## CHRIST PAGEANT SET BIGGEST CROWD

Christ, Moses, the Baptist will be in the annual Kenner Pageant that will be held at 3:30 p. m. Sunday, at the big amphitheater to their home midway between Cistland.

100 persons from throughout West Central Texas to be presented on the 360-foot, 12-stage complex. The various scenes will deal with the life of Christ from birth through resurrection, along with scenes on the lives of Moses and John the Baptist — all well known from Bible descriptions.

The scenes will include the birth of Moses, the Seven Plagues, the Ten Commandments, Preaching by John the Baptist, the Manger Scene, Baptism of Jesus, Walking on the Water, the Lord's Supper, Betrayal by Judas, and the finale, the Crucifixion.

Phil Kendrick, son of the J. H. Kendricks, is the director of the pageant. Musical background will be played by the Kendrick Family, which has a wide reputation for quartet and gospel singing. Volunteers make up the cast and will handle staging details.

Considerable improvement has been made this year at the Kendrick Amphitheater, including new buildings and stages in white stone finish. The stages include the running river Jordan, the Sea of Galilee, Mount Calvary and others.

Live animals for the scenes include a camel loaned by the Fort Worth Zoo, a grey donkey for the Mother Mary, a white donkey for Jesus' Triumphant March, horses for the chariots and the mounted guards of Herod, and sheep for the Shepherds in the Fields.

Mr. Kendrick, who has said that the pageant "is our contribution to the Lord's work," said there would be no admission charges. Some 10,000 cars can be handled in the parking areas, and there will be room for many thousands to spread their blankets and sit in the large area in front of the stage complex.

"Everybody's invited," Mr. Kendrick said. Mr. and Mrs. Kendrick and their three sons — Bill, Phil, and Pierre — and families began the pageant at the family farm some five years ago. Their investment in stages, and equipment has grown each year until it now is worth many thousands of dollars. Work goes on the year around, and the pageant area is well kept at all times.

Eastland people are being asked to help design a program of improvements for their town by the Chamber of Commerce, which will mail more than 1,200 letters and questionnaires early this week. Chamber President J. T. Gregory said, "We feel that the folks who live in and the ones who can best tell us the ones who can best tell us what they want and what

Eastland needs to become the best possible place to live and work."

A stamped, self-addressed envelope will be enclosed in each letter. Residents are asked to complete the questionnaires and return them by mail before Wednesday, April 17. All information will be confidential and will be used only in a compiled report, which will reflect the combined opinions of all those who answer.

Residents are asked to rate as "Good", "Average" or "Below Average" forty-two separate items dealing with community, city, school, and industrial facilities and services. They are asked to list as least five specific areas of

Eastland which need improvement.

The survey committee is composed of M. H. Perry, Frank Sayre, Lewis Tiner, Don Kinnaird Jr. Buddy Haun, and Grover Hallmark. Publicity committee members are Jay Staggs, Joe Culpepper, Ben McKinnis, and H. V. O'Brien.

The Chamber will base its planning upon the information received from the completed questionnaires. Gregory said, "We need the frank opinion of every Eastland citizen in order to get an impartial overall view of our town. We urge everyone to join together in this effort to find the best way to improve community services."

## City Getting More 'Sparkle' Every Day

Progress is being made toward the goal of a sparkling city before Easter, reported the chairman of the Cleanup Committee. The annual cleanup drive is being sponsored by the Civic League and Garden Club.

The city began picking up debris on April 1 and will continue until April 12. 



# Set May 2 On na Play Priority

The Sabanna Watershed includes slightly over 200,000 acres in Comanche, Eastland and Callahan counties. The Sabanna is a tributary of the Leon River above Proctor Reservoir which runs into the Little River and empties into the Brazos River. Present annual damages resulting from flooding in the watershed include crop and pasture \$55,000.00, other agriculture property \$35,000.00 and damage to roads and bridges \$10,000.00. Total damages are estimated to be at about \$100,000.00 annually.

Soil Conservation Service officials point to the loss of from 6 to 10 inches of top soil on about 15,000 acres annually and they also point to crop and pasture damage which is rather substantial. Conservative estimates are that erosion damage to the flood plain has reduced production 40% during the last 20 years. The successful completion of this project should reduce flood damages by about 70%. Reduction of sediment damage should be reduced by 70 to 90% and erosion control should approach 80%.

Wilson pointed out that the May 2 Hearing will culminate several years of activity pointed toward approval of this project. In September, 1966 the Watershed Association submitted its proposed project to the State Soil and Water Conservation Board and to the State Soil Conservation Service. In February, 1967 the application was tentatively approved pending a field examination to determine feasibility of the proposal. In October, 1967 a 4-man survey team from the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and Soil Conservation Service conducted a survey of the Watershed area and concluded that the project was feasible. On November 16, 1967 the State Soil and Water Conservation Board approved the project following the report of the Survey Committee.

Recently Wilson received a letter dated March 8, 1968, from Mr. Harvey Davis, Executive Director, Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board stating that the Hearing to establish priority for the

project had been set for May 2, 1968.

The State Board Members will tour the Watershed beginning at 4 p.m. on that date and will conduct a Hearing in the Gorman High School Auditorium at 8 p.m. on the same date. Wilson stated that E. G. Henderson, secretary - manager of the Gorman Chamber of Commerce, is in charge of planning in detail the tour of the Watershed on May 2.

He stated also that the Woman's Study Club of Gorman is in charge of arranging publicity and encouraging attendance to the two events scheduled for May 2 and that C. H. Locke, secretary - manager of the De Leon Chamber of Commerce, and A. D. Jenkins, secretary - manager of the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, have been assigned the general chairmanship in their respective cities for coordinating efforts toward a large attendance at this event.

All local clubs and organizations in the Gorman area either have been or will be asked to perform specific tasks in preparing for the two events on May 2. Eugene Baker, publisher - editor of the Gorman Progress, has stated that he will devote the entire issue of the Gorman Progress on April 25 to the Sabanna Watershed Project. Interest in the project is running high throughout the Gorman community and many persons are expected to be on hand for the Hearing in Gorman.

Reports from DeLeon, Rising Star and Carbon indicate that the same situation is prevalent in those towns with project to interest in this important project. Mack Stubblefield of Carbon is coordinating efforts in that city. The Commissioners Courts of both Comanche and Eastland counties have indicated their support of the project. Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey and a representative of the Comanche County Commissioners Court are expected to participate in the Hearing.

It is expected that irrigation will increase in the Watershed. Some 25,000 acres of peanuts have been converted from dryland production to irrigation within the past few years in Comanche and Eastland Counties. Farmers will be anxious to take advantage of irrigation opportunities available to them following the construction of reservoirs.

There will also be opportunities for land owners to consider fish and wildlife development which will benefit the entire community. It is also anticipated that fishing, boating, camping and picnicking at all structures will be assets to the community wherever the reservoirs may be located. Another important advantage sought by the group is the protection which will be afforded Proctor Lake in materially reducing sediment presently flowing through the Sabanna into Lake Proctor thus causing costly build-ups of residue in the Lake.



Because of the knowledge and experience I have gained in the administration of the laws pertaining to the tax office, I feel justified in asking you to elect me to a second term, for which I pledge you the best effort I can possibly give.

I have lived in Eastland County since I was ten years of age.






