Dallas Man Will Direct Hymn Festival

Bill Mann, director of Evangelistic Music of First Methodist Church in Dallas, will direct a Hymn Festival Revival at First Methodist Church in Eastland, Mar. 5, 6, and 7. The public is invited to attend the services at 7:30 each night.

Mann was born in the ore-mining city of Bessemer, Ala. and attended elementary and high school there with his brothers and sisters. He began his study of music at the age of 16. A very fine teacher of voice, Mrs. Phyllis Pumphrey who now lives in Birmingham, worked with Bill for many years, and is responsible for the musical knowledge and vocal technique that today makes Mann such an outstanding singer of all songs.

In 1945, at the close of World War II, Paul Moon, a member of Homer Rode-Heaver's firm, heard Bill sing in the chapel of Williams Field Air Force Base in Chandler, Ariz. Moon urged Bill to consider prayerfully the possibility of going into Christian service as a gospel singer. This was the beginning for Bill; the start of an interesting life in the work of the Church, singing for Christ.

While serving as Director of Youth Activities at the First Methodist Church of Baton Rouge, La., in 1952, Bill organized one of the finest teenage programs to be found in the country. He was then called to organize and carry out an extensive youth program in the second largest Methodist Church in the world, First Methodist Church of Houston. He accepted the position and was very successful in his work there.

Mann joined the other recording artists of Word Records, Inc. in October of 1957. His records have met with great success due to the depth and sincere feelings of the singer himself. To Bill Mann, each song brings a message, and this message he passes on to his listeners in the inspiring Mann style.

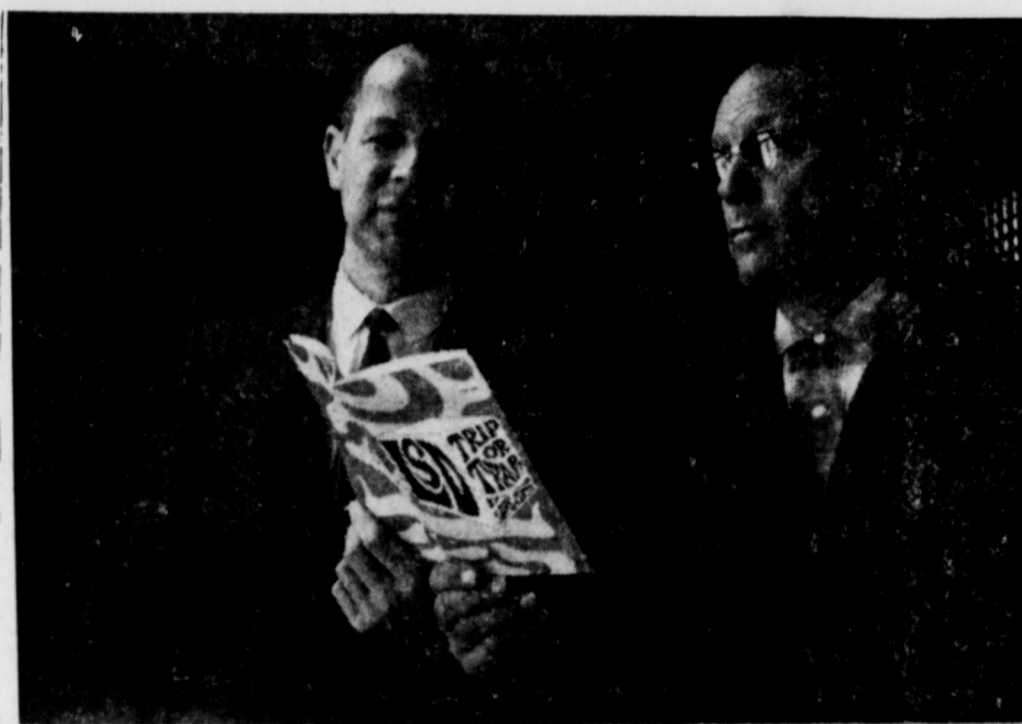
She was born Nov. 29, 1889, in Coryell County and had lived in Eastland County for the past 50 years. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Mrs. W. S. Poe of Eastland was a mere garter snap from pure joy this week when she received a letter from Mrs. Charles S. Robb, the former Lynda Bird Johnson.

Mrs. Poe of 514 S. Seaman, has a very unusual hobby — she makes blue garters for brides. She has made fourteen of these over the past ten years and most of the girls who have worn them have been Eastland girls or have been brides of Eastland boys.

However, one girl who has received one of Mrs. Poe's heavily-beaded garters is not an Eastland girl even though she is a true Texan — Lynda Bird Johnson.

Mrs. Poe had thought of sending one to Luci Johnson when she married, but said she just never got around to it. So, when it was announced that Lynda would marry, Mrs. Poe began to make a garter for her.

The blue garter that Lynda received was made of pale blue satin ribbon with lace to match. Mrs. Poe dyes the lace herself. The design was outlined in blue and crystal beads.

Hearing Set For Friday In Cisco Burglary Cases

A hearing will be held at 10 a. m. Friday in Judge Scott Bailey's juvenile court at the courthouse in Eastland for two Cisco youths apprehended and charged with auto theft and breaking into several local homes.

Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett returned the boys, 15 and 16 years old, to the county Sunday from Sanderson where they were caught with the auto that was stolen from the V. B. Fergusons in Cisco last Tuesday. A number of items taken in the home thefts were recovered in the car, police said.

Mr. Ferguson reported that his car did not seem to have engine damage. A wheel and tire had been removed and sold, he said.

One of the boys was released Sunday afternoon to his father, and the other was still being held Tuesday morning. Under juvenile law, names of the youths cannot be used and handling of their cases is left pretty much to the juvenile court.

A half dozen homes were burglarized in recent weeks.

\$6,000 In Fees Paid, Primary Candidates Ready

Approximately \$6,000 has been paid in filing fees by candidates in the May 4 Democratic Primary, County Democratic Chairman A. E. Crawley of Ranger reported Wednesday. Deadline for payments was Tuesday midnight.

Candidates were assessed at the rate of seven per cent of a years salary, except for those offices where fees are set by other means, due to multiple-county districts.

A report of the filings, given by Mrs. Scott Bailey of

Cisco, Executive Committee Secretary-Treasurer, is as follows:

Cong. Omar Burleson, \$68. His annual salary is \$30,000, but his House of Representative district includes some 31 counties.

In the 91st District Court judgeship race, Earl Conner Jr. of Eastland and Truman Kirk of Cisco, each paid filing fees of \$1,260. The annual salary is \$18,000.

James Weeks of Abilene paid \$4.17 as a candidate on the state school board.

In the state representatives race, Byron Richardson of Cross Plains, Bob Mann of Mineral Wells and Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge, each paid \$10 fee, as set by law.

Edgar Altom and Eddie Pietrozsek, both of Eastland, each paid \$386 as candidates for county tax assessor-collector, salary for which is \$5,520.

L. E. Sublett paid \$386 as county sheriff candidate.

In the County Commissioner's Race, Pct. No. One (Eastland, Olden and Ranger) Danny Woods of Olden and Johnnie W. Morren of Eastland, each paid \$323. Salary is \$4,620.

In the Pct. No. Three (Rising Star) Commissioners race, L. J. Collins and Delbert Tarver, both of Rising Star, each paid \$323; salary is \$4,620.

Constable Porter Woods of Eastland paid \$105; as did Albert White of Gorman; W. H. Kornegey and F. D. Chambers at Rising Star; A. W. Dawson and W. A. Evans of Cisco; and Ralph W. Veal of Ranger.

Mrs. Bailey said that the executive committee will meet March 18, to draw for places on the May 4 Democratic Primary ballot.

The collection was taken while the Horace Horton family attended a wedding rehearsal dinner for their daughter, Donna, and Jackie Wayne Lyles who were married Saturday night in Denton.

The guns were prominently displayed in the new Horton home. High ladders were necessary for burglars to have removed the guns. Two of the guns were used in the Santa Claus Bank robbery in Cisco in December, 1927. They were at the Cisco Bank, where they have been on loan since last year when the bank celebrated its 50th anniversary.

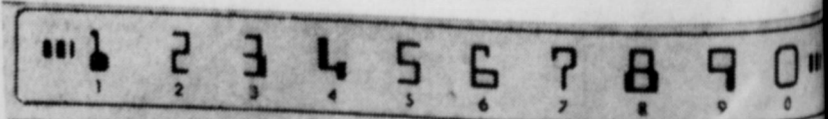

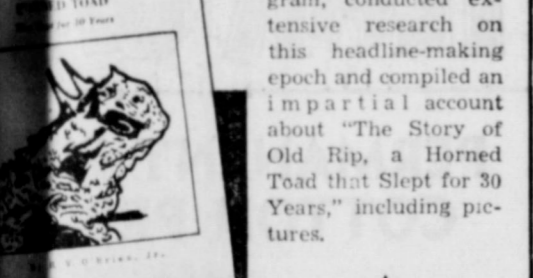

It's Coastal Plantin' Time

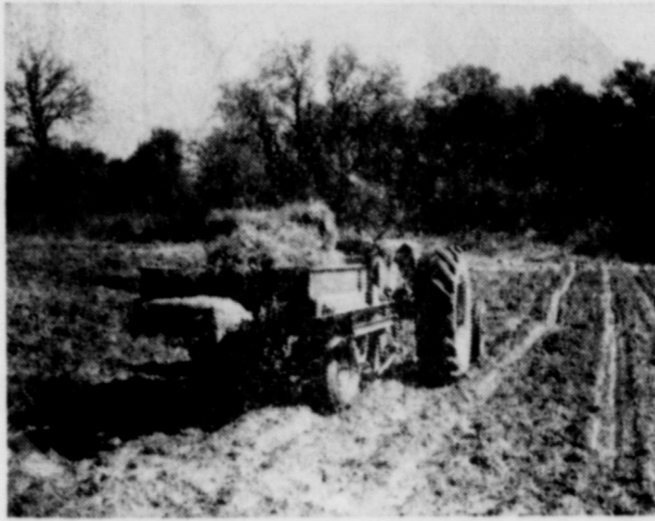

It is again the time of year to establish Coastal bermuda grass. The favorable moisture conditions should help assure producers of a good stand and growth if the simple known rules of planting are followed.

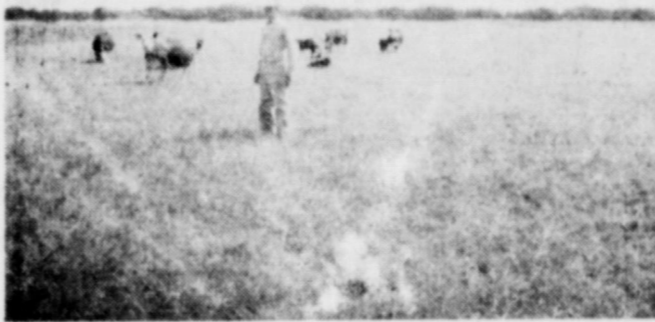
Even under the best conditions new plantings of Coastal bermuda grass will occasionally fail to become established. Poor weather conditions will some times cause a failure when everything has been done in a workmanship way. However, the great majority of poor stands can be traced to conditions which are under the control of the farmer. Plan ahead.

Be ready when planting time comes. If you jump into the job with no forethought and unprepared, you are going to be disappointed. Be sure your soils are adapted to Coastal Bermuda, generally sandy land and bottom land. Prepare a good seedbed well in advance of planting time.

A good seedbed is one you would work up for planting any field crop. The land should be plowed in the fall, kept free of winter weeds and should be firm and moist at planting time. Use good planting equipment. Some sprig planters are easier to use than others but any machine can be used that will place the sprigs at the right depth, distribute the right amount of sprigs uniformly and cover them properly. Use the fresh, healthy sprigs. Poor quality sprigs cause many failures. Sprigs dug and left exposed to the sun and wind for a long period of time make poor planting material. A fresh supply should be dug each day - preferably in the early morning.



JERRY MEHAFFEY of Gorman owns a 160 acre farm located three miles south of Carbon. The above picture shows a Coastal Bermuda sprigging machine in operation. Jerry planted 163 acres of Coastal in 1964, built cross fences to divide this area into three pastures and constructed farm ponds for livestock water. A cow and a calf is run for a six-month period on approximately two and one half acres. Fertilizer in keeping with soil test is applied annually.



A. J. ROGERS of the Chaney Community was the Upper Leon Soil-Water Conservation District's Outstanding Conservation Farmer in 1957. Mr. Rogers is shown with his cattle in a pasture of coastal bermuda grass established in 1963. Mr. Rogers owns a 99-acre farm and he has established 43 acres to coastal and the remaining acreage is farmed to peanuts.

They should be kept moist and covered in a shade until used. When hauled, sprigs should be tightly packed, sprinkled, and covered with a tarp. Baled sprigs are easier to handle and transport than bulk sprigs. Plant sprigs in moist soil. Pack soil firmly around the sprigs to cut out the air. Sprigs planted this way will remain alive for several days or even weeks. Planted in dry soil they must have rain within a few days. Plant at right time.

Sprigs may be planted anytime between the middle of February to the middle of June, if other conditions are good. Early plantings usually do better. Plant sprigs at the right depth - about 2 inches in most soils. It is best to leave one end of the sprig sticking out if possible, especially if the sprig is not dormant. Break soil crust with a rotary hoe or harrow if a hard rain has fallen before shoots have come out.

Keep the field clean. Control competition. It is a good idea to mark the rows and cultivate until the runners begin to cover the middle. Stop mowing when the mower is clipping the Bermuda plants. Spraying has proven to be very effective for control of weeds. Fertilize properly. Fertilize at planting time and follow up with additional applications as needed. Rates,

and analysis should be based on current soil test. If the field is really foul with weeds, delay fertilizing until the Bermuda begins to make runners. Don't wait until you have a solid stand. Without fertilizer it may take years to get that stand. Don't break or tandem the field after the grass has been planted. You may kill some weeds plowing but you will

normally encourage many more than you kill. A good stand of Bermuda will take out the weeds. Graze cautiously the first year - if at all. Close grazing during the year of establishment will retard root development and heighten the chances of the new stand freezing out in the winter. After establishment don't fail to fertilize the grass regularly. Always leave at least a 6 inch top growth for best production.

Farmers and ranchers of Eastland County have established approximately 1,500 acres of Coastal Bermuda per year for the past four years. A good stand and growth of Coastal Bermuda properly fertilized and managed will normally run a cow and calf for a 6 months period on 2 to 3 acres. These pastures grazed during the growing season often permit producers to give rangeland much needed rest periods permitting the desirable native grasses to gain in vigor and produce a seed crop to thicken the present stand. Native range grasses rested during the growing season make maximum growth and furnish excellent forage for winter use.

Several conservation contractors are available to plant

Cost share assistance is available to producers having Great Plains Conservation Program contracts. Public Invited to View Culmination Students' Long Months of Work

Term projects of Junior and Senior English students will be displayed in the Eastland High School library all day Tuesday, Mar. 5. Visitors are invited to the exhibit anytime during regular school hours.

Each student compiled a series of themes, book reviews, and pictures on the subject of his choice. Generally the Juniors selected American topics and the Seniors chose English subjects, in accordance with the standard schedule for literature study in high school. Students chose authors, periods of history, wars, famous people, and current events.

The projects represent at least five months work and some students have worked almost a full year, beginning their research before school ended last year.

Purpose of the extensive project is to train the student to use both the library and other sources of reference (correspondence, visits, television programs, and others); to prepare research notes and cards; to select and reject material in order to write an interesting, complete report. Cover of the books have been decorated to accent the contents.

Requirements included reports on at least five full-length books on the subject; bibliographies, showing the research done; and footnotes to document direct quotations.

School Supt. Wendell Siebert said, "Our school sets standards which are difficult, but which can be mastered the way one masters anything in life: by diligent work."

"The third and fourth year English courses require work, hard work and lots of it. Meeting the requirements gives the student training in obtaining and using material. It gives him a strong sense of accomplishment for when the student completes his term project, he has accomplished something.

"Some of the students have said they might choose another subject, given the opportunity, but none of them would choose any other way of learning to research and write. These students are learning to schedule their time and energy. Many juniors, especially the boys who plan to play football next fall, have already started work on their senior projects.

"We invite each adult in Eastland to come to the high school library Tuesday, Mar. 5, to see the exhibit of these term projects. We think you will be interested in the various subjects covered; maybe surprised but certainly pleased at the quality of work done by these young people."
