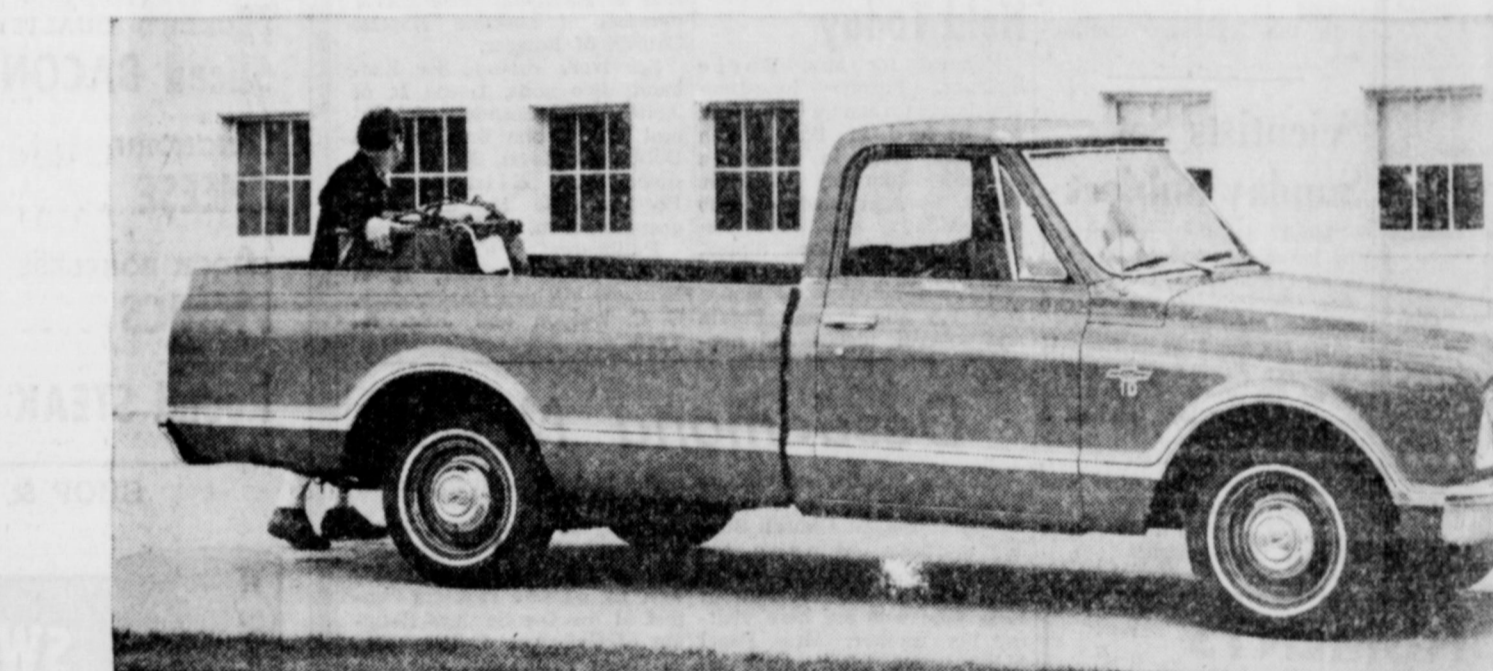

For calorie conscious guests make Celery-Olive Slimmer's Dip. Only 12 calories per tablespoon. Mix 2 cups creamy cottage cheese, 1/2 cup finely chopped celery, 1/2 cup finely chopped olives, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Chill until serving time. Makes 2 1/2 cups.

Three Cheese Dip

Three Cheese Dip is cooked ahead and served cold. Place in a saucepan 2 cups shredded sharp natural American cheese, 3 ounces cream cheese, 3 ounces blue cheese, and 2 tablespoons cream. Melt cheeses over very low flame or over hot water. Add 4 ounces finely chopped flame. Stir in 1/4 to 1/2 cup fruit juice, enough to give "dipping" consistency. Pour into glass jar and chill overnight. Let stand at room temperature a few minutes before serving. Makes about 2 cups.

Nutty Fruit Dunk

Nuts are an "extra" in Nutty Fruit Dunk. Combine 1 cup creamed cottage cheese, 1 can (8-ounce) applesauce, and 1/4 cup chopped salted almonds. Chill until serving time. Makes about 1 1/2 cups.

Shrimp Dip

Shrimp Dip brings a touch of the sea to party menus. Drain and break into small pieces 1 can (4 1/2-ounce) shrimp (two-thirds cup fresh cooked shrimp may be used). Blend 1/4 cup chili sauce, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish, and a dash of liquid red pepper. Fold in 1 cup sour cream. Add shrimp. Cover and chill until serving time. Makes about 2 cups.

**Texas Tortoise,
Horned Lizards
Now Protected**

AUSTIN—The slow moving Texas tortoise and the bizarre horned frog or toad are now protected from commercial exploitation by laws passed by the 60th Legislature, according to Howard Lee, director of programs for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Senate Bill 386 protects only the Gopherus berlandieri or Texas tortoise. The Texas tortoise, found only in South Texas and Northern Mexico, is completely harmless and eats fruits from the common cactus and young plants.

Lee said commercial exploitation of the land tortoise is rapidly depleting the population from South Texas and Northeastern Mexico. He said the slow reproduction rate of the tortoise could lead to its extinction and could possibly upset the ecological balance of the limited area where it is found.

Senate Bill 331 protects all species of the horned toad or frog, which is neither a toad or a frog but a lizard and member of the same family as the Iguana found in Mexico and Central America.

A handbook of lizards indicates there are some 13 species in the United States with three found in Texas. The book lists wide variances in the species. Some are egg layers while others are live bearers. Some squirt blood from their eyes which ruin a white shirt or a pair of khaki trousers, Lee said.

"Otherwise, they are harmless—except to the ant populations," he said.

Homemakers Hints

By JANET MEYERS
Home Demonstration Agent

What's new to wear? Disposable dresses... leather dresses... vinyl bikinis... garments of "chameleon cloth" that can be given a second set of colors when the owner gets tired of the first set of colors.

Just as exciting are the new things being done to those long time favorites, cotton and wool. A new treatment to cotton that we will be seeing more of is "slack mercerization" that gives stretch to cotton fabrics.

This method has been adapted by industry for sportswear, lounging apparel and other stretch clothing. Too, a new process for treating wool, called "Wur-lax," is used by industry to make woven and knit wool garments that can be machine washed without shrinking or matting. A USDA developed process for tanning leather makes it possible to launder leather garments without affecting

their softness and beauty and opens up many new possibilities for the use of leather in wearing apparel. Now under development are light-weight, wool-cotton blends that resist shrinkage and wrinkles and hold a crease. They are wash-and-wear, and in tests, shirts laundered and tumbled-dried more than a dozen times looked as smoothly pressed as when new. Do you enjoy sewing? If

you do, you might enjoy entering the "Make-It-With-Wool" contest. This annual contest is open to girls as well as adults. The style show will be held in Denton this year on Dec. 3. 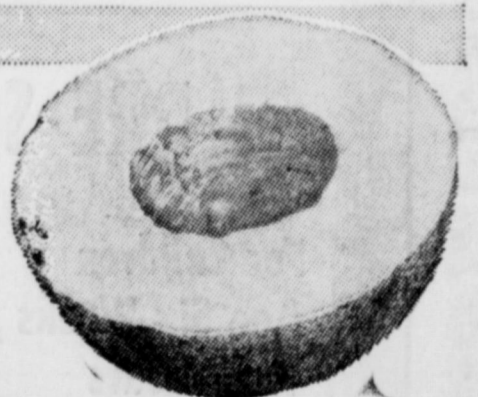
