Gordon Woods Dies; Final Rites Planned Sunday

Funeral services for Gordon Woods, well known Eastland County rancher, will be held at 3 p. m. Sunday at the Church of Christ in Eastland with Norman Murphy, East 14th St. Church of Christ Cisco minister, officiating, assisted by James Gaston, Ranger minister.

Mr. Woods, 47, died at 11:45 a. m. Friday in a Quanah hospital. He suffered an apparent heart attack in a Quanah restaurant and was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital. He was en route to Oklahoma where he planned to look after interests.

Mr. Woods was born Nov. 14, 1920, in Ranger and had lived at his ranch at Route 3, Cisco, for the past 22 years. He had been a rancher in Eastland County all of his adult life. He also had extensive land holdings in Nevada.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Woods was married Sept. 18, 1946, to Johnnie Fox in Ranger.

Surviving are his wife of the home; two daughters, Mrs. Dan Massengill of El Dorado, Okla., and Vicky Dale Woods of the home; two sisters, Mrs. Bill Bradshaw of Ranger and Mrs. Wayne Nugent of Pocatello, Idaho; one brother, Melvin E. Woods, of San Diego, Calif.; his mother, Mrs. Azalea Woods, of Ranger; and a number of aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews.

Burial will be in the Pioneer Cemetery in Ranger with the Arrington Hamner Funeral Home of Eastland in charge of arrangements.

Funeral services for Danny Phipps, 23-year old former Ciscoan whose body was recovered Thursday from the waters of a creek near Possum Kingdom Lake, were held at 1 p. m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Grafard.

Burial will be at 4 p. m. Saturday in Decatur Cemetery. The Rev. Loren Cranford, Grafard Baptist minister, will officiate.

Danny, who was a football star at Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. V. Phipps of Grafard, also formerly of Cisco. He had been the object of a search since his wrecked auto was found near the Rock Creek bridge on March 3.

Born Sept. 7, 1944, in Odessa, Danny was a member of the First Baptist Church at Breckenridge.

Surviving are his parents of Grafard; two sisters, Brenda and Margaret Phipps, both of Grafard; three brothers, Vernon Phipps, of Brazoria, G. A. Phipps of C. J. C., and James Phipps of Grafard.

Jury Trial Set Monday; Liquor And Racing Propositions Put On Ballot

A final decision is expected in Truman P. Kirk's court battle for a place on the Eastland County Democratic Primary election ballot before printing presses begin rolling, according to information Friday.

County Democratic Committee Chairman A. E. Crowley reported that printing can be delayed until April 12 to await the outcome of a jury trial that has been scheduled for 9 a. m. Monday, April 1, in 91st District Court in Eastland. This would allow ballot printing before the beginning of absentee voting 20 days before the May 4th election.

At the same time, Mr. Crowley announced that the county committee has re-considered an earlier decision and will permit advisory propositions to go on the ballot, including liquor-by-the-drink and horse racing. Most counties will include these two measures on their ballots to permit people to express an unofficial opinion.

Judge Temple Driver of Wichita Falls has been named to serve on the bench of the 91st District Court in Eastland when the case of Truman P. Kirk, seeking to have his name in the Democratic Primary ballot as a candidate for the judgeship, goes to trial at 9 a. m. Monday.

The case was ordered to be tried by a jury by the Texas Supreme Court in a hearing last Wednesday in Austin. Judge Driver was assigned to 91st bench due to the illness of Judge Frank Sparks of the Eastland court.

The Supreme Court acted after Judge E. H. Griffin of Olney, sitting in for Judge Sparks, issued a temporary injunction sought by Earl Conner, Jr., also a candidate for the 91st bench, to keep his opponent's name off the ballot, alleging that Kirk was not qualified by reasons of legal residence.

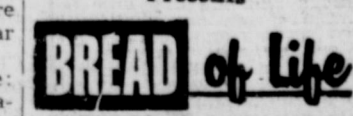

Jury Trial Set Monday On Kirk's Eligibility

The action of the court followed arguments by Bryan Bradbury in behalf of Mr. Kirk and Virgil Seaberry for Earl Conner, Jr., who had challenged the eligibility of his opponent by reasons of residence.

The high court said that if Judge Sparks was unable to hear the case, as he has been ill for some time, he should request the assignment of another judge, either by the president judge, either by the president judge of the administrative district - Judge Louis Holland of Montague - or the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

Judge Sparks reported that he was requesting Judge Holland to assign a replacement as he was still ill.

Mr. Kirk deposited money for jury fees with the 91st court when he prepared his brief to appeal the decision.

The high court was told Wednesday that the question of whether Kirk should be allowed on the May 4 Primary ballot for 91 District Court Judge is a "mixed question of law and fact."

Judge Griffin issued a temporary injunction to keep the Eastland County Democratic Committee from listing Kirk on the ballot, at the request of Earl Conner, Jr., the other Democratic candidate for the judgeship.

Bradbury said that Kirk met with Conner in January when he filed and asked that, if Conner planned to contest his candidacy, the matter be taken into court then so the question could be disposed of without the pressure of time. However, Bradbury said, Conner refused and waited six weeks to ask for the injunction.

Conner maintains that Kirk is not eligible to run for the office because he is a resident of Abilene, where his wife is now living, and not Cisco, where Kirk maintains a law office and teaches at Cisco Junior College.

A temporary injunction is not a substitute for a full dress trial on the merits, Bradbury argued, because one has to have only a "minimum of proof" and show probable injury to himself to get a temporary injunction.

"Many things" were permitted on the hearing on the injunction which would not be permitted in a trial, he said,

adding that Kirk had more witnesses than he did in a trial. "I don't know who's body knows, but I know it's a trial," he said. "He said there's time for a trial, ballots can wait until April 10 or 11, balloting being April 12."

Mr. Seaberry, attorney for Kirk, maintained that the evidence would be presented in the hearing on the injunction. However, he admitted to the court that if Kirk would be allowed on the ballot, Seaberry also stated that a jury trial was proper because the date is a "statute," a matter of interfering with process.

Best Sight Of All For Reporter In Hawaii Was A Guy Named Joe

There are those who measure the distance from Texas to Hawaii in miles. And then there are those—wives who have gone to Hawaii to meet their husbands—TAKING R and R leave from Viet Nam—who measure the distance in memories.

I was met in Hawaii by Mrs. James Young, a friend from school days in Cisco. The former Jody Elston, she is the granddaughter of Mrs. L. A. White of Cisco. Jody and her husband, who is stationed at Schofield Barracks,

have been in Hawaii for a year and were very helpful in planning a sight-seeing schedule. We couldn't have missed the pineapple fields anyway; they are everywhere and can be smelled from quite a distance. Sugar cane also grows everywhere.

High on a cliff overlooking the treacherous waves and undercurrents on the northern side of the island is the home of James Michener, author of the best selling book, "Hawaii." This, incidentally, is the location of Wiamea Bay, where people standing on the beach have been swept to death in the sea by sudden high waves.

A water buffalo—honest, there was a water buffalo in Hawaii; I saw it and even had my picture made beside it—belonged to an old Japanese couple. The couple ran a miniature fruit stand beside the road, selling bananas, and mountain apples. These apples smelled like flowers and tasted like pears.

Except for the water buffalo, the least expected sight was one which would make any Texan feel at home: mesquite trees and cactus plants covering the side of a mountain.

Driving up a military road from Schofield Barracks to the summit of Kolekole Pass, we saw where the Japanese planes flew through the mountains Dec. 7, 1941.

Makaha Beach, site of the International Surfing Meets, was the next stop. Although it is more beautiful than the world-famous Waikiki Beach, there was none of the glamour and excitement at Makaha as there was in the Waikiki Area.

All of this sight-seeing was accomplished in one day, which also included trips to the Polynesian Cultural Center, the Mormon Temple, the "blowhole" and Chittaman's Hat Island.

All of the Waikiki Area of Honolulu was interesting. Every type of restaurant—Polynesian, German, Oriental, or a plain old Dairy Queen—was located there. People of every age, race, and color were dressed in anything from formal attire to mu-muus and barefeet. They all had one thing in common though—there were smiles on their faces and they were having a good time.

The islanders say that a R and R couple can't be missed—they always have a special glow about them. The merchants have provided almost every service and product at a reduced rate to R and R couples.

Even entertainment is provided at a discount. A famous Hawaiian entertainer, Don Ho, is a favorite with visitors. His show was presented in honor of all the boys from Viet Nam and their wives. At the end of his show he led us all in singing "God Bless America."

Another "famous" person we saw entertain was the boy who played Friday on "Adventures in Paradise" a TV series which starred Gardner MacKay. He was a guest of another entertainer who could sing anything from Hawaiian War Chants to country and western music.

There were so many more things to see: so many memories to crowd into such a short span of time—special memories of walking down the beach at sunset, laughing at little things, mostly just being together. I saw many things that were very beautiful and unusual, but the most wonderful sight? Staff Sergeant Joe Martin, native of Eastland County, graduate of Cisco High School, American soldier now stationed at Tuy Hoa in Viet Nam—and my husband.

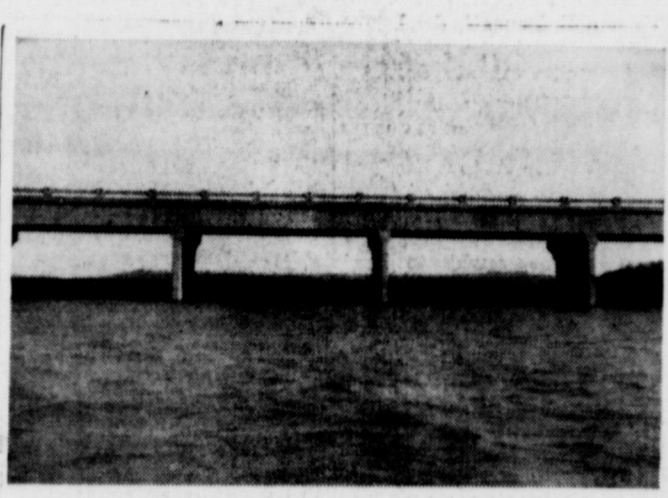

PLANS UNDERWAY FOR BIG EASTER PAGEANT

Final preparations will begin this week for the annual Kendrick Easter Pageant to be presented at 3:30 a.m. Sunday, April 14, at the Kendrick Amphitheater on Highway 80 midway between Cisco and Eastland.

The cast of more than 100 persons from throughout this region will portray the entire life of Christ from birth through the resurrection in a total of 60 scenes. The amphitheater is a complex of 12 separate stages and buildings spreading 360 feet. The stages are finished in crystal white stone and include the running River of Jordan, the Sea of Galilee, and the Mount Calvary.

A real live camel, borrowed from the Fort Worth Zoo, has arrived at Kendrick Farm and will take part in rehearsals. Other animals will be a grey donkey for the Mother Mary, a white donkey for the triumphant march of Jesus, horses drawing chariots, mounted guards of Herod, sheep for the Shepherds in the Field, and animals for the Manger scene.

The script, as in the past pageants, was taken word for word from the Bible and arranged into pageant scenes by the Kendrick family, well known throughout this region for their quartet singing.

Improvements have been made during the past year on the Kendrick Amphitheater, including a new building enclosing lighting equipment, a better concession facilities and additional space for auto parking.

"We can accommodate 10,000 cars and 100,000 people," said J. H. Kendrick. "Just bring a blanket to sit on and stay warm in. There is no admission charge, and parking is free."

The annual pageant has grown in interest each year and many thousands of people are expected again this Easter morning from 3:30 until sun rise.

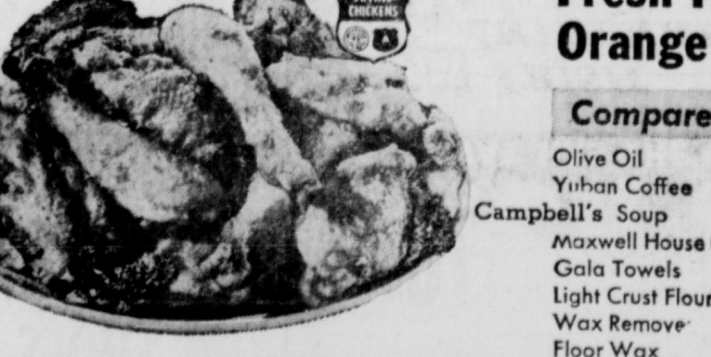
