HENRY PARSONS IS TRUSTEE CANDIDATE

Henry Parsons filed Friday as a candidate for the Eastland school board, place two. Parsons is the fourth candidate for the board and the second for place two. Deadline for filing is March 6.

Others are Winston Bole, place one; Robert G. (Bob) Perkins, place two; and Virgil T. Seaberry, Jr., place three.

Terms of Dr. B. B. Alexander, Willard Griffin and Seaberry expire this year. Alexander and Griffin have announced that they will not seek re-election.

The school board recently adopted the place system under terms allowed in a new Texas law.

Parsons is a native of Eastland and graduate of Eastland High School, Ranger Junior College and attended Hardin-Simmons University. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Parsons. He and his wife, the former Neta Fay Massengale, have two sons, Michael and Mark.

In this time of "typical images", the American woman is usually described as selfish, aimless, bored, and complaining.

She is pictured as going from criticism to gossip, from useless activity to forced service, always in untidy clothing and hair rollers.

Eastland has an excellent way to show that typical image is not true: the 1968 Telegram Valentine, Mrs. Otis (Katie C.) Knox Sr.

Mrs. Knox moved to Eastland in 1920, when her parents, Mr. and Mrs. James K. Arnold opened the Arnold and Robertson Lumber Yard on the corner of Conneliee and Commerce. It was a 13th yearer yard in Eastland, Katie remembers.

Since that time, Katie has presented a picture to Eastland residents: the image of a Christian daughter, wife, mother, and, recently widow.

Always beautifully groomed, Mrs. Knox is also cheerful. Her mother, Mrs. Mattie Ar-

nold, may be ill at home, or at the local hospital. Mrs. Knox may be tired, rushed. But fellow shoppers, or fellow church members (at the Church of Christ) do not hear of troubles, overwork, or sadness. Mrs. Knox greets a neighbor with a smile and a word of cheer.

She says, "There is so little we can do to carry out Christ's wish that we help one another. To cheer is a way of helping, though, you see. So I try to offer a word of praise or encouragement to others."

Mrs. Knox has many hobbies. She likes to read and to study the Bible. She likes music, especially semi-classical, and plays the piano "sometimes three and four hours at a time," she says. Animals have a large part in her heart, and in her life. A favorite gift from her late husband was a bulldog which was a family pet for 14 years. She has seven dogs now, simply because she cannot turn away a puppy needing a good home. She had

three kittens which did not get along with the dogs, so Mrs. Knox moved the kittens to her home in Olden. Twice a day, she drives there to feed them; cold weather and icy highways do not stop her.

When Katie was a child, she liked pretty clothes, especially hats. She didn't even carry a doll out until she fixed a hat on its head. Today, hats are still favorites with her. She has 75 summer hats ready for the months ahead.

Mrs. Knox has a son, Otis Jr., of Little Rock, Ark.; and a daughter, Mrs. Martin Jean Morton of Fort Worth.

For many years, Katie and her husband dreamed of moving to Olden. They bought land. They rebuilt a house there. Then, in the midst of her happy work, Otis died.

And, in the midst of her sorrow, Katie picked up the dreams and the work, believing that dignified "beginning again" is also a witness that Christ is able to help, she remained well-groomed, cheerful, encouraging.

The home in Olden is almost ready; Mrs. Knox is packed to move. She says, "I prayed earnestly before making the decision. Once I made it, I found strength to carry it out."

The impact that Mrs. Knox's silent witnessing had on people was revealed during the Christmas season. Cards flooded her home: cards with a note added: "Thank you for the example you set for others." "Just to say it's wonderful the way you accept life." "Just to let you know we think..."

And Mrs. Knox's sincerity and humility were shown, also: she is still surprised about the card, two months later.—By MARIE BONEY.

The Eastland Mavericks nailed down a third place slot in District 7-AA Friday night by defeating Hamilton, 66-62, and set themselves up as a contender in the championship circle.

Comanche beat Cisco and Granbury rolled over Clyde so those two teams are still tied for first place. Eastland plays Comanche in the local gym next Friday night in a make-up duel which will be the last cage action of the year for the locals and a

challenge for the championship — hopeful Indians.

Hamilton and Eastland had been tied for third place, but the Maverick win in the local gym Friday night pushed Eastland ahead.

Gary Spradling scored 31 points for high honors, while Jerry Newman had 22 for the victors.

Granbury beat Clyde, 100-71, and Comanche tripped Cisco, 66-51.

The Mavericks will host the Abilene Christian College High School boys in Eastland Tuesday night in a non-conference game. There will be boys' action only.

Hamilton won the girls game here, 58-25.

John Davis, 14, of Bowie, nephew of Dr. J. O. Jolly Jr., was killed Tuesday night in a head-on collision on Texas Highway 175, south of Nocona while returning home from a basketball game there.

Funeral services were Thursday afternoon in the First Baptist Church in Bowie, with burial in Elmwood Cemetery there.

Five persons were killed in the two-car accident. Two other teenage boys were traveling with Davis and a father and son were in the other vehicle.

PILOT RECEIVES CONCUSSION AS CHOPPER CRASHES HERE

A U. S. Army helicopter pilot from Fort Wolters, crashed his TH-55 helicopter on the A. J. Rogers Ranch about 12 miles southeast of Ranger Friday morning about 11:30.

Major Louis J. Rochat, public information officer at Fort Wolters, said the flier was on a routine training mission when the accident occurred.

Major Rochat credited Buddy Rogers, the first to arrive

on the scene, with helping the pilot from the wreckage and possibly saving him from more extensive injuries.

The pilot was treated at Ranger General Hospital and then moved to Beach Army Hospital at Mineral Wells. Spokesmen here said he was suffering from a minor concussion and facial lacerations.

The pilot was on an advanced training mission and was damaged in the crash and flying one of the three Huey helicopters of that type stationed at Wolters. The craft was reported to be extensively damaged in the crash and an investigation is under way to determine the cause of the accident.

The name of the pilot was withheld by Wolters officials pending the notification of relatives.

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
