Geo. Wallace Backers Meet, Organize Here

The Eastland County Convention of the American Political Party met at the Ranch and Farm Service Building in Eastland Tuesday night to organize and plan strategy in support of the George C. Wallace Campaign for President of the United States in 1968.

The presiding officer was Charles L. Hethcoat, Jr., Mineral Wells, district chairman of a nine-county area.

A taped speech by Henry Bucklew of Mississippi was enthusiastically received by the some 30 people present, and there was a question and answer period of discussion.

Gordon Clark of Eastland was named county chairman and Mr. and Mrs. Richard Rossander, also of Eastland, accepted the responsibility of secretary and treasurer of the organization. Forty dollars was collected to promote the distribution of campaign literature locally. Four from Cisco attended.

The position of the party appears to be extreme right wing conservative, a spokesman said, and issues touched on were the Vietnam war, registration of guns, Supreme Court authority, sacredness of property rights and law enforcement in America.

It was pointed out that Texas voters may legally vote for the person of their choice in November regardless of their party pledge in the May elections. A strong statement was also made that the election of Wallace did not require a majority of all the votes cast, but just more votes than any other single candidate receives.

Future political activities of the party include a \$25 a plate fund-raising dinner in Houston Aug. 6 when Candidate Wallace will speak; an area dinner at \$6 a plate at the Baker Hotel in Mineral Wells on Aug. 10; and the American Party State Convention to be held in Austin on Sept. 17.

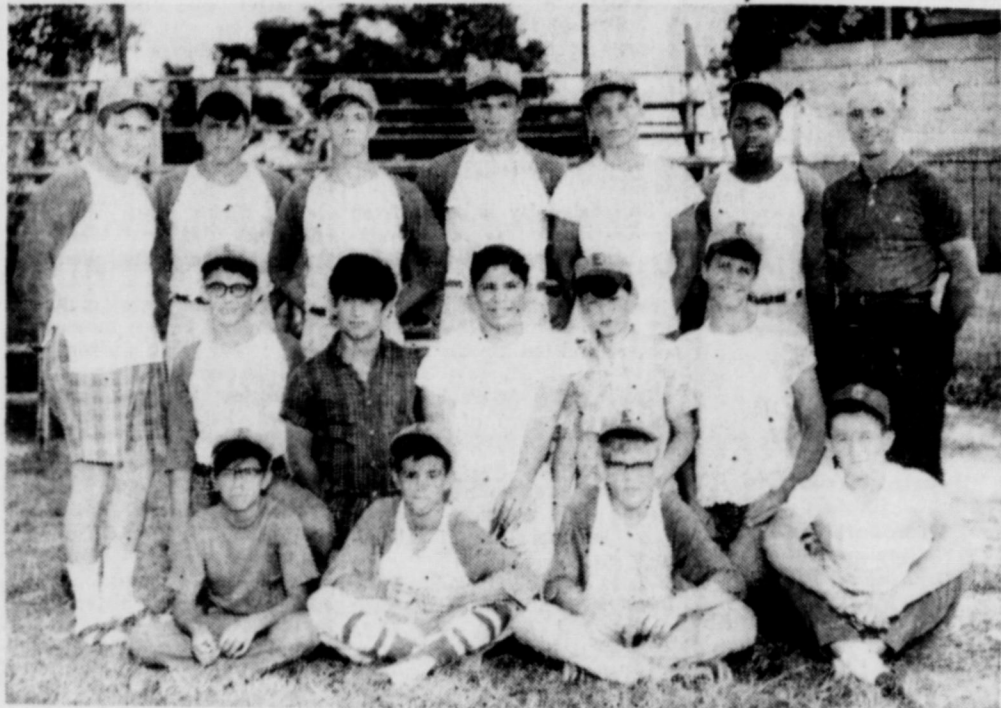

Petitions Ask Elections to Combine Olden, Eastland Independent School Units

A meeting will be held Friday morning in County Commissioners Courtroom to discuss a date for setting the elections, County Judge Scott Bailey announced on Wednesday. Time for the meeting will be 10 a. m. and all persons who signed the petitions and school officials from Olden and Eastland are invited to attend and participate in the date setting, he said.

Judge Bailey said he has found the petitions to be sufficient in number of names of qualified voters.

He guessed that Saturday, Aug. 24 to be the earliest date possible for the election.

Petitions asking elections to consider the consolidation of the Olden Independent School District with the Eastland Independent School District were filed with County Judge Scott Bailey Monday morning.

The petition from Olden contained the names of 42 persons and the one from Eastland contained 24 names. Only 20 qualified voters are required to call such elections, officials report.

Judge Bailey said that he would probably check the validity of the signers Monday against the poll lists from the two towns and call the elec-

tion on Tuesday. Most likely date for the elections in view of the 20-day absentee ballot period, would most likely be late August, possibly, Saturday, the 24th.

The matter would have to carry in both towns to accomplish the consolidation of Olden with Eastland, it is reported. In effect, the Olden voters would be voting to determine if a majority of them want to consolidate their school system with that of Eastland and the Eastland voters would be voting to determine if the Eastland school would receive the Olden system.

Many questions naturally arise from such a situation, and the word "consolidation" is relatively fresh in the minds of Eastland Countians in view of the six-district vote only a few years ago. A proposal to consolidate six of the nine (at that time) systems into one giant district was soundly defeated in each district then.

Knowledgeable authorities doubt that the voters in Olden will vote to consolidate at this time. It is further expected that school officials in Ranger will probably extend an invitation to the Olden officials to consider consolidating into that system.

The Olden schools are scheduled to open Sept. 3.

Last consolidation into the Eastland system was in 1949 when the Morton Valley Independent School District was consolidated into the Eastland system. Last consolidation in the county was when Scranton joined the Cisco system several years ago.

The question of "incentive aid" (a subject that drew much attention back during the six-district vote) would come under careful scrutiny under the proposed consolidation. The aid is a state program in which school districts which absorb other districts are granted certain amounts to assist them financially.

Presumably the teacher contracts and any other obligations now held by the Olden system would be absorbed by the Eastland system. The Olden system has no bonded indebtedness and is one of the few districts in the state to enjoy that distinction.

The Olden system is now scheduled for some eight classroom teacher units, an agriculture teacher, a coach, a superintendent, a part-time principal and a part-time home economics instructor. These probably would be reduced under consolidation, authorities report.

The Olden trustees have individually and so far, unofficially, expressed disapproval with the consolidation move, believing, they say, that it is not necessary at this time.

To be eligible for the state's incentive aid, the new consolidated district would have to have a total average daily attendance of 750 — which the Eastland and Olden schools would have.

'Port Completion Expected Aug. 10

Jaycee President Wade Freeman announced that work on the Eastland Airport is scheduled for completion by Aug. 10. The Jaycees adopted the airport project in February 1967. It included a paved, lighted runway, 4,000 by 50 feet.

Dick Dixon, president of the Jaycees at that time, said then, "Eastland needs an adequate airport. The club believes that the town will stand a better chance of securing industry with adequate airport facilities and we believe this is the best way for us to serve Eastland at this time."

Dixon appointed James Wright general chairman of the project. Wright outlined plans for the runway, stating that the "impact area" of 500 feet at each end would have a

12-inch base, while the other 3,000 feet would have a six-inch base beneath the topping.

Freeman said the Jaycees did the actual labor involved in survey and clearing work and built the proper water drainage facilities near the runway. The project was financed by "about 75 percent of all money earned by Jaycee projects in the last year and a half", Freeman said. He added that the total cost is expected to be "slightly less than ten thousand dollars or about one-fifth of the estimate given by the State Aviation Agency."

The runway will be surfaced and the lights will be moved from the old runway in the next few days.

Dick Johnson is serving as coordinator of the work.

Funeral services for Charles L. Guinn, 90, long-time resident of Eastland County, were conducted at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Rust Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Floyd Boulware, Methodist minister, officiating. Burial followed in Oakwood Cemetery of Cisco.



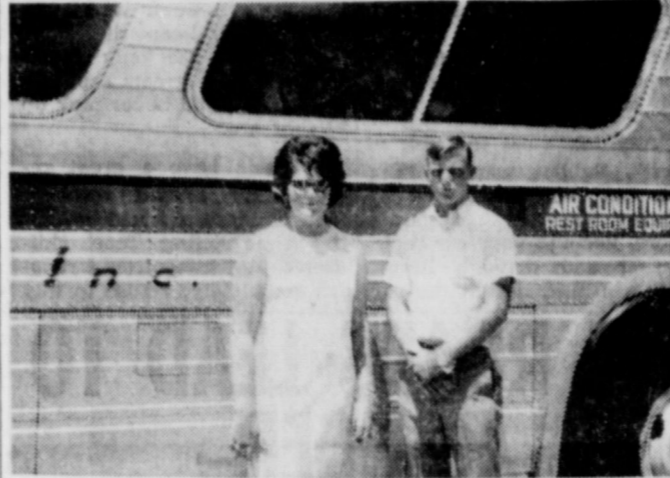

Summer Time Is Best Time for Backyard Cookery Art

"Backyard Bar-be-Que" is a way of life in the county. Eastland residents regularly enjoy meals, both indoors and at lake lots. The menu seldom varies: baked potatoes, salad, and ice cream or lemon. "bar-be-que" may be any name; many people do not use any type of sauce when cooking on an outside grill. J. D. (Oleta) Barker, secretary in the County-District in Eastland, said, "I cook outside, and

charcoal or wood and a new gas grill, a gift from her son, Robert Justice of Abilene. Mrs. Justice said, "We do not care for sauce or even the smoke flavor. I turn the grill on high, salt and pepper the meat, turn the grill down to low, and put the meat on to cook. If a guest prefers rare meat, his portion can be removed quicker. Usually I cook the meat slowly for some time. We serve baked potatoes and a green salad with the meat." Mrs. Justice also has a daughter, Janice, who teaches school in Lubbock. Mrs. J. T. (Louise) Gregory of Eastland said, "We mix Worcestershire Sauce and melted butter in equal amounts and brush it on the meat often while it is cooking. We use a regular bar-be-que grill with charcoal for the meat, but we bake the potatoes in the oven. We serve a green salad with the meat and potatoes, but seldom serve a dessert."

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a diem of not exceeding five Dollars (\$5) per day for each Regular Session and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty days. In addition to the per diem Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from their seat of government not to exceed one round trip per session during such time as the Legislature is in session, which shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session." "Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation of any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to the states and individuals who are unable to care for themselves or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). "Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer or prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state." "Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)." FHA's Role in County Explained for Lions

"Among the greater needs in Eastland County today is the development of feed grain crops and more modern housing and rental units," O. M. Boyle, county supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration, told members of the Eastland Lions Tuesday. Citing "leadership and credit" as the two things that will make this county "go", Mr. Boyle explained his agencies work for members at the weekly luncheon meeting at the White Elephant Restaurant. Gilbert Meredith was program chairman and introduced Mr. Boyle, a 28-year veteran with FHA, who moved here in 1966, but didn't bring his family until mid-1967 because he couldn't find adequate housing, he explained. A division of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, FHA has a role of education and making non-competitive loans for such things as home purchases and repairs, water systems (such as that at Olden), beautifying recreation areas, installing sewer systems, technical advice, conservation and generally serving the citizens of the area. Lion Tamer Jeff Glazier presided and guests introduced included Bill Morris of Dallas, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Amis of Richardson, George Hendricks of Sweetwater, and Mike Clifford, Frank High-tower, Mike Siebert and Clara June Smith, all of Eastland. Explaining that all of Eastland County, including its towns, is considered "rural" by USDA, because there are no cities of as much as 5,500 people, Mr. Boyle told about the Technical Action Panel (TAP) which he heads, and which has been instrumental in work on the Sabanno Water Shed, development of the Pioneer Co-Op, developing of the Lakewood Recreation Area, encouragement of some 1,500 acres of Coastal Bermuda in the county, work on the Morton Valley water supply program and other people-serving programs. Closing with a brief thought on stewardship, Mr. Boyle pointed out that all people, regardless of their "holdings" are but tenants on this earth, and have a responsibility to be about helping their fellowman as well as making gains for themselves.
